



TIGHTENING THE SCREWS.

LONDON, July 20. A strong, but unsuccessful German counter-offensive is still being fought out on the British front. The Teuenic armies find themselves again the object of similar attacks on both the eastern and western fronts. The recent successful advance having brought the British into line with the French at Hardecourt, the French offensive, which had been for some time in preparation, has been renewed on both sides of the Somme, on the French front, for about five

miles, thus far successfully. At the same time, according to Rome reports, a violent Russian ofensive has resulted in the Carpathians, Kovel, Vladimir, Volynski, and second stage of the battle for the possession of Kovel is continuing with extreme violence. General Brussiloff has brought up crushing forces from the Stokhod to Lipa to attack the Austro-Germans. Anxiety as to their ability to withstand the pressure is being reflected in the Berlin comnents on the situation. Military critics here discuss the new situation which has arisen out of Germany being now compelled to act on the defensive. They speculate how soon Germany may find herself obliged to make an attempt to shorten her exensive but, supposedly, thinly held ines, especially on the eastern front.

STILL ADVANCING.

LONDON, July 20. An official at midnight from the British headquarters in France reads: North of the Bazentin-Longueval line we have advanced along 1,000 yards in the face of stubborn opposition. Heavy fighting still ontinues in the northern outskirts of Longueval village and Delville Wood. On the remainder of the main battle front there is no change.

VICTORIES FOR THE FRENCH.

PARIS. July 20. French forces have captured the ntire first German positions from Estrees to the height of Vermando Villers, according to an official statement issued by the War Office tonight. They have also taken on both sides of the river, 2,900 prisoners in to-day's engagement.
