FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of Pounds sterling, to be raised and paid, for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements; or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements: for which Legacy the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

* * Requests for charitable or benevolent purposes of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personality not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

I. This Society shall be designated **THE NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.**

II. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's system.

III. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary or Secretaries, and also of Governors and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.

IV. Each Subscriber of one Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.

V. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for life.

VI. Each Subscriber of Five Pounds annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.

VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than twelve; of whom nine who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.

IX. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered *ex officio* Members of the Committee: the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every Month.

X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have a second, or casting vote.

XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.

XII. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held in London annually on such day during the months of April or May as shall be judged most convenient, when the proceedings of the foregoing year shall be reported, the accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.

XIII. A Special General Meeting of this Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter, addressed to the Secretary.

XIV. Ten days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society who reside within the limits of the Threepenny Post shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron; or in his absence, the Vice-Patron; or should he be absent, the President; or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present; or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed or altered, nor any new Law established, but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. THAT the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed, to be called "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of _____," for the purpose of co-operating with that Institution.

2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum or upwards, or Five Guineas or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.

3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than _____ Members; and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

5. That this Auxillary shall furnish the Parent Society, on or before the first week in March in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

1. THAT we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this Association be denominated "The _____ Association."

2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per annum, or making a donation of One Guinea or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.

3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee, to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than _____ other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.

4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener, if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that three Members be empowered to act.

5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.

6. That this Association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society, on or before the last day of February in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

"THE Lord hath been mindful of us, He will bless us," is precisely the language of confiding assurance which your Committee feel themselves justly warranted in employing on this the Twenty-first Anniversary of your Society, on a review of its past history, its difficulties, its fears, its struggles, and its triumphs; and encouraged by the many and undoubted tokens of the Divine favour, they afresh commend it to His care, in whose faith and fear it was first established, and to promote whose glory, in the advancement of His truth, it has received help unto this day.

On former Anniversaries the Committee have confined themselves to a narrative of the Society's operations during the year; but circumstances have of late arisen in the providence of God, which seem to call for a more extended view in reference both to the past and the future.

The Society was formed in the year 1823, with a view to the benefit, in the first instance, of the poor settlers in Newfoundland, who, in point of religious and moral instruction, were at that time in a most deplorable condition. The Founder and Framers of the Society did then, indeed, entertain the hope that, if God prospered the design, it might in due time extend its operations to other of the North

American Colonies. Its beneficial effects soon became evident, and were on all hands acknowledged, and in the sixth year of its existence the attempt was made at further extension, and "British North America" was added to the original designation of the "Newfoundland School Society."

The change was thus noticed in the Report of that year:—

"It is not because this benign experiment is so well justified by its results in Newfoundland, that your Committee have now conceived the idea of trying it upon a wider scale, and extending the operations of the Society to the adjacent continent of North America. The British colonies were not overlooked in that glance of comprehensive love which first lighted upon Newfoundland. It was never intended by those who made the first onset, and broke the ice on that neglected shore, to stop there; but as they were favoured by Divine Providence, to penetrate the recesses of North America, and carry the lamp of Christian knowledge into the Canadas, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia. The extension, therefore, of the Society to these regions is contemplated, not in the spirit of rivalry or interference, but of love; having no other object in view but to give light to them that sit in darkness, and to aid, as an auxiliary, every Christian institution within the sphere of its operations."

This design, however, was not practically carried into execution till the beginning of the year 1839, when the Society established its first school in Lower Canada, under the auspices of the present Bishop of Montreal, who gladly welcomed its introduction into his diocese. Since then it has established, and has now in operation, upwards of seventy schools in that province, the agents sent out from England have received ordination, and are gratuitously superintending schools in their respective missions, and the commendation which the Society has received both from the Bishop and the Clergy generally is such as to entitle it to the fullest confidence and support.

About the same time, also, the island of Newfoundland was constituted an Episcopate, which necessarily brought the Society more directly under the eye and observation of the Church, and gave fuller opportunity to the sifting and testing of its constitution, principles, and operations.

And it is matter for no small gratitude, that, without deviating from its past and consistent course, without either compromise or change, the same agents being still employed, the same education conducted, the same rules acted upon, the Society has received the most decided and unqualified approbation from the late much-loved and esteemed Prelate of Newfoundland (now of Jamaica), after visiting the schools, and examining the working of the entire system. All the communications with which your Committee have been honoured from his Lordship, during the five years he presided over the Church in Newfoundland, have not only been of the most encouraging character, but have served very much to strengthen in their minds, and that of others, the opinion once expressed by him, "that the Society is deserving of taking a higher position, as an Education Society, than it now does."

To this subject his Lordship pointedly adverts in his last communication, being a reply to a resolution which your Committee felt it to be their duty and privilege to record on occasion of the Bishop's deeply-lamented removal from an island where his labours had been so abundantly blessed. This resolution your Committee conveyed in the following terms:—

"Resolved unanimously,—

"That this Committee, referring to the translation of the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland to the diocese of Jamaica, cannot allow an event of such importance to religion, and to the interests of this Society, to pass by, without, in an especial manner, placing on record their sense of deep and lasting obligation which the island of Newfoundland owes to the indefatigable labours, apostolic zeal, and sound judgment, of its late revered and estimable Prelate.

"They leave to others to recount the signal blessing which has so eminently rested on the Church during the short period his Lordship has presided over it, while with gratitude they refer to the great progress which the cause of Christian education has made in Newfoundland, under the wise and paternal oversight of his Lordship, who, by his laborious personal inspection of the Society's schools, his encouraging countenance, his liberal aid, and ready counsel at all times, has furthered in a remarkable manner the great design for which this Society has laboured for twenty years.

"Nor can this Committee refrain from expressing their high satisfaction at the recorded testimony of the Bishop to the importance and usefulness of the Society, when, after a minute investigation of its schools throughout the colony, he declared them (in his own emphatic words) to have been '*the greatest bulwark of the Protestant faith in that dreary and benighted land;*' a sentiment to which his Lordship gave the best practical effect by selecting and ordaining *nine* of the Society's teachers as *deacon schoolmasters*, and *licensing most of the remaining teachers*.

"Thus the Society's grand object of Christian education, in accordance with the principles of the Church of England, is permanently secured, and combined with the highest spiritual advantages both to child and adult.

"While, therefore, it is impossible for the Committee to contemplate, without devoutest thankfulness to God, these great mercies to Newfoundland, and to this Society, in the cause in which it is engaged, they cannot but proportionately feel his Lordship's removal to be a source of deep and anxious concern.

"With unaffected sincerity do the Committee earnestly desire and pray that every blessing of a temporal and spiritual kind may follow his Lordship to his new and extended sphere of labour, and that his valuable life may long be spared to carry out, with the same earnest devotedness, and with the same happy success in Jamaica, those enlightened principles which have nurtured and confirmed the Protestant Church in Newfoundland.

"For that colony now bereaved of his Lordship's paternal care, this Committee would not cease to implore the Sovereign Disposer of all events to raise up and qualify, with like gifts and graces, a successor to carry on the great work now so happily in progress, till ignorance and superstition shall yield before the light and power of the glorious Gospel of the blessed God.

The following letters, in reply, have been received, addressed to the President, Lord Bexley, and to the Clerical Secretary :—

"*Bishop's Lodge, Jamaica,*

"*4th Feb. 1844.*

"My Lord,—I had the honour to receive, by the last English mail, a valedictory letter subscribed by your Lordship on behalf of the Newfoundland and North American School Society, together with a copy of the resolution of the Committee on which the communication was based.

"My Lord, it is in a real, and not a mere figurative sense, that I declare my ignorance of any words that would adequately express to your Lordship and the excellent association over which you preside, my deep gratitude for the manner in which you have been pleased to acknowledge my humble efforts to encourage the work of your agents in Newfoundland, and to accelerate the march of Christian education—education which has the Bible for its basis, and the Holy Spirit for its sanction, through the darkened diocese which I lately occupied.

