Military Admit of No Argument and Impress All Comers Into Gruesome Service.

Francisco, April 20.-Portsnouth-square yesterday became for a ime a public morgue. Twenty or thirty corpses were laid upon the troden grass in the absence of more suitble accommodations

It is said when the flames threatened o' reach the square the dead, mostly unknown, were removed to Columbiasquare, where they were buried when danger threatened that quarter.


Out at the Presidio soldiers pressed into service all men who came near and forced them to aid in burying the dead. So thick were the corpses piled up that they were becoming a menace. and early in the day the order was issued to bury them at any cost- The soldiers were needed for other work, so, at the point of rifles, the citizens were compelled to take to the work were compelled to take to the work of burying. Some objected at first, but the troops stood no trifling, and every man who came in reach was forced to work at least one hour. Rich men, unused to physical exertion, labored by the side of working men, digging trenches in which to bury the dead.
