Last night a number of gentlemen met in the Board of Trade rooms on preceded by southerly gale with fog the invitation of Mr. W. G. Gosling, President of the Board of Trade. The step is one in the right direction and should do much to stimulate public opinion. The formation of matters is one of our greatest needs, and when a substantial advance has been made in this direction, the determination to have a clean healthy and beautiful city will be followed by steps to get it. Everybody recognizes there is need for improvement, and it is equally well recognized that such improvements will cost money, and we have no doubt that when the needs are well ventilated, citizens will be prepared to pay for them. Mr. Gosling made it clear that the movement is in no sense hostile to Municipal Councils, present or past, and the presence and active co-operaton of Mayor Ellis at last night's meeting showed that he has accepted the movement in the spirit which has brought it into being and that is a desire to co-operate in bettering civic

Mayor Ellis showed that substantial improvements of a permanent wature could be made at a comparatively small increase to the annual burden of civic taxation, if made as he advocated on capital account, and defrayed by way of loon. He took in the paving of New Gower Street and George Street. He dealt also with the extension of water and sewerage. opening up of new roads and streets, and placed the capital expenditure at

half a million dollars. This would not entail an extraordinary burden on the city, nor one which we believe citizens could not and should not be willing to boar. The co-operation of those who have the knowledge and experience of civic desirous of improvement is a health;

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 22. By a presidential decree, issued this afternoon, every day, including to-day, from now to the end of the year is made a legal holiday, in order to check the run on the city banks, particularly on the Bank of London and Mexico On promulgation of this decree the Bank opened its doors, but refrained from paying

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. Upon receipt of despatches, late last night from Rear Admiral Fletcher Commander of the U.S. battleship now in Mexican waters, the Navy cards in the other suits. MEXICO CITY, Dec. 22. Federal successes at Tepic and Mazatlan, both on the Pacific Coast of Mexico, are reported in official advices received here to-day. The

rebels are said to have been severel punished in a fight with the federals eight miles from Tepic, capital of the territory of the same name, while the federal forces which have been besieging Mazatian for many weeks are said to be forcing the rebels back towards Chuliacan, the capital of the State of Sinatoa.

LONDON, Dec. 22. The Bishop of London has author ized special prayers in the churche in his diocese concerning the Ulste situation, and has sanctioned a sol emn service of intercession for the preservation of peace in Ireland Meanwhile the Government's attempt to keep out arms has been checked according to the Times, which say that the Government has been advis ed that its recent proclamations against the importation of arms in to Ireland are ultra vires and cannot be sustained.

PARIS, Dec. 22. An official report of tuberculosi has just been published by Ammer oise Rendu. He notes that 85,00 people died from the disease in 1910 or 217 per 100,000 inhabitants. These deaths were mostly among young men. The curious fact is that the disease tends to diminish in Paris and increase in the suburbs. This i explained by the absence in the su burbs of establishments to fight i In a discussion of the report by the Municipal Council alcohol was cited es the cause of the spread of the dis se. 'The Council adopted a resolu t'on advocating a tax on pure alcoho to pay the cost of dispensaries and s: nitariums.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 22. The Bank of London and Mexico closed its doors to-day. The Banl was unable to secure currency wit' which to pay depositors, and war therefore forced to suspend. Bankers here generally agree with the management that the institution is solven and that the closing may be only temperary. The Bank has, it is said, excellent collateral. Silver and gold have long been scarce in the country and recently State bank bills hav been refused except in the State where they were issued. The busi nss done by the bank was chiefly commercial. It did not represent Mexican Government in the matters of loans to any extent. It was, how ever, rated as the second largest in stitution of the republic, having about \$30,000,000 in deposits.

OJINAGA, Chihuahua, Dec. 22.

General Salvador Mercado, who was Commander-in-Chief of the Mexican federal troops in the north, wadeposed yesterday. It is reported by U. S. army officers that he had es caped to the American side of the border. Mercado's evacuation o Chihuahua City, leaving that import ant federal stronghold open to occu pation by Villa's rebel troops, without a fight, was said to have caused his summary dismissal from com mand by orders from Mexico City General Francisco Castro, formerly commander of the federal troops a Juarez, is named as his successor Castro came to the Mexican side from Presidio, Texas, as a civilian. Muc' activity, believed by some to be pre liminary to a general movement by the federals away from the border was manifested soon after Castro cok command.




