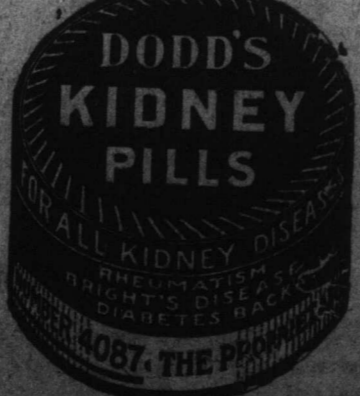

Rhodes Scholarship, 1923.

Movement of British Troops on Ulster Border.

Military Operations in Full Swing --- Regulars Drive Free Staters From Pettigoe --- Britain Must Stand by Treaty --- U. S. to be Represented on Commission of Enquiry

BELFAST, June 4.—Operations on a big scale are now in full swing on the Fermanagh border, several thousand troops of the British regulars are engaged in the military operations in reality about ten o'clock Saturday when troops with full fighting equipment marched from Enniskillen to the western side of Lough Erne near Belleek, while artillery, with motor cars, tenders, and all the necessary paraphernalia of war in its train, rattled along the narrow road. It was planned to place a big gun in position near Roscoe where it could command not only Maghera Amena but also Belleek and the fort overlooking it occupied by the Sinn Féin forces. Another phase of the operations was the landing of troops on the island in Lough Erne, a point but a few miles across the Channel to the Ulster territory occupied by the Sinn Féin forces. The movement was carried out with dramatic suddenness, several armored cars and tenders crossed the peaceful roads around Belleek, and along the road to Pettigoe, and at Lettercran, in the counties of Fermanagh, Tyrone and Donegal converge, they were under constant fire from Sinn Féin machine guns. There was intense machine gun fire from the Free State border all day on a six mile stretch without perceptible result.

FRANCE AND RUSSIA.
PARIS, June 4.—Premier Poincaré in a memorandum yesterday to all the powers which received invitations to attend the Hague Conference on Russian affairs demands that the Soviet Government withdraw its memorandum presented at the Hague meeting, M. Poincaré holds that the memorandum was a Soviet document replying to the memorandum of the inviting powers, and it should be treated in the same way as the original Russian memorandum, since it confined the attitude of the Soviet Government with respect to restoring property to foreigners indemnifying owners for damages sustained or recognizing the Russian debt. The original Russian memorandum at Geneva was withdrawn by Russia after the Allied objection to it had been expressed.

ULSTER'S TESTING TIME, SAYS CRAIG.
LONDON, June 4.—In the course of an interview Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, said "the testing time for Ulster has come. It may be the testing time for England has come. If we go down our flag goes down with us. We are fighting not only our cause but the cause of Great Britain." He declared the reason Ulster refused to have anything further to do with the boundary commission was because the two leaders of Southern Ireland had signed a pact which "in our opinion jeopardized the whole question of empire citizenship."

MONTECALM OFF AGAIN.
MONTRÉAL, June 4.—The Canadian Pacific steamship Montcalm which went ashore in the St. Lawrence on Friday night, has been pulled off by tugs and towed to Quebec. The passengers have been transferred to the Canadian Pacific steamers Cassandra, Metagama and Canada.

A WILD NIGHT IN BELFAST.
BELFAST, June 4.—One civilian was killed and twenty wounded during two hours sharp fighting on Saturday night between Republicans and special in Cromac and Joy Streets. The constabulary riddled houses with machine gun and rifle fire, while the civilians used bombs, rifles and pistols. As the curfew hour approached communication with the centre of the city was cut off and everyone on the streets searched with much inconvenience to many hurrying to catch the last train.

WILL RE-ACT, SAYS HENDERSON.
LONDON, June 4.—Arthur Henderson, M.P., Labor Leader, says the extremists among the employers of the United Kingdom may think this an opportune time to curb the power of the trade unions and teach the workers their place, but their success in this direction will only have the effect of strengthening the influence of the extremists in the working class movement.

AMUNDSEN EXPEDITION LEAVES.
SEATTLE, June 4.—The auxiliary power schooner Maud, bearing the Amundsen Polar Basin Scientific Expedition, sailed from Seattle yesterday, for Nome, Alaska, on the first leg of the five year voyage through the Arctic ice packs.

