A SPLENDID PAGEANT

Nearly 18,000 persons were present during the afternoon and evening. The affair was the biggest of its kind ever held in this city.

Following a short address by Mayor Walters, the procession of the living flag, in which 400 girls took part, was held, and after the march was placed in a bay on a number of national and patriotic songs.

CANADIANS ANSWERED THE CALL WHEN EMPIRE SENT MESSAGE ASKING GREATER PRODUCTION

Patriotic Production Day at Exhibition Gives Striking Picture of How Canadians Have Become Linked Together in an Effort to Produce More.

The attendance at the Exhibition yesterday was 55,500 as compared with 59,000 for the same day last year and 83,000 in 1913. The attendance for nine days is 653,000.

Patriotic production received an impetus yesterday which will go far in impressing upon the citizenry of this country the spirit of helpfulness and the unity of purpose which has characterized the Canadian National Exhibition this year. A day especially set aside for that purpose and it fulfilled the hopes of those who originated it.

We cannot doubt that the British people have the desire to give us a preference in the purchase of wheat as well as in the purchase of war munitions. It is up to the Imperial and Dominion Governments to find the way to implement this natural sentiment and laudable desire.

A Hole in the Mud-Wall. People in authority are aware of the fact that the Toronto Board of Trade is not easy in its mind about the mud-wall, which it has been proposed to build on the Esplanade.

The board of trade decided upon a mud-wall it had not had the experience of a mud-wall which is now possible at Sunnyside and the entrance to High Park.

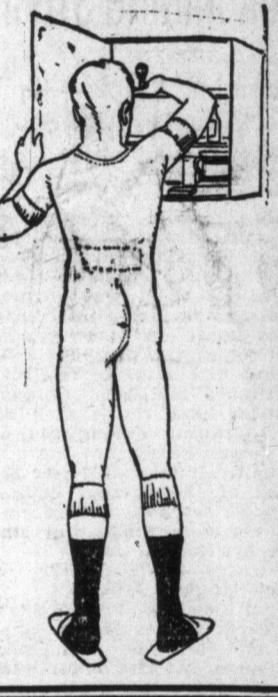

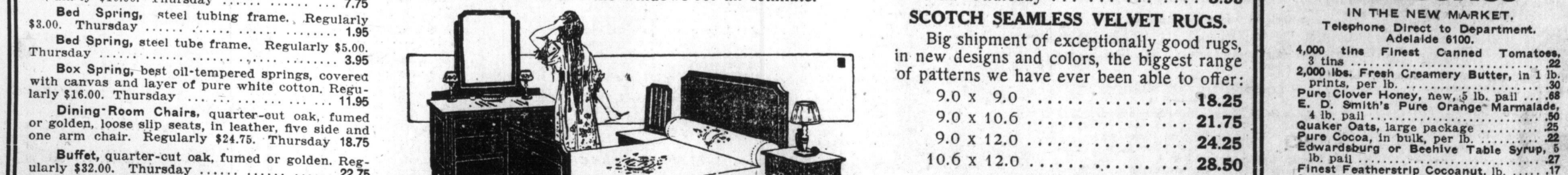
