Teachers' Convention.

ITS NEEDS EMPHASISED.

"Genius without Education is like silver in the mine."—B. Franklin. These were the words of Benjamin Franklin, uttered many years ago, but they were held good to-day.

If we found a silver mine in Newfoundland, and did not make an effort to develop it, we would be contented to say the least—as accounted for to-day there is in our midst mines of wealth that we fail to take cognizance of.

A question whether more than 90 per cent of our population to-day can read and write intelligently, and it is obviously certain that fifty per cent at least of our population have not the necessary education they should have. It is a matter for common talk why such is the case. But what are we doing to prevent a continuation of this large amount of illiteracy? That should be the question troubling every teacher to-day. How are we, as geniuses among us? It is quite possible that we have. But without the necessary trappings of education we will remain in ignorance of most of them and our country thereby be the loser.

A writer in a city daily a few days ago says: "It is to be tried that we are poorer than we ought to be, but that is not because of lack of education," and points out the number of Newfoundlanders who have made "genies" abroad, and also the uneducated who have in certain instances amassed wealth here.

Now the examples given do not prove the assertion, the writer makes. It has been often said, "exceptions prove the rule" and thus it is with the quotation in question. I contend Newfoundland is poorer by reason of her lack of education. She is poorer materially because of foreigners with scientific knowledge in the past competed successfully against us in fish and oil markets. She is poorer materially because of the very fact that many of her citizens have been obliged to leave her shores by reason of their general non-education and its attendant evil, undevelopment of our natural resources. But besides diminished prosperity Newfoundland is poorer in moral and spiritual welfare, for owing to lack of education the children have been sent out to "find out for themselves" and have often been ruined physically and morally.

But coming back to our original thought and supposing that we have no geniuses in our country, we still owe to every man and woman an education that will make him and her responsible and intelligent citizens, and here I think teachers are too slow in tackling the problems of the times. It is true that here and there teachers are awakening and the conferences at Bay Roberts and Winterport are worthy of commendation. Good as it may be, however, there is something more general wanted, and as the Summer School is to be continued in 1919 (so says report), a teachers' convention should be endorsed by every teacher and every teacher should make an effort to attend. Too long have the minds of the children here been neglected and treated as the undeveloped mine. It is time that the teachers to get into line and see that the men and women of to-morrow have the average knowledge sufficient for the common good, and even the bare fact that each and every child can read and write as the fruits of the teachers' efforts will be ample proof of the conference's benefit to the Colony.

When our country adopts Compulsory Education—and teachers should play an important part in making such a provision law—then shall we have assisted to develop the mine of human intelligence, and whether profit or loss, the result must be for the all-round good of the community.

PEDAGOGUE.

Mistaken Leniency.

Generally there is considerable popular sympathy on the side of commutating a death penalty to life imprisonment, although much of it is mistaken. But in the latest commutation in favour of the half-breed Beatty, of Theodore, Saskatchewan, indignation and not sympathy. The commutation is a marvel when you recall the man's crime. In the absence of Edward Beatty, the Chief Forest Ranger, who lives two miles from Theodore, Beatty beat Mrs. Beatty to death, and carried off her woods their daughter, a girl of twelve years, and kept her there for a day and a half. SOLDIERS TAKE NEW DISEASE INTO PARIS.

Germany Seeks Recognition.

