We wish them Godspeed. We shall have the pleasure of having Mr. Archer at St. George's again next month, on a Sunday.

Miss C. M. Cayley, who was to have returned before this, will not leave Bermuda till May 9th. In Bermuda they have been having tea out of doors with sunshine and flowers all about them. Ah well! We shall be having summer here, also, before very long.

On May 25th, Mr. Kenrick sails (D.V.) from Montreal for England. Mrs. Kenrick was to have gone too, but does not feel strong enough for the undertaking and has been obliged to cancel her passage. Mr. Kenrick will have for a travelling companion, Mr. J. G. Widdifield, of Trinity College, who has during the present academical year been Secretary and Assistant Superintendent of the Sunday School. His place at the Secretary's desk will be taken by Mr. F. J. Walker. The travellers will return at the end of July. During the first part of Mr. Kenrick's absence, the following clergy have kindly undertaken to supply his place at St. George's: May 26th, The Provost; June 2nd, Fr. Davenport; June 9th, Prof. Jenks; June 16th, Rev. W. L. Archer; June 23rd, Prof. Jenks, June 30th, Rev. G. H. Broughall.

## EASTER VESTRY.

The Easter Vestry meeting was held on Monday, April 8th. After the adoption of the minutes of the last vestry meeting, Mr. Louis McMurray presented the Wardens' report for the past year, which, after discussion, was adopted.

The Rector then nominated Mr. L. S. McMurray his Warden for the ensuing year; and on motion of Mr. Harman, Mr. Geo. C. Biggar was unanimously elected People's Warden. Mr. Charles Heath was reappointed Vestry Clerk.

On motion of Mr. McMurray, seconded by Mr. Baines, the following gentlemen were appointed Sidesmen: Huson Murray, S. Bruce Harman, G. F. Harman, C. D. Heath, Dr. Baines, F. F. Payne, G. P. Reid, R. B. Street, R. C. Street, H. L. M. Weller, H. Winsor, J. E. Cameron, R. C. Bourne, C. Wilkinson, Capt. Strong, A. R. Smith, C. W. Scott, Fred. Walker, Godfrey Horlock, R. Crashley.

After discussion of the desirability of increased help in ushering in strangers, it was resolved that

the Vestry Clerk do notify four Sidesmen for each service to be present for duty each month.

The Rector drew the attention of the Vestry to the very inadequate stipend of the Assistant Priest. During the discussion which followed it was freely expressed that the stipends of both Rector and Assistant were "most inadequate." On which it was moved by Mr. Weller, seconded by Mr. R. A. Baines, and resolved that the Rector's stipend, as well as that of his Assistant, be increased by \$150 per annum. It was also decided to ask the congregation to approve the action of the Vestry by increasing the revenue of the church, so that it may be possible for the Wardens to pay the increased stipends. The Rector, for himself and on behalf of the congregation, tendered a hearty vote of thanks to the Churchwardens for their efficient and valuable services during the past year. This was followed by votes of thanks to the various organizations in the parish, and to Mr. Phillips and the members of the choir, for their valuable services during the past year, to the Women's Auxiliary, St. Agatha's Guild, the officers and teachers of the Sunday School, the Sanctuary Guild, the Chairman and Sidesmen, the Brotherhood of S. Andrew, and the Young Men's Association, and warm appreciation expressed of their valuable work, by which the efficiency of the church is maintained and increased. A hearty vote of thanks was then passed to the Parish Guild for their valuable services and contributions to the church funds.

The Parochial Tribunal was reappointed. The Vestry, having finished their business, then adjourned, after which the following gentlemen were unanimously re-elected lay representatives of this Parish to the Synod of the Diocese: Huson W. M. Murray, K.C., George F. Harman, E. Douglas Armour, K.C.

#### THE PARISH GUILD

A particularly pleasant meeting of the Parish Guild was held on Thursday afternoon, April 25th, and was thoroughly enjoyed by the thirty-five or so who were present. These family gatherings, if one may so call them, when our parish people meet to talk things over, certainly do fill a long-felt want. The time went quickly by with music, refreshments, and genial speech. Mrs. John Boyd, always welcome at St.