MAGISTRATE MURDERED.
BELFAST, June 4.—James Flanagan, a resident magistrate, was shot and killed this morning.

Ancient Building Had Great Room.

Remarkable discoveries of the ruins of an ancient and heretofore unknown civilization have recently been made at Chalchihuites, state of Zacatecas, Mexico, according to information that has been received by the Mexican government authorities. While exploring the ruins that have long been known to exist at Chalchihuites the discovery of a magnificent room, or saloon, 1000 feet square, was made by J. V. Kidder,

archaeologist of Andover, Mass., and Clarence Hay of the Museum of Natural History of the United States. In this saloon are 28 beautifully carved columns of stone. Many prehistoric relics were found while excavating the ruins, it is stated.

The statement is made on the authority of archaeologists who have visited the ancient city at Chalchihuites and inspected the ruins brought to light by the recent excavations that they were the work of a civilization which had no connection with the prehistoric race that built the buildings and temples that are now in ruins in far Southern Mexico, nor are the ruins at Chalchihuites similar in any respect to those of San Juan Teotihuacan, where the pyramids of the moon and sun are found. Neither do they bear any resemblance to the ruins at Casa Grande in the northern part of the country. It is said to be evident that the people who built the wonderful city where the little people of Chalchihuites now stands were highly cultured and especially advanced in the arts.

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Impressive Military Ceremony.

Colors of N. F. Fencible Regiment Deposited in Museum — Prime Minister Accepts Flags For Colony — His Excellency The Governor Makes Interesting Address.

An impressive ceremony took place yesterday afternoon when two flags of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment were deposited in the Museum under the supervision of the Agricultural and Mines Department. Elaborate preparations for the ceremony were made by the Newfoundland Historical Society, and all sections of the colony were invited to attend. A guard of honour consisting of the C.B. Cadets, the Catholic Corps and the Newfoundland Band were also in attendance. His Excellency arriving at 10 p.m. his Excellency arriving at 10 p.m. his Excellency arriving at 10 p.m.

E. Pilon and deposited in the Lady Chapel of the Church by the members of the Pilon family. On the return home of the Newfoundlanders mention was made of the flags, and on the 12th December, 1914, a paper on the "Newfoundland Regiment of the Olden Times" was read by Miss Morris at the Current Events Club, which was published in the Evening Herald on the 16th January, 1915. An article afterwards appeared in "The Distaff" written by Miss Morris, entitled "Flags of the Newfoundland Fencibles." Subsequently the Historical Society took up the matter and proposed to obtain the return to Newfoundland of these flags. Mr. Shortis, the Corresponding Secretary of the Society, was authorized to communicate with Sir Edgar R. Bowring, High Commissioner in London and in March, 1920 received the following letter from him:—

Dear Mr. Shortis. Thank you for your letter of January 22nd and February 21st. It is a great satisfaction to me to know that the trophies obtained by this office were acceptable to the good people of St. John's. Since last writing you, I have had a very nice and most interesting letter from Rev. John A. Balleine, Rector of St. Brelade, Jersey, Channel Islands, and I am now enclosing for your perusal a copy of his communication. You will observe that Mr. Balleine has gone to some trouble on our behalf to obtain the views of those in whose custody the Newfoundland Banners have been held for a long time. He has ascertained that no objection is offered to returning the Banners to the Government of Newfoundland, but they will not agree so readily to transferring the flags to any private Society or Association. This is a difficulty that should be very easily overcome in my opinion, and I am accordingly asking the Colonial Secretary to interest himself in the matter, and probably you will like to get in touch with Mr. Lewis to obtain the views of the Government. There will be some expenses involved, of course, in the removal of the Banners, and I presume no objection will be raised to the suggestion put forward by the Rector that a brass plate should be substituted at the expense of Newfoundland when the flags are removed and returned to the Dominion. I have not yet been able to obtain

