Dunkirk Again Is Bombarded

Fourteen Shells Thrown by Long Range Guns — Russian Reverses Not Viewed With Alarm

Paris, June 22.—The French War Office this afternoon reports: "The support of Dunkirk was bombed last night by a piece of long range artillery. Fourteen shells were thrown and some persons belonging to the civilian population were killed."

RUSSIANS CALM

Petrograd, June 22.—"An appeal to the country to maintain calmness, issued by the Russian general staff, is posted in public places throughout the city giving assurance that the whole truth is told in official communications and that wild rumors which are being circulated in Petrograd are unfounded."

SAY RUSSIANS BEATEN

Berlin, June 22.—An announcement made today by the Overseas News Agency says that the Russians before Lemberg have been defeated along their whole line and are fighting only to gain time in order to save their artillery and other war material."

RUSSIANS SINK TURKISH VESSEL

Petrograd, June 22.—It is officially announced that Russian submarines have sunk a large steamer and two sailing vessels belonging to the Turks in the Black Sea, between Eregli (a seaport 180 miles east of the Bosphorus) and Kefles Island (80 miles west of Eregli)."

WARSHIPS INCLUDED IN THE ITALIAN BOOTY

Prizes of War Taken at Monfalcone Worth Several Hundred Millions of Francs

Paris, June 22.—The booty taken by the Italians in the capture of Monfalcone is worth several hundred millions of francs, according to a special despatch from Rome. Included are two superdreadnoughts and one cruiser under construction, eleven merchant steamers, twenty-four sailing ships, thirty-two boats, six aeroplanes and a large stock of torpedoes, mines and ammunition and three camouflages.

FURTHER EFFORT TO BE MADE ON BEHALF OF MARITIME GIRLS' HOME

At the last meeting of the Wallace Presbyterian, Rev. V. M. Purdy tendered his resignation of the congregation of Parrsboro to take up work for the Maritime Home for Girls, at Truro.

The Maritime Home for Girls has been established since last September, and in that time more than forty girls have been cared for.

At the present time there are twenty-two girls under charge, and that is as many as the present capacity of the building will allow.

During the summer it is the intention of the board to enlarge the premises so that a larger number may be accommodated.

One of the judges of the Nova Scotia court declared there were probably between sixty and seventy girls in the province alone that should be committed to the home.

The staff at present in charge consists of the superintendent, Miss Day, a graduate of a training institute; the matron, Mrs. Lewis and two teachers.

GERMANS OCCUPY EX-GERMAN TRENCHES

Have Brick Floors; Graves of Fallen Grenadiers Kept Neat, With Flowers

London, June 22.—Lieut. Douglas Hall, Royal Air Service, belonging to Toronto, now lying in a hospital at Alexandria, wounded in the face and arms from shrapnel, is progressing favorably. He was previously in the hospital with fever after six days and nights of continuous fighting.

News received here today says a great portion of the Canadians are now occupying trenches recently in the possession of Germans. They are eight feet deep, with a brick floor, but only about two and a half feet wide. These trenches bear eloquent testimony to the manner in which the Germans spent the time in fortifying themselves during the winter.

Close by is a graveyard marking the spot where the Prussians and the Grenadiers had a hand-to-hand fight. It is fenced off with wire and boards and bears the inscription: "In memory of those who fell here, it is the duty of those who follow to attend to the flowers and weeds."

As a result each regiment has planted a different variety of flowers, which are kept clean and watered each day.

Near here, also, Sergt. O'Leary, ex-Royal North West Mounted Policeman, won his V. C. so the Canadians just now are on historic ground.

GERMAN RAILWAY TO BAGDAD PROCEEDS

War Has Not Stopped Work on Cause of So Much "Diplomacy"

Constantinople, via London, June 22.—The war has not interrupted the work on the Bagdad Railroad, which when it is completed, is to run from Konia by way of Anama, Mosul and Bagdad to Bussra. The bridge over the Euphrates River having recently been finished, another important link in the line was made today with the final blast in the Bagdad Tunnel, running through the Amanus Mountains and connecting the Plain of Cilicia with Aleppo. This tunnel is three miles long and has been four years in building.

GERMANS OCCUPY EX-GERMAN TRENCHES

Have Brick Floors; Graves of Fallen Grenadiers Kept Neat, With Flowers

London, June 22.—Lieut. Douglas Hall, Royal Air Service, belonging to Toronto, now lying in a hospital at Alexandria, wounded in the face and arms from shrapnel, is progressing favorably. He was previously in the hospital with fever after six days and nights of continuous fighting.

News received here today says a great portion of the Canadians are now occupying trenches recently in the possession of Germans. They are eight feet deep, with a brick floor, but only about two and a half feet wide. These trenches bear eloquent testimony to the manner in which the Germans spent the time in fortifying themselves during the winter.

Close by is a graveyard marking the spot where the Prussians and the Grenadiers had a hand-to-hand fight. It is fenced off with wire and boards and bears the inscription: "In memory of those who fell here, it is the duty of those who follow to attend to the flowers and weeds."

As a result each regiment has planted a different variety of flowers, which are kept clean and watered each day.

Near here, also, Sergt. O'Leary, ex-Royal North West Mounted Policeman, won his V. C. so the Canadians just now are on historic ground.

Their armies would still be in the field in strong positions, and when they get the needed supplies of ammunition they can resume the offensive as vigorously as before, when they swept over the region from which they have lately been retiring. There is no reason to doubt that it is a lack of guns and ammunition that has handicapped their armies for some weeks past. To remove a dent in furniture is not such a difficult process as it may seem, although the degree of success is measured to a great extent by the kind of wood that is to be treated—soft wood being more easy to deal with, of course. The first thing is to damp the affected part with warm water. Then make a pad of brown paper and damp it thoroughly. When this has been done lay the damp brown paper over the dent and hold over the part a hot iron. The reason for this is that it makes the wood swell in the particular part until the dent swells out level. The harder woods may require treating several times, but excellent results will eventually be obtained.