"During the four years of my episcopate in that dreary and difficult land, for such is its character, though it is endeared to me by many inextinguishable recollections, my hands were indeed strengthened by the support of your Board; their judicious selection of teachers whose hearts and minds were, in general,

evidently consecrated to this good cause, their ready and prompt attention to every measure which it was my duty to suggest, their prudent and conciliatory regulations, devised in that truly Christian spirit, of which moderation is always a characteristic, — these were among the means by which a gracious God has permitted me to produce, in some small degree, the prosperous results to which you advert, and which will be gratefully remembered by me till the hour cometh in which I can no longer work.

“ I accept with much thankfulness the honour of continuing in my office as a Vice-president of your Society, and I entreat your Lordship, and the constituent members of the Committee, to believe that you will have my daily prayers to our Heavenly Master for a blessing on your labours, with which it will ever be my pride and happiness to remain associated.

“ Reverend and dear Sir, — I have to thank you very warmly for your kind letter accompanying the Address of the Newfoundland School Society, as conveyed in the communication which I had the honour to receive from your noble and venerable President.

“ In my reply to Lord Bexley I have endeavoured to express my deep and lasting sense of the great aid which I have received from an institution so justly dear to the Church of the colony which I have lately quitted, and my gratitude for the confidence which they have uniformly reposed in my humble exertions to increase the efficiency of their schools.

“ It will give me inexpressible satisfaction to be instrumental to the extension of the agency of the Society beyond the colonies to which it has hitherto been confined, and I shall joyfully welcome any of their teachers in this diocese.

“ I hope that the period may soon arrive when the Society may assume a more general name and character, and be so supported by the British and colonial public, as to become the principal Colonial School Society in connexion with the Established Church.

“ With cordial acknowledgments of your personal kindness to me, and a strong desire to maintain our correspondence on this or any other matter that may interest you, I remain, my dear Sir, yours most sincerely,

To the concluding paragraphs in this last letter, the Committee are anxious to invite particular attention. A growing want has been for a long time felt, and not unfrequently expressed, of a *Society* whose object should be to provide for the colonies an uniform and efficient system of

education on the principles of, and in connexion with, the Church of England. Your Society has done much in preparing the way; while its past history and present position seem naturally to point it out as peculiarly fitted for giving full effect to such an important and comprehensive design.

Your Committee feel it incumbent upon them explicitly to state their opinion, that the simple and exclusive character of such an enlarged Society should be *educational*, avoiding thereby collision with other societies,—keeping the old path, and restricting the application of its funds to one definite object. Moreover, they are of opinion that, to work satisfactorily, and with a due regard to order, such Society should intrude nowhere against the will of constituted authority; while, according to its means, it should be ready to embrace every opportunity for enlarging the sphere of its operations. Guided by these principles, and steadily acting in this manner, it would prove itself the rival of none, but the friend of all. And what was said of your Society by the excellent prelate of Montreal, in regard to his own diocese, would be applicable to every place where its operations would be conducted:—

“ I shall (writes the Bishop) regard the Society as *aiding* instead of *interfering* with the *ancient protectress of the Colonial Churches, the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel*; the particular department of labour which the former has assumed being eminently subservient to the objects of the latter, and still not being identical with them.”

Your Committee will now briefly advert to the Society's proceedings during the year.

Our Superintendent's Report from CANADA would be of the most cheering character, but for the melancholy and too often-repeated tale of multiplied applications for aid, which your Committee have no funds to meet, although, in most cases, a very small sum would suffice to originate and maintain schools, assisted by local subscriptions. The Superintendent has reported to the Governor-general a list of seventy

schools in operation, the importance of which cannot be sufficiently estimated amid a population overrun with superstition and irreligion. The sum granted by your Committee to Canada has stirred up the colonists to contribute about 1000*l.*, a fact which your Committee hope and believe will prove an effectual argument with many at home for increased liberality and support to this branch of the Society's operations.

The influence which the Society has gained, and the tone which it has given to the great question of religious education in Canada, is far greater than could have been expected, from the little, comparatively, it has been enabled to do, clearly shewing how much more might be done were your Society entrusted with larger means.

The following extract from the Superintendent's report, as illustrating this remark, and describing the Society's labours generally, will be read with interest. After speaking of the good effects of the Society's labours, the report proceeds:—

" But you may ask, 'How can such a trifle as we grant to Canada have such an influence as you describe over so vast an extent of country?' We think you are not aware of the large field of labour which we occupy. You will find us scattered through the large French Canadian parishes, where our fellow-countrymen have settled, side by side with Roman Catholics, with nothing but the French language and the French Church within hearing and sight. You will see our little schools on the very edge of the woods, where Englishmen have been driven by their poverty, and are become half savages, if not rescued by the hand of God, through some such means as your Society. You are aware that we now confine our operations to the lower part of Canada. Along the frontier we have some twenty schools, sprinkled at intervals of ten, twenty, or thirty miles, according to the wants of the settlers, forming a line through the country from the upper diocese down to the district of Quebec. In eleven French parishes we have established schools, attended by many French children, amounting to about 700. In the eastern townships we have 13 schools and 1300 scholars; along the St. Lawrence and on the Ottawa Rivers are scattered 24 schools, which have had on their books, at various times, 1000 children, making a total of 4600 benefited by your exertions and money. When, therefore, you view the broad field which we have occupied, you cannot be surprised when we speak of our having exercised an influence which, without this consideration, would appear incredible. Our

schools generally have elicited the praise and admiration of all who have visited them. I attended an examination of that at Lachine, and after a protracted scrutiny of about two hours, of all the classes, by three Government Commissioners, they declared that it merited their highest approbation, and concluded by signing a memorial to the Government for a pecuniary grant. In the report of one of the schoolmasters he says, 'The Roman Catholic school has been discontinued, and that under the auspices of your Society is the only one in the settlement; in consequence of which, some few Roman Catholic children form a portion of its scholars, and participate in the blessings of Gospel instruction.'

"On the whole, we have much to be grateful for having such testimony from various sources, of the good we have done, and are still doing; but we have also much cause for grief, seeing that when we were just beginning to be known in the length and breadth of the land, as Scriptural in our principles and steady in our operations, commanding every where affection and respect, we are obliged to pause for want of funds. We can only pray that God will so supply the necessary means, that Scriptural instruction may largely increase in *this province*.

"There is another branch of labour in which we are engaged to which I must refer—the circulation of books and tracts. In many places, our schools are the only channel by which the poor people can get any book that they may want. In the most destitute neighbourhoods, we have formed dépôts, from whence issue the Bible, the Prayer-book, other volumes which may prove useful as school-books, and vast numbers of tracts. We sell them in every instance where we can, even if we only get a trifle; but we never permit a poor man unable to give any thing to depart without his Bible or Prayer-book,—the Bishop of Montreal and Lord Bexley having liberally placed some of these books at our free disposal.

"Thus you see, that if we are obliged to close a school in a settlement, we not merely deprive the poor people of education, but also the means of improving or retaining what they may have already learned, besides withdrawing the beneficial influence which a single school cannot fail to exercise."

Your Committee turn to NEWFOUNDLAND with deepest feelings of gratitude, yet with earnest supplications on its behalf. Whether they look at the steady progress which the cause of Scriptural education is making through the agency of the Society, the formation of new missions, and the increasing fruitfulness of those longer established, the all but universal desire of the population to obtain schools for their children, and instruction for themselves, the opening doors of usefulness on every hand, and the voice of approval of the Society's character and operations from every quarter, they are constrained to ask, with humble and adoring thankfulness, "What has God wrought?" Time was when, instead of

friendly counsel and aid, the Society met with secret or open opposition; but God has made even its enemies to be at peace with it, and given it a prominence in the list of blessings to that dreary and desolate land, which may well make the heart of every Christian to rejoice; while, in the emphatic words of the late Bishop, "it stands an institution justly dear to the Church of the colony."

