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1891 TORONTO MAYORALTY 1891

ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF TORONTO:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: I am a candidate for the office of Mayor for 1891. I have waited until this late hour in order to allow an abler or more popular person to take the field in the public interest, and I only take the field now, among other reasons, that it may not go abroad that Toronto has only one son fit and competent to occupy two of the highest positions in her gift, nor can I remain inactive and see the affairs of this great city again pass into and under the control of the over-rated men who have mal-administered the vast civic expenditures for the past three years.

SUNDAY STREET CAR SERVICE---I have no sympathy as a rule with the men who make insinuations without the actual knowledge of the truth which the insinuation is intended to convey, but it does appear, as clearly as circumstantial evidence can make it, that the Sunday street car question has been raised by the friends of the administration in order to divert the public mind from the incompetency and wasteful extravagances of the last three years and more particularly of the year last past.

As to the Sunday street car business itself, I claim that those who voted against the submission of the question to the electorate have been grossly misrepresented. In the first place, Sunday cars are prohibited by statute until the 12th of March next by the agreement under which the Toronto Street Railway Company operate, which is an Act of Parliament and cannot be affected in any way by any act of the citizens or the council.

The proposed agreement in no way ties the question up for 30 years as alleged; I claim that a Sunday car service can be had at any time that the people desire it; the council only acted according to their usual practice when they declined to act on a petition on the same night on which it was presented. All petitions go as a matter of course to the regular or special committee for the time being having charge of the matter, opportunity is then given all parties to be heard and the genuineness or otherwise of the petitions ascertained, and considering the charges made against the bona fides of the petition in question there was not the slightest reason why the rule should be departed from, but the urgency of adhering to the rule was apparent.

Personally I am opposed to a Sunday street car service, but I did not vote nor will I vote to place the matter beyond the control of public opinion for 30 years, or any number of years. I do not wish to govern others or have them in any way prejudiced by my individual scruples, for with my knowledge of hygiene and physiology, even if no Bible existed, I would insist upon one day's rest out of seven for man and beast, and even inanimate machinery.

Now to questions more immediately affecting the material welfare of the citizens. No one man could well possess within himself the experience and all of the qualifications necessary to enable him to wisely and prudently administer the affairs of a corporation like ours with its multifarious departments and divers interests involving an annual expenditure of nearly \$6,000,000.

If elected, I will endeavor to surround myself with trustworthy heads of departments, each of whom could be relied upon to advise and guide the Council on all matters pertaining to their respective departments, and I would have as little hesitation over suspending a well-paid, influential head of a department for negligence or incompetency as I would the humblest subordinate in the civic service.

FINANCES---In a short address such as this must necessarily be all questions cannot be fully dealt with, but the financial question being the most important, and at the same time in a most deplorable state, I will endeavor to deal with it more extensively than some others. When economy has been urged successive councils have pleaded, "We cannot lessen uncontrollable expenditure." That is quite true, but I will endeavor to show that what is called uncontrollable expenditure is not altogether uncontrollable expenditure, the largest item under that head is interest on the civic debt, which debt amounts to about \$17,000,000, including the local improvement debentures; we pay 4 per cent. on the major portion of the debt, and only recently have we begun to issue 3 per cent. debentures, which have been sold considerably below par. I claim that our securities are, or ought to be, as good as those of the City of New York and certainly as good as those of the City of Montreal. Both of those places borrow money at 3 per cent.; I claim that the difference between what we pay, 4 per cent., and what we ought to pay, 3 per cent., is beyond doubt controllable expenditure, and that difference, \$170,000 to \$200,000, could go to the sinking fund and hasten the extinction of the city debt, or annual taxations could be reduced to that extent; I would advocate the latter in order to relieve the over-burdened ratepayer. But the control of the alleged uncontrollable expenditure does not stop here. The interest on local improvement, short date, debentures is still higher, or which is the same thing, the dis-count is much greater. I believe moneys used for local improvements cost us about 5 per cent. Instead of issuing local improvement or short date debentures we should secure legislation authorizing us to issue consolidated loans for 40 year 3 per cent., and the city could use 3 per cent. moneys for local improvements, instead of paying 5 per cent. Sinking funds could easily be made a mere matter of bookkeeping or internal arrangement, thus an additional saving of over \$35,000 per annum could be effected by a discontinuance of local improvement short date debentures.

WATER BY GRAVITATION---If there has been one department of the civic service more wretchedly administered than all the rest the public will agree that it is the Waterworks Department, for which I do not hold the present committee entirely responsible, but responsibility rests largely upon their long line of predecessors and not only with them but also with the erroneous system that appears "Like a huge inverted cone wanting its proper base to stand upon."

I am in favor of procuring an illimitable supply of pure water from Lake Simcoe by means of gravitation, if practicable. Millions of dollars have been expended on the present inefficient system, but the advocates of gravitation, and they are a considerable number of the present Council, could not procure an appropriation of even one thousand dollars to demonstrate the feasibility or otherwise of the gravitation scheme, and while that trifling sum could not be secured for such a purpose the administration was more than willing to spend over that amount in publishing the false and misleading reports of alleged experts in order to mislead the public at the public expense, that the miserable system at present in vogue might be bolstered up for another decade or more.

STREET RAILWAY FRANCHISE---It is proposed to sell the exclusive right to operate surface street railways in this city for 30 years to one corporation. The city could not make a greater mistake than dispose of this franchise and plant in anticipation of or before our getting it. The great value of this franchise is its prospective value, and what might be deemed to be a first-class bargain now might be regarded as a huge blunder a few years hence. I advocate the running of the street railway by a commission for a short time, at least as an experiment; I claim that we could better afford a year or two of the worst conceivable mismanagement than place this most valuable franchise beyond our control for 30 years without proper consideration or a knowledge of its value.

