Agree That British Reports Are Accurate

CERMAN CLAIMS FALSE

No Trace of Widespread Destruction Reported From Berlin German people, that the German

S. S. McClure, magazine publisher, was in Germany not long ago, and there read of the frightful damage done by a recent Zeppelin raid. When he return-S. S. McClure, magazine publisher, ed to England on his way home he took

ed to England on his way home he took the trouble to visit the places where the Germans claimed to have wrought their destruction. He checked the British official statements, and then announced that the British figures were correct, and the German claims absurd.

Similar testimony has been given by a correspondent of the Springfield Republican, who appears to have been sceptical of the British reports. He was provided with credentials which took him to the districts visited by the raiders, and there was permitted to interview witnesses of the raids, to count the dead and independently estimate the damage. He reports, as Mr. McClure reported, that the British figures are absolutely to be depended upon; and that the German claims are mere inventions. He asserts positively that it is impossible for the Zeppelin raiders to know anything of the damage they do; impossible for them to recognize the districts over which they are flying.

Germans Do Not Know

Germans Do Not Know A captain of one of the Zeppelins brought down in England, when asked how he could reconcile his conscience to dropping bombs on women and children, denied that this was done, and asserted that bombs were dropped only on military works and public buildings. Asked how he could tell where a bomb dropped on a dark night when he was a couple of miles up in the air he redropped on a dark night when he was a couple of miles up in the air he replied, with some mystery, that the Germans have their ways of knowing. If this is true, then it is plain that the German reports of munitions works being destroyed and thousands of people killed are deliberate inventions, and not founded on the reports of the Zeppelin officers. British aviators flying at various heights over London in order to test the efficacy of the methods employed to darken the city on the approach of a Zeppelin agree that at a much lower altitude than that usually maintained by Zeppelins it is impossible to distinguish prominent places. If those who are flying over London every day cannot tell one landmark from another, how is it possible for strangers flying much higher up to do so? er up to do so?


The correspondent of the Republican visited an important Midland city of several hundred thousand population the day after a notable air raid. This city should have been a shining mark. It has many square miles of munitions works, and the facilities for driving off works, and the facilities for driving off invaders were slight compared with those of London. The city was warned of the approach of a Zeppelin, and all lights were turned out, while the citizens in obedicage to orders stayed indoors, refraining from laughter or any other loud noise. For some time, perhaps half an hour, the invader hovered over the hushed and shrouded city, utterly at a loss where to strike. Then a distant railway train evidently gave the commander of the airship his first hint of his whereabouts, and the bombs began to drop, until the whole cargo had been disposed of. Then the ship flew swiftly away.

Poor People Chief Sufferers

As a result of this spectacular raid the correspondent found that between twenty and thirty people had been killed by the bombs and twenty houses destroyed. Despite the vast extent of the area occupied by munitions works, only one bomb dropped within it, destroying a pile of railroad ties. Nearly all the bombs fell in the thickly-populated districts, upon the homes of the very poor, and it has been noted that this is the case with the great majority of the bombs dropped in England since the beginning of the war. It is supposed that this is due to the fact that the Zeppelins necessarily follow the course ed that this is due to the fact that the Zeppelins necessarily follow the course of railways or rivers in their flight, and it seems to be the rule in most cities that the railways pass through the most congested districts. The houses destroyed, for the most part, have been small and poor, and in view of this fact





Six Days in a German U-Boat

Captain of Torpedoed Columbian, Landed at Corunna With Crew, Tells of Fxperiences

Corunna, Spain, Nov. 17—Captain Frederick Curtis, of the American steam-er Columbian, who arrived here with the rescued crew of that steamship, declared rescued crew of that steamship, declared to a representative of the Associated Press that he was a prisoner on hourd, the German submarine U-49 for six days after the destruction of his vessel. Captain Curtis said the Columbian was warned before she was torpedoed and sunk by the U-49. The crew was left in life-boats and the captain was taken on house the submarine.

Captain Arthur Patterson, of the British steamer Seatonia, says that he also was a prisoner on board the U-49 for eight days, during which time he heard the guns of the submarine in action, and also heard distinctly the explosion of the torpedo which, he learned later, blew up the Norwegian ship Balto, soon after which Captain Yelugsen, of the Norwegian ship Fordalen, joined him in the narrow prison on board the submarine, where they were joined on the following day by Captain Curtis.

