SERIOUS TROUBLE WILL FOLLOW THIS

Swift Vengeance Will Be Meted Out to Chinese Who Killed Missionaries

Bishop of Hng Kong Has Account of Lianchow Outrage--American Gunboat With Members of Mission Board Has Gone to Scene.

HONG KONG, Nov. 3.—Bishop Merrill of the Catholic church has received a letter confirming the news of the massacre of American missionaries at Lianchow, and giving the following particulars.

Dr. Machie, Mrs. Machie, their one-year-old daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Powell, Dr. Christian and Miss Patterson took refuge in a cave. The mob pursued and killed all except Dr. Machie and Miss Patterson, who escaped to the Yamen.

The American gunboat Calles and two Chinese gunboats with members of the American Board of missions are proceeding to the scene of the massacre.

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END OF THE MYSTERY

Boston Police Have Landed the Man Who is Most Wanted in the Winthrop Case.

BOSTON, Nov. 3.—Chief William Wata, of the bureau of criminal investigation, and Superintendent of Police Pierce, with Pawnbroker Berkman, who sold the suit cases in which the damnable letters of Susan Geary were found in Boston harbor, Timothy Howard, the cab driver who drove the motor car to New York on the midnight train, to be present today at the examination of William Howard and Louis Crawford, who were arrested in that city last night.

Police Captain Duggan said today that he had received today the letter which was held until now.

On the strength of the alleged statement by Howard, one of the New York aspects, that the head of the victim had been thrown into the harbor, in a weighted handbag, the police today began a systematic dragging of the bottom of the harbor at that part ordinarily frequented by the East Boston boats.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Supt. Pierce and Chief Wata, of the Boston police, arrived here today accompanied by Captain Crawford to the examination of William Howard and Louis Crawford, who were arrested in that city last night.

When the party arrived at police headquarters the prisoners were brought out for inspection. Chief Wata said that Crawford is the head man of the Boston case.

William S. Ferris, proprietor of the Ferris Hotel, says that he will proceed against the company which installed the equipment as generator for the turbine in the result of injuries sustained in the recent explosion.

D. McNeill, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., accompanied by J. W. Leonard, assistant general manager and Superintendent Wm. Downie, left this morning on their private cars for St. John to inspect the turbine.

One of the men working at the new turbine at St. John's station, met with an accident this morning causing injury to one of his legs. While passing a large quantity of carna sand from the pit against the lower portion of the right turbine, the sand was being blown away at work shortly after the accident.

Lawrence Owen, who was sentenced to four months in jail for being implicated in the assault upon George Murray, was released yesterday at St. John.

Joseph Hughes, who was sentenced to jail in connection with the same assault, Constable Beckwith, however, escaped him before he had gone far. One of the boys, he thought, was enough to lose.

Dan, Mier, a Frenchman, employed by the telephone company, had a very exciting time of it yesterday near the Aqueduct when he was fixing some of the telephone wires when an insane man carrying a large knife, came running to the police upon which he was being pursued.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3 (Special).—C. H. Hays and William Wainwright, of the Grand Trunk, are in the city today. They were seeing the railway commission in regard to the shortage of cars and had business with some of the other departments.

It is understood that the imperial authorities are asking the militia department to pay the cost of the royal park of Halifax from the list of July last in addition to paying the cost of the Canadian troops that were waiting to occupy the garrison as soon as it was vacated.

The department made no provision for paying the cost twice and it is not likely that it will be done. The subject is now one of correspondence between the two governments.

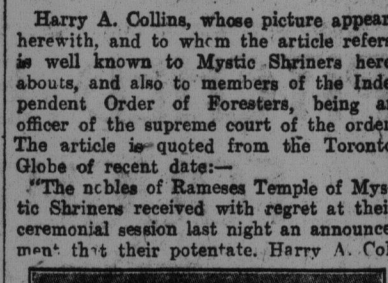

WHO ARE CRUEL?

Yesterday the grave closed over the body of the young man who in a "sparring match" on Monday night, in presence of hundreds of citizens, was killed.

