The process of cleaning and drying the crude whalebone when first taken from the ships is interesting. During 1895 \$419,000 were paid in fire insurances premiums in Nova Scotia. This year so far \$130,000 have been paid, against losse to date of about \$400,000.

It is estimated that half a million tons more of coal will be shipped to Northwestern points this year than last, and the total will reach about 3,000,000 tons.

A dispatch to the Central News from Hamburg says that the German, American and British transatiantic steamships companies are aimut to enter a convention to regulate first and second cabin fares.

Three small cargoes of Barbadoes molaster, comprising about 1,500 puncheons, bare been sold at the Islands for Montreal account at conal to about 29 chere. There are other orders at the Islands at 12c first cost, but sellers will not accept that figure.

Camphor has been almost neglected throughout the interval and stocks are accumulating. Firms quote \$73 per pecul sellers, but no buyers. Latest advices from Formosa are to the effect that the manufacture of camphor has been stopped by the Japanese and fears were entertained there that it will be some time before work can be resumed again.

Mayday in Toronto was marked by the inauguration of as trike which threatens to sen-usly interfere with building operations. In paramance of their resolution to strike unless their demand for 21 cents an hour was met by the employers, the 300 members of the Builders' Laborers' Union deserted hods and hoee and very shortly after the bricklayers and stone masons of the city also quit work to exhibit their aymighty with the strikers, as well as for the reason that they could not get along without the laborers. About 900 men are affected by the strike. Of these some 250 are stone cutters and 350 bricklayers.

A company, called the Neepawa Electric Light & Power Co., incorporated last fall, is making arrangements to take over the town telephone system from the Bell Telephone Company. As a consequence the rental of the instruments will be reduced.

The Greek Chamber has passed a bill modifying Article 2 of the law of July last respecting the tax on currants. Exporters of currants of the 18% crop will no longer have the option of paying the tax of 15 per cent in money or in kind as heretofore, but will be required to do so in kind.

An order has been received at St. Thomas from Detroit to the effect that the employes of the Michigan Central Railway shops will work ten hours each day. It will be remembered that a short time ago the men were placed on an eight-hour schedule. The shops are rushed with

The Bulletin says that it is now certain that stocks of cheese in Canada larger than the estimates indicated in February last, as well as those in England and that the reason prices have continued at such a low basis was simply that the sapply was ample for all consumptive requirements, and that English importers after they became the principal owners of cheese in Canada found it impossible to advance values to a point that would give them a reasonable profit. The price of cheese was undoubtedly affected adversely by the low prices of other provisions, more especially bacon, which sold during the past season at the worst slaughter values ever before experienced.

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
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An effort is being made to introduce Nova Scotta coal into New England on a large scale. The Dominion Coal Company has petitioned the Legislature of Manachusetts for a charter to furnish cheap gas to the public by permitting it to bring coal from Cape Breton in its raw state, and resolve it into its constituent elements of coke, tar. gas and ammonia, and to supply these for the various needs of the people. It is expected that the gas thus provide and the people of the people produced can be sold at a price that will cause it to become a powerful factor in industrial commiss. 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

THE U.S. DEFICITS.

The spectacle of the present condition of American finances is one that is certainly not flattering to the patriotic pride of our cousins across the line. A nation of 70,000,000 people, having an annual budget of only \$400,000,000, which is compelled to run into debt \$30,000,000 annually to cover its ordinary expenses, cannot be said to be possessed of either an adequate fiscal policy or an expert exchequer. of income, the deficit has been as regular as it is unpleasant. The pay. ment of sugar bounties has been resisted on the ground that the act allowing them was unconstitutional; the rebate of the tax on alcohol used for medicinal and manufacturing purposes has been prevented by an arbitrary refusal to make the preliminary regulations prescribed by law; against the claims of importers for the return of duties illegally exacted legal technicalities have been employed as long as possible, and even the item of office rent for the Venezuelan Commission is disputed. All these expedients, however, have sufficed only to reduce without completely extinguishing the annual deficit. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1894, it was \$69,803,260; for that ending June 30, 1895, it was \$42,805,223; for the ten months of the current year already elapsed it is over \$25,000,000, and it will probably increase \$5,000,000 more during the two months yet to come. This is not a pleasant showing, in

view of the fact that Great Britain, with a population of 40,000,000, and an annual expenditure of \$500,000,-000, can show a surplus of \$20,000,-000. And this, too, in spite of the fact that Great Britain is a free trade country, while the United States places a heavy import tariff on nearly every article entering its borders. What deduction then can we make from this contrast if it be not that, while the finances of Great Britain are administered on sound business principles, those of the United States are practically at the mercy of an irresponsible and, from a business standpoint, only half-educated Senate, swayed to and fro by conflicting political interests. The silverites insist that the free coinage of silver at 16 to 1 is a panacea for all financial ills. The protectionists demand a further increase in duties as all that is necessary; while the banking interests urge the funding and retirement of the legal tender notes. In the meantime, while all these diverse interests are arguing, the deficiency in the revenue is running on, and if the Administration adheres to its statement that the gold reserve must not be permitted to fall permanently below \$100,000,000, a further issue of gold bonds will require to be made before long. #### A SENSIBLE VIEW.

