ESTIMATES FOR BRITISH ARMY

Newspapers Say Churchill Has Made Out Pretty Good Case—Can't Go Back to 1914 Footing Yet.

(Canadian Press.) London, Feb. 25—Winston Churchill's army estimates received on the whole fair press notices yesterday. The Times says that Mr. Churchill did not succeed in carrying conviction, though he made out a fairly good case for his proposals. The world had not yet returned to normal conditions and probably it was too soon to reduce our standing forces to the old strength.

CONFESS IN MATTER OF BOND THEFTS

New York, Feb. 25—Joe and Irving (nick, brothers, and Wall Street messengers have confessed that they turned over to Nicholas Arstein, alleged head of the \$50,000,000 Wall Street robbery plot, at least \$200,000 in stolen securities, so it was announced at the district attorney's office yesterday. The boys made the confession, it was said, because they contended that Arstein had "held out" on them. The alleged transfers of the securities to Arstein are thought to have been made in Washington.

MRS. GROH SAYS NO

Heine Must Not Sign With Reds Unless He Gets More Money.

New York, Feb. 25—Ball players may storm and raise ructions on the ball field, and they may dislodge their managers at times, but in their own home they are like any other married citizens. Heine Groh, it has been reported, is a hold-out. As a matter of fact, Heine's wife is the holdout and Heine is acting as the spokesman or middle-man. Groh recently returned his contract to President George Herrmann of the champion Cincinnati Reds, demanding more money. Herrmann says that he can pay more than the amount stipulated in Heine's contract. Enter Mrs. Groh, manager of the Groh household. A despatch from Cincinnati last night had it that the directors had forbidden Herrmann to sign the contract until Mrs. Heine to sign the contract with more money. And as yet Heine has not dared to sign.

Winsted, Conn., Feb. 24—John M. Stone, fifty-five, pleaded guilty yesterday to attempting to kill his young stepdaughter, Arlene Taylor, by putting poison in her food. He was sentenced to one year in jail.

Asquith Returns To British Commons

Former Premier Has Won the By-election in Paisley Labor Man Second; Coalition Candidate Snowed Under—Another Election Today.

London, Feb. 25—Former Premier Herbert H. Asquith was elected to parliament from the Paisley constituency in the recent by-election. Announcement of the result was made this afternoon. Mr. Asquith, the Liberal nominee, polled 14,694 votes, against 11,840 for J. M. Biggar, the Labor candidate, and 3,778 for J. A. D. MacKean, coalition. Extraordinary interest has been taken in the results especially in parliamentary circles. The Times parliamentary correspondent says that never before has there been so much betting on an election. Speculation took two well defined directions. One was that Mr. Asquith would win with Labor a good second. The other was that the Unionist poll would be unexpectedly heavy and would give Labor the seat. Mr. Asquith and his daughter accompanied Mr. Asquith to Paisley to hear the returns.

ANOTHER ELECTION TODAY.

London, Feb. 25—(Canadian Press)—Mr. Asquith left for Paisley last night to hear the result of the recent election, which is expected to take place this afternoon. The counting of the votes in Scotland cannot begin nowadays until noon to allow for the arrival of the English mail with papers from absent voters. Horncastle will vote today and the counting will be on March 8. The vacancy occurred through Colonel Weagill's acceptance of the Australian state governorship. The election will certainly be a test of the agricultural voting tendencies. The constituency is a large and thinly populated, lying in the southern part of Lincolnshire with no towns worth mentioning except Horncastle, Kegworth and Spalding. The constituency's political history is of Conservatives winning with fairly small majorities on straight tickets from the premier and Unionist candidate, is a local man and is endorsed with the full coalition benediction from the premier and Hon. Law. W. Holmes, the labor nominee, is a member of the executive of the agricultural laborers' union and fights as much on trade union lines as on those of general politics. Finally there is Hall Haddon, independent Liberal, a building contractor of Stamford, who is courting with apparent success the farm laborers vote before the labor candidate appeared.

EDWARDS LIKELY TO STAND UNDER THE OLD BANNER

Frontenac Member Makes Statement—Against \$2,000 Gratuity for Soldiers.

Kingston, Ont., Feb. 25—Dr. J. W. Edwards, M. P. for Frontenac, in an address at the annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Frontenac yesterday afternoon, said he would likely seek re-election by the old party. He defended the United Frontenac Association which he would not vote for the \$2,000 gratuity asked for by the returned soldiers. He said that the gratuity was not entitled to a gratuity of \$2,000. To grant such a gratuity, he said, would hang a million on a milestone about the neck of every producer.

