SIR ERIC GEDDES TELLS ABOUT THE SUBMARINE WAR.

LONDON, To-Day. Sir Eric Geddes, who recently suc-deeded Sir Edward Carson as First Lord of the Admiralty, made his first address in Parliament to-day and gave some interesting and anxiously awaited figures of the work of the Navy and shipping in general. His declaration that between 40 and 50 per cent. of the German submarines operating in the North Sea, Atlantic and Arctic Oceans had been sunk was not the least interesting of his announcements. There was an indication of the unceasing war which the British and American patrols are making on the submarines in his statement that during the last quarter the enemy had lost as many submarines as during the whole of 1916. The First Lord, speaking directly for his department, said that in addition to an increase in personnel the services of younger officers had been requisitioned to add strength to the experience of the older ones on the naval staff. 

Photograph Records of Our Fighters.

Eritor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-Since my return from the United States I have been looking over an accumulation of English papers, and came across the following item, which appeared in 'The Manchester Weekly Times,' of August 4th. need hardly add that the item in question gave me infinite pleasure to read. I may say for my own appreciation and love of our gallant lads, who have fallen in defence of our Country, and of those who are still fighting for freedom, for over eighteen months I have been collecting photographs of our Soldier boys. The following is the article referred to:-

GIVE YOUR PHOTO TO THE WAR MUSEUM.

The committee of the National War Museum are anxious to make as complete a collection as possible of portrait photographs of all British officers and men who have served or are serving in any capacity whatever with H. M. Forces during the present war.

The photographs should be, if possible, unmounted, to facilitate docketing. If the contributors will write on the back of the photographs sent in, name, regiment or ship, rank, decorations, and date, they will materi-

ally assist the committee. It is hoped, with the kind co-operation of relations and friends of officers and of officers themselves to establish a record of national interest and of permanent value as his-

Photographs should be sent to the Secretary, National War Museum, H. M. Office of Works, Storey's Cate,

Westminster, S. W. I. I humbly suggest to my Honorable friend the Minister of Militia, that such a collection should be made in this country. It would be of great interest to future generations of our Island Home. If I am of any assistance in a work of this kind, I offer my services freely and willingly to the Minister of Militia. I would also suggest the name of Miss Holloway, who would be invaluable at the inauguration of a National Art gallery for Newfoundland. A collection of photographs of our boys who have died that we might live, and those who are still fighting on land and sea, in addition to their record, history and deeds of valour, this will be a history worth handing down to their child-

ren's children. I understand there is a historical committee. What their duties are, and what they have done I don't know. Perhaps they have taken up the work of photograph collection, with a view to start a National Art Gallery. If so, I wish them every success.