Through the merey of God, all the teachers have continued to labour with their wonted health, and strength, and happiness in their work. Some new schools have been opened in compliance with the conditions on which an increased Government grant has been made; and in those recently commenced in the westward of the island, among chiefly a Protestant population, destitute of every semblance of instruction or means of grace, the most gratifying fruits have already appeared. In the mission of Bay St. George, to which the Bishop ordained and appointed the Rev. W. Meek, the change from its barbarous ignorance and vice is of a most remarkable and decided character.

"There is the Sabbath," writes Mr. Meek, "in St. George's Bay. The Sunday games, and dances, and revels, are gone, and most of the week-day ones too. Our division of the settlement is as quiet and orderly as most English villages. Our temporary little church is, throughout the winter, too full, and would have more worshippers were there better accommodation. Our scholars are all able to join with their Prayer-books in the services of the Church; and 'that faithful saying, so worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners,' is, however feebly, yet constantly, addressed to ears and hearts which very recently, whatever else they heard, heard not of Him 'whom to know is life eternal.'"

And your Committee have been greatly delighted with a confirmation of this interesting state of things, in a communication from Captain Darley, of her Majesty's ship *Electra*, who visited, among other places, Mr. Meek's station, and thus writes of it:—

"At St. George's Bay, Mr. Meek is most arduous in his pious labours, in which he is assisted by Mrs. Meek. Divine service is performed twice each Sunday, in a large storehouse, as there is no church built as yet; but I am happy

to say I saw one in progress of being built. Between the services, a Sunday-school is held, and a daily school. The children have made rapid progress in reading, writing, &c. and in a knowledge of Scripture. Mr. Meek teaches the boys, and Mrs. Meek the girls, whom she also instructs in needle-work. The samplers I sent you are good proofs of her efforts in this useful branch of female education. Mr. and Mrs. Meek are greatly beloved by the people. I was informed by Messrs. Winter and Parsons, two respectable merchants of the place, that since Mr. Meek arrived in the settlement, two years ago, the tone of society has been wonderfully changed. Marriages and baptisms, which were unknown before, are now never neglected to be performed; in short, it has become a Christian community from having been sunk in heathen darkness."

Equally gratifying are the accounts from Fortune and Hermitage Bays, the Isle of Valen, Carbonear, and other parts where the Society has opened its schools. The poor people have given every affectionate proof of the value which they attach to your Society's agency, by assisting, not only to their power, but, with truth it may be said, beyond their power. They have, with their own hands, constructed their school-rooms and teachers' residences, and contributed of their pittance to their support. The visits of the teachers have been welcomed, more especially to the sick and the dying, and every demonstration given how very highly they are esteemed in love for their work's sake. Nor is this all; every new mission has been, as it were, the centre of a new attraction. The adjoining settlements have become anxious for the same privileges; and wherever your teachers have been able to visit, they have found the poor and destitute settlers yearning after Christian instruction, and willing to do all in their power, if any hope could be held out to them of having a teacher.

The Society's Branch Schools, your Committee deem to be among the most valuable of its operations. They are conducted at a moderate cost, and in places where the poor inhabitants cannot look for any thing else. Nothing can be conceived more important than the establishment of these little nurseries, serving, too, as a sanctuary, with a pious and devoted teacher, and under a superintendance which ensures

their efficiency and usefulness. Your Committee would take this opportunity to express their great gratitude for the liberal aid of a Christian lady, through Lord Bexley, by which two branch schools are conducted in places which had excited her warmest interest, and in which upwards of 100 children are now receiving the advantages of a Christian education.

From Mr. T. B. POLDEN, of Belloram, Fortune Bay.

"Feb. 26, 1844.—This day I gave notice to the people that I should like to have the timbers cut and hauled out of the woods to lengthen the school-room fifteen feet. In a short time a crew of about thirty men and boys assembled together, and I accompanied them; they cut all the timbers required, and hauled them out and placed them on the school premises, where each man will haul out his own timbers in readiness for the intended alteration. As soon as the frost is out of the ground, and we can lay the foundation, we shall (D.V.) proceed with the school-room, and finish it forthwith, as it is now much too small for the number of children (or at least scholars) who attend. It was very gratifying to me to see how cheerfully these poor men worked, though it was by no means an easy task to draw large timbers nearly two miles through the woods and snow, and especially as they had to go over a high mountain.

"March 1.—On my visit to Coombs' Cove the poor people said, 'If you please, sir, be you going to put a schoolmaster here? we should be terrible glad to have one.' I visited every house in the harbour, and found the place contained about seventy souls, all of whom are Protestants. Very few can read, but most anxious to learn. One man (James Y——) asked me to accompany him to a house a short distance from the one where I then was. I did so; and after he had shewed me the house he said, 'This is a house I lately bought from my brother, and if we could get a man to come here and teach our children, and read to us on Sundays, I would fit it up as a school-room and a place for the man to live in, until we could build a better one.'

"March 2.—Walked from Coombs' Cove to Wreck Cove. I have visited many places in this bay, in which I have found hundreds of immortal souls living in spiritual darkness, without clergymen, without teachers, without Bibles or Prayer-books, and really as if there was no God or Saviour in the world; but a more degenerate race of human beings I never before beheld than the poor people of Wreck Cove. Many of them, when they saw me, and the two men who accompanied me, coming, ran out of their houses, apparently as much frightened as if they had never seen a human being before. I must say I was much amused to see the poor children (whom I greatly pity, as I know, poor things, they cannot help it) fly away into the woods; others under the flakes, and some under the piles of wood, &c.; others were peeping round the corners of the huts, and as we walked along on one side, they would run round to the other. However, after being with them for a short time, and conversing with their parents about them, &c. they appeared much more reconciled. These poor creatures live in

small huts (or, rather, hovels), about eight feet square and four feet high, which are so full of smoke that it was almost impossible to see the inmates. How they live in them I am sure I cannot tell. They informed me that their forefathers 'came out from the old country' (England). I visited every hut in the place, and found the people were all Protestants, and, by name at least, attached to the Church of England. Not a solitary individual in the harbour could tell a letter, though, in answer to a question I put to them, they said, 'To be sure we should, master, be glad to learn a bit, as well as other folks, if we had a chance. We ben't so ignorant as all that, but what we know learning is a capital thing if folks make good use of it.' I then asked them if they would like me to read prayers to them, &c. They said, 'O, yes, master, we should like to hear the Word of God, to be sure, and if any body would come along this way and sometimes to read to us, we should be terrible glad, for we can't read ourselves; but nobody don't care about us.' In the course of my conversation with them they said (not knowing who I was), 'There is a man down at Belloram, but he never comes a-nigh us, though we should be glad to see him if he would come, for we should like to hear prayers as well as Belloram folks, if we could.' I said, 'I suppose I am the man you mean, for I am the schoolmaster from Belloram,' &c. They then said, 'Oh, be ye, sir; why, somebody told us a long time ago you would come and see us, and we have been looking out for ye.' From this I learnt that these poor neglected creatures had really been expecting me to pay them a visit for some time past. I would gladly and willingly often visit them if I could, but the travelling is so difficult that it is utterly impossible. I am sure our friends at home cannot form the least idea of the travelling in this island, at least in this part of it, for a traveller who has any distance to go must go part of the way by water and part by land. In the summer he has to walk through woods and bogs, and in the winter deep snow. When he comes to a creek or bay he is obliged to get into a punt (often when he is very much heated from walking), and is landed on the opposite side. On the other hand, if he leaves home in a punt, he cannot go all the way by water, but is obliged to get out and walk across some point or neck of land, and carry what he was wrapped up in, &c. while in the punt with him. This is the case in going from Belloram to Coombs' and Wreck Coves. Oh, that it may please the great Husbandman to send forth more labourers into this part of His vineyard, so that these our poor neglected fellow-sinners may be able to hear that Word which was given to be a 'light to our feet, and a lantern to our path.' But to return. When I had collected all the people together in the largest hut in the place, I read Divine service, and a printed sermon from John, iii. 16. A more attentive congregation I never saw. As soon as I had done, all, as with one voice, thanked me, and wished to know if I could inform them when I should be that way again. They then wished to know if there would be a schoolmaster sent to Coombs' Cove, adding, 'If there was, it would be nothing for us to go there to hear the Word of God on a Sunday; and we could strap our children at our backs, as 'tis but about three miles, and that's not so far as we go in and out every day to our winter-houses in the hard weather,' &c. They also said their children should attend daily, when they possibly could there, if there was a school at Coombs' Cove. One poor old man, between seventy and eighty years of age, said, 'Please, master, have you got a book in your pocket to give away to an old man? if you have, I should be glad with it.' I asked him what good it would be

