From an authoritative statement issued by the Swedish government a clear idea can be gained regarding the telephone system in that country. Sweden is a thinly peopled country with a population of less than 5.000.000. The telephones are chiefly in the hands of the government, there being upwards of 100,000 instruments in use in 1904. The growth of the state system has been very rapid, the number of stations in 1893 being only 16,000, as against the 70,000 in existence in the former year.