a reply from Bristol, but will send a reminder and will keep you informed as to how things proceed from time to time. Meanwhile I shall be glad to hear your views on the above matter with kind regards. Yours sincerely, (Sgd.) EDGAR R. BOWRING, High Commissioner for Nfld. H. F. Shortis, Esq., Sec. (Enclosure.) St. Brelade Rectory, Jersey, January 22nd, 1920. Dear Sir—Your letter of the 11th ult. has been transmitted to me by the Dean of Jersey. The statement on behalf of the "Historical Society of Newfoundland" that two banners, formerly belonging to the "Regiment of Newfoundland Fencibles" are hanging in our Parish Church is quite accurate. At the request of the late General Pilon, C.B. to whom they had come as an heirloom, they were placed there in the year 1882. In our ecclesiastical archives I find the following entry: "On the 14th September, 1882, the Flags of the Newfoundland Fencible Regiment, formerly commanded by Major Elias Pilon, were placed in the hands of the Rector and Churchwardens of the Parish of St. Brelade by Major General P. G. Pilon, C.B., R. Artillery, nephew of the said Major Elias Pilon, to remain in their custody and in that of their successors in the said Parish."

(Notes by Major General Pilon follow.) "I have been trying to get some account of these Colors, but have failed. All I know is that the colors are those of the "N.F.R." which was disbanded or converted into the "Newfoundland Companies" in the early part of this century. My uncle Major Pilon, was in command at the time and the colors evidently became his property." I submitted your letter to a meeting of our parochial ecclesiastical authorities last week, and also interviewed the daughters of the late General Pilon. Both parties agree that while they would offer no objection to the return of the banners to the Government of Newfoundland, they hesitate to give a final decision until they have ascertained the status of the "Historical Society."

Is there any possibility, however remote, of that body ceasing to exist and of the banners eventually being neglected or lost? Before the removal of the banners from your church could be effected, a faculty, incurring some expense, would have to be obtained from our local Ecclesiastical Court, and our authorities also suggest that a brass plate, indicating the reason of the return of the banners to Newfoundland should be placed in the Church. Sir—Reference is made to the 28th May, covering copy of Resolution passed by the Historical Society of Newfoundland, relative to certain Banners of Newfoundland Fencibles, now in the Church of St. Brelade, Jersey. I have the honor to intimate that the Government have instructed the High Commissioner, London, to arrange for the return to Newfoundland of these banners, and the payment of the expenses in connection with the same, as well as of a brass plate, explanatory of the event which will be erected in the Church at Jersey.

