REPORT.

THE cause of Missions is the cause of God ; and, in whatever aspect we contemplate its existence or operations, the Christian's deepest sympathy is awakened, and his most ardent attachment secured. If we review the past, alike conspicuously may we behold the smallness of its beginning, and the certainty of its progress : if we investigate its present position and rapidly increasing strength, its vitality and progress to maturity are manifest ; or, if imagination ventures to delineate the glorious issue of "the handful of corn," or "the grain of mustard seed," prophetic vision seems to withdraw the veil, and open before us an enlightened world, the triumph of truth, and the universal reign of the "Prince of Peace." In whatever department of the Missionary enterprize we are engaged, or however limited our influence, it is a pleasing reflection, that we may subserve the purposes of redeeming mercy, and bear an honourable (though humble) part, in crowning the Redeemer—Lord of all !

In presenting to this meeting our Annual Report, your Committee record with gratitude the providential care of the Ruler of the universe, which, in the time of public calamity, has mercifully screened our Missionaries from the sword of the destroying angel. The season of calamity is past ; and, with unbroken ranks, we are permitted to engage in the services of the present Anniversary. This, our joy, is however mingled with trembling ; for, while our Missionaries are enabled to occupy their several spheres of labour, we regret to state that our esteemed brother, J. Hughson, Esq., who, from the formation of our Auxiliary Missionary Association, has rendered such efficient services as Treasurer of the Society, and for a still longer period as Treasurer of the Connexion, has been the subject of protracted bodily affliction. In con-

sequence of this, notwithstanding his continued interest in our operations, he has felt it impossible for him to sustain his former relation to the Society. Your Committee feel assured, that the Connexion whose interests he has laboured to promote, appreciate Brother Hughson's past services; and that, in retiring, the sympathy and prayers of our friends generally, follow him.

In directing your attention to the active exertions and practical results of the past year, your Committee feel bound to thank God, and take courage. In every department of our work there have been unusual evidences of vigour and improvement. Aware, however, that the proper object of Missionary exertion is never accomplished until the moral "wilderness becomes a fruitful field," we rejoice to know that our labour in the Lord has not been in vain. While on our older Stations improvements have been made, calculated to promote the comfort of the Missionary, and for the better accommodation of worshipping assemblies, it affords us pleasure to state, that, by the agents of the Society, new and comparatively destitute parts of Canada have been explored, and the inhabitants of those remote places directed to an exalted Saviour.

On some of our stations the Lord has visited our little Zion, with special outpourings of his Holy Spirit; and even where no special revivals have taken place, our work in general presents an encouraging aspect. "In the name of our God we have set up our banners"; and while we see the work of our hands rendered successful, with deep humility and adoring gratitude we exclaim, "Not unto us, not unto us, but unto thy name give glory, for thy mercy and for thy truth's sake."

Considering the extent of our borders, and the number of our agents, it will be evident to a close observer of the facts of the case, that, with two or three exceptions, our stations are, according to the popular use of the term, *Missionary Stations*. Our scene of labour extends westward to the vicinity of Lakes St. Clair and Huron, and stretches itself thence, in an eastward direction, about seven hundred miles; it is bounded on the south by the United States line, in Canada East; and by the St. Lawrence and the Lakes Ontario and Erie on the south, in Canada West; and it reaches into the

And with all this extent of territory we have had but forty agents engaged during the past year, including the general Superintendent, and two hired Local Preachers, whom the wants of regular travelling Missionaries rendered it necessary to employ. In order, therefore, to accomplish a state of cultivation, which would shortly render the various stations self-supporting, double the number of agents must be employed. The employment, however, of the number of Missionaries which the extent of our field of labour demands, is an honour and an achievement for which we must earnestly strive.

Your Committee contemplate with satisfaction the numerous openings and calls for an extension of the scene of our Missionary operations; nor are we unmindful of the obligations under which we are laid to the Author of all good, who has raised up and brought into our itinerant ranks men "who count not their lives dear unto them," so that they may fulfil their ministry, and finish their allotted work. Some have been raised up among us, and others have expatriated the land of their nativity, in order to dispense the word of life to the inhabitants of this country. And while some who have long toiled in the work of the ministry are well-nigh exhausted in their holy enterprize, we rejoice to behold, in the growing intelligence and increased experience of some of our more youthful labourers, the prospect of ample strength and wisdom to manage our Missionary bark, amid future storms, and the exhaustion of the energies of our more aged brethren.

As on past occasions like the present, so now, your Committee cannot too strongly express its sense of gratitude for the deep interest the Parent Society manifests in the success of our Missionary operations, and the increased pleasure with which they so generously appropriate their funds for the support of our work, and for the promotion of the comfort of our Missionaries.

And while the Parent Society have given liberally, the improved state of their finances prove to a demonstration, that there is a kind of diffusiveness which, even in a temporal point of view, enriches the donor. From the Report of the Parent Society, for 1847, we select a few items, which, we

doubt not, will be read by our friends in this country with great satisfaction:—

ENGLAND.