Even in defeat the Germans are as haughty and arrogant as they were in August 1914, when because of Belgium's refusal to give them passage through that country, in order to attack France, they violated all precedents of honour, tore up all treaties and made Belgian resistance the pretext to turn the land into an "abomination of desolation." At the signing of the armistice on November 11th, 1918, there was a further exhibition of German self-regard which was however promptly ripped in the bud by Generalissimo Foch, and the envoys of Kultur were forced to accept and agree to the conditions imposed, distasteful and bitter as they were. But evasion is a notable German characteristic, and though three months have elapsed since the signing of the armistice have not yet been completed by the dishonorable Hun, and with commendable but misplaced leniency the Allies have severed the prolonged term of the agreement, rather than insist on the performance of its provisions. German ally and procrastination has followed procrastination until the patience of the Allies has been brought to the point of exhaustion and at length, prepared fresh terms which must be accepted ere any further renewal will be given. In the face of this which we have to term "passive defiance," the representatives of Germany who patently have no code of decency and whose ethics are not at all ashamed of their attitude, and if we can credit the various reports from abroad their rather glory in their conduct, the latest phase of German insolence being in the demand that the Allies recognize the new Berlin Government. Note the distinction. Not the German Government but Berlin. It may be tantamount to the same thing, but coming from the notorious Matthias Erzberger, there is enough significance in the difference to be a warning that should induce caution in opening any negotiations with the so-called Berlin Government. The purpose of the League of Nations, now in process of formation is to admit "every civilized nation which can be relied upon to promote the League's objects," a limitation which bars and bolts the entrance doors against the present day Germany, because that country, yet cannot be considered a civilized nation in the true sense of the term; neither can she be relied on to promote the objects for which the Society of Nations is being formed. The new democracy of Germany as represented by the Berlin Government, is not to be accepted as entirely free, at once, from the crimes and the suspicious of crimes attaching to the Germany of only a few months ago. In no sense has Germany carried out the provisions dictated by the victorious Allies and incorporated in the armistice, but ever has she been guilty of delay and of side-stepping. Her pleas for repeated extensions of time have been acceded to, but no haste or desire has been so far shown to fulfil her part of the agreement. Once she shows sincerity of purpose and genuinely begins to perform this, considerations for her admission to the Association of civilized powers will take place, but the length of time between now and then will depend on Germany herself, in the progress toward real democracy made by her people upon democratic principles of justice and liberty, and upon the production of evidence proving that they have received a change of heart, "based not merely upon defeat and international helplessness, but upon recognition of the nature of the offences against humanity and civilization." Erzberger's demand for recognition must therefore wait until Germany has repented and done penance for her many crimes against humanity.

A Vice-Regal Visit.

THE GOVERNOR AT THE PENITENTIARY.

At three o'clock yesterday afternoon His Excellency the Governor, Sir Alexander Harris and suite visited the Penitentiary and at once entered the Main Ward, where he was received by the Superintendent and the official staff. Here the prisoners were paraded and given an opportunity (which several availed of) to personally plead with His Excellency for remission of sentence. After a general inspection of the Male and Female Wards, Kitchen and Store-rooms, he passed on to the Industrial Department, where he spent half an hour or more inquiring into the details of the broom-making business, in which he seemed very much interested. Before leaving, Sir Alexander made the following record of what he thought of the institution and its present management:

"February 13th, 1919. "In pursuance of what I conceive to be an annual duty, I have made a thorough inspection of the Penitentiary in company with the Superintendent and (as regards the Women's Ward) the Matron. There are fewer prisoners than last year—26 total. I am glad to report the favorable impressions of last year. Every pains are taken to keep the place "credible, and the Superintendent gives a good account of the general character of the prisoners. But there are no cases in which, at present, clemency could be exercised, though some eight or ten prisoners spoke to me, after the "parade, in the Wards. "C. ALEXANDER HARRIS, Governor."

M. C. L. I.

"That a League of Nations as proposed by President Wilson is essential" was the resolution debated at last evening's meeting of the M. C. L. I. Mr. J. S. Currie led the affirmative side, and Mr. S. P. Whiteaway the negative, each side adducing strong reasons for and against the scheme. Mr. Currie contented himself with presenting President Wilson's idea of a League of Nations as delivered by him in a speech. The subject was so wide in its scope that it was impossible for him to deal with it thoroughly in the 15 minutes at his disposal. The idea is no longer in its theoretical stage, as the Peace Conference, composed of the leaders of the great nations, is now engaged in considering its feasibility. For many years, men have thought of the idea of a League of Nations, where freedom of the seas, equality of nations, and the safety of peace would be guaranteed. For the last three or four years the world has witnessed a League of Nations—the great unity of nations prosecuting the war with common service and common sacrifice, and the feasibility of the idea could no longer be doubted.