WILSON SENDS MR. CRANE TO CHINA

Had Been Recalled, Under Taft, for "Talking Too Much."

Washington, Feb. 25—Charles R. Crane of Chicago, a business man, millionaire and world traveler, who was appointed United States minister to China by President Taft and recalled while on his way to Peking for "talking too much," has been selected by President Wilson for the same post, succeeding Dr. Paul Reinsch.

DEATH KEEPS BROTHERS APART BUT FEW HOURS

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 25—John A. Kennedy and James F. Kennedy, brothers, who conduct a tailoring establishment here, died within a few hours of each other on Monday. John died in the morning, and when an undertaker went to the tailor shop in connection with the funeral arrangements, he found James dead there. James was buried in the morning. His death is said to have been due to natural causes.

Out in Force to Make Arrests and Recover Wine

Champion, Mich., Feb. 25—Denied permission for the arrest of officials of the Iron County, Mich., whom he charges with a conspiracy to obstruct the prohibition law, Major A. V. Detrynck, with a force of thirty-five men, passed through Champion last night en route to Iron River with the avowed intention of making the arrests without warrants and recovering eleven barrels of wine taken from federal officials last week.

Queensberry Has Failed Again

London, Feb. 25—(By Canadian Press)—The Marquess of Queensberry's affairs are again before a court. This is his fourth failure, and in his public examination he indicated it was due to shortage of funds owing to an exploit in Canadian oil and mineral properties. When was in Canada in December, 1918, his wife called him \$7,500 to buy, but declined to advance a further \$10,000. Consequently he was stranded and "killed his friend, Bob Slevier," who furnished \$7,500 to enable him to return.

ONE DEATH FROM INFLUENZA IS REPORTED HERE

One death from influenza was reported to the board of health this morning, but no new cases were reported. A total of 272 cases have been registered since the outbreak of the disease, with 109 recoveries, thirteen deaths and 153 cards to be removed from houses. It is also reported that several houses are ready to be released from quarantine, but must be reported according to form before this can be done. No new cases were admitted into the emergency hospital this morning.

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SIX MONTHS OF LIGHT SAVING

Britain's Summer Time March 28 to September 27—Matter in Parliament.

(Canadian Press.) London, Feb. 25—Continuation of the war emergency laws, which had already been discussed at a sitting of the House of Commons last night and the debate was further adjourned. Members were informed that an agreement had been made to exchange prisoners with Russia, that it was hoped that the appointment of an ambassador to Russia would soon be announced, and that summer time would last from March 28 to Sept. 27. Winston Churchill said that the provisions in regard to German army reductions were broadly speaking being satisfactorily adhered to. The secretary of state for Ireland brought in again last session's education bill for Ireland. The House of Lords discussed last night the labor party on a motion calling attention to labor's extreme tendencies and the government's attitude. No division was taken.

CAILLAUX IN HIS DEFENCE

Paris, Feb. 25—Continuing his defense on the charge of having had reasonable dealings with the enemy, former Premier Caillaux said he had met Pierre Loriot, executed in October, 1918, and twice, M. Duval, director of the newspaper Bonnet Rouge, executed in July, 1918, only once. His relations with Miguel Almerindy, editor of the Bonnet Rouge, who was sentenced to five years imprisonment in connection with the Bolo case, and died mysteriously in prison according to Caillaux, were slight. He said he was suspicious of Almerindy.

WIND DESTROYS 30 HOUSES AND CHURCH IN SPAIN

Madrid, Feb. 25—Thirty houses and a church have been destroyed by a tornado which swept over the town of Benicarlo, on the eastern coast of Spain, eighty miles northeast of Valencia.

WILSON'S REPLY HAS REACHED LONDON

London, Feb. 25.—President Wilson's reply to the allied note on the Adriatic situation reached London this morning.

GROCERY PRICES IN THREE CITIES OF THE DOMINION

ST. JOHN SKATER WHO HAS WON FAME ON BLADES

Harry Thorne in the City for a Few Days and May Be Seen in Action.