Who were cruel? Since the affair has cost a human life the question may fairly be asked.

It may at once be said that the promoters were not inspired by humanitarian motives. With them it was simply a plan to make money, and they could make more money by encouraging the rivalry of local men, thereby inducing the friends of each to be present and watch the contest.

Once the contestants are secured the law permits the issue of a license for a sparring match. The mayor issues this license. He doubtless assumes that the presence of the police is ample assurance that everything will be satisfactory.

And then there is the paying and applauding public. Most of those who attend such an exhibition do not go to see a scientific exhibition of boxing.

Who are cruel? The men who promote the police who permit and the public who attend and applaud such exhibitions as that of last Monday night.

If the newspapers treated these affairs as they do some others, and published next morning a list of names of well-known citizens in attendance, they would doubt incur grave displeasure, but they might be doing the city valuable service.

TEMPERANCE WORK

One of the speakers at the meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance said yesterday that prohibitionists are now where they were fifty years ago.

The magnitude of the temperance movement, the brightness of its outlook, and the certainty of its success, were Controller F. S. Spence's leading themes in his address, and he said that being familiar, as his circumstances require, with temperance activities all over the world, he never knew a time when the prospects were so bright.

At present a more vigorous and practical effort is being made in Ontario to restrict the liquor traffic than for years past. It does not take the form of government ownership of saloons, or provincial prohibition. It goes in for local option where possible, and for reducing the number of saloons where they exist.

JOKESMITHS

The Times stated on Wednesday on the authority of Engineer Hunter, that the water from Loch Lomond would be brought into the city this year; the Telegraph yesterday stated, on the authority of the water board, that it would not.

As the Times was unfortunate enough yesterday to have the headlines of two

paragraphs transposed, the humorist of the Star should be able today to make Jerome K. Jerome appear but a common jokemith.

The following despatch from Denver shows that they are hot after the grafters in the west as well as the eastern states:—"Capiases were served yesterday on seven well-known residents of Washington and Yuma counties, in the northeastern portion of Colorado, based on indictments returned by the Federal grand jury sitting at Pueblo last week, charging forgery and perjury in the location of government lands in the counties referred to.

The death of the Russian General Dragomiroff recalls two instances of the Russo-Turkish war, which are thus related:—"At Shipka Pass, when his forces were being fiercely resisted by the enemy and fell back somewhat, he dismounted and walked slowly up and down a ridge on the firing line a hundred yards in advance of the troops. A storm of bullets whistled about him, but he was not hit. At length he called to his men: "What are you doing, you geese? Did you think there was danger here? I don't find any." The Russian troops rallied and forced the Turks to retreat.

Says the Montreal Gazette:—"The failure of the Enterprise National Bank, of Allegheny City, is bringing out things which, coupled with the disclosures of Philadelphia's civic mismanagement, indicate that Pennsylvania's public administration is about as corrupt as Pennsylvania's ever was. The only difference is that while New York's rogues have generally been Democrats, Pennsylvania's are usually Republicans.

Mr. Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, presents a cheerful picture of the possible future of the great Canadian West, when he states that "in his opinion the completion of the new transcontinental railway would see the beginning of a movement in grain and grain products to the Pacific coast which would soon increase until the shipments westward would be as great as they are eastward at present.

In an article with glaring headlines the Star last evening made a low attempt to create prejudice against a minister of the gospel. Prejudice, in religious matters, is supposed to be rather easily aroused. The Star made a number of statements said to have been secured from "members of the congregation" whose names were not given.

The Ontario government has come to an important decision with regard to the sale of liquor in newly organized clubs. The Toronto Globe says: "The Chatham and Ottawa lodges of the Elks will not be granted permission to keep and dispose of liquor on their premises, and this ruling will hereafter be applied to all parties securing incorporation as clubs."

Frank H. Flewelling, of the firm of Slipp & Flewelling, pork packers, was born in Greenwich, Kings county, April 15, 1832, a son of John and Ann (Belyea) Flewelling, and is of loyalist descent.