It is gratifying to learn that the notable article written by the Hon. David A. Wells upon the relations which should exist between Great Britain and the United States have caused a genuine sensation among the letter class of American politicians. We have become so accustomed to persistent abuse of England and English institutions in the American press that it is as refreshing to find a prominent writer upon politico-financial subjects deliberately taking up the cudgels upon the part of our much abused mother country as it must be astonishing to that section of our neighbors across the line upon whom the sight of the British flag is popularly believed to have the same effect as that of a red rag upon a bull.

We have long been accustomed to listen with a smile to the assertions of Eugland's land-grabbing propensities. But passing over the traditional advice to people who live in glass houses, Mr. Wells reminds the American public that they and other foreigners may buy any land that England "grabs," and that in all English ports and rivers and territories they can buy and sell, import and export, on the same terms as British subjects. Many of the English colonies are independent except in the selection of their executives, and have so full control over their own destinies that they levy customs duties on imports from the sovereign country, and the Impe rial Government has even allowed the Government of India, not a self-governing dependency, to levy, a duty on English cotton goods. The contrast between India and Egypt before British occupation and at the present time proves that British domination has had beneficent compensations to the subject races and to the commercial nations of the world. England is alone among nations in throwing open the traffic of her colonies and fruits of her conquests to foreigners. The root of the difficulty between England and Venezuela is the question whether the Orinoco shall be Euglish and open to the whole comgovernment or corporation. England has no territory that Americans can possibly desire, except Canada, whose people can control their own future, and she has no possessions from which they are excluded, and none with which they do not have more trade than they would have if England restored them to the aborigines.

Here is a plain and unvarnished statement of the benefit which the much abused "land-grabbing" policy Apply to of England has proved to the very people who are enarling at the hand that helps them. Yet we shall still see tirades in a certain section of the American press in which England is depicted as the undying enemy of all things American; simply because the writers cannot understand her frank and open policy. They argue that were they in England's place they would endeavor to seize the whole of the trade for themselves by the imposition of prohibitory tariffs, the enaction of oppressive immigration laws, and by every species of traffic restriction, and that consequently England must be following some deep and Machiavellian policy in freely extending the benefits of her conquests to all. They cannot grasp the fact that England secures no especial advantage for her own merchants, but leaves them to work out their own prosperity by uprightness and business sagacity; because it differs so entirely from what would be their own line of policy in such a So, when they find that, measured by their own selfish standard, the liberal policy of England is incomprehensible, they have no recourse save to ascribe it to some mysterious inducement, which they do not hesitate to invent, if necessary, the arguments of the Hon. David A. Wells will appeal in vain. But with the ordinary men of business, and the solid thinkers of the United States, they will carry great weight, and, therefore, their wider dissemination cannot but produce good results.

Our contemporary says plainly that the fire records before 1883 are useless, and we are satisfied that those for subsequent years are far from perfect. The one thing beyond doubt is that the waste by fire is enormously greater than there is any excuse for, both in the States and Canada, and it would be reduced if the work of inspection were more thoroughly done, and the game of making money out of the companies rendered impossible to be played with profit.

### ARE INTEREST RATES TOO HIGH?

A merchant complains that the present rate of interest on money for commercial needs is "vastly more than ordinary profits can afford." He attributes the great prosperity in England, France and Germany, which now prevails, to the low rates current for money. There is much to be said for this view. Low rates for money are indicative of its being plentiful, and, if it is available for commercial needs, of confidence prevailing. It is quite possible, however, for money to be very abundant and very cheap, while, at the same time, "depression or bankruptcy are rampant and stagnation reigning," which the writer we allude to, considers to be caused by the high rates of interest in Canada.