UNIFORM THREE CENT FARE---The evidence lately given at Osgoode Hall in the now pending arbitration shows conclusively that passengers can be carried for three cents for a continuous ride, including transfers, and that ten tickets could be sold for 25 cents, but the present administration proposes to make an apparent reduction in taxation that would be no reduction at all, but simply a means of compelling the masses who use the street cars to pay for their ride, and in addition thereto to contribute towards the maintenance of the Civic Government, or in other words, it proposes to resort to "indirect taxation," the worst possible form of municipal taxation, because it is misleading and deceptive. The public are led to believe that they are buying a ride at about its proper cost, when in reality it is a payment of taxes, besides at present the citizen gets his tax bill, and he knows exactly what he pays and he can now seek a remedy, but how can the citizen intelligently seek a remedy when he does not know the extent of the extortion?

THE ESTIMATES---The Civic Reform Committee, of which I am Chairman, brought in a report recommending that the estimates for the next ensuing year be prepared and submitted and passed in Council before the first day of January in each year; the policy of the Committee and Council was to allow the citizens to know what rate of taxation was proposed, the electors could then vote confidence or want of confidence in the men who prepared the estimates; although that report was unanimously adopted by the Council and although every standing committee in the Council instructed the proper officers to forthwith prepare the estimates for 1891, the estimates have not been submitted.

The rate this year is 14 1-2 mills on the dollar and there is a deficit of over a quarter of a million dollars. Notwithstanding the inadequate and inefficient service rendered by nearly every department the expenditures to which the city is already committed for 1891 together with the deficit from 1890 will necessitate a rate of 17 or 18 mills on the dollar, and that is the only reason why the decree of the Council and all its standing committees has been set at naught.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE---The paid head of the Corporation, who holds absolute sway over the heads of departments and who holds the power of suspension in the hollow of his hand. The Council could not have been defied by its paid servants in this insolent manner unless it were done by and with the advice and consent (if not the direct instruction) of the head of the Corporation.

Who else would dare do it? I respectfully submit that if the man be re-elected who has for the past three years influenced and controlled the deliberations of the Council, the rate will not be far short of 20 mills on the dollar. We are at that stage of mismanagement that scarcely any change could make worse.

The present Mayor claims that he is only one member of a Council composed of 40 members, and that he is no more responsible for the existing state of affairs than any other member. Such a statement is entirely false and misleading. His Worship's opinion is invariably sought and usually embodied in every recommendation of any importance that emanates from the Corporation officials, and when such report or recommendation comes before the Council the latter have no alternative but to adopt the report or vote want of confidence in the official; if the latter course be adopted the members who are responsible for the rejection are accused of a want of loyalty and a desire to embarrass the administration. Besides His Worship is a member of every Committee of the Council and the members of the Committee very properly show the greatest possible deference to His Worship at all times, and, moreover, His Worship's view almost invariably prevails at Committee meetings and also in Council. His Worship was never known to be absent when any patronage was about to be disposed of, but he was usually judiciously absent when schemes of civic reform were under consideration.

If elected I shall assume the responsibility properly belonging to the head of the Corporation and the only member of the Council representing the entire electorate, and if I should be unable to secure the reform of existing abuses I will at least fix the responsibility for their retention where it properly belongs.

I claim that E. F. Clarke is not legally (or in any other way) qualified to be Mayor of this City. I claim that His Worship is to all intents and purposes a Corporation contractor. Nearly a year and a half after E. F. Clarke took the oath of office he was in a position to execute a bill of sale of the plant, presses and type used in doing the City printing.

Note the law and practice of bills of sale. Bills of sale are usually given when the vendor retains possession of the goods and chattels sold. If a man buys a printing press or plant and removes the goods to his own premises, does he usually take a "bill of sale" and register it any more than he would if he bought a horse, a wagon or a ton of coal? No, the bill of sale in question implies one of two things, either the goods are still in E. F. Clarke's use, possession or control, or the bill of sale is a very inartistic, clumsy blind, that does not even deceive His Worship's friends.

My five years' public record is before you. I have never been accused of giving a questionable vote in Committee or Council. I am not supported by extreme party journals in this contest, because I have not proved sufficiently pliable and workable, but I am persuaded that the masses will consider that no disqualification on the other hand it may be said of me, "We love him for the enemies he has made."

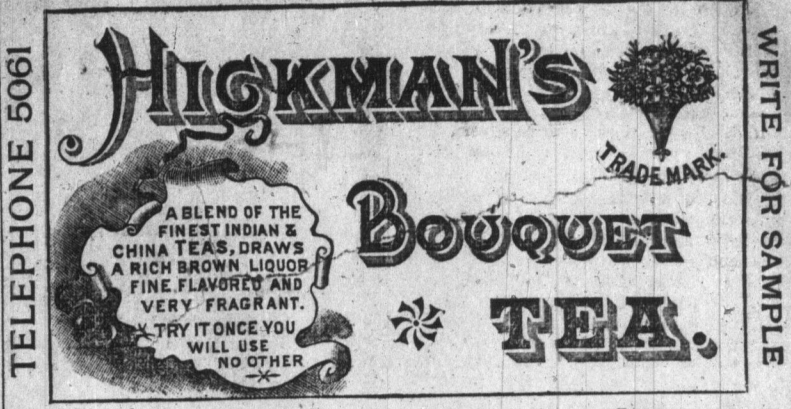
