Two Points of View

"THE minute I get to New York I always feel shabby, no matter how well dressed I felt before," said a woman from a less metropolitan city, who sometimes goes to New York to see her mother. "I feel as if everybody was staring at my clothes."

"Why, I never felt like that," answered another woman. "There are so many wonderful things to look at in New York that it never occurred to me that anyone would look at me."

Each of us, for himself, the centre of the universe. That is a law of psychology. Even the most unselfish person cannot think of the world in any other way than that. Although he may wear himself out in the service of others, he must still think of this unselfish service as built around himself.

Don't worry about receiving too much attention from others. Unless you are signally disfigured, you are in no such danger. Half the time when you think people are staring at you, they are only looking at you as they look at the trees, or the houses they pass, with entirely indifferent eyes.

"Why I saw them of course," explained the pretty one indignantly. "Then you were staring at them just as much," triumphantly pointed out the blunt young person. "And there wasn't anything wrong or remarkable about them, was there? People have to look at something. They can't walk along with their eyes closed. That's all it means. I would be sorry if I were you."

Princess Camporeale, Duke of Adraga, who was at the time attached to the Italian legation at Washington. His only sister, Her Serene Highness Dona Maria, was the wife of Prince Buseca of Naples. Dona Laura, the daughter of the historic Anglo-Italian house of Acton, Prince Camporeale, by reason of his former residence in Washington, is regarded in Rome as an expert on American affairs.

An intimate friend of Dowager Queen Margherita, she, as the widow of a man who was a member of the Order of the Annunziata, ranked herself as a "titular cousin of the sovereign." As a cousin of the house of Acton, it is of course goes without saying that Dona Laura spoke English as her mother tongue.

The Acton, who was an old Shropshire family, and received a baronetcy from Charles I., have always had foreign attachments. Joseph Acton was a general and prime minister in the service of the King of Naples. One of his sons was admiral in the Neapolitan or Italian navy.

Another Acton became a cardinal, and prime minister of the Kingdom of Naples. Sir Ferdinand Acton married the only daughter and heiress of the last Duke of Dalberg and, dying five years later, his widow married the late Lord Rossmore, who entrusted the education of his young son, John Ferdinand Acton, to the second baron in the diplomatic service, and has been attached, as secretary, to the British legations in Berlin, Vienna, Madrid and the Hague.

His pupil, young Sir John Acton, became imbued with his ideas and disdained himself in 1869 and 1870, by his hostility to the doctrine of papal infallibility. This Sir John, who in 1869 was elevated to the peerage as Baron Acton, married the German Countess Marie Arco-Valley. He was lord in waiting to Queen Victoria and a great favorite of Empress Frederick of Germany.

Londoners witnessed a strange sight on Thursday last. A tribe of Zingaris, or continental Gypsies, assembled at the Charing Cross station, dressed in the bright colored and curiously cut garments that their kind in the southeast of Europe affect, and laden with burnished copper pots and pans and busts of various shapes and sizes, boarded the train for Dover, there to shake the dust of England from their sandals and embark for kinder skies. The customs of Great Britain were decidedly unpropitious to these nomads. They could not understand why the health authorities should insist upon their indulging in an occasional wash and clean-up, and obeying even the rudimentary rules of hygiene.

The regulations against unrestricted dirt became irksome to them, so they donned their best finery, packed up their belongings and made off for a clime where they can do as they please and not be interfered with, animated, possibly, by that spirit of their race which in early times gave rise to their name of "Touch-nots."

It will be remembered that in 1907, Germany, at the instance of the Kaiser, made a determined effort to get rid of them, the Prussian prime minister giving special instructions to suppress the "Gypsy nuisance." It seems a pity that the Kaiser did not have the knowledge gained from recent events in England. If he had insisted upon the Gypsies washing themselves regularly, and had appointed a Prussian bureaucrat to see that they carried out the law to the letter, all the Zingari would quickly have left the country, bag and baggage, of their own accord.

In Rumania they enjoyed exceptionally good treatment, although a large proportion of them were tied down to the land, prevented from wandering, and reduced to the condition of serfs. It is from this class that the Gypsy bands and Zingari orchestras that attract so much attention in America, are derived.

Their treatment by the Kaiser's government as "undesirable aliens," and the British regulations regarding soap-and-water, may seem harsh in these days, but they are kindness itself compared to the treatment these wanderers received in the middle ages. In America they were put to death wherever found, in Scotland their mere presence in the kingdom was a capital crime, while under an old English statute, which was repealed only about 100 years ago, it was a felony, "without benefit of clergy," merely to associate with

Daily Hints For the Cook

BAKED PORK TENDERLOIN. Split the tenderloin through lengthwise; make a stuffing of bread seasoned with salt, pepper and some kind of sweet herb, stuff the tenderloin and tie a string around it to keep the filling in, add a cupful of water and bake from forty to fifty minutes; baste frequently.

PINEAPPLE PIE. Peel and take out the core and little ends of one pineapple. Grate it or chop it into very fine pieces. Mix together and beat one cupful butter until creamed. Add the beaten yolks of five eggs, then the pineapple and one cupful of sweet cream and lastly add the beaten whites of the eggs, whipped in the pie mixture very lightly. Bake with undercrust only.