to him, as there was no one in the harbour who could read it. 'I'll get somebody or other to read it to me, for our skipper that comes to take the fish can read, and I'll get him to read it to me.' I most readily complied with his request, and gave him several tracts. He said, 'I'll get them sewed together, and put in my Prayer-book, where they sha'n't get hurted.' 'Prayer-book!' said I, 'have you a Prayer-book?' 'Yes, I have, sir,' was his answer, 'and I would not part with it for any money, for it was my poor father's, who is dead and gone. I only wish I could read as well as he could.'

"I am fully persuaded, could some of our kind Christian friends at home (who lend a certain portion of their wealth yearly to the Lord, for the spread of the Gospel to the heathen) see the state of utter destitution and wretchedness these descendants of English ancestors are now in, they would of their abundance cast in more into the treasury of the Lord for the Newfoundland School Society, so that they might be enabled to extend their labours through the length and breadth of this dark and benighted land."

From Mr. JOHN MARSHALL GROLE, Hermitage Bay.

"I have at present forty-two scholars on the books, three having removed to other harbours. Sixteen read in the Testament, write a little on the slate, repeat nearly the whole of the Church Catechism, and a little of the multiplication-table; eight in the third-class book; thirteen in the second-class book; five in the alphabet. Not one of these knew the alphabet when I commenced school among them, in August 29, 1842. They are also able to sing a few tunes tolerably well, and join in the responses during Divine service. On the Sabbath, I have a congregation of about 100, who have hitherto attended very well. How delightful to see this people, who have been accustomed to spend their Sabbaths in sin and wickedness, profaning God's holy day,—to see them bending in the house of prayer, and joining in the services of our beloved Church, or listening attentively to the words of eternal life! May God, of His great mercy and love in Christ Jesus, cause the good seed to take root, spring up, and bring forth fruit, to the praise and glory of His Name!

"I have raised about 28*l.* towards defraying the expenses of building my school-room, and I hope to get a little more this summer. Mr. Gallop, the agent at Guntois, has been very kind in assisting us; he settled with the man who brought the wood for his own dealers, or I should not have been able to procure it yet. I have been at some expense to encourage the people in building the school, as most of them are very poor. One of Mr. Gallop's sons is remaining here for the purpose of attending school.

"I have been under the necessity of spending the winter in the woods, not one family being left in the harbour. My school labours were, of course, partially suspended. I visited them from house to house, as much as I was able. This was very acceptable to the people, and, if I am spared among them another winter, I must follow them again. I am willing to do so, if the Lord continue my health. It is impossible for them to remain in the harbour, in consequence of the great scarcity of wood in this neck of land. The people talk of building me a small dwelling-house when the school is finished.

" My Sabbath-school is well attended : I have, at present, about fifty. I have not been able to accomplish much amongst so many, as most were not able to read. A few of my week-day scholars are beginning to assist me a little, and two of the planters who are able to read come occasionally to help."

From Mr. WILLIAM SHANNON, Carbonear.

" This harbour, next to St. John's, is the largest in population in the island. I believe there are about 4000 people in it. One half of the people is Roman Catholic.

" You will be pleased to hear that the school is much appreciated throughout the harbour. Many an evening have I seen a group of people outside the door listening to the children singing, and, on more than one occasion, they have opened the door, and begged permission to enter.

" Under the sanction of the Bishop of this diocese, I read the Church Service every Sunday at Perry's Cove, a place about seven miles distant from Carbonear. The people there are very desirous of having a school ; they hauled out the frame of a house a few weeks ago, and set it up ; they expect to have it completed before next winter.

" They promise to contribute all they can towards the support of a teacher, if one should be sent to them. William Budden, in whose house I meet the people on Sundays for Divine service, has been for some months past under deep religious impressions ; he was greatly afflicted for some time. I do hope and trust that God has sanctified his affliction to his soul. When I first visited Perry's Cove, I found the people very ignorant with regard to religion. On Sunday evenings, I gather the little ones around me, for the purpose of giving such instruction as they are able to receive."

The Superintendant writes, in reference to this station :—

" I may mention, touching the public examination of Mr. Shannon's school, that the Hon. Judge Lilly, who, with many others, both ladies and gentlemen of the first respectability, was present on the occasion, has informed me that the progress made by the children in so short a time was really astonishing, and such as reflected the greatest credit on the teacher, and, at the same time, proved the usefulness of the Society."

From Mr. JOSEPH BAGGS, Salvage.

" Our present school-room is much too small, especially on Sundays, when we have on the average about seventy-eight scholars, children and adults. The daily school averages only from forty to fifty ; but if the local circumstances of this station, together with the great attention the cod-fishery necessarily requires, be considered, a greater number could not reasonably be expected ; for almost every boy over seven years of age is taken to sea during the fishing months, and girls about the same age, or younger, are required at home to attend to infant children. It may, however, be hoped that, as the fall advances, and during the winter, the daily attendance will be increased, and prospects become still more encouraging.

"More than fifty of the number admitted into the schools at this station were, it might be said, utterly ignorant; others had made little progress in learning, and a tolerably good number of the adults admitted as Sunday-scholars can read.

"With regard to Scriptural instruction, or being taught in the fundamental truths of Christianity, they were nearly all on a level;—ignorant of God, the great Eternal Being, knew but little or nothing concerning Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and the Saviour of mankind, and, consequently, wholly unacquainted with the nature and operations of the Holy Spirit. Their knowledge of a belief in a future state of rewards and punishments was not such as to have a practical influence on their hearts or lives.

"Your teacher makes frequent visits to the people of the harbour, for the purpose of reading with them, and distributing tracts, which are received with gratefulness. Loan library books are greatly inquired after, but he regrets his inability to meet the demand. He has not hitherto extended his visits beyond his own more immediate sphere, Salvage; save on one Sabbath, he went to Barrow Harbour, a small settlement, containing a population of about thirty souls, wholly destitute of any means of instruction.

"Commending this report to the consideration and approbation of the Committee, your teacher hopes this interesting place and people will not be forgotten, and, in the meantime, faith and prayer shall be exercised, and God's grace relied on, that, with His blessing, this barren waste will, ere long, blossom and bud as the rose, and bring forth much fruit to perfection, to the praise and glory of Him who would have all men everlastingly saved."

In adverting to the distribution of Bibles, and other religious publications, your Committee are reminded of the debt of obligation which your Society owes to those great Christian institutions, the British and Foreign Bible Society, and the Religious Tract Society, inasmuch as, wherever it has taught the child or the adult to read, it has likewise been enabled, through their means, to place in his possession the Holy Scriptures, and to provide wholesome nourishment for the appetite thus created.