Harry Thorne left St. John five years ago and since that time has made a great name for himself as a speed skater. While living in Boston in 1916 he won the New England championships, and the following year went to New York and represented that city in the metropolitan championships. He later went to Toronto, where he is now located in the barber business. While there he has

represented the city in all championship events and has won against the best skaters in America. The following are the distances and time he made in his championship races: 220 yards, 18 1/4 seconds; 440 yards, 39 seconds; 880 yards, 1 minute 20 1/2 seconds; three-quarter mile, 2 minutes 10 seconds; 1 mile, 2 minutes 46 seconds; five miles, 15 minutes 20 seconds. He won more than 100 prizes in skating races, besides winning a swimming contest. He expects to leave in a few days for Winnipeg to compete in the Canadian championships there on March 2, but an endeavor is being made to have him remain here to skate in the city championships. Although he has not been on a round rink in five years, he has consented to meet any local man prior to his departure. He has many friends in this city who have been following his record with keen interest.

THINK IT UNFAIR TO MAKE DOCTORS PARK THEIR CARS.

(Montreal Star.) Secretary T. C. Kirby of the Montreal Automobile Association waited upon Chairman E. R. Deary at the city hall respecting the new city traffic and parking by-laws. It seems most unfair to doctors that their cars must park, and a strong request was made, to read that all doctors' cars be allowed to remain outside their own premises ready for the doctor to respond to a call for duty. Also that doctors' cars be allowed to remain on the street, while the doctor is visiting the patient. It was pointed out that it would be most unfortunate for both the patient and the doctor, in the case of an urgent call, if the doctor was not allowed to leave his car hurriedly at the door of the patient, but was obliged to put up with the delay while the car was driven outside the prohibited parking space. The question of having the city adopt some prominent emblem or specially painted cross for doctors' cars, to enable the traffic officers to give them the right of way was also brought forward by T. C. Kirby. Both these matters were favorably received, and full consideration and study was promised immediately.

T. SHAW HALL ON OLD DAYS OF SPORT

Sending Skaters to Lake Placid Recalls McCormick, Paris Crew and Other St. John Athletes.

Sir—A copy of your issue of the 17th Inst. was forwarded to me from St. John and I read in it a letter of W. H. Golding in reference to sending Mr. Gorman to Lake Placid to compete in the races. I was glad to see that St. John was to obtain its place in the first rank of athletes. The old Paris crew carried the boat racing colors to victory in Europe. I shall never forget Hugh McCormick's first race in the old Victoria rink. I can see him now, as he rolled his country socks over his pants, screwed his long reach skates into the heel of his shoes, and tightened his straps around his feet, pulled off his coat and stepped into line at the starting point. At the word he was off two strokes ahead and one over. And how quickly he did distance all the others. I saw him break the world's record and do the mile in 2:58. He cleaned out Paulsen and Dowd. Then there was Frank White, the prettiest and fleetest 100 yard runner I have ever seen. Oh! how that boy could

travel. He, O'Riley, Vincent and myself went to Truro to race for the championships of the province. Our main competitors were from Halifax and those Halifaxians certainly did love us. They did not. White got the 10 yards, Vincent got the 20 and 440, and I got the one mile, and I think the two mile, first on the high wheel. If I remember we brought back six first and four second prizes. I am glad to see the spirit still remains in the rising generation. That's right. Keep it up. I am a St. John boy and while I have lived here for more than twenty-five years I am still a St. John boy and a Canadian. The Americans today have a wonderful respect for the Canadians. Their record through the war was so wonderful. I have yet to hear an American who has been up to Canada on a visit speak in any but the most praiseworthy terms of the Canadians. Let me tell you if that young man goes to Lake Placid he will receive the most courteous treatment, for he is a Canadian. When I first came to New York they used to say, where is St. John, in Nova Scotia or Quebec? and they used to laugh at Canada and say when we need her we will go over and take her. They imagined her a country where there was six months winter and six months fall, where the inhabitants were Eskimo once removed, whose inhabitants were mainly French Canucks and Indians and looked on us as a different race of human beings. Not so today. The war has

changed it all and today they look on a Canadian as a man away above the average. Let the good work go on and let people know that the spirit of the Paris crew still lives as strong as ever. T. SHAW HALL. New York, Feb. 19. WARS ON GIRL SMOKERS. Mount Vernon, Feb. 25—High school girls here are perturbed over a request by the Rev. Dr. O. F. Bartholomew, pastor of the First Methodist church, that the school board determine whether cigarette smoking is practiced in the school. When a charge to that effect, made recently by Dr. Bartholomew from his pulpit, was challenged, he retorted that two girls "virtually had confessed," but said that as their revelations were in the nature of "spiritual confessions," he could not disclose their names. In a letter to the school board, the pastor admits "the difficulties involved in trying to fasten upon the guilty a secret practice," and suggests examination of the matron and others. "Smoke presupposes fire," he added. "I earnestly hope the publicity given this cigarette business will act as a deterrent and corrective."