The proposal of the Government is that these Banners shall be in charge of the Government authorities, and be placed in the Museum under proper keepership, and with a detailed statement, setting forth so far as possible, all the circumstances in connection with these banners. I feel sure that this action of the Government will commend itself to the members of your Society. I have the honor to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, (Sgd.) ARTHUR MEWS, Deputy Colonial Secy., H. F. This completes the account of the Historical Society's connection with these flags. I now have the honor to request the Prime Minister, Sir Richard A. Squires, to formally acknowledge the receipt of the flags and to give them place in the Museum as the property of the Government. The Prime Minister, on behalf of the people of Newfoundland, formally accepted the flags, and intimated that they would be placed in the charge of Mr. George E. Turner, Esq., Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Mines. He congratulated the Society on having secured the trophies, and agreed with the idea that they should be placed in some public place where they could be always open to view. The flags being looped up with a ribbon were released by his Excellency the Governor. Simultaneously the bugle called the general salute which was given by the military party. Officers of the Royal Naval Reserve, the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, Comptrolary, Brigades of Artillery, and the Newfoundland Fencibles then addressed the gathering. THE GOVERNOR'S ADDRESS. The flags which we are about to install are said to be those of the Royal Newfoundland Fencibles. Now the first question which suggests itself is what were the Fencibles? I first became familiar with the word "Fencible" in regard to the old Malta Fencible Artillery, an appellation which survived to quite recent years, though I believe it has now been replaced by another. To determine the precise origin and application of the term I should have to refer to some authentic original authority; I have not this at hand but I find in the Manual of Military Law that "Fencibles" was one of the terms used for Corps raised on a volunteer basis, something less definite than the Militia. Apparently the original Fencibles were chiefly raised in Scotland; afterwards the term was applied to Regiments raised outside the British Isles. As regards the meaning of the term, it seems to suggest that they were to be used primarily for defence. My difficulty over this was that the Latin termination "billa" is usually used rather in a passive and not in an active sense, but on examining such authorities as are available I make out that this termination, which is apparently a variant from a suffix containing the root of the word for "bearing" or "bear," may also imply capacity for a particular quality. Therefore we may conclude that "Fencible" is used to mean a force primarily employed for the defence of a special locality. But before we come to the Fencibles in Newfoundland we find other traces of military effort and it is not inappropriate to give some short sketch of them. And here let me make one remark as to the importance of care in using evidence. The chief information which I have been able to get comes from Prowse's History and certain extracts produced by Mr. Shortis and Miss Morris of the Legislative Library. I have not seen originals and I have not been able to collate them. What we have is good as far as it goes; only it must be used with careful and exact reference to dates and the relations of the papers to one another. My conclusions might be modified by more complete material. In 1797 and 1799 there was a local Militia at St. John's probably raised for the emergencies of those times; we have extant some few documents referring to it. In 1717 it is recorded that the Second Somersetshire Regiment, afterwards called the "Fighting Fortieth" was formed of Companies raised in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, this was not directly a Newfoundland Regiment; but it kept the Newfoundland larder in touch with the martial spirit. In 1787, again in an emergency, the local Militia of Newfoundland was reformed and apparently 4 companies were embodied. In 1775 there are found traces of a most interesting episode in Newfoundland's connection with military prowess. That you will remember was the year of the war for American Independence. The Americans were keen to bring Canada in on their side. Canada was at the time denuded of British troops; it relied only upon half-hearted French, many of whom were much inclined towards the American cause. Carleton, the Governor, was left practically without support and was driven back on Quebec, at that time a principal military station. Here there appears to have been certain Companies of Newfoundlanders, probably details of Regiments such as the Second Somersetshires which we mentioned just now, recruited in Newfoundland. They were the chief representatives of an actually British race at that moment. There seems to be evidence that it was the presence and fighting quality of these detachments which turned the day in favour of England. So that it may be a fair claim that Newfoundland had a large share at that time in saving Canada to the British Empire. But, and this is a point to which I desire to direct attention, this was not done by the Royal Newfoundland Regiment which had not yet come into existence. It was apparently done by Newfoundlanders recruited for other Units. (See 7th Page.)

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Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review)
Codfish—The export of dried codfish this week totalled 6,697 quintals all from St. John's as follows:—

By schr. Olive Moore 2,185 quintals to Barbados from A. E. Hickman and Co., Ltd.; by schr. Beulah from Bowring Bros. 4,342 qts. to Bahia, and by S. S. Sabie 1,80 qts. to Farquhar & Co. Ltd., Halifax. The Oporto market on May 28th showed 25,743 qts. of Newfoundland fish with 7,772 quintals for the week's consumption, and two vessels just entering, the Nellie Walter, and the Port Union. The Newfoundland stocks are now very low and will be practically cleaned out by the end of June. Our stores were never cleaner in July than they will be this year.

Cod Oil—The local market is holding its own, but the foreign markets all show that the present prices are of the most temporary character and will not continue very long. The bulk of the old oil has gone forward to market, and there will not be much left when the new is ready. The revival

of industries in the United States gave great help to the local situation the past two months, and even better demand is in sight.

Flour—May wheat made a sensational decline in Chicago this week closing on the 1st at 117. Winnipeg wheat, however, kept up around 127. The quotations are now about on a level with July wheat in both these markets. The United States markets are looking well, but it is two or three weeks late. The crop outlook in North West Canada has improved greatly also, and is looking very hopeful. All indications point to cheaper flour in a few months. The local quotation is still \$10.25 wholesale for leading brands. The imports are now 94,000 barrels.

Pork—The pork market continues strong, especially Mess and Fat Back new importation, of which will cost considerably more per barrel than stocks now held in the local market. Ham Butts at \$29.50 for choice is an economic and comparatively cheap purchase just now. Other grades run at \$42.00 for Family Mess Rib \$29.50, Mess \$29.50, Fat Back \$28.00. There is a fair trade on this week owing to

supplies being purchased for the fishery.