During the year, the teachers had exhausted their stock of Bibles and religious tracts, and their application for a fresh supply was as liberally as it was instantly given, in the grants from the Bible Society, of 300 Bibles and 500 Testaments, and from the Tract Society, of their tracts and religious works, to the amount of 20*l.* The remittance to the Bible Society for copies of the Scriptures sold during the year has been 65*l.* 9*s.* 3*d.*

It is an interesting fact, that while, on the one hand, your Society has been dispelling the darkness of superstition and ignorance by a Scriptural education, it has thus been enabled to give permanency to its labours, by putting in circulation, through its teachers, nearly 20,000 copies of the entire Word of God, or portions of it, and nearly half a million of religious tracts and books breathing the doctrinal and unctional spirit of the blessed Reformation, together with thousands of Prayer-books and homilies. From the several communications of the teachers, your Committee are glad to find that a great and growing desire exists to be possessed of the Prayer-book,—a fact which proves not only that your Society is a faithful handmaid to our Scriptural Church—winning for her the affections of the people, but furnishes also the hope that an enlarged acquaintance with her formularies will, as it ever must, produce a race of Christian men soundly taught in the Scriptures, and valiant for the truth of God upon the earth.

They would take this opportunity of stating that her Majesty's Government has appointed the Rev. Dr. Feild, late Fellow of Queen's College, Oxford, and Rector of English Bicknor, Gloucestershire, to the see of Newfoundland, in the room of Dr. Aubrey G. Spencer, now Bishop of Jamaica,—an appointment which there is every reason to believe will afford another striking proof that “He who holds the stars in his right hand, and walks among the golden candlesticks,” will continue to cast the bright beams of his heavenly light upon the once benighted shores of Newfoundland; which your Committee earnestly pray that God may of his infinite mercy grant.

Your Committee have to acknowledge, with much thankfulness, from different friends, several boxes, containing various articles of clothing for the poor children of Newfoundland.

From the Misses Neele of Islington, a very large parcel

of apparel for the school at Spaniard's Bay, under the charge of the Rev. J. Griffin.

From Miss Haydon of Guildford, a box of flannel, stockings, &c., for the school at Bay St. George, under the charge of the Rev. W. Meek.

From Mrs. Atkinson of Knaresborough, a large box of apparel.

From Miss Smith of Everton, Yorkshire, flannel, shoes, &c. &c.

From Mrs. Smith, a parcel of apparel for children.

These presents, it is unnecessary to add, are of special value to the poor children in the severity of a Newfoundland winter; and deeply will these proofs of Christian love and spiritual sympathy be felt and acknowledged by many a grateful heart.

The Committee have also thankfully to acknowledge, from the Rev. J. Hall of Bristol, in addition to former grants of the same valuable works, which have proved of great service in the different stations of the Society,—

From Miss Protheroe, a valuable present of books; and from Percival White, Esq., fifty copies of "Scriptural Peace in Death."

Before concluding this portion of their report, the Committee would acknowledge with unfeigned thankfulness to God the affectionate estimation in which their teachers generally are held in their respective spheres of labour, and would take this opportunity of conveying their gratitude to those kind friends of the Society in Greenspond, with the Rev. J. Gilchrist at their head, through whose liberal contributions a dwelling-house has been projected for the master, as an expression of their respect and friendship to him. The

sum of upwards of 100*l.* was liberally contributed at a public meeting, convened to take the subject into consideration.

The Committee have also to refer with especial thankfulness to one deed of Christian generosity, which has allotted a sum nearly equivalent to the cost of one mission, which the Society has recently opened, in which the donor feels special interest, and which God is greatly blessing.

In a letter which your Committee have just received from this gentleman, himself a resident in Newfoundland, and an eye-witness of the labours and benefits of the Society, he remarks:—

“The great usefulness of the Newfoundland School Society in a national, as well as a moral point of view, is not adequately appreciated, even by the most devoted friends of the Society. It is so ably and so satisfactorily conducted here (in Newfoundland), that I deem its usefulness beyond all calculation and beyond all praise.”

Such a testimony is surely more than enough to encourage the friends of the Society; while the act which confirms it speaks loudly to those who have the means, and on whom rests the responsibility—“Go and do likewise.”

HOME PROCEEDINGS.

Your Committee regret to have to state that, compared with the former year, there has been a falling off in the receipts, and which chiefly appears in the item of Associations. This, however, it is believed, arises, not from any diminution of interest felt on behalf of your Society, but from the pressure of local claims, which have deprived it of the proceeds of sermons in some of the more important associations, and which abundantly accounts for the deficiency. It is to be hoped that its clerical friends will bear the Society in mind in making their arrangements for appeals to the Christian sympathy and liberality of their people. It is in this way

that, not only are the funds greatly augmented, but also a deeper interest is created by its claims being thus brought before numbers who are accessible by no other means.

The sums raised in Canada and Newfoundland are applied respectively in aid of the grant made by the Society. During the year, the sum of 963*l.* 9*s.* was raised in Canada; while 1172*l.* 13*s.* 5½*d.* have been raised in Newfoundland, from May 25th, 1842, to November 25th, 1843, exclusive of balances in both Superintendants' hands. These sums, reduced to sterling money, amounting to 1853*l.* 3*s.* 5*d.*, and, added to the home receipts, from Donations, Subscriptions, Associations, &c. &c. make the total 4327*l.* 4*s.* 3*d.*; but the payments have exceeded that sum by 270*l.* 15*s.* 9*d.*, which is now due to the Treasurer.

This deficiency would not have caused your Committee any deep concern, but that the prospective operations of the Society will require the whole of the anticipated usual income, affording no probability of liquidating the debt, except by the increased liberality of the Christian public. On this ground, they recently put forth the appeal of their Superintendent's letter from Newfoundland, in which he strongly shewed the difficulty of *immediately*, and the great evil of *ultimately*, suspending any of the branch schools of the Society.* The Committee are deeply grateful to those old

* The Rev. T. F. H. Bridge, the Society's Superintendent in Newfoundland, presented a petition to the legislature of that colony, in which he set forth the facts of the Society having spent, and continuing to spend yearly, a large sum of money collected in Great Britain, for the promotion of education,—of her having, during the twenty years of her existence, educated 13 or 14,000 of this population in her principal and branch schools,—of the ascertained utility of the latter class of schools, and their peculiar suitability to small settlements,—and of the necessity which the Society would be under of closing them all, unless the legislature should extend liberal assistance to her. Annexed to this petition was a schedule containing the localities of our schools, among which the branch schools are far the most numerous; and on the above premises, and an investigation of this schedule, a grant was made of 500*l.* per annum; which, as Mr. Bridge justly observes, necessarily pledges the Society to the maintenance of her existing branch schools, so long as the amount of the legislative vote is received. This fact pleads powerfully for increased support from home.

and oft-tried friends, who so liberally and readily responded to their appeal for aid, and which has prevented the necessity of an immediate closing of any one of the schools now in operation.* And earnestly is it to be hoped that the day may never arrive when your Committee may be compelled to write to a people, poor, and destitute, and deserving, who shew every desire, and use every effort, to secure for their children and themselves a religious education,—“ We must withdraw the master, though without him you have none to care for you, none to assemble you together on the Sabbath, none to instruct you,—we must leave your children, though thirsting for knowledge, to grow up and to perish for lack of it, because there is not Christian sympathy enough at home to listen to your cry.”

Your Committee rather believe that the Society is destined to achieve yet greater things, and to receive corresponding support, that not in Newfoundland alone its schools may be multiplied, but that, in other colonies also, children yet unborn may hereafter arise and call it blessed, and, through its instrumentality, the cause of Scriptural education, and, with it, our Reformed Faith, be mightily advanced in the earth!

