

Report of the Birk Session

FOR THE YEAR 1883.

The number admitted to the membership during the year was 59.

There were registered: Baptisms 20, Marriages 10, and Burials 22.

The number of certificates of dismissal granted during the year was 28; and, after revising the Communion Roll, the number of members now stands at 537.

The Sabbath School continues under the Superintendence of Mr. D. Morrice. The number of scholars is increasing. The Bible Classes are so arranged that all the young people of the Church may be able to avail themselves of the opportunities afforded them of studying the Word of God. We trust that they may be inclined to do so, for only as they give heed to these things can their lives be useful and noble, holy and happy.

The work of the Congregational Missionary, Mr. R. Hyde, has been carried on regularly during the year. An account of his work will be found in the report of the Missionary and Benevolent Society.

The year has been one of severe affliction to many of Blow after blow has fallen upon us. In the beginning of the year news reached us from Glasgow, Scotland of the sudden death of James Court, our venerable senior elder. Like Enoch, it was his one aim in life to walk with God. and he is not, for God has taken him. Then further on in the year one whole household, which has had an honoured place in the Church during all its history, was removed by death. The manly form of Edward Mackay is seen no more, and with the death of his niece, Miss H. Mackay Gordon, disappeared the last of the household of Kildonan. And just as the year was closing, James Davison, who has been connected with the Church for 30 years as member, deacon and elder, was called to his rest. What shall we say to these things? "Whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom He receiveth." God help us to lay these things to heart, so that though no chastisement for the present seemeth joyous but grievous, nevertheless our hearts being rightly exercised thereby, may produce abundantly the peaceable fruits of righteousness to the praise of His glorious grace.

Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1883.

Another year having passed away, affords to the Deacons' Court a renewed opportunity of laying before the Congregation a short statement of its affairs.

SUSTENTATION FUND.

The total receipts for the year amounted to \$7,513.96, of this sum \$4,763.13 was realized from Pew Rents, and \$2,235.83 from Plate Collections; the balance, \$515.00, being raised by special effort.

The total disbursements for all purposes amounted to \$7,540.60, leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hand of \$28.20.

While recognizing the fact that there are many calls upon the liberality of the Congregation in different directions, the Court would again urge the necessity of an increase in the weekly offerings, which, in order to meet the annual expenditure, should not average less than \$60 per Sabbath. This amount has not hitherto been reached, but the hope is expressed that this plain statement will result in the necessary addition to our Sabbath offerings, and thus do away with the necessity of supplementing, by special effort, our legitimate sources of revenue.

POOR FUND.

The amount received during the year on account of this Fund was \$396.01, which, with the balance on hand, makes a total of \$513.67. The amount paid out was \$376.75, leaving a balance of \$136.92 in the Treasurer's hands.

BUILDING FUND.

The payments made during the year to this Fund were \$3,994.50.

In this connection it may be stated, that early in the year the necessity of a speedy extinction of the Church debt occupied the attention of the Court, and in May last the following resolution was adopted and subsequently endorsed at a meeting of the Congregation:—

"Resolved, That for the purpose of extinguishing the debt which at present rests upon the Church property, members and adherents be invited to sign an agreement promising to pay, on or before the 9th day of March, 1884, ten per cent. on the actual increase of substance which, by the blessing of God, the respective subscribers accumulate during the present year. Further, that those in receipt of

stated salaries be asked to contribute a percentage of their income, such contributions to be paid in on the first Sabbath of each month."

An explanatory Circular was then distributed, and forms of pledge put into the hands of the Congregation. Returns from 75 individuals have been received, and it remains to be seen what the result of this effort will be.

Within the last few days the sale of the old Church property in Cotte Street has been completed. The amount for which it was sold was \$15,500, and one-fourth of the purchase money has been received in cash.

LADIES' VISITING AND AID SOCIETY.

This Society continues to prosecute with commendable zeal the important work for which it has been organized. In addition to providing for the necessities of those more immediately connected with our own Congregation, aid was given to the Nazareth Street Mission and French Evangelization work. The Treasurer reports having received in cash \$84.50, as well as donations of clothing, &c. The amount disbursed was \$110.78.

PEW REPORT.

The letting of Pews and Sittings is still in the hands of Mr. R. N. McCallum, 1305 St. Catherine Street, where the seat book and plans of the Church are kept, and where application can be made at any time by those desirous of obtaining seat accommodation. and, besides, the remains of 200 copies provided for the use of strangers, and 100 copies with the sol-fa notation.

The book to which the above statement refers is that which has been used by the Congregation for the last fifteen years. The stock being nearly exhausted, there remaining on hand available only 19 copies at \$1.10, and 47 copies at 75 cents; and besides this, the fact that the book so long used is now out of print, having been superseded by a new edition very much superior to the old one, the Session, after careful examination, decided to adopt the new edition as the Psalm and Hymn Book to be used by the Congregation on and after the first Sabbath in February, 1884.