Beef—Despite the strong tendency in pork the past three weeks, beef prices are a little easier. There was a considerable trade in this commodity in the local market this week owing to schooners from the outports taking on supplies for the fishery. More beef than usual this spring is being purchased by planters, and less pork, owing to the disparity in prices. A fair fishery beef can be had for \$20.00 a barrel as against \$29.00 for cheapest pork. Our grades are Bos Flank \$25.00, Bos Packet \$20.50, and the 3 grades of boneless \$20.25, \$19.50, and \$18.00 respectively per barrel wholesale.

Molasses—There has been an advance of five cents per gallon in Fancy Molasses at the market of origin, according to cables received from Barbados this week. The market is very strong at the advance, which means ten cents per gallon here. The price at Barbados is 40 cents per gallon, is of course received in wine gallons, and in addition to this the loss in gauge and other charges will increase the original price to fully ten cents per gallon. It looks as if we have seen the lowest price for this season in the early part of May.

Sugar—The market is very strong and higher prices are expected. Old stocks are about absorbed and as the season of greatest demand and consumption has arrived, predictions are to the effect amongst some sugar dealers that the summer's tendency of the market will be upward. Others contend that the conditions indicate lower sugar by July. The local quotation for American White Granulated is \$19.50 per 100 lbs., in barrels. The S. S. Sabie 1. this week, brought in 300 barrels and 600 cases.

Potatoes—This week has been a veritable "potato week" in and around St. John's accentuated by the Agricultural Department giving out specially selected imported tubers to the farmers and fishermen-farmers for seeding purposes. A few schooner cargoes also arrived from Bonavista Bay, and these also were bought for seed. The prices are easier, viz: \$3.00 for imported, and \$2.50 for local. Specially selected or picked potatoes cost 50 cents per barrel more.

Hay—The Hay trade has been moderate this week, but the demand is fair for the season. Importations that were so heavy the first part of May have fallen off. Cattle are now finding fair grazing and the present slackening, usual to this season, will continue for six or six months. Prices in the local market are about the same, viz:—\$13.00 to \$14.00 per ton ex. store, and \$11.00 to \$11.50 cheaper ex. wharf. Local farmers are offering

loose hay at about \$45.00 per ton, or about 2 1/2 cents a pound.

Oats—Oats hold the firmness of last week and will likely continue up to present levels all the summer, and until the new crop is reaped. The local demand for seeding has been particularly good the past two weeks, so that the supply that had become slack was supplemented this week by the arrival of the S.S. Mapledawn with 500 sacks. The local quotations are, \$3.80 per sack for mixed, and \$4.00 for white. Oats cannot be replaced at these prices just now.

Local Fleet Diminishing.

ONLY HALF NUMBER OF SCHOERS. PROSECUTE LABRADOR FISHERY TO-DAY AS COMPARED WITH 1910—ICE DELAYS SAILING OF CREWS.

News of the ice conditions in the North indicate that the sailings for Labrador by the fishing fleet will this season be fully two seasons late as compared with the average time for departure for that coast. The almost continuous N. E. and E. winds of May

keep the ice in of the coast north of Bonavista Cape up to the last of the month, and delayed the vessels north of that point from getting to St. John's for supplies. The cold weather also helped to delay preparations for the fishery.

The eastern part of the Straits of Bell Isle was blocked with ice last week and the whole front of the coast from Bell Isle to Fogo was barricaded up to a few days ago. It is likely that the recent off shore winds of this week have now freed the coast, and that next week the advance guard of the fleet, keen to secure the good trap berths will be on the move to get to the Labrador Coast.

Numbers Decreasing.

We regret to record that there will be a further falling off in the fishing schooners to that coast this season. Last year the total number surveyed and given clearances for Labrador was 579—green fish catchers. This was a falling off of 421 vessels in ten years. The present season there will be further falling off, which is estimated to bring the total down to about 500—just about half what it was in 1910.