To this end, they commit it, in earnest faith and prayer, to Him whose is the silver and the gold, and in whose governance are all hearts, that, if it be His blessed will, its “ little strength ” hitherto vouchsafed may mightily increase, and its folds, so precious but so few, may abundantly multiply, to gather in the thousands of stray lambs of His flock, yet unsheltered and uncared for, to be saved with the remnant of the true Israelites in the day of the Lord Jesus.

THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNIVERSARY SERMON,

"And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice; and there shall be one fold, and one Shepherd."—John x. 16.

Of the truth of this prophecy of our blessed Lord, we ourselves are now the witnesses. We were not of the fold of Israel, yet have we been made to hear the voice of "the good Shepherd," who hath "laid down His life for the sheep;" and so far are we advancing towards the attainment of that perfect work, which shall be revealed, when they that are afar off shall be brought home to His blessed flock, and "be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord."

To proclaim, brethren, this great truth—to proclaim it as a certainty, which we believe shall one day be accomplished, is to profess ourselves at the same time engaged in the promotion of it. If Andrew were no sooner called to the knowledge of his heavenly Master, than he instantly found his own brother Simon, and "saith unto him, We have found the Messiah, which is, being interpreted, the Christ; and brought him to

Jesus;" if the woman of Sychar, when the same truth was communicated to her spirit, ran eagerly into the city, and urged the inhabitants thereof to learn for themselves that which she had learnt; if Peter, when he was converted, was commanded to "strengthen his brethren;" if, upon the same authority received from the lip of Christ, and binding upon every generation of His Church, the commandment has been issued to "go forth and teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:" then it follows, that we are clearly constrained, by the working of every instinctive energy of our nature, as well as by the solemn command of that Lord, into whose Church we have been received by baptism—to press forward to "the mark of the prize of our high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Acknowledging the one privilege, we are bound to remember the other duty.

The blessedness of this privilege, and the solemn obligations of this duty, are so vast, that they are sufficient of themselves to engage our attention; and, fixing our deepest thoughts upon them, we might well essay to examine them as far as we are able, in themselves and in their results. And if, in the course of ordinary pastoral instruction, I were now called upon to speak to you, I would fain endeavour to pursue that train of thought. But such is not the occasion on which I now stand here. I feel too, that the general truth involved in the declaration of the text is that which must once and again have been brought before you; and remembering, as we all must, that only upon the last Lord's day, the words which I have just read, and their context, formed the Gospel appointed for that day's service; I trust, that the hearts of most of those to whom I speak, have already been filled with a deep and abiding sense of this touching record of Scripture. I purpose, therefore, if God will, to go on to the application of the general principle which it involves, and which is associated with the object which has called us together this evening.

And I address myself the more willingly to this consideration of the subject, because I believe the historical circumstances connected with that field of Christian enterprise, in

which the Society I am now advocating has been for some years engaged, are such as may furnish to those who have not hitherto been acquainted with them, and even to those who have been familiar with them, some solemn and important lessons.

I would, therefore, as briefly as I can, place before you some of those points, marking the relation between this country and the first scene of this Society's labours—I mean the island of Newfoundland—which appear to claim our regard. It was the first land, as you know, discovered by British mariners, when stimulated by the discoveries of Columbus, they went forth, five years afterwards, with the authority of Henry the Seventh, and under the guidance of the Venetian Cabot, to reach, if possible, India and China, across the north western waters of the Atlantic. It was also the first field of foreign enterprise, on which the power of the British Parliament was ever known to operate; for as early as the second year of Edward the Sixth, an Act of Parliament was passed, for licence to traffic to the same. Again, it was the first country, in which a British colony was planted; for in the year 1583, the 25th of Elizabeth, the half brother of Sir Walter Raleigh, Sir Humphrey Gilbert, an officer who had served with great distinction, both at home and abroad, and who had long turned his attention especially to the promotion of commercial and maritime enterprise, set forth thither with varied and extensive powers which he had received under letters patent from the sovereign. There is no doubt, and we admit it freely, that the character of the powers vested in him by those letters patent, was more in accordance with the high prerogatives of princely power which prevailed in the sixteenth century, than with those principles by which it is now deemed right that colonisation should be regulated. Nevertheless, one of the most important articles in those letters patent ought thankfully to be noticed; namely, that which provides that the laws which he was empowered to establish in the island, should, "be as near as conveniently may, agreeable to the laws of England, and also not against the true Christian faith or reli-

gion, then professed in the Church of England." This provision, I say, deserves to be noticed; because, albeit the form in which it is expressed reflects, in some degree, the spirit of despotic rule prevalent in that age, yet the proclamation itself of the true faith then professed in the Church of England, and the interest manifested on behalf of the men who were about to leave her fostering care at home, that they should be preserved, and strengthened by the same bonds of holy fellowship abroad, and be taught to remember, amid the dangers and the hardships of their new estate, the ground of their common salvation—these, assuredly, are witnesses, to tell us, that, in that first attempt to plant in a foreign clime a settlement of British subjects we have the recognition, broadly and distinctly made, of the inheritance which they, who embarked in that enterprise, possessed, in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and of the bonds of close and holy brotherhood which, through the power of that Gospel, remained between those who tarried in their own father-land, and those who left it for a foreign shore. It is a testimony, which has been, for the most part, lost sight of in the cursory glances which have been taken of this enterprise by the general historian. We, therefore, should the more carefully remember it, and pray that by such remembrance we may be the better incited to the work which is now before us.

But it stands not alone. A further and more explicit testimony to the same effect is supplied in the remarks accompanying the only narrative which has come down to us of that expedition, by a writer who was himself the captain and the owner of the only vessel which survived; and also in the report made afterwards of the same, by one of its chief promoters. The expedition itself, it is well known, proved most disastrous; it reached its destination, indeed, and the leader, having landed in the haven of St. John's, which is at this day the chief city in the colony, and having taken possession of it in the name of the Queen of England, delivered three laws to be enforced in the island—the first, in accordance with the law just adverted to, that the religion should be that of the Church of Eng-

land, and the other two for the maintenance of the queen's prerogatives in that island. But, proceeding afterwards to explore the southern and western coasts of the isle, he was compelled by most adverse circumstances to abandon his design; and, returning homewards, perished in the voyage. The point, however, to which I wish now to call your attention, is the train of thought expressed by the writer in question; who, as I have already said, commanded the only vessel which survived the expedition. Whatsoever may have been the errors, both of design and of execution, which helped to mar that enterprise—and they are neither denied nor palliated in the narrative to which I refer—it is clear that he who recorded them, knew well the proper objects, which ought to be kept in view in such undertakings, and the spirit in which they ought to be conducted. Speaking of the extent of the discoveries in the western hemisphere, which had been made up to that time by the voyagers of other nations as well as our own, and of the period which had elapsed since the commencement of them, he confesses,—and if he, towards the end of the sixteenth century, made this confession, with how much greater reason may we repeat it now?—that "in both these respects, a glorious opportunity had been given to sow the seed of eternal life in those fields of heathenism, from which a full and precious harvest might already have been gathered in." He makes also the distinct acknowledgment, that "this must be the chief intent of such as shall make any attempt that way, or else whatsoever is builded upon that foundation shall never attain happy success or continuance;" "and although," he adds, "we cannot precisely judge (which only be longeth to God), what have been the humours of men stirred up to great activity and diligence in those remote countries, yet the events do show, that either God's cause has not been chiefly preferred by them, or else that God has not permitted such abundant grace, as the light of His knowledge of Him to be yet revealed to those infidels before the appointed time." In the mean while, he urges "every man in whom is any instinct and inclination to this attempt, to

examine his own motives, which, if the same proceed of ambition or of avarice, he may assure himself it cometh not o. God, and therefore cannot have confidence of God's protection and assistance against the violence both of sea and infinite perils on the land. But if his motives," he adds, "be derived from a virtuous and heroical mind, preferring chiefly the honour of God, and compassion for those who are tyrannised in most wonderful and dreadful manner over their bodies and souls; and from a willingness to help those who in this realm are distressed; all these," he confesses, "be honourable purposes, imitating the nature of the munificent God, wherewith He is well pleased, who will assist such an action beyond the expectation of man." A similar testimony is pronounced, as we have before said, by another writer, in a report which he drew up of the same enterprise; and notwithstanding that some of the pleas advanced by him, are no doubt overstrained, yet it is certain that the main object which that "chief adventurer," as he is called, had in view, in this first attempt to plant a British settlement abroad, was the extension of Christian truth, by the extension of the Christian name.