Other speakers for the affirmative side spoke of the balance of power of the world, and its failure to prevent wars and strife, which was, after all, the underlying principle of a League of Nations. If the idea were not feasible the great American continent would not be so enthusiastically supporting it, nor would the British Empire and other great nations of the world. In spite of old failures new ideas should be tried. While conglomeration of nations failed to keep the peace of the world, it was because there was no armed force behind it with which to enforce the decisions of the combine. In spite of the pessimism of croakers all over the world, there were some good ones. The history of all great inventions was one of discouraging antagonism; when the trains, wireless, submarine, airplanes and others were many to ridicule their practicability and feasibility, but despite this the inventions went ahead, and despite failures of thousands, the idea of a League of Nations will go steadily ahead, until eventually realized in one great combination of nations, "the federation of the world."

The negative side, led by Mr. S. P. Whiteaway, gave many examples of old attempts at the same plan, all of which failed to accomplish what they had guaranteed to do. Smaller nations were promised the protection of the great powers, but in the end were set upon and destroyed by the very powers that were to support and protect them, as witness the example of Belgium, which was ravaged by the Congo Free State, and Armenia, ravaged by the Turks. The plan was not feasible because of the absence of community of race, language, morals, interest and religion, and until the heart of the world had been changed it was impossible and could never be worked with success. It is impossible to establish a league on paper agreements, and righteousness is one of the vital necessities of a League of this kind. The world is not ripe for it, and the time has not come. Many speakers spoke for and against the resolution, but when put to the vote was passed by a fair majority, and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Attempted Burglary.

A burglary was attempted on the store of Mr. John R. Robertson, Water Street, on Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning. When some, so far unknown individuals forced an entrance to the basement by smashing the windows on the back of the house. The local Jack Sheppard endeavored to reach the office and shop on the second flat, where there was a good possibility of a haul, but like the Prussians at Verdun, he found the passage blocked by lock and bolt, and had to beat a retreat—nothing doing. The tracks are plainly visible in the snow, and it is evident the culprit is not a fox from the mountains, but a cat which had a thorough knowledge of the surroundings, it is probable we shall hear of an arrest. So far as is known nothing of importance was taken from the lower flat.

Grocery Store Robbed.

In the early part of the week, the west end store of Mrs. Matthew Kent was robbed of a sum of money, comprised of silver and small change. The thief entered the shop while Mrs. Kent was in her husband's shop adjoining, and taking the cash box and money as she quietly sat entered. Luckily, the money is returned pretty quickly, Mrs. Kent intends to prosecute as she knows the name of the person who took it.

A panel blousing in the back is a feature on some of the new coats. A seemingly permanent style is the belted suit coat with a waistcoat. Sole white laces embroidered in silver are favored for evening wear. The latest coat is a combination of a tight scant skirt and a full, loose top.

Hats Off to Fishermen.

"The Grand Fleet could not exist without the trawlers," recently declared Lord Jellicoe speaking at Hull. Certainly Britain could not have existed without the Grand Fleet, so it follows that the nation was saved and the war won by the trawlers. But there is more to it than this—a great deal more. The fishermen who were left fed us. We could never have carried on without the fish they caught. The fried-fish shop has fed very many more of our folk than most people have any idea. To give one example. During the past year the fried-fish shops of one town—Bradford—have supplied 800,000 meals of fish weekly to their patrons.

At the beginning of the war the Admiralty had only 150 small vessels for patrol-work, for convoys, mine-sweeping, mine-laying, and number of similar purposes. Of course, it fell back on the fishing fleet, and before long had commandeered eighty out of every hundred trawlers, besides a host of smaller craft.

Before the war, the Grimsby fishing fleet numbered 700 vessels. Of these 453 were surrendered by their owners for Government purposes. Of the 247 left for fishing, no fewer than 156 have been destroyed by submarines, 270 since August 1914. As Mr. Clynes said recently, in the annals of war nothing will be found finer than this record.

Splendid Patriotism.