In England, for instance, last year, and before then, the money market was flooded with money, and the bank rate was only 2 per cent; yet trade was extremely depressed. rates of interest being high is of no practical service to business. What would be of service would be some practical plan for securing money at lower rates, although whether this would do very much to raise profits higher is at least exceedingly doubtful. The low range of profits arises from competition. There are more goods in the market seeking buyers, than buyers seeking goods. Hence traders are tempting customers by low prices; so low, indeed, as to leave the margin of profits very scanty. It is quite true that the high rate charged for loans bears heavily on some traders, whose business is carried on by borrowed capital. But if money were much lower, would not the competition be much more active? Is it not only too notorious that persons are crowding into store-keeping more and more every day, in spite of so many failures? The rate of interest seems no barrier to this imprudent increase of retailers, and no check upon the wholesalers helping more of them to open stores where there are already too many to prosper. The banks cannot be charged with ex orbitant demands of interest for loans. as their profits are, with very few exceptions, not only very moderate, but inadequate for investments of that character.

interlopers have no stake whatsoever in this country; they pay no license fees; are not subject to supervision by Dominion officials, and do not spend one cent in Canada, except in those rare instances where they incur a loss and feel that it will be good policy to pay it. Naturally, this gives them an opportunity to do business here much more cheaply than the resident companies; more especially as they have no office rent or taxes to pay, and as their expenses are confined to the salary of their inspector or to the commission ther pay to local brokers for securing business for them. Their method of getting risks is both cheap and effica. cious. They send on an inspector who solicits 'no insurance, but thoroughly examines the risks he selects. If his report be satisfactory, the managers write to the firm or manufacturers, asking what rates the risk pays for protection, and offering to undercut it, no matter what it may be, for either the whole or a part As the reduction they offer may possibly be from 25 to as high as 50 per cent under the schedule rate, they usually secure what they want, for, as they take only the best of selected risks, they can afford to carry them for much less than an ordinary company compelled to pay rent, taxes, license and other expenses, and forced to accept risks of varying character in order to keep the volume of its business at a profitable level, could afford to do, and thus the cream of our insurance is drifting across the border.

Yet the insurance these mutuals offer is by no means as cheap as it appears at first sight; for they often insist upon improvements that swallow up all the saving in premiums, interested in a sprinkler plant—and most of them are-they insist upon their own particular sprinkler plant being put in the moment they accept the risk. This always means a considerable amount of expense, and often without any corresponding increase in security. And every time they inspect the risk they demand some new expenditure. In the case of one large risk in this city, the saving of \$1,500 per year in premium payments which they offered was more than counterbalanced by .. demand for an expenditure of \$6,000 in plant. As this would have swallowthe firm preferred to pay a little higher premium and stay with the old line companies.

Of the insecurity of payment, in event of loss by fire, it is not necessary to speak. Many of the new bloods are irresponsible concerns, to sue whom would be throwing good responsible ones the lot of the insured is not a happy one unless the insurers feel it better to pay up. If they do not, the long and tedious process of litigation in a foreign country must be gone through, and the claimant will be lucky if he gets his money inside of two years, and must not be disappointed if he never gets it at all.

Is it not, then, better for our merchants and manufacturers to place their risks with responsible companies doing business in this city, even if they have to pay a little higher preminm for doing so? Cheap insurscenre the best and most reliable form in the market.

#### THE AUFFMORDT CASE.

Speaking upon the question of smoke damage brought up in the celebrated Auffmordi case, the Boston Herald says:

"There is no doubt, on both sides a disresition to consider personal interest. #### THE LUMBER TRADE.

Advices from Fredericton are to the effect that more lumber will be shipped from New Brunswick this year than last, and that prices will be generally better, except for hemlock, the prospects for which are anything but bright. The tanning business is gradually leaving the eastern states, and locating in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois, where there are plenty of hides, and lots of hemlock. The result is that the shipments of bark from New Brunswick are getting smaller yearly. Three or four years ago, from a hundred and forty to one hundred and fifty thousand cords were exported annually, and now the amount does not exceed over 60,000 cords annually. The price this year in Salem and other points is \$8.50 per cord, and it costs more than that to land it there, in consequence of which not one cord will be peeled by bark dealers this year. Mr. D. F. George, one of the largest shippers, has all of his peel of 1805 on hand yet. He has not shipped a car for six weeks, and does not expect to ship any more for six months to come, unless there is an improvement in price or a reduction in freight rates, which is not very probable. It is to the credit of the labor organizations of Chicago that they invited Secretary Carlisle to address them on the subject of their own interests in the coinage question, and he made them an admirable speech. It ought not to be poss.ble for the blatherskites and the demagogues to mislead any workingman who heard or reads that speech. It has always been a mystery why workingmen who complain that their wages are too low should ask that their wages be paid to them in dollars worth only half of what they are now getting, and Mr. Carlisle made it clear enough to his audience that the immediate effect of free silver coinage would be to reduce the amount of food and clothing and shelter their wages would procure. The prices of all they have to buy would rise and wages would remain unchanged awhile and then tardily begin to advance, but it would be years before they would advance as much as prices. During the chesp money period of the war prices rose much more than wages, but in the sound money period since then wages have advanced more than prices, which has added greatly to the comfort and prosperity of the wage-carners.