Nor are these the only witnesses which remain, to tell us of the earnest aspirations which were felt, and which were expressed in that day, for the true welfare of England's first colony. There was a man named Richard Whitbourne, who stood as a spectator upon the shore of the chief haven which I have named in the island, at the very moment when Gilbert took possession of it on behalf of this country. He was at that time in command of an English vessel, which lay with many others in the harbour. Before, and many times after that period, he visited the same haven, in the exercise of his commercial calling: and, in the twelfth year of James the First, namely, the year 1615, he went out thither under a commission from the High Court of Admiralty, for the purpose of correcting certain disorders which had sprung up in the fishery. In the course of the same reign, he published a Discourse which is now extant,—though rarely to be met with—upon the history and character of the island. This work

is well worthy of notice on account of the curious and interesting matter which it contains with reference to the subject of which it professes to treat; but particularly do I cite it now for the testimony which it gives, as to the feelings with which the possession of that colony was at that day regarded by the temporal and spiritual rulers of our Church. It contains, at the outset, a copy of a letter from the Privy Council, accompanied with a reference from James the First to the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, recommending to them that a copy of Whitbourne's treatise might be distributed throughout the several parishes of their provinces, for the encouragement of adventurers into the plantation, and also, that they should promote, in the most favourable and effectual manner collections to be made in all the same parishes, for the purpose of defraying the charges incurred in different ways by the writer in question. He himself also, as would appear abundantly evident, if we had time to cite the passages, never fails to present to his readers that which was certainly present to his own mind, namely, the obligations laid upon them all to promote, in a distant island, that knowledge of the truth which was the glory of their own Church and country. Let me refer only to two out of the many which occur to me. He says, in one place, of the savages of Trinity harbour, "If they might be reduced to the knowledge of the true Trinity, indeed, no doubt it would be a most sweet and acceptable sacrifice to God, an everlasting honour to their king, and the heavenliest blessing to those poor creatures who are buried in their own superstitions. The task thereof would prove easy, if it were but well begun, and seconded by industrious spirits. No doubt but God himself would set His hand to rear up and advance so holy, so pious, and so Christian a building." Again, in another place, where he is engaged in showing that the settlement or plantation in that island would be the means of bringing its poor misbelieving inhabitants "to the knowledge of God, and to the light of His truth, and to civil and regular government," he adds, "This is a thing so apparent, that I need not enforce it any further, or labour.

to stir up the charity of Christians therein to give furtherance toward a work so pious; every man knowing, that we ourselves"—here is a solemn consideration—"were once as blind as they in the knowledge and worship of our Creator, and as rude and savage in our lives and manners. Only thus much will I add," he says, "that it is not a thing impossible, that by means of those slender beginnings which may be made in Newfoundland, all the regions near adjoining thereto may in time be fitly converted to the true worship of God."

Brethren, the prayers and the expectations of this honest mariner have not yet been answered. He speaks of the beginnings of the great work in his day as slender: and we, who are at this moment assembled, at an interval of more than two hundred and twenty years since his words were first addressed to Christian England, must not we with shame confess that the work is only still beginning, and that that beginning is only still slender? We are not, indeed, forgetful of the circumstances of our national history, which, in a very great degree, may be thought to explain the causes of this humiliating result. The reign, for instance, of James the First, which was closing when Whitbourne's book appeared, was followed, as we know, by that fierce struggle, in the reign of his son, which cost him both his throne and life; and albeit, in the time of the Commonwealth, and that which followed the restoration of the House of Stuart, the growth of our vast colonial empire may be traced, both in the east and in the west, yet our relations with Newfoundland were impaired throughout almost the whole of that period; and when, at length, in the year 1713, the Treaty of Utrecht declared that the exclusive sovereignty of it belonged to England, that declaration, was accompanied by conditions which made it difficult for this country to avail herself fully of the real privileges of that sovereignty. And then, the political circumstances of this country, for a great part of the eighteenth century, arising out of her wars with France, and with her own colonies in North America, tended to throw fresh obstacles in the way of any close and beneficial union between her and her earliest colony. But, after making every

abatement which considerations such as these may suggest, the humiliating fact must nevertheless be admitted, that there has been, during that long period, (may we not say that there is still?) a fearful and sad indifference to those holy ties which have bound that land to our own? We have stood by, with folded arms, suffering a sad arrear of moral guilt to accumulate. The voice of the "good Shepherd" has been for ever sounding in the ears of our fathers and of ourselves, and saying, that other sheep there were, not of our own fold, which yet were to "hear His voice," and to be made one fold with us; and we have not obeyed that voice; we have not stirred one step, we have not aroused ourselves in any one way, to speed on that glorious summons or to bring back those wanderers to the fold. Nay, if that were all, it would be a light burden compared with the heavy weight which really rests upon us. For it is not only, brethren, that we have not done the good which our hands might have found to do; but see the evil which we have actually wrought among those savages to whom Whitbourne pointed, and whose superstitious ignorance he deplored when he made that earnest and simple-hearted appeal, that we might bring them from that darkness to light, remembering that our fathers were once as dark, and our fathers once as rude and savage as they. The descendants of those very savages rose up to possess the land of their fathers; and we, the descendants of the mariners and merchants to whom such thoughts were suggested have swept them from the face of that land. It has indeed been so. I stop not now to show, by various details, the steps by which this fearful result has been attained, but we know, by evidence too clear and positive, that it is so. And therefore, I say, after making every abatement which equity and truth demand, in extenuation of the fearful guilt which this nation and Church has brought upon herself by this long neglect, the fact itself of neglect must not be denied. And if we, brethren, at this distance of time and place, are well nigh bowed down to the dust with shame at the contemplation of this neglect—no marvel that they who witnessed the appalling evils which flowed from it, who with the

hearing of the ear heard it, and with their eyes beheld it, should have felt their hearts kindled within them; and, in the apparent hopelessness of any other resource, should have come earnestly entreating the help of their brethren at home. We know that it was precisely this feeling, working in the heart of one who dwelt in that island, and through his earnest and honest entreaties reaching the hearts of many who had before not known what it was to bestow even a thought upon its inhabitants, which, under God, led, in the year 1823, to the formation of the very Society for which I plead. We know, further, that, urgent as were the calls which were made from Newfoundland itself, within five or six years after the creation of this Society, they who were entrusted with the management of its proceedings dared—it was a bold adventure, but they did dare—even to look beyond that field to the borders of another larger still; and they then professed to assume as another field of labour, their province of British North America. Ten years elapsed indeed ere they could make that profession good; but when the opportunity at length was offered, and the door was opened, in 1839, by the Bishop of Montreal who welcomed the agents of this Society into his diocese, they availed themselves of it; and have ever since been going on, cheered by the hearty encouragement of him who is the spiritual pastor of the flock among them, and cheered by the prayers and sympathy of others, who have rejoiced to strengthen their hands in this work.