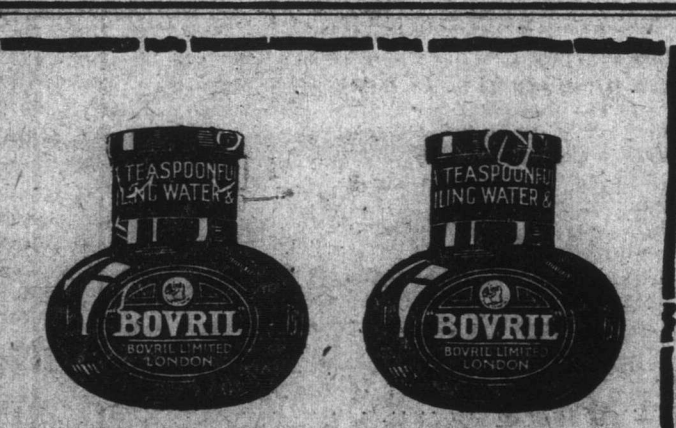
This is a serious state of affairs and spells bad for the Labrador fishery of the future, seeing that there are so few new schooners being built each winter in recent years to replace the 30 to 50 that are lost every year, not to speak of those that become so old and uneconomical that they have to be condemned. Were it not then for the shore crews or stationers that go down in the steamers and freighters, the Labrador fishery would be to-day a small factor in our fish trade compared with a quarter of a century ago.

An Exceptional Year.

Last year might be regarded as an exception in the last decade as to fish shipments from the Coast direct to foreign markets, as 158,575 quintals were sent out direct, as against 47,380 in 1913.

It is only fair to say that the number of 579 schooners for last year are only those that have "cleared" at the Custom House in the regular way, and it is a well known fact that a good many of the Northern shippers never take the trouble to enter or clear their schooners. Even if we allow 100 to have done this, which is a liberal margin, we shall then have 680, which is only half the fleet of twenty years ago.—Trade Review.

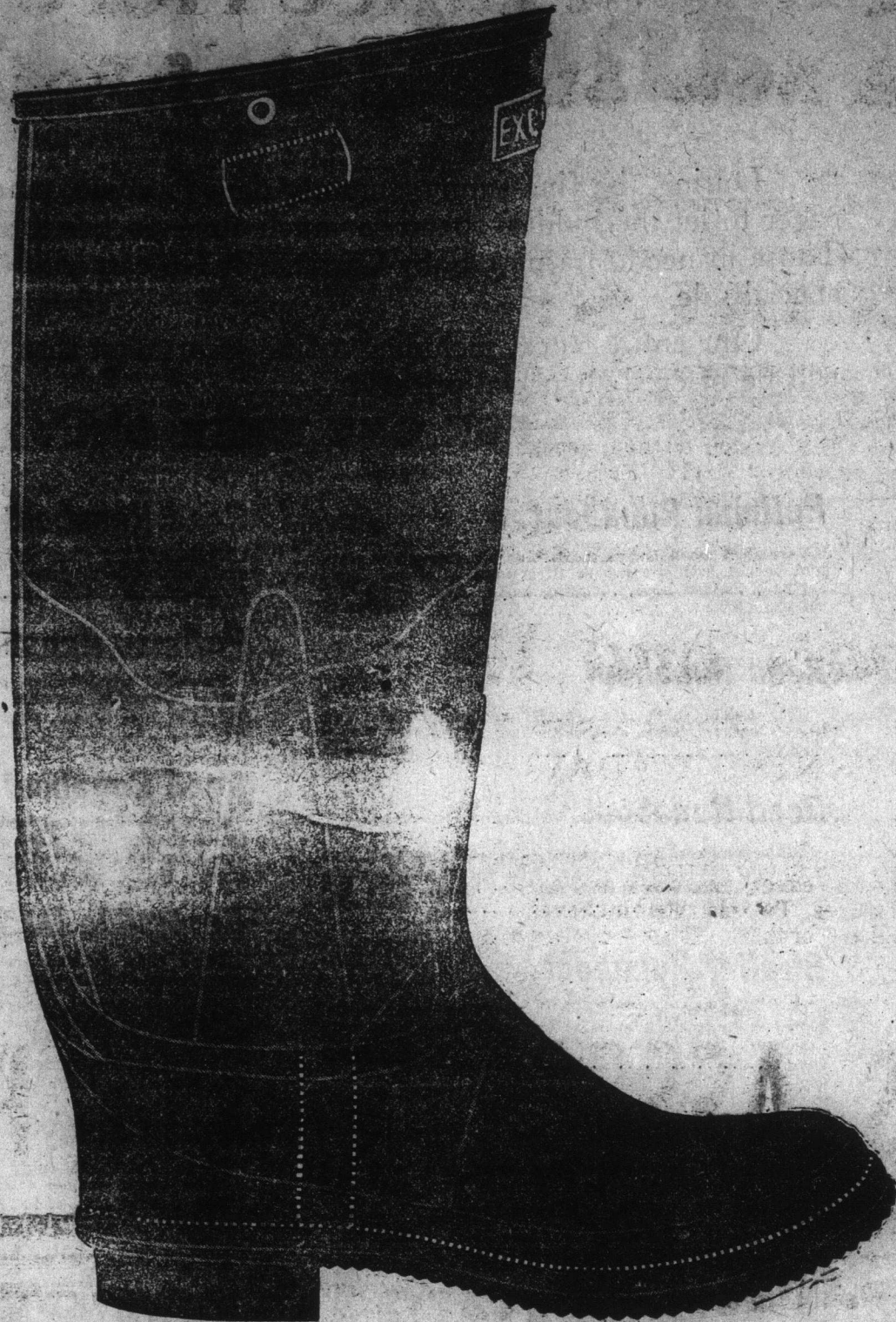
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Remarkable Cures From Codliver Oil.

