



Conciliation Board to Settle Toronto Suburban Railway Dispute.

Electrical workers on the Toronto Suburban Rallway Company are asking for practically a 117 per cent. increase in wages as well as a reduction in hours, and have applied for a board

of conciliation.

The station operators, now working \$4 hours a week, receive 30 cents an hour. They ask 65 cents an hour and a 48-hour week. The linemen now work a 60 hour week at between 38 1-2 and 40 cents an hour, and are asking 68 cents an hour and a 48-hour week. The winders, working a 60-hour week at 45 cents an hour, ask 70 cents an hour and a 48-hour week, and the he pers want an increase of from 35 cents an hour to 54 cents and a reduction of hours from 60 to 48.

Refused Offer

The company, in the preliminary

Refused Offer

The company, in the preliminary negotiations, offered all the men a flat increase of 5 cents an hour with the exception of the Toronto linemen, whom they offered an increase of only 1 1-2 cents. This offer the men refused, and made a counter compromise offer to settle for a general increase of 10 cents an hour and a reduction of six hours for men working 60 hours a week and a reduction of 12 hours for men working 84 hours a week. This offer the company refused, and then a board of conclination was applied for. The company has not yet nominated its representative.



Not the least shame is the fact that the leading culprits are unconscious of their shame, for this betokens an absence of public morals and standards that can only be the result of national moral weakness.

In other words, butter for next winter's use is going into storage more slowly than last year and at very much higher prices. The outlook for next winter is very bad.