Sir John French, in a speech to the 80th Infantry Brigade after the second battle of Ypres, said: "The 80th Brigade have had a very hard time, and I want to tell you how much I appreciate what you have done. You held on to your trenches in the most magnificent manner under a more severe artillery bombardment than has ever been known, and in doing so you have been of the greatest assistance to operations which the British army was carrying out at the time. Men who have merely to lie down and wait under a fire like that are apt to think that they are undergoing war rather than making war; but I want to tell you that by doing what you did you were really making war or what will be known in the future as a great battle—the second battle of Ypres.

NO FOREIGN LEGION BUT FOREIGNERS DRILL Ottawa, June 22.—No foreign legion is to be enlisted by the Militia Department of Canada despite the story from Montreal to this effect. The basis for the story is probably to be found in the fact that a corps of Montenegro, Serbians and possibly Roumanians and Bulgarians is to be assembled at Three Rivers, possibly given some military training and then shipped to Montenegro. An agent of the Montenegro government is now in Canada for this purpose and is receiving the co-operation of the Militia Department. INVESTIGATE For every able-bodied male in the dominion, not of military age, there is, in the opinion of The Financial Post, at the present time some kind of useful employment. Those of military age and physically fit are not entitled to consideration except for special reason. Their lots of room in the ranks. When our manufacturers dare not take orders at a profitable price because of lack of labor, and with a big harvest but two months distant, there is no possible justification for the systematic effort being made to foster emigration of mechanics. Our railroad repair shops and the harvest field, as well as the shell factories, require them in Canada, where the need of labor is as great as in Britain. A shell made in Canada is as effective as one made in Britain. To take from Canada a man to make a shell in Britain is wasteful to the extent of the cost of his transportation, inasmuch as he could be made as serviceable in Canada as in any other part of the Empire.



SEA WOLVES FOOLED; TOO EAGER FOR PREY

Bombed Steamer's Crew Return to Ship and Get Her Back to Port

Milford Haven, Wales, June 22.—With a big list to port and all her pumps working at full pressure, the steamer Turwell steamed into port after having surrendered to a German submarine, the crew of which had exploded bombs in her hold. The escape of the steamer was due to the fact that the submarine, eager to sink another steamer, did not remain long enough by the Turwell to make sure of the effectiveness of the bombs. The Turwell, which is a vessel of 4,500 tons, left Liverpool June 16 for New York. She was overhauled by the submarine thirty miles off the Pembroke-shire coast Wednesday morning and her crew ordered to take to their boats. The Germans boarded the Turwell, exploded the bombs and then hurriedly put off from her, having sighted the British coasting steamer Trafford, a vessel of 284 tons, which they pursued and sank. MORNING NEWS OF THE WAR

Since the opening of war the British casualty lists have shown 1,672 officers' names, 8,272 killed, and 6,651 wounded. The Germans are reported to be mounting seventeen inch guns on new battleships, which they are reported to be rushing to completion.

P. Fletcher, of New York, a saloon passenger aboard the Anchor Line steamer Cameronia, in London yesterday said that when the steamer was going through the Irish Sea on her way to Liverpool, she charged at a submarine, and though not sinking her, managed in this way to make her escape.

BONUSES TO OFFICERS OF MERCHANT SERVICE

The Imperial Merchant Service Guild has received information to the effect that a large and well-known steamship firm in Glasgow, in addition to paying special war bonuses to the present time to their captains, officers and engineers, has just set apart the sum of 25,000 for distribution amongst them when the appropriate time arrives. This is in special recognition of their services and the loyalty and self-sacrifice by them, apart altogether from the enhanced personal risks which they have faced without demerit.

The guild has recently urged upon all the representative ship-owners' organizations in the United States and Italy—especially in view of the great profits now earned by merchant ships—of substantially increasing the war bonuses of those chiefly responsible for the safety and efficiency of their vessels. Already there have been many responses and the guild feels that similar additional provision to that referred to has already been decided upon by several firms.

GRIM TALE OF WAR TOLD IN LETTER FROM DRIVER D. J. GUILFOIL
 Stirring Words of the Ypres Fight and the Great Work of Canadians

Mrs. J. Guilfoil, 80 Chapel street, has received two letters from her son, Driver D. J. Guilfoil. In one, dated May 24, he said he had many narrow escapes, but had not been hurt. He had seen Danery and William Walton, who were also well. "We have been in some very hot places," he says, "but we can show the Germans what the Canadians are made of and they are beginning to know it."

In a letter dated June 7, Driver Guilfoil says of the battle of Ypres:—"We lost a good many men and horses. I shall never forget it as long as I live, not only the excitement but to see men with their heads blown off, and men dying in terrible agony. It was that kind of thing that upset our nerves, and more to see our own pals killed in front of us, and to hear of some of them being crucified, or poisoned with gas and then stabbed with bayonets. Germany has fought us in a terribly treacherous way. Our boys have beaten them in more than one battle, and will have more revenge if it takes every one of us to do so. You may read of great battles being fought, but I have never seen a braver lot of men than our own boys are. At Ypres we had 50,000 against 20,000 Canadians. We beat them at times, even though we lost a big part of our men. The Germans lost 12,000 in killed alone, and after that the total was 150,000 Germans against 50,000 British, but they were beaten."