The first mackerel from the Cape Shore last year were landed on June 7th, and the indications are for a good catch this year. There were about 6,500 barrels of Cape Shore taken last year, as against 24,000 barrels in 1894.

BICYCLE INSURANCE.

Underwriters are commencing to sound a note of warning with reference to insurance on bicycle stocks. This year over 1,000,000 wheels will be produced in the United States alone, and as the demand is very largely supplied, over-production is certain to set in before long, in view of the enormous profits gained, so that, one of these days, the inevitable crash will come. Up to the present, prices, thanks to a combination of great strength, have been kept up, but the end of this is near, and insurance men must not allow the overplus to be sold out to them at combine prices. Recent fires emphasize the importance of these matters, and the agent who studies the situation and keeps up with the times will think several times before he asks his companies to go on, and managers will do well if they declino more of them than they now write. It may not be best, just yet, to put them in the prohibited list, but they are going that way and will get there in due time.

#### THE WORLD'S WINE PRODUCTION.

The Moniteur Vinicole has recently published a statement showing the wine production of the various countries of the world. From this statement it appears the yield in France amounted in the years 1885 and 1894 to 587,127,000 gallons, and 859,162,000 gallons respectively, in Algeria th \$3,549,000 and \$0,121,000 gallons; Tunis,

110,000,000 gallons. In Turkey and Cyprus the production of last year amounted to 52,800,000 gallons, and this compares with an average yield of 40,000,000 gallons. In Bulgaria the yield was 26,400,000 gallois; Servia, 17,600,000, Greece, 35,200,-000; Roumania, 68,640,000, Switzerland, 27,500,000, the United States, 89,700 000, Mexico, 1,980,000; Argentine Republic, 29,700,000; Chili, 33,000,000, Brazil, 7,700,-000; Cape of Good Hope, 2,420,000; Persia, 594,000, and Australia, 3,300,000 gallons.

#### THE LONDON FEATHER SALE.

The report of the second cetrich feather sale in London, says that the attendance of buyers was good and that bidding throughout the sale was brisk. Continental buyers were competing with American buyers much more freely than for some time past; but the home trade, however, continues dull. Living feathers, which were of exceptionally fine quality, did not show much change on the average. Boa feathers were rather weak in prices, but the most pronounced feature of the sale was the extraordinary demand for short black and drab feathers of all sorts, more especially flors goods, which were all eagerly competed for at prices which show large advances over those ruling at the previous sale. Good quality of white feathers ruled firm, some of the finer lines realizing about 10 shillings per pound over last sale prices. Medium seconds and some good fleshy thirds ruled very firm. Narrow and common grades show a decline of about 5 per cent under previous prices. Good and fine qualities of Femina goods show no material change from previous prices, with the narrow and common grades about 5 per cent cheaper. Byocks ruled firm at unchanged prices. Boos in white and good long grades were firm throughout, with an occasional advance, with the ordinary grades showing a decline of from 1 shilling to 1 shilling 6 pence per pound. Femins a decline of about 2 shillings a pound. Black butts, in good long grades, ruled about 2 shillings 6 pence per pound higher, with the ordinary grades steady. #### THE AMERICAN WOOL MARKET.

American wool dealers say the approach of the clip time has stimulated some inquiry, manufacturers being in the market to take advantage of the weakness of holders who are getting ready to put in the new wools. Naturally under these conditions, the holder is more tractable as to prices and more willing to accept offen from buyers. There is no better illustration of this than is found in the sale in the Boston market of 1,500,000 lbs. of Essiem Oregon at a price close to 20 per cent below the saking price some weeks ago. The wool was taken by a manufacturer, but it was practically a speculative purchase. The prospects for the wool growers are not favorable, for in addition to the large quantities of domestic wools held in the seaboard markets, there is quite a heavy stock of foreign wool, and buyers are giving preference to the latter. The grower who is not strong enough financially to carry his wool into the fall months is likely to face an adverse market. It is very likely that considerable wool will be forced on the market just as acco as it comes in, but this may give rise to some speculation, which in turn may tend to prevent prices from going off very appreciably. The opportunities for expect appreciatory. Into opportunities to capes are also a bar to any great decline, for domestic wools are nearing a point which will attract the foreign manufacturers. Quarter-blood wools are said to be close to that point now, and it would not be sur-prising if some large lots were soon taken for export. #### A NEW POSTAL DEVICE.

It is estimated that only 10 per cent of the postal cards and stamped envelopes sent out in solicitation of orders come back to the firms that send them out. The stamped envelopes may have the address changed or may be redeemed, and it is said that the postal cards are bought up by the quantity, have their addressed sides bronzed, and are sold for general use.
