





Preparations for Heavy Shipment-Channel Clear of Ice.

Washington, April 5.-The Russian Government is preparing to expor through Vladivostok 350,000 tons of wheat from the Ossk (Siberia) district, where there was a large crop behalf this year. Vladivostok has no facilities for handling such an amount o cargo, but as it is the only port from which the shipment can be made, temporary moorings and storehouses are being constructed.
