Worms That Stop Trains

That insects should be able to stop train seems, at first, impossible. It has, however, happened in several.

Just lately a train going from Rome to Avezzano, in Italy, was stopped by a dense cloud of locusts, which settled on the wheels and on the rails in swarms. As the train advanced it squashed thousands of them to a pulp, and this made the rails so slippery that the train could not go

What is perhaps more extraordinary is that a train should be stopped by worms. This has happened on the Warwick-Killarney line, in Australia. A train suddenly stopped dead, and nothing could be done to restart it, The wheels slid back, but would not advance. The rails were found to be covered with worms, and, as in the former case, when squashed by the wheels they made the line too slippery for the train to go forward. This has also been known to happen in Europe, on the line from Brunn to Farmers and Poulterers,

In Italy swarms of white butterflies have been known to settle on the railway lines, and so make tran-

sit extremly difficult. Perhaps the most amusing case or record comes from French Guiana, where thousands of little green frogs suddenly took up their abode on a railway track!