The funds of the Mission have not been in so satisfactory and prosperous a state for a number of years. During a year of deep national distress, there has been raised in England the sum of £1,847 4s. 2½d.; in Ireland, £429 0s. 6½d.; and Canada has raised, by special Missionary exertion, (irrespective of what is raised for the ordinary support of the gospel on regular circuits,) the sum of £248 1s. 4d.* making a total of £2,524 6s. 0½d.; being £205 17s. 8d. above the expenditure of the year. To the above income for the year, must be added the grant of £800, from the Jubilee fund; which, with the surplus before mentioned, has enabled the Committee to extinguish the Mission debt, and leave a balance of £81 2s. 7½d. in the hand of the Treasurer. The Committee sincerely hope this gratifying announcement will operate, as it ought, upon the friends and supporters of the Mission, not by engendering indifference, but by stimulating to increased exertion; for, while the Committee are resolved to keep the Mission free from embarrassment in future, it is equally their purpose to extend the field of their operations as far as the liberality of the Connexion shall furnish resources. And, when it is remembered, that both a Home and Foreign Mission are shortly to be commenced, it is obvious that the annual income must be advanced considerably beyond that of its most prosperous years in time past. A clear income of £3,000 per annum, raised in England, would be creditable to the friends of the community, and furnish means for carrying out the intentions of the Conference with satisfaction and efficiency; and this, it is hoped, will soon be accomplished.

IRELAND.

We have again arrived at a period when it is proper to pause and view the dealings of Jehovah with us during the past year. In August last, a mysterious Providence visited this country with one of the most afflictive calamities that could befall a nation. The potato crop perished; and, in sweeping away the food of at least two-thirds of the people, we were left with "cleanness of teeth in all our cities." Famine produced pestilence; and the awful consequences of this dreadful scourge, have been painfully felt on every station occupied by our Missionaries. This event had a depressing effect on the minds of the brethren, and our Societies and Congregations have suffered in common with every other section of the Christian Church. Some of our worthy members have been deprived of the privileges of Christian communion, by these adverse circumstances: others have been driven from the land that gave them birth, to seek the means of subsistence on distant shores; and not a few have fallen victims to starvation and disease. But, in the midst of deserved wrath, God has remembered us in mercy; and we will sing of mercy and judgment: unto thee, O Lord, will we sing.

And here let it be borne in mind, that while our esteemed English brethren have made cheerful and liberal appropria-

tions, to meliorate the moral condition of the inhabitants of the sister Isle, their beneficence has not rested in this. Praise-worthy efforts, to mitigate the horrors of famine, have, from time to time, been put forth. The following brief, but touching statements, from the Report, deserve attention:—

In many cases, there is no doubt but our brethren have saved whole families from all the horrors of starvation. It has increased their toils and anxieties to a considerable extent; but the blessings of them that were ready to perish have come upon them, and what is still better, they have enjoyed, in no ordinary degree, the approving smile of Him who has said, "Blessed is he that considereth the poor: the Lord will deliver him in the time of trouble."

British generosity has thus fed the hungry, clothed the naked, and rescued many from a premature grave. Christian liberality finds in this a rich reward; but there is something more than this in store: its record is on high. "These cannot recompense you; but ye shall be recompensed at the resurrection of the just." The amount contributed in money was £517 2s. 4½d.; and in clothing, rice, &c., about £200. These contributions would have been much larger, but, in almost all our circuits, the friends had previously contributed to the National Relief Fund.

The next paragraph, selected from this Report, exhibits conspicuously the deep interest taken in the prosperity of the work in Canada; and the cheerful liberality which they exercise to promote the prosperity of our growing cause:—

CANADA.

Arrangements have been made to extend the Canadian Mission. The number of stations has been increased from twenty-five to thirty; and six additional Missionaries, (making forty-one effective labourers,) are now employed in this field of exertion, and preach the gospel in about three hundred and fifty places. In the month of June last, two young men, Messrs. D. Rolston and T. Brown, left this country, under the auspices of the society, to labour as Missionaries in Canada; and, it is hoped, have by this time safely arrived at their destined spheres of exertion. The widening extent of the Canadian Mission, and the increasing number of its agents, rendered it necessary to augment the sum allowed for its support; and the Committee have extended the grant for this year to £600. They feel satisfied, that, as the claims of forty-one Missionaries rendered this grant imperative, and the prosperous state of the funds will sustain it, the friends and supporters of the Mission will cordially approve of this addition to the expenditure.

In contemplating the Missionary operations of our beloved brethren in England, your Committee feel it indispensable to express the sincere condolences of our Auxiliary for the Parent Society, in view of the heavy loss it has sustained by the decease of the late and highly esteemed Treasurer of the

Missions, J. Thornhill, Esq., of Stockport, England. Having long and efficiently filled that responsible situation, he has, during the past year, been called home to an eternal rest. Long will his services be remembered with gratitude, and his memory cherished, on both sides the mighty Atlantic. The annexed brief notice of our departed brother's decease, claims a place in the present Report:—

It is our painful duty to announce the death of our beloved friend Jonathan Thornhill, Esq., who, for the period of twelve years, has so efficiently discharged the duties of Treasurer for the Missions. Our esteemed friend has been unwell for several weeks; yet no serious apprehensions were entertained as to the result. His exit, therefore, was very sudden. On Thursday, the 6th April, 1848, while dressing, and apparently better than usual, he was seized with a violent pain in the region of the abdomen, and in a few moments expired. His death has produced a shock which vibrates through the whole Connexion, and over a wide surface of the public community. His urbanity and kindness of heart—his simplicity, humility, and piety, commanded general esteem. His departure is deeply deplored as a loss to the Circuit, the Mission, and the Connexion generally. Under the distress felt by this painful dispensation, it is our consolation to know, that our beloved friend was favoured during his illness with the consolations of the Holy Spirit, and seemed to breathe habitually the spirit of humble prayer and praise. Our loss, therefore, is his eternal gain.