And here, brethren, I am reminded that in the same year of which I speak, the episcopate was also established in Newfoundland. The Church was then in her integrity exhibited in the sight of her people; and ever since there has been exhibited among them that perfect reciprocity of Christian love, which the pastor will ever pray may exist between his flock and himself. We have not now the time to speak of, and if we had, we feel that we could not adequately acknowledge, that great debt of obligation which we owe to him, who, having during that period, filled the office of Bishop of Newfoundland, has now been called to labour in another por-

tion of the British Colonial empire. But we do thankfully confess, that this Society has experienced his most constant and fatherly protection; and we pray that the same help may be continued to be extended by those who follow him. We pray that the same scattering of the spiritual seed by their hands may be prospered, and that He who is the Lord of the seed-time and of the harvest, will not suffer their labour to be “in vain in the Lord.” It is upon no vague, no general grounds of hope, that we indulge this expectation. We feel that at the period at which we are speaking, we have this sure testimony upon our side, namely, that at the present time, including those seventy schools which are established in the diocese of Montreal, there are one hundred and twenty schools in operation, owing their existence and their maintenance, under God, to the exertions of this Society. We know, further, that eighteen of the agents of this Society have been received into the holy orders of deacons and of priests by the Bishops of Montreal and Newfoundland, and that nine of these teachers are at this moment engaged in their work in Newfoundland. All these are palpable and distinct testimonies. They are tokens set up in the midst of us, to show that God still deals mercifully with us, notwithstanding that we have been so slow to promote His glory. He has not cast us off. He still suffers us to draw near unto Him with the voice of supplication and of praise; and, in the desire which He awakens within us, to make others partakers of that hope which has been extended to us, He would make each of us, more faithfully and more ardently realize the fulness of that hope himself. I leave it then for you, by your own earnest efforts, by your own hearty prayers, to strengthen the hands of those who, as labourers in the field of missionary toil, do indeed need your help. In any and every place that toil is arduous; but how much more arduous is it in the island, of which I have been speaking! We have abundant evidence of the difficulties, which have beset those who have travelled the length and breadth of that dreary land; when they have been cut off for weeks and months,

from all communication with their families, and gathering, as they best could, the few inhabitants of the forest in its gloomy solitudes, where the only light kindled has been that of the seal's oil placed in a scollop shell,—have made known to them, in those poor, inclement regions, the riches of Jesus Christ. At other times, they have gone into the rude cabins of those of our own countrymen who have settled on its rugged and indented coasts, and have heard from their own lips the touching language of complaint, "If any of us are sick and sore, there is no one here to visit us, no one to care for our souls." They have seen them weeping, when the Sabbath dawned upon them, to think how different the associations of that day were on that dark shore, from those which they remembered in their native England, when the sound of the Sabbath bell was heard, and they were glad when others said unto them, "Let us go unto the house of the Lord." Yea, they have looked upon scenes more appalling still than these, as they have traversed the steep and rocky headlands of the isle. They have seen there men who live only upon the wreck of some stranded vessel; men whose eyes have kindled into brightness, as they watch the clouds of the coming storm and welcome the first howlings of the gale; and when the hand of violence has done its fearful work, and the spoiler has carried off the prey, it is but to drown his soul for days and nights in drunkenness. These are the scenes which the minister of Christ has witnessed, when he has gone forth to proclaim his heavenly Master's message in that island. And when he seeks to teach the children of those savages—and savages our neglect has made them—when he seeks to bring them up "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," and to redeem them from that heavy bondage by which the strong man of sin has bound them; will he not rejoice if he knows that there are those at home who remember him; and who, "absent in body," are "present with him" in "spirit?" Will he not rejoice, when he sees how utterly feeble his own hands are, to gather these poor wan-

derers together, that there are those at home, who will, as of the ability which God hath given unto them, make strong his feeble hands; and bearing his burdens, rejoice to "fulfil the law of Christ?"

It is precisely, brethren, that joy of which I would have you this evening to be both the givers and the receivers; it is that you may "fulfil the law of Christ" by bearing the heavy burden, under which others are toiling, that I beseech you now to join with us in promoting the operations of the Society of which I speak. Promote them the more, brethren, because, in a time of desolation and difficulty, they seem to have been well nigh the only instruments at work. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, whose ministers are appointed to watch over the very people in whose behalf the schoolmasters and agents of this Society are engaged, have at no time said that they could have done without them; they have at all times said, that, as their help is needed, so have they been joyful to receive it. And, if their testimony has been followed by that of the Bishops of the Church who preside over them, need we receive further evidence to assure us, that whilst the object which we are desiring to attain is one which for its own sake is needful, the means which God has permitted to be employed in its achievement, are proper and efficient? To His Word, then, which is our only guide, and to His Spirit who is our only Comforter, do I commit the cause which I have thus far been endeavouring to place before you. I commit it with the earnest prayer, that He who is the great Giver of "every good and every perfect gift," and with whom there is "no variableness neither shadow of turning," may quicken in your hearts the love of His name, and enabling you "not grudgingly, nor of necessity," but with cheerfulness, now to obey the call which we address unto you. May those likewise for whom this work of Christian love is required, be brought into the fold of the good Shepherd! May they hear His voice; and hearing it, return to the shelter and salvation of His everlasting arms!

APPEAL.

THE Society was formed in 1823, for the purpose of establishing Schools in Newfoundland, and other of the North American Colonies, on the principles of the Church of England.

Hitherto it has been confined to Newfoundland and Canada, where it now has 120 schools. There are numerous applications before the Committee for aid, but the state of the finances will not justify any additional grant being made; nor, indeed, will it be possible to maintain all the schools now in operation, without an increase in the Society's funds. The Committee, therefore, earnestly solicit contributions, and especially subscriptions, not only to prevent the closing of a single school, but to enable the Society to open some which have been built at the sole expense of the poor people, in the hope of being supplied with Teachers.

The following Testimonials to the character of the Society's schools, and the great good they have under God achieved, will show how deserving they are of support, from all who deeply feel the value of religious instruction to the young.

The BISHOP OF MONTREAL writes :—

"I consider the schools which the Society has already established as blessings conferred upon the country; and I feel that I have all the guarantee which I could desire that provision will be afforded in these schools for a sound and Scriptural Education, conducted in connexion with the Church by faithful and efficient teachers."

The BISHOP OF NEWFOUNDLAND, after a personal examination of most of the Society's Schools in the course of his episcopal visitations, speaks of them in the following terms :—

"My firm conviction" is, "that they will be, under God's blessing, the main seminaries of the Protestant faith in this desolate and benighted land; pervaded," observes the Bishop, "as the instruction they impart is, by the spirit of Scriptural truth and Evangelical principle. * * * * *

"At distant stations, which, from the paucity of Clergymen hitherto employed in this colony, could enjoy but little of the ministerial care, the Teachers of the Newfoundland School Society have held together the congregations of the Church of England, by acting gratuitously as readers of Divine service on every Sabbath, and by instructing them in their religious and moral duties, under the sanction of ecclesiastical authority."

The following letter was received on his Lordship's leaving Newfoundland for Jamaica, to which diocese he has been translated :

JAMAICA, JANUARY 20, 1844.—"In my reply to Lord Bexley I have endeavoured to express my deep and lasting sense of the great aid which I have received from an Institution so justly dear to the Church of the Colony which I have lately quitted, and my gratitude for the confidence which they have uniformly reposed in my humble exertions to increase the efficiency of their Schools.

"It will give me inexpressible satisfaction to be instrumental to the extension of the agency of the Society beyond the Colonies to which it has hitherto been confined, and I shall joyfully welcome any of their teachers in this diocese."

"I hope that the period may soon arrive when the Society may assume a more general name and character, and be so supported by the British and Colonial public, as to become the principal Colonial School Society in connexion with the Established Church."

The following extract is from a letter of a Gentleman long resident in Newfoundland, and a member of the Local Legislature, who is chiefly supporting a new mission recently opened by the Society :—

"The great usefulness of the Newfoundland School Society, in a national as well as a moral point of view, is not adequately appreciated, even by the most devoted friends of the Society. It is so ably and so satisfactorily conducted here (that is, in Newfoundland), that I deem its usefulness beyond all calculation and beyond all praise."