This decision having been communicated to the Deacons' Court, the said Court authorized the procuring of a sufficient number of copies, and accordingly 1125 copies have been provided, which are kept in the Lecture Room of the Church, and may be had at any time by applying to the Church officer.

CHURCH AND MISSION SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Sabbath Schools connected with the Church, as well as the Mission Schools of Nazareth Street and Petite Cote, are reported as in a satisfactory condition, and the missionary offerings of the young people connected therewith, are expected to be up to the average of former years.

Two Bible Classes have been recently organized, one for young women, taught by Mrs. A. B. Mackay, and the other for young men, taught by Rev. W. J. Dey. These classes meet every Sabbath afternoon at three o'clock, and all young persons not otherwise engaged should make it a point to attend.

ELECTION OF DEACONS.

In consequence of the election to the eldership of Messrs. Laidlaw and Munderloh, and the removal from the city of Mr. James McGoun, it was found necessary to increase the number of Deacons. The usual steps were taken, and Messrs. D. Wilson, D. T. Fraser, D. Cameron, and Dr. F. W. Kelley were daily elected to that office.

CHURCH PSALMODY.

As in former years, the Court would again acknowledge the services of the Choir, who, under the leadership of Mr. McLaren, are entrusted with this very important part of our worship. Meetings for practice are held every Saturday evening in the School Room.

IN CONCLUSION.

The Court cannot bring this brief statement to a close without referring to the removal by death of two of its oldest members, the late Mr. James Court and the late Mr. James Davison. Mr. Court, in the early history of the Church, filled the position of Superintendent of the Sabbath School, and Mr. James Davison was for a number of years Clerk of the Deacons' Court. Their deep interest in the welfare of the Congregation during the long period of their connection with it, is too well known to require to be more than referred to here. It behoves those of us that remain to emulate their zeal in every good work.

One other name may be mentioned here as having passed away during the year, the late Mr. Edward Mackay.

His regular attendance at both week-day and Sabbath services was an example to all; while his large hearted liberality to every good object, and more especially in connection with this Congregation, will long be remembered. To all the bereaved and afflicted amongst us we would tender hearty sympathy, while praying that the lessons of God's providence may be learned by us all.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Missionary and Benevolent Society.

Montreal, 30th January, 1884.

In submitting the Twelfth Annual Report of this Association, your Committee will refer briefly to the work of the past year.

FINANCES.—The Treasurer's statement presented herewith, shows that the contributions for the year amount in all to the sum of \$4746.71. This includes the sum of \$1524 paid by members of our Church on the special effort in connection with the Augmentation Fund for Ministers' Stipends.

Special Collections.—The usual Annual Collections appointed to be taken up by the General Assembly, have all been made, as will appear by reference to the Treasurer's account.

Mission Schools.—The wants of our Mission Schools, at Nazareth Street and Petite Cote, have been provided for as usual. A persual of the respective reports of the Schools, to be printed with our Church reports, will show that they continue to prosper, and are doubtless instruments for good in their respective localities.

CHURCH MISSIONARY.—Mr. Richard Hyde, who succeeded Mr. Morrison in November, 1882, is still engaged in

this work. The following figures, gathered from his monthly reports, will give an idea of the nature and extent of his work:—

MINNEDOSA CHURCH.—We have not heard from Mr. Wellwood for some time, so that we cannot say whether his people are yet in a position to carry out the terms of our loan. Your Committee will however keep this matter in mind, with a view to carry out the ideas conveyed in our last Annual Report.

Conclusion.—Your Committee is still of opinion that the names of many members and adherents of the Congregation are not yet on our respective lists. In view of the removal during the past year, by death, of several of our most liberal givers, it is the more needful that all should do something to provide means for carrying on the Missionary operations of our Church.

ANNUAL REPORT.

MONTREAL, 18th January, 1884.

As customary at this season we present to the Congregation the following brief report of the position and work of our school for the year just closed.

STATISTICS.

We have to note a decrease of six in the number of scholars on the roll, and of fifteen in our average attendance, while our staff of teachers remains the same as last year. The figures are as follows:—

BIBLE CLASSES.

The Bible Classes, to which reference was made at our last Annual Meeting, were carried on until the end of June last, and were resumed in the fall. Dr. Kelley, who took part in this work until the summer vacation, having intimated that he would be unable to resume his class, arrangements were subsequently made under which Mrs. A B. Mackay and the Rev. W. J. Dey took charge of this important work.

SCHEME OF LESSONS.

"The International Scheme" was, as heretofore, in use during the year.

MISSIONS.