Take the record of the men. It is just as wonderful. Before the war, 1,100,000 miners worked our coal pits; these 400,000 joined up, on 36 per cent. This is a great record, yet does not equal that of the fishermen. In 1913, 37,422 men were employed in fishing in England and Wales. Of these almost exactly the same number joined the Navy or Reserve, while the rest of all military age were enrolled in a special Navy Reserve, and a certain number monthly. Scotland has done equally well. The casualties among fishermen have been very heavy indeed. They have averaged 2,760 a year since August 1914. As Mr. Clynes said recently, in the annals of war nothing will be found finer than this record.

The wonderful thing is the way in which the remnant of the fishing fleet has carried on. Even in 1917, in most respects our worst year at sea, no less than 40,000 tons of fish were landed in British ports. This is about one-third of the average taken in the five years preceding the war. Belgians helped in the work, and in 1917 the Belgian trawlers exited from Ostend caught 89,000 tons of fish.

Better days are dawning. At the Board of Fisheries all is bustle. Such fishermen as can be spared from the arduous task of mine-traveling are being sent back to their old calling with all speed. What is most encouraging for the future is the fact that the North Sea has had the rest which it has long needed. The Belgian coasts and the Dogger Bank are swarming with flat fish of a size not seen for a generation past. Fish before the war brought fishermen only one and one-third of a penny a pound. This must never happen again, but, all the same, we on land ought to be revelling in cheap fish by next spring.

THE EFFECT OF CARE IN DRESS.

The cause of obesity is a too abundant accumulation of fat in the cellular tissues of the body, and when not hereditary, it arises from numerous causes, such as, over-indulgence in sweets, and fatty foods, or possibly, want of sufficient and proper exercise.

A short brisk walk before breakfast is not only a tonic but a flesh reducer as well. Should the weather be unfavorable for a walk take some good indoor exercises, with dumbbells, Indian clubs, or calisthenics, before the corset is donned.

It means a great deal of time and patience if the stout woman would keep her flesh within fashion's boundaries. The present day mode of hairdressing does not permit of straight lines, and in consequence artificial means must be resorted to. Heated irons should never be used for curling the hair. Their use will injure the hair follicles, causing the hair to split, become dry and come out.

The hair can be very prettily waved by the aid of soft kid curlers. They are old-fashioned but not injurious to the hair. If one finds difficulty in keeping the hair curled even when it has been done in kid curlers, moisten the hair lightly with glycerine and rose water. This solution causes it to become a trifle sticky and more adaptable to the curling process.

A surprise chemisette of rose-colored voile has neck and front outlined with pleated bands of voile. Striped and blocked tricolette is charmingly worn as a sleeveless blouse over a skirt of plain color. Eyelet work, embroidery, self-colored, is one of the most refined forms of ornamentation on cloth frocks.

Our American Letter.

Our American letter
Charleston, South Carolina, Feb. 3.—Geo. Bernard Shaw, the British author, in his latest article, predicts a war between Great Britain and America, with Japan as an ally of Great Britain. He tries to show that England by insisting on her control of the seas will, when the time comes, attack this country should it attempt to build a navy approaching hers. Shaw's article bristles with sarcasm when it deals with Britain's professions of sincerity in the matter of Belgium's neutrality. According to Shaw, England was ready to attack Belgium if Germany had not done so, and that she could have prevented the war but chose the course which brought it about. Shaw warns the United States that England and Japan will be ready to attack this country at no distant date. Shaw is the English Harden but he is infinitely more dangerous to the peace of the world. He should be squelched along with William Randolph Hearst, and others of his type.

Great public works in the United States are planned to meet the situation which will be created by the demobilization of the troops; \$200,000,000 is the sum asked for this purpose and it is expected that in six months an era of unprecedented prosperity will see in that will remain for a decade. Building operations have been at a standstill during the war and when once they begin the problem of unemployment will quickly vanish.