He completed his education at the Gagetown Grammar school at the age of sixteen, he came to St. John and began his training as a clerk in George Robert's grocery store. Establishing himself in the same line of trade at Indiantown in 1874, he conducted a successful business there for over ten years, or until 1885, when he formed a partnership with E. W. Slipp, under the firm name of Slipp & Flewelling. The business grew rapidly until in 1895—ten years later—an

up-to-date cold storage plant was installed which added greatly to their trade facilities. Their staff has also been increased until at the present time the payroll numbers fifteen. This firm carries on a large pork packing business, buying pork and selling the product all over the Maritime Provinces.

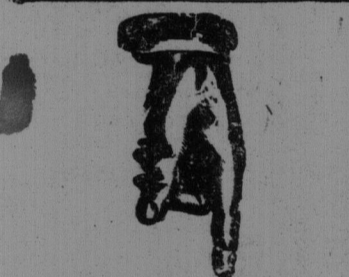

THE QUESTION OF GATE CHAMBERS

Water and Sewerage Board Deal With a Knotty Point in Loch Lomond Construction Yesterday.

The water and sewerage board met yesterday afternoon for the purpose of deciding what action should be taken in consequence of Messrs. McArthur & MacVay requiring an order to construct three gate chambers on section 1 of the water extension.

Ald. Christie to Mr. MacVay—"Do you refuse to do it? Sure you can answer that without legal advice."

Mr. MacVay proceeded to explain how much work had been done.

Ald. Bullock—"Yes, but how about completing it?"

Mr. MacVay—"I don't think you can expect me to say."

The chairman—"It's a very simple matter. Will you say you refuse to go on? You understand if you refuse the city will do the work, that is all."

Mr. MacVay did not give any definite answer.

Ald. Christie asked if Mr. MacVay would furnish a refusal in writing.

Mr. MacVay moved that plans of the work be furnished to the contractors and if they did not go on the city should step in and do the work.

Ald. Frink moved an amendment that an order should be given to the contractors to do the work on a basis of 15 per cent over cost upon their releasing the city of any liability.

The motion and amendment were then withdrawn and on Mr. Hunter agreeing to take the matter into his own hands, the board adjourned without passing a resolution.

After the meeting a conference took place between the contractors and the resident engineer and it is understood an order was issued for the work to be done on the basis of 15 per cent over cost.

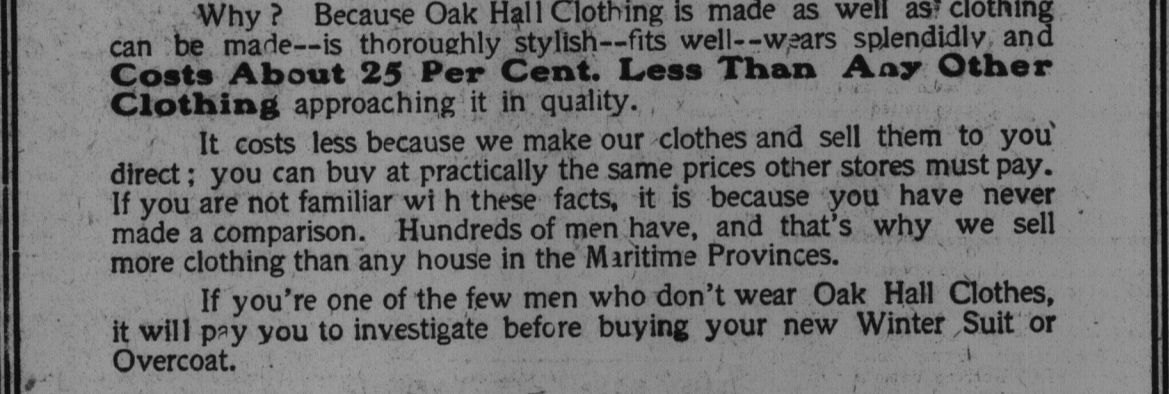
