New Provincial Company To Be Formed; Will Operate Without Cost To Province

Previous Agreement With International Paper Company Abrogated—Details of Arrangement Withheld Until Premier Speaks Next Week

HEALTH DEPT. TO INCLUDE LABOR

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 11—Another milestone in the negotiation and attempts to develop the Grand Falls power site extending over a period of some 20 years has been reached and passed with the important announcement in the Speech from the Throne today that the Grand Falls would be developed without cost to the public of New Brunswick, but with the resulting promotion of industry so necessary to the future of the prov

The province, it is learned, will not even be called on to guarantee the bond issue for the development, which will be undertaken by a company to be formed in the province. The International Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, which had held the development rights for years at the Grand Falls site, and which entered into an agreement with the Veniot Government to sell the rights for a consideration amounting to \$1,200,000, will take the leading part in the company to be formed, according to Premier Baxter

PROVINCE IS RELIEVED

Under the new arrangement to be put before the consideration of the House next week by the Premier, the Province will be relived of the financial burden of the development which was placed as high as between \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000 last year when the entire project was under consideration by the House. Fraser's, Limited, it is learned, took a prominent part in the negotiations for the new development which were only completed late yesterday afternoon.

GRAND FALLS POWER The paragraph dealing with the Grand Falls is considered one of the most important in years, announcing as it does that the development will be proceeded with and arrangements completed by which power will be made available for existing as well as prospective manufacturers of pulp and paper.

The Government, it announces, has decided to abrogate the agreement entered into with the International Pulp tered into with the International Pulp and Paper Company Ltd., by which the province was to contribute the capital required for the development. Details of the new scheme probably will not be made known until Fremier Baxter's speech in the House next week. It is above, however, that the agreement between the Power Commission, the International and Frasers' Limited, with respect to this important matter was respect to this important matter was tance telephone conversations here on Wednesday afternoon between the three parties concerned.

DEAD REMEMBERED

Other matters dealt with in the speech concerned regret over the deaths of Queen Alexandra, J. M. Flewelling, and Frank L. Potts, unveiling of the monument at Rexton, N. He took the opportunity to congratulate Speaker O'Brien on his election. Although a young man, he felt he was well qualified to uphold the dignity his office. ### Speech From the Throne

FOLLOWING is the full text of the Speech from the Throne, de-livered by Lieut.-Governor Todd at the opening of the first session of the Ninth New Brunswick Legislative Assembly this afternoon.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

IN OPENING this, the first Session of a new Legislature, I have much

pleasure in welcoming those members who have been re-elected as well as those who come to this Assembly for the first time, and trust that your labors may be devoted to the realization of the hopes which the people entertain of a forward movement on the part of this Province. Since last we met death has removed the gracious Queen Mother

Alexandra whose memory will be precious to the people whom she made With you I sincerely regret the death of Mr. John M. Flewelling and Mr. Frank L. Potts, elected to represent the constituencies of St. Stephen-Milltown and the County of Saint John. Both gentlemen had given ex-

cellent service as members in the past and their absence today is a reminder of the temporary nature of all human endeavor. During the year there was unveiled at Rexton in the County of Kent a memorial to the late Right Honorable Andrew Bonar Law, a native of that county who was the first Prime Minister of Great Britain born in the overseas Dominions. I am pleased to extend to those who defrayed the cost of this memorial the thanks of the Government and people of this

DESIRE to impress upon you the fact that agriculture is still our chief industry. Farm crops of all kinds have been abundant and for such of our products as we have had an exportable surplus the prices have been good. Much still remains to be done in this department. Raising of live stock in our hay producing sections should be encouraged as should every effort to manufacture a finished product for consumption or export rather than to sell an article in its raw state. I invite your attention to the standardies than the second of the standard of the standard of the second of the secon than to sell an article in its raw state. I invite your attention to the standardization of products and the necessity of individual effort for greater production for export. My Government will assist so far as is possible in the problem of marketing. Our geographical position gives us an advantage over central and western Canada in the matter of freight which would ensure our access to overseas markets upon a competitive basis.

