MAMMOTH DAM FOR A PULP CO.

New York Engineers On Their Way to Newfoundland to Undertake Big Work.

OF SURPLUS RESERVE

SYDNEY, March 13—H. F. Lincoln, of New York with staff of engineers, is here on the way to Grand Falls, where they are to proceed with the construction of a mammoth dam for the Anglo-Newof a mammoth dam for the Anglo-Newfoundland Pulp company on the Exploits
river. The dam will have head of 126 feet
and will have drainage of four thousand
square miles of territory. The work of
construction will take about three years
to complete. Mr. Lincoln made surveys
of the holdings of the company in the Exploits river timber territory a few months
ago, and declared them to possess the best
pulp supply in any part of the world. U.
I'. Beaton, of London, England, is president of the company, which is capitalized
at two millions. The company will erect
large pulp and paper mills, and will give
employment to three or four thousand men
when in full operation.



IENA DISASTER COST 120 LIVES

This Number Now Dead and Many Others Who May Not

still unaccounted for eight officers and 110 men. There is little doubt that all these missing men perished

The roll call was applied only to the crew of the Iena, but as it is believed that some twelve or fifteen arsenal hands were engaged on board the battleship at the time of the explosion, it is feared that the total number of dead will reach 120. In this belief the naval hospital here was instructed tonight to prepare mortuary space for 120 bodies.

Minister of Marine Thomson made a second visit to the lena late today, after the drydock had been emptied of water, and made a careful examination of every part of the battleship that was accessible. The interior steel planking and the partitions of the battleship show signs of having been subjected to enormous pressure. In many cases they are bulged out or indented. The gap in the side of the vessel acted as a safety valve for the vast volume of gas generated by the burning powder, without which the explosion would have had even more disastrous results.