The war has had a bad effect upon negro labor in the South. Large numbers of the blacks were drawn from the plantations and given work at high wages on government projects. They are now averse to returning to the plantations even though they are offered as high as \$100 a month. The huge wages earned in war work have completely turned their heads. Many negroes have had as many as 12 sons in the army and draw \$50 a month from each of them. The limited mentality of the black cannot adapt itself to new conditions until compelled by necessity.

A photo-play advertised as an idyll of the Newfoundland fisherman presented at one of the theatres turns out to have been filmed in Maine, the sardine fishermen of that State posing as Newfoundlanders.

It is reported from New York that the spoken drama is coming back in public favor. This is delightful news. The world has had a surfeit of motion pictures and will welcome a return to the old days when actors of flesh and blood thrilled us with their interpretations of human hate and love.

Anniversary of a Famous Battle.

The naval battle fought off Cape St. Vincent on February 14, 1797, between the English, under Sir John Jervis, and the Spanish—fifteen sail of the line to twenty-seven—brought England a victory much wanted at the particular juncture, and also gave Nelson his first chance of winning outstanding distinction. Of the nine ships cut off by Jervis before the Spaniards could turn their line of battle, Nelson in the "Captain" supported only by "Frodo" and the "Culloden," engaged six. The "Santissima Trinidad," the "San Josef," the "Salvador del Mundo," each of 112 guns, and three 74s. Later, Nelson was reinforced by the "Elenheim," Captain Frederick, and the "Excellent," Captain Collingwood; Nelson's ship at that time being nearly disabled and the ammunition almost expended. Yet in this condition he boarded and carried first the "San Josef" and then the "San Nicholas," himself leading the way with the cry of "Westminster Abbey or Victory." The Spanish admiral might yet have attempted to restore the fortunes of the fight with the intact main body of his force, but he declined action, and retired in the "Santissima Trinidad," which escaped to fight on another and far more disastrous day at Trafalgar. Sir John Jervis, who displayed commendable decision in engaging a fleet numerically so superior, was raised to the peerage, with the title of Earl St. Vincent, and awarded a pension of £3,000. For Nelson, who had achieved all the tangible results, inclusion in a promotion of rear admirals and the Order of the Bath was deemed sufficient. But his share in the battle, so spectacular as well as so effective, founded that great national popularity which he was to retain and increase until his death.

CITY'S HEALTH.—During the week 4 cases of smallpox, 1 of diphtheria and 6 of influenza were reported in the city. Ten houses were disinfected and released from quarantine. At present in hospital are 24 diphtheria, 3 smallpox and 16 influenza patients, while 4 with diphtheria are being treated at home.

Songs That Live in Memory.

(From the New York Herald.)

Very many years ago a wise man called Fletcher of Saltoun said that if he were permitted to write the songs for a people he would not care who made their laws, and the sentiment has gone echoing along the corridors of time. The present generation concerns itself overmuch, and not always sagaciously, with the makers of its laws, cares but little for its song writers, nor heeds the warning note in such a lyric as "Johnny, Get Your Gun," made popular at a time when the nation should have been looking to the priming of its muskets. But although we do not

know the names of our song writers, the songs themselves make an impression on our minds that remains long after they have become trite and passed into oblivion. There is not one of them, however, that will not in later years awaken memories long dormant. No Highlander can hear "The Cock of the North" without thinking of the plier propped against the wall with both legs crushed and playing that stirring music while the killed soldiers charged. "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp!" and "Rally Round the Flag" bring back the days of the Civil War to many an old defender of the Union. "The Bonnie Blue Flag" still stirs the heart of the Confederate veteran. "There's a Hot Time in the Old Town" recalls to the mind San Juan Hill and the Spanish War, as well as the many ragtime melo-

dies of which it was the first to become popular. Lyrics that catch the public fancy usually voice some passing mood or condition, but there is one theme that never passes—one that served singers and poets before Cadmus invented letters. Such songs as "When Stars Are in the Quiet Skies" and "Douglas Tender and True," may come and go, leaving tender memories behind them, but there is never a season, from mating spring to dreary winter, in which the passion that rules men's lives does not seek expression in some new melody.