POOR OLD ST. JOHN HAD TO DROP OUT

(Fredericton Mail.) The greatest change in hockey, however, is in the towns which have teams in the league. The league in 1903 had three St. John teams—Mohawks, Beavers and Neptunes, as well as St. Stephen Thistles, Marysville, Crescents and Fredericton. The latter team was selected from four local league teams. St. Stephen won the league and the Spencer trophy. The Trojans of this city—a local league club—were beaten after the league season by a close margin at St. Stephen. As years went by the composition of the league changed. St. Stephen dropped out through lack of a rink. The St. John representation was reduced to one club and finally disappeared when the Queen's rink was turned into a rollaway the year around. St. John reappeared in the league, however, at a later date. The league extended easterly taking in Sackville, Moncton and Sussex. Marysville and Fredericton always were great rivals on the ice but Sackville had the call as the premier team. Later Moncton took the lead. Some twelve years ago Fredericton imported a team—taking a leaf out of Moncton's book—and the Capitals won not only the New Brunswick title but also the maritime title. The year before a number of the players who composed the team as members of New Glasgow team, unsuccessfully challenged for the Stanley Cup. This was professionalism very thinly disguised in Fredericton and Moncton and the league went out of business for a couple of seasons. When revived Chatham came in as the first North Shore club. Later Campbellton entered the fold and Bathurst this year is the latest. The clubs in the eastern part of the province formed their own organization and poor old St. John finally dropped out of sight.

HALIFAX CRESCENTS IN THE FIELD AGAIN

(Halifax Echo.) Looking back through the long line of sportsmen that have made Halifax the sport centre of the maritime provinces there appear the names of many prominent athletes before the era of dollar hunting came to upset things. Not that professionalism is at all to be cried down, but results show that the most exciting contests and the most hotly contested ones have always been between amateur performers. Two clubs have been prominent in developing men for athletic events, the Wanderers and Crescents. Of late years the war has curtailed the activities of one and removed the other from the roll almost entirely. The Wanderers still exist and will blossom forth with the coming season while the Crescents are beginning an entirely new existence which will start with a meeting to be held this evening. A few weeks ago several of the old Crescents met and discussed the prospects of a reorganization, and the notice of their meeting met with so many inquiries as to when the club was going to resume activities that those who were concerned in the matter decided to start an entirely new Crescent. A new club is to be absolutely an amateur organization and is to embrace all amateur sports. In addition plans are underway to make the new club a factor in sport by obtaining proper club facilities. In addition to the great number of younger men who have shown an interest in the organization, the C. A. A. C. will have an advisory board of those whose names are inseparably connected with athletic achievement in this province. Every effort is to be made to make the club bigger and better than ever by securing a large membership. At present writing the number of applications show that the move will be a success but there is still room for at least many more members before the limit is reached. The Blue and Black will place in local baseball leagues three teams, a senior, intermediate and Junior and from some of the names of those who will turn out to try for a place on the teams they will have a formidable lineup in each division as they stand at present. Hockey has always been a Crescent stronghold and on one occasion the club performed the unexcelled or unparalleled feat of carrying off premier honors in every division. The champions will flock back to the old winged moon brigade together with many others who have developed since and will make the place of those who have been put out of the game by time.

ORPHANAGES IN BRITAIN FILLED

Prospects Bright for Early Renewal of Emigration to Canada.

London, Feb. 5.—(By Mail)—A correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, discussing the report of the Canadian government's chief inspector of British immigrant children, says at no time, perhaps, in the history of philanthropic emigration and similar institutions almost to the breaking point, and have placed in their charge an unprecedented number of young lives for whose future welfare anxious thought must be taken. In normal years the strain would have been relieved by regular drafting to Canada. Before the war the principal British organizations annually emigrated an average of 2,500 children to their receiving and distributing centres in the dominion. In 1914-15 the number had dwindled to 1,799, in 1916-17 to 821, and in 1918-19 to 231. The chief inspector reports for the last twelve months shows that in the past two years, by reason of submarine perils and shortage of shipping, not a single child emigrant was sent to Canada. It is obvious that the situation cannot be relieved until this emigration is restored, and it is gratifying to find in this report a confident anticipation that the matter will be resumed this year. There is no question about openings in Canada for these young emigrants. Although it is widely known that juvenile emigration to Canada was entirely suspended from 1916 onwards, the number of applications for children received by the various agencies in 1918-19 amounted to 11,719, and competent observers think that this figure falls far short of the actual demand for boys and girls.

