

One of the Thieves Offers to Return the Stolen Bonds for a

Money Badly, Will Have to Do Without.

United States is recalled by one of the thieves entering into negotiations for the return of millions of dollars of bonds that were stolen from the Manhattan Bank in this city in 1878 The Manhattan Savings Institution was robbed on October 27, 1878, of \$2,747,700 in securities and \$11,00) in cash. A few of the securities were returned, and by special acts of Congress and the State Legislature duplicate Govbonds were issued to the bank, reducing the institution's loss to something like \$15,000. The person who is in a position to restore the bonds is in New York, and if the officers of the bank were to offer a small reward for their return he would put the police in the way of getting them, but the bonds are valueless now and the bank officials decline to enter in-to negotiations for their return. The bonds would not be worth anything to them, ex-

are is in need of money. He was once suspected of the robbery, but the police were never able to secure any evidence against him. The robbery was cleverly planned and carried out. The robbers got planned and carried out. The topbers got into the bank after the nightwatchman had gone off duty. Three of them entered the apartments of the janitor, got from him the combination of the lock on the outside doors of the vault, under threats of killing him, and then began operations. One of them went into the counting room, in overalls, and began sweeping. igged up in overalls, and began sweeping rest worked at the vault. It was not until February 18, 1879, that the first arrest was made, and John Hope got 20 years in Sing Sing. It was said that Hope knew absolutely nothing about the robbery. Peter Ellis and Abe Coakley were arrested in Philadelphia April 28, 1880, but were acquitted, and John Cannon was sentenced to 15 years in Philadelphia for trying to dispose of some of the bonds. The man who planned the robbery was in business on Broadway not far from the bank. Neither he nor the man who did the actual work of opening the inner safes was ever prosecuted. A feature of the case was that the four detectives who worked up the case against Hope died suddenly, and one of them told a friend of Hope's father just before he died that he swore falsely against the young man.