"My ship, registered at New York," said Captain Curtis to the corespondent, "carried a cargo of about 9,000 tons and a crew of 109, all of whom were saved. I stopped on the command of the submarine, whose commander ordered me to abandon ship with the crew immediately, which we did without other baggage than two satchels with documents and money. Taken Aboard U-Boat.

"Submarine U-49 fired at once two torpedoes at the Columbian, which immediately sank. The crew was left in lifeboats, while I was taken on board the submarine, which plunged Immediately after I was taken into the small quartermaster's cabin, where I found the captains of the Seatonia and Balto. After me came Captain Yelugsen, of the Fordalen. The cabin was very small. It contained a little folding table, a folding chair and three bunks. Everything was permeated with the odor of benzine. There was no communication with the exterior and the cabin was absolutely dark night and day. We were fed in the morning with a few morsels of black bread, a cup of coffee and a small portion of bad butter; at noon with a stew of canned meat and soup and at supper at ten o'clock with coffee or tea and black bread, with butter or marmalade. 

"INTERVIEW" WITH SPIRIT OF FORMER

F. A. Thomas. 'Doctor of Spiritual Science" Recounts It

SERGT. HARTLEY FRENCH

Says Latter, Who Was Killed in Action, Made "Manifestation," Declared Himself Happy and D.scassed the War

The story of an interview with the shade of Sergeant Hartley French, a na-

shade of Sergeant Hartley French, a native of St. John, who went overseas with a New Brunswick battalion and was killed in action, is given prominence in a recent issue of the Boston Sunday Post.

The "manifestation" is said to have been made to F. A. Thomas, "doctor of spiritual science," in the presence of F. H. Williams, whose wife is a sister of the late Sergeant French, at their home in Boston.

The spirit of the soldier is credited with reporting that he is happy, that conditions in the spirit world are different from what he had expected and that he sees a prospect of the United States being drawn into the war, but that even those in the spirit world cannot tell when the war will end.

In his interview with the Post reporter, Mr. Thomas is reported as saying:

porter, Mr. Thomas is reported as saying:

"I called at the home of F. H. Williams, 708 Tremont street, where I now live, and Mr. Williams answered the bell. I had never seen Mr. Williams, did not know any of his family or anything about the roomers in his house. While we were talking I saw a spirit standing beside Mr. Williams.

"I described the spirit so closely that Mr. Williams told me his name was Hartley French, 38 years old, who with his family had lived in Mr. Williams' house for three years. While in Boston he was employed as an automobile chauffeur, and after he went to the war his family went to live with some of

his family went to live with some of their relatives in Roxbury.

"When the way backs out Mr French "When the war broke out Mr. French went to his old home in St. John, N.B., and enlisted in the British army. He felt it was his duty to go, as he was a British subject, and wished to prove loyal to his country. But he did not believe the war would last long and planned to return to Boston just as soon as it was ended.

"He was sent to England and then to France. He was fighting in the trenches at Verdun when he and several others were literally blown to atoms by the explosion close to them of a shell. They were attempting to make a charge at the time.

charge at the time.

"As the spirit appeared there beside
Mr. Williams who had known French
so well and liked him very much, he

so well and liked him very much, he saide

"I want to send a message to my family tell them I am happy. Some day I will manifest directly to them.

"I have found things much different in the spirit world from what I was taught to believe."

"Mr. Williams suggested that I ask him when the war would end. I did so and he replied:

"'All Europe will be in it yet, and perhaps the United States, unless a change takes place. There is no one in the earth plain who is perfect and knows it all. So here in the spirit world nobody knows it all; therefore there is no spirit here who can say when the war will end.

spirit here who can say when the war will end.

"The men in the trenches do not know what they are fighting for. They know very little about the war. It will never be known how many men are killed. The suffering in the trenches is so dreadful that the soldiers prefer death to remaining there."

"The spirit of Mr. French then ceased manifesting," said Mr. Thomas. "When he first appeared he told me he did not want to go to the war. He insisted he was happy even though he passed out under such awful conditions, his material self being literally wiped out of existence in the fraction of a second. Mr. Williams told me that if the man had been standing right there I could not have given a better description of him."

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

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