We have much pleasure in stating that the interest of our School in Mission work has been more than sustained. The contributions amount in all to \$310.88, which is \$45 in excess of the previous year. From the details which will appear in the printed report it will be seen that the little folks have helped us very much in this work, while our Missionary Society has also done very well. We would take this opportunity to place on record our sense of the loss which the School has sustained by the removal from the city of Miss M. Ross, who for many years took an active interest in every good work connected with the School.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion we would be speak the sympathy and prayers of the Congregation that the Lord will bless us yet more and more in this good work.

TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT,

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1883.

In submitting the Annual Report of the Petite Cote Sabbath School for the past year, we would first of all acknowledge God's good hand upon us in sparing us all to begin another new year in His service. During the past year several of the families represented in our School have suffered from severe sickness as well as sad bereavements. With these families we sympathize very deeply, and have not ceased in all our devotions to commend them to the God of all consolation.

The number in attendance this year has equalled E

within a small fraction that of last year. The highest number being 33 and the lowest 12. The attendance is of necessity very much influenced by the weather, as well as by the care of the cattle and horses on the farm. The average attendance was 22¼, say 23, of whom 17 were males.

The heavy snowfalls of last year caused the roof of our shed to fall in. This has been repaired, and all our available funds, the proceeds of last year's social and the concert which followed, as well as the balances from former socials, have been used to pay the accounts, and still leaves us somewhat in debt; we thought it best not to fall back upon the Mission Fund of Crescent Street Church, which has always supplied our necessities when we made application for aid, and we depend upon whatever balance may result from the present meeting, or from such other efforts of a like nature which our young people may set on foot during the winter months, to clear off all our indebtedness and give us a new start for the year now happily commenced.

The lessons of the past year have been the International series, and have proved deeply interesting.

Our School and its friends enjoyed a very pleasant sail down the river to Isle Gros Bois, and the weather being nearly all that could be desired, boating and other amusements filled up the time very agreeably.

The "British Workman," and the "Cottager and Artizan" have been regularly distributed every month. Besides these papers the sum of \$30 was expended on new books for the Library—the amount so expended was partly made up by the interest, \$14, on the bequest made to the Library of this School by the late Mr. Jos. Mackay.

Did our finances admit of it, a little money spent upon our floor would not be thrown away. The seams seem to be widening, so that the regions below are too plainly revealed, and the frost and storms of winter are not easily kept out even with a fire in the stove. This would have been remedied last year had not the snow played havoc with our shed roof, and so deprived us of the means. We trust some scheme will be devised this year to enable us to sit without having our feet frozen next winter while the lessons are being studied. The road to and from the school being exposed to the full blast of winter, sheltered, however, to the north-west by the Ottawa Ranges, and to the south-east by the Vermont Hills, is sufficiently cold to create a desire for comfortable quarters during the hour for study.

It gives us much pleasure to inform you that in order to render the present meeting as pleasant and profitable as possible, we have, besides several well tried friends who have always aided us upon these occasions, other friends who have so much interest in our prosperity as to come such a distance to aid us in our meeting, and give us words of cheer and counsel, as well as by their sweet songs to waft us for a while from earth to heaven.

Memoranda.

- Public Worship on Sabbath commences at 11 o'clock A.M., and 7 o'clock P.M.
- Weekly Prayer Meeting in the Lecture Room every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.
- Sabbath School meets every Sabbath afternoon at 3 oclock.

 The Teachers' meeting for business is held on the second Thursday of each month.
- The Sacrament of Baptism is dispensed at the forenoon service on the first Sabbath of each month. Applicants must give notice to the Minister during previous week.
- THE ELDERS visit their districts quarterly and distribute cards for the communion. Any who may not receive their cards from the Elders, can get them at the close of the Friday Preparatory Service or from the Elders at the door on Communion Sabbath morning. When members change their residence, immediate notice should be given to the Elder of the district or to the Minister.
- THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is dispensed on the second Sabbath of March, first Sabbath of June, third Sabbath of September, and second Sabbath of December.
- THE STATED MONTHLY MEEEING OF THE SESSION is held on the first Tuesday of each month.

- THE MISSIONARY COLLECTORS visit their districts once a month to receive contributions for the Missionary and Benevolent Society. Attendance is given in one of the Committee Rooms on the first Wednesday of each month, half an hour before the meeting opens, to receive the amounts from the collectors.
- The Young Men's Association holds its meetings fortnightly during the winter season.
- The Ladies' Visiting and Aid Society meets once a week during the working season. All the Ladies of the Church are members of this Society.
- ATTENDANCE is given in the Church on the first Tuesdays of January, April, July and October, from half-past 7 till 9 o'clock P.M., for the purpose of letting pews or sittings, and receiving pew rents.