MONCTON WOMAN IS STRICKEN WHEN ALONE; PARTIAL PARALYSIS

(Moncton Transcript.) Miss Jane Irving, of 322 Robison street, was found in her home on Saturday evening by Sergeant Collings of the local force and Thomas Doige, suffering from a partial stroke of paralysis as diagnosed by Dr. Botford, who was called later. 'PHONE MATTER OFF FOR MONTH

Briefs re Rodney Wharf Street Car Service—Public Utilities Session.

The Public Utilities Commission for New Brunswick is in session here today. This morning routine business was disposed of. This afternoon the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Co. for permission to increase its rates will be taken up and postponed for a month. Another matter which will be dealt with will be in connection with the city's request to have the N. B. Power Company's lines extended down Rodney wharf. A brief in this case has already been filed by the city solicitor, Hon. J. B. Baxter, K. C., and it is expected that Fred R. Taylor, C. C., city solicitor for the company, will file his brief this afternoon.

The commission will go to St. Stephen this evening and tomorrow will sit in joint meeting with the Maine Utilities Commission on the matter of the application of the Calais Street Railway Company for permission to increase the street car fares in the border towns. This application was submitted to the respective commissions last fall.

NOT GUILTY IN THE CHEESE CASE

The case of the King vs. Frederick C. Jones, charged with stealing a cheese from the C. P. B., came up for trial before Judge Armstrong in the county court this morning. The following jury was sworn: Guy H. Humphrey, Bennett T. Hamilton, J. A. Smyth, Kierstead, Arthur J. Conway, H. Montgomery Jones, Wm. Charlton, George B. Cromwell, Leonard Higgins, L. T. Gard, Thomas Reynolds, F. T. Welsh and J. B. Jones. William McAler, Thomas Grey (car checker), and W. J. Perry of Montreal (car checker), testified for the crown, and the accused was then called and testified that he found the cheese near his house in St. John street, and after keeping it for some time, gave it to McAler to dispose of for him on the understanding that they would go fifty-fifty on the proceeds. The jury after being out for fifteen minutes brought in a verdict of "not guilty." His honor remarked to the jury that he had expected a verdict of guilty with a recommendation to leniency, in which case he was prepared to allow the prisoner to go on suspended sentence, but on the verdict of not guilty he discharged the accused. J. A. Barry for the prisoner and C. H. Ferguson for the crown.

The case of the King vs. Clarence A. Whipple will come up for trial this afternoon. E. S. Ritchie appears for the prisoner.

KNIFE USED IN FIGHT ON BOARD STEAMER AT SEA

Trouble in Forecastle of the Bilbster and One of the Seamen is Stabbed—Story Told in Court.

As a result of a disturbance created at a game of cribbage on board the S. S. Bilbster during her recent voyage from Havre, France, to this port, Derek Hozeman, a Dutchman, is in the General Hospital suffering from two nasty stab wounds in the chest, and Johannes Flamen is lodged in jail charged with stabbing and wounding Hozeman, while on the high seas on Sunday, February 15.

The accused was given in charge by Captain William H. Venning, master of the vessel, on her arrival here yesterday, and the preliminary examination was commenced before Magistrate Ritchie this morning. The captain told of the affair being reported to him and said he rendered first aid. He said the man was stabbed twice in the breast and was bleeding profusely and it was evident that the wound was not slight. On arrival of his ship at this port he had the man transferred to the hospital.

John Parker, seaman on the vessel, said he entered the fore-cabin and Hozeman and another man were playing cribbage. They were making considerable noise while counting the cards, which seemed to annoy the accused and he told them to stop, as he was in his berth trying to sleep. To this Hozeman replied "If you can't sleep through that you cannot be very tired," and Flamen answered, "You keep your mouth shut." The wounded man then said, "Come out and fight."

A fight started and after clinching three times the two men went down on the floor, Hozeman apparently having the best of the struggle. Flamen said to him, "Get up and fight fair," but the man answered, "We can't fight fair on a rolling ship." While Hozeman was adjusting his clothes, the witness said, the accused went to the food locker and took a knife and made a rush for his opponent, who fled to the other end of the fore-cabin. The accused stabbed him twice in the breast, the witness said, after which the victim ran out of the fore-cabin saying, "You have stabbed me."