Your Committee contemplate, with unmingled satisfaction, the efforts of the Parent Society to promote the extension and efficiency of our work, and the comfort of our Missionaries in Canada; nor is that satisfaction marred by a reference to the results attending the efforts of our Auxiliary Society during the past year. In order, however, to estimate our Colonial efforts aright, it must be borne in mind, that but a small portion of the expences involved in carrying on our work is paid from the Mission fund or English grants; which renders it necessary for each station to furnish a large proportion of the salary and expences of the resident Missionary or Missionaries, exclusive of what is contributed toward the Mission fund. Added to this consideration, which affects our operations at all times, several peculiar difficulties have been encountered during the past year—difficulties of so grave a character, that many of our friends predicted a heavy decrease in our funds. Of these your Committee would refer to the comparatively small amount of time and attention which other engagements permitted the General Superintendent to devote to the Mission.

ary Meetings : the progress of the late elections, (a time of very great political excitement,) during the time our Missionary Meetings were being held ; and above all, the almost unprecedented commercial pressure which has characterized the past year. These things, it will be seen, must have operated against us ; yet such were the zeal and liberality of our friends, that, amid all these disadvantages, the sum £322 1s. 7d. was contributed to our Mission fund, being £102 0s. 10d. more than the receipts of the preceding year. May we not exclaim, " If it had not been the Lord who was on our side," under such a state of things, the result would be widely different.

In presenting the thanks of our Auxiliary Society to the Collectors and Contributors, for their zeal and liberality during the past year, your Committee feel called upon to encourage and stimulate to greater diligence and perseverance ; and they do this under the fullest conviction, that our success in the past, is but the earnest of the overwhelming tide of prosperity, which, if every department of agency be on the alert, will shortly be secured. The resolutions of our Annual Conference, respecting the organization of local Missionary Committees, &c., on every circuit, and the employment extensively of Juvenile Missionary Collectors, it is earnestly hoped will be carried into effect. Let us be zealous ; but let us not be enthusiasts. Never expect the end while the proper means for its attainment are neglected ; and, when we have employed the means, in an humble dependance upon the Great Head of the Church to establish the work of our hands, we have a solid foundation for the hope that we shall be abundantly successful. While some have despised the day of small things, others have predicted our speedy overthrow ; but we read, in passing events, the legible assurance of stability and extension. May the God of Missions hasten the day when the Missionary host shall accomplish its bloodless triumphs on every shore. With the following eloquent appeals, from the English Missionary Committee to the Parent Society, your Committee will bring their Report to a termination :—

In conclusion, the Committee would affectionately and earnestly entreat the friends and supporters of the Mission to continue ; and, if possible, to increase their laudable exertions, their Christian liberality, their fervent and believing prayers. The calls to duty are becoming

louder and more imperative. The state of society at Home demands Missionary effort, and it must be put forth. The vast numbers of thoughtless, uneducated, Sabbath-breaking population in our crowded cities, must be enlightened and evangelized, by direct Missionary and aggressive effort. The perishing heathen must be taught by us, as well as by other communities, to cast their idols to the moles and the bats, and worship their Creator and Saviour in spirit and in truth. The Mission in Canada must be yet further extended, and agents be increased in number, so as to render our efforts commensurate to the growing requirements of that vast and interesting portion of the British Empire. To these labours of love, we are called by Providence: by the spiritual necessities of our fellow creatures: by the immense obligations, springing from our own mercies: by the responsibilities arising from our privileges, our talents, and resources; and to these efforts we are pledged by our covenant relation to God, and by our own recorded and reiterated purposes. Let us then put energy into our Missionary operations, and faithfully and cheerfully fulfil the sacred duty which God has assigned to us. Let none of us live in vain; but strive, by our individual and combined exertions, liberality, and prayers, to accomplish the noble design of our existence; and leave this bad world better than we found it. The Committee feel deeply impressed with the necessity of *special* prayer, for the prosperity of their efforts, and entreat the respected Superintendents of Circuits and other Ministers to frame their arrangements so, that prayer-meetings may be simultaneously held in all our Circuits in behalf of our Missions: then the God that heareth prayer will show us His great salvation, and in blessing He will bless us, and in multiplying He will multiply us; and in us and in our seed shall millions of our fellow-men be blessed; and the happy day shall be accelerated, when the whole earth shall be filled with His glory, and all flesh shall see His salvation together. Even so, come Lord Jesus; Hallelujah, for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth!