A commissioner to deal with new industries, marketing, natural resources and immigration, has been appointed and it is hoped by this coordination to produce gratifying results.

OUR expenditure for highways has been heavy and we must realize that the cost of upkeep will not be light. Leading as they do to scenery which is unsurpassed on this continent, our roads should be used by a greatly increased number of tourists. To that end it is proposed to give assistance to the development of this valuable traffic. In this connection our natural advantages in fish and game must be protected and generous opportunity afforded both to tourists and to our own people to make use of them. The angling possibilities of the Saint John, Miramichi and other rivers are as yet scarcely realized.

It is evident in the matter of forest resources that the lumber industry as hitherto carried on is in a state of transition towards the more highly as hitherto carried on is in a state of transition towards the more highly manufactured forms of pulp and paper. A project is now well under way by which approximately \$5,000,000 of private capital will be invested in the manufacture of these products at Bathurst, including the provision of the necessary power and involving the employment of about 1,200 additional hands. Such enterprises should be encouraged, as it is by building up communities founded upon labor that the best results can be obtained for

My Government, feeling that in railway transportation charges the Maritime Provinces have been at a marked disadvantage since the War, joined with the Governments of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island in the presentation of a case which has been expertly prepared and will be heard before the Board of Railway Commissioners at Moncton on April 6th.

IT is the intention of my Government to efficiently enforce the laws of this Province including the law relating to the sale of intoxicants. A new Chief Inspector has been appointed who has just completed the districting of the Province and the appointment of his staff. His work will demonstrate to what extent it is possible to overcome the indifference with relation to this law which has become widespread among the people, and to combat the efforts of those who, for personal gain, have persistently set the law

My Government in conjunction with the N. B. Electric Power Com mission has made a study of the development of power at Grand Falls.

More complete surveys than heretofore existed have demonstrated that the expense of storage facilities in the State of Maine will be greater than anticipated: It has been decided that the contract entered into between the Commission and the International Paper Company, by which the Province was to contribute the capital required for the development, purchase the rights of the Company and give it practically an exclusive right to take such power as it pleased without obligating it to the use of such power, shall be abrogated. It is necessary that the Province should be protected against possible loss in such an enterprise while at the same time the development should be proceeded with. An arrangement by which the power will be made available for existing as well as prospective manufactures of pulp and paper, to the extent of the capacity of the Falls, will be submitted to you for your approval. Besides this an opportunity will be provided under public control for users of power for other purposes.

IN view of the negotiations between the Government of the Dominion and the governments of the Western Provinces for the transfer to those provinces of their natural resources, my Government will press upon the Federal Administration the fairness of a readjustment of our financial

My Government feels that the interests of Labor would be promoted by committing them to the care of a Minister, and for that purpose will enlarge the Department of Health to include Labor.

The Public Accounts for the past year will be laid before you, together with Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure. The latter must necessarily be based upon the upkeep of the services which the Province has already instituted and for the provision of adequate revenue will be a matter for

### HELPFUL HINTS BY GOLFING STARS

JOCK HUTCHISON—GOOD GOLF EXERCISES

NOW for a word about golf exercise. One of the hardest things to master in golf is the pivot. Correct pivoting is correct timing.

It is possible to do this without the aid of a golf club at all. Stand up before a mirror and place your hands on your hips. Take your stance just as you would if you were going to hit the ball. With your hands on your hips and your thumbs dug into your side, turn as far to the right as possible. This will be when your left side is facing the way you are looking.

Your left elbow will be pointing in that direction also.

When you turn see that the left knee points outward, not toward the other knee. See that the left heel leaves the ground gradually and, as you pivot back to the opposite side see that the left heel returns to the floor at the exact moment you face square again. Keep on going until you are

in the same position on the other side.