George's, as usual, delighted her hearers with her singing; Miss Merritt played most acceptably on the piano, and Miss Evans, to her sister's accompaniment, handled the cello with consummate skill. The last two ladies came a considerable distance in order to play for the Guild, and the members are correspondingly grateful to them. The business transacted was mostly of an informal nature, but one tangible result of this meeting, will be the replacing of the present unsightly floor coverings in the church porches with new material. Mrs. George Burton was in the chair.

We wonder if the good ladies will ever feel justified in replacing the present *dreadful* flooring of the School-house with something more sightly and less draughty. If in addition to a hardwood floor our Parish Hall had modern benches, it would be, if not a thing of beauty, at least a joy forever.

#### YOUNG PEOPLE'S DOINGS

The Y. P. A., under the energetic and tactful leadership of Mr. F. J. Walker, who came to us from Grace Church with Mr. Kenrick, has held several very successful functions. On April 11th, the society gave a social in the School-house. To this the young people's societies of Grace Church and Holy Trinity were invited. The attendance was most satisfactory, the gathering being quite remarkable for the large number of young men who were present. An exceedingly pleasant evening was spent with games, guessing competitions and music, with coffee and cake at the end. The feature of the evening was the display of picture advertisements round the walls (with the names covered) the identity of which the guessers were required to solve. That the young people had a good time need scarcely be said. Whether, however, the unfortunates who were called to the platform to answer unexpected and embarrassing questions, enjoyed that part of the programme as did their delighted audience, may well be doubted. With one exception of Miss May Clark of Grace Church, who was asked to define an ideal young man, and Mr. Kenrick, who discoursed eloquently on German buns, both of whom appeared to enjoy the experience, they seemed decidedly ill at ease.

An evening of a similar nature was enjoyed by our young people at Holy Trinity, whither, in company

with several other "Y. P. A.'s," they repaired on Tuesday, April 23rd.

On April 25th, a very excellent concert, at which most of the singers were professionals who generously gave their services, was held under the joint auspices of the Y. P. Association and Y. M. Association. Unfortunately the weather that night was even more disagreeable than it has been so many other nights and days of the past month, and this interfered to a considerable extent with the size of the audience. Both the Rector and Mr. Kenrick were at an important meeting at Trinity College that evening, which had the effect of keeping them away. The Rector, however, was able to look in at the end of the evening. The societies concerned wish to give their special thanks to Miss Phillips, through whose efforts most of the "talent" was secured, and to "The People's Florist," Queen St., who kindly loaned the plants used for decorating the hall.

Under this heading we may also mention a pleasant evening which was spent at 73 Baldwin St., on Thursday, April 18th, when Mrs. Kenrick entertained the members of the Young Men's Bible Class. Here, also, let us state that a Lacrosse Team has been organized for the season in connection with the Y. M. A. In this, Messrs. Godfrey Horlock and George Baldoch are the moving spirits.

#### WARDENS' REPORT.

The financial statement presented by the Wardens showed that there was a credit balance of \$103.67, the first credit balance in several years. The year's revenue exceeded the expenditure by \$433.42, but of this \$329.77 was taken to wipe out the bank overdraft which had accumulated from previous years. Below is the statement re-arranged with a view to making it more accurately show from what sources and for what purposes funds were received and expended. The second column of figures shows the result of a comparison with the previous year, that is where there has been an increase or a decrease, it is indicated by the abbreviations, inc. or dec. During the twelve months making the past year, two Easters occurred. For that reason the open offertories of the last Easter Sunday and the last Good Friday are classed as

"Special" revenue. There will be no Easter in the current year of this church's finances. The statement showed:

## THE CONFIRMATION

Confirmation was administered on Sunday evening, April 21st. The class presented was small, consisting of five young men and boys, and nine young women and girls. The class would have been somewhat larger, but several who were under instruction dropped out for one reason or another. A majority of those who were confirmed were adults. Next year we hope that a number of children whose parents thought they were too young to be confirmed on this occasion, will be brought forward. The administration of the Rite was preceded by evensong with one psalm and one lesson, and this, coupled with the smallness of the number of confirmees and the brevity of the Archbishop's excellent address, had the effect of making the entire proceedings shorter than the usual evening service.