NEWFOUNDLAND OIL RECOGNIZED THE BEST.

By the English mail this week we learn that some visitors of great importance to our cod-oil trade will visit Newfoundland this summer. The Research Commission of the British Government are making special investigations regarding medicinal codliver oil, as some remarkable cures have been made recently in the London Hospitals, which are attributed to codliver oil. The University of London is sending out one of their principal chemical professors, and the Lester Institute is doing likewise. They will be accompanied by a Biologist sent out by the British Minister of Fisheries. Those scientists visited Norway last year and were given every possible facility by the Government of that country to assist them in their investigations. For many years Norwegian codliver oil has been receiving the preference from the British medical profession in consumptive cases, etc., but now it would appear that Newfoundland is coming into her own at last. The careful and thorough instruction and inspection under Government supervision is showing their good results, so that now Newfoundland oil is recognized to be not only the very best in color, taste and odor, but medical men are finding the vitalizing element in it, which is superior in its effects to the codliver oil of any other country. The visit of these scientists is made to synchronize with the codfishing season, so as to enable them to study the codliver oil industry in every detail.—Trade Review.

The present position of the Telegram is a monument to his enterprise and mechanical skill—from the humble start to a full measure of success. Such is the life work of the man just called to his rest. After an active, useful life, he passed home "like one who draws the drapery of his couch about him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

DAMAGE DONE BY CLOUDBURST.

BINGHAMPTON, N.Y., June 5. A cloudburst flooded the Delaware River yesterday sweeping away ten bridges and doing damage nearly \$2,000,000.

A GLUT OF MACKEREL.

HALIFAX, June 5. Over 2,000,000 pounds of mackerel were taken by Nova Scotia fishermen last week, the average price received by them being about 3 1/2 cents per pound. The inability of dealers to handle such big catches, obliged some fishermen to accept two cents a piece for mackerel weighing four pounds.

REBELS RETREATING.

LONDON, June 5. British troops have driven Sinn Fein- er invaders from their main position in Ulster territory, and large part of the border between North and South, now is practically a battlefront. Sinn Feiners now face seasoned and well equipped troops, with artillery, instead of the Ulster specials who have held the line for some time.

A MERE HYPOTHESES.

LONDON, June 5. Newspapers refrain comment on the Irish situation, but the Daily News, basing its information on a despatch from Emmet's, declares under its biggest headlines that a crisis has been deliberately faked for political purposes, and that provocation to war comes from the Ulster side.
