tradition around the Colours was stronger then even than it is now. Probably, as I have suggested, Major Pipon looked upon them as a sacred trust, or even did not quite know what was best to be done. They may therefore be regarded as having been kept in the Church of St. Brelade in default of better knowledge. They must now have been in Jersey for nearly a century and for 40 years of nearly a century and for 40 years of that time in the custody of the Church. You have heard from the President of the Historical Society the somewhat romantic story how visitors from Newfoundland had their attention called to the Colours and how eventually they have been sent across to their proper home. In the absence of any Church that was actually contemporaneous with them we perhapss could not improve upon the solution which has now been adopted for giving them a permanent and wor-In concluding his address his Excel-

ency suggested that once a year the pupils of the city schools should be taken to the Museum to see the flags. Dr. J. Alex Robinson, who was to address the school children present, spoke but a few words as the heat of the room had become oppressive and many were showing the effects, several children having to be brought to the outer air.