ROYAL BOUILLON. To make three pints of rich bouillon, take two and a half pounds of lean beef that has been finely chopped and cover with two and a half quarts of cold water, allowing it to stand for one hour; then cover and place on a moderate fire, only just simmering for three hours and remove any scum that may arise; now add one small onion, one carrot, a sprig of parsley, one bay leaf, two cloves, four peppercorns and two stalks of celery, all cut in dice, and simmer until the vegetables are tender. Strain into an earthenware bowl and let it cool without covering.

Edmonton, Alta., May 20—Three candidates were officially nominated today for the provincial by-election—Hon. C. V. Cross, attorney-general; A. F. Ewing, Conservative; and Jas. R. Knight, Socialist.

THE WORK OF THE ST. JOHN RIVER COMMISSION (Bangor Commercial) The International St. John River Commission was in session Friday and Saturday at Van Buren, and while there was no evidence taken at the meeting of the commission was an important one, the members being given an opportunity to witness the sorting of logs on the river at the St. John Lumber Co. mill. It was the delay in the sorting of the logs of the spring drives that led to the bloodless "Van Buren War" of several years ago, and was the climax of a series of river difficulties that led to the appointment of the present commission by the governments of the United States and the Dominion of Canada to investigate the conditions and uses of the river. The commission started out to investigate the river in connection with its navigation for log driving purposes, but its authority was extended to a broader field and it was instructed to look into the question of conserving the waters of the river and the tributaries.



FLEMMING NOW DOES THE THING HE CRITICIZED

Large Sum Paid to Lawyers Hired By His Government--Read This Statement of Facts

Fredericton, May 20--Some of the government supporters and newspapers are fond of referring to the fact that years ago legal gentlemen belonging to the Liberal party did some work for the local government of that day and received payment for the same. At the time they were in opposition and were equally anxious not to declaim against the usefulness of the solicitor general.

Their memories have as usual proved to be very short. A reference to the Public Accounts of 1910 and 1911 will show that the Hazen-Fleming government were very generous indeed, to the lawyers who supported them. In the amounts paid for the administration of justice in 1910 there are two separate sums, one of \$601.03 and the other of \$127.75 paid out on similar provision outside altogether of the work done by the attorney general, and it should be added, by the attorney general, for no sooner was the Hazen government in power than the premier forgot all about his famous platform and filled the office of solicitor general just the same as his predecessors had done.

Under the heading of "Criminal Prosecutions," in 1910 it will be noted that Fowler & Jones, of Kings; W. F. Kerston and T. J. Carter, of Victoria County; J. B. M. Baxter, of St. John; H. H. James, of Kent; T. W. Butler, of Northumberland; R. W. Harquail, of Restigouche; R. B. Hanson, of York; J. C. Hartley, of Carleton; A. J. Leane, of Westmorland; W. Mott, of Restigouche; all had a share in the plums that were handed out. Mr. Baxter, of St. John, under another heading is paid the comfortable sum of \$1,000 for "Services re Judicature Act"; and E. C. Wrayman, of Kings county, received \$1,000 and \$225 additional for expenses, while the Hon. Mr. Hazen, the attorney general, had \$205 in addition to his \$2,100 as attorney general and \$800 in round numbers as a member.

Many Tory Lawyers Hired. In 1911 the total sum paid to several legal gentlemen who are known as good Conservatives and supporters of the government. These included J. C. Hanington, of Gloucester; C. Lionel Hanington, in Westmorland county; A. A. Wilson, of St. John; and E. C. Wrayman, of Restigouche; John B. M. Baxter, of St. John; C. J. Coster and H. A. Powell, of the same city; J. Carter, of Victoria; and now a government candidate in that county: H. H. James, of Kent; J. C. Hartley, of Carleton; A. A. Davidson, of Northumberland; Fowler & Jones, Kings; George Gilbert, of Restigouche; R. B. Hanson, of York; and E. C. Wrayman, of Kings.

The legal expenses this year for fish, forest and game was \$311.15, all of which was outside the attorney general's department. Hon. Mr. Hazen, under another heading in 1911, had \$412 for travelling expenses, \$400 for a special stenographer, \$200 for a stenographer in London, etc., while under the heading of "Succession duties," he was paid the sum of \$277.80.

The solicitor general in the same year received, in addition to his salary of \$12,000, \$815 for travelling expenses and \$171.69 for contingencies. All of the above goes to show that the members of the Hazen-Fleming government did not live up to the promise that they made in opposition. They were always harping upon the expenditures of the then attorney general, Mr. Pugsley, and one of their favorite campaign speeches consisted of additions of the amounts that he had received for a good many years previously in order that the people might be convinced that the government, of which Pugsley was a member, was lavish in its distribution of favors. No sooner, however, had Mr. Hazen gotten to power than he placed his friend, H. A. Powell in a position to charge the province over \$200,000 for his services as attorney general, the useless Central Railway investigation, and various other persons, including a judge of the superior court, received over \$30,000 more in connection with the same inquiry.

EXCHEQUER COURT AWARDS Judgment in Several Cases Which Were Heard in Chatham Chatham, N. B., May 20--Today the exchequer court was occupied until about 5 o'clock with the crown end of the A. & R. Loggie case. Six witnesses were examined during the day, these were A. P. Williams, W. Scott, H. C. Reid, valuers; W. E. Loggie, H. P. Bonjanni, Flood and John C. Fowle, town treasurer. When these had been heard the judge intimated that he did not need the counsel to review the case pro and con, as he had a very good idea of the evidence fresh in his mind and he would give his decision in the course of a short time. Dr. Wallace, for the defence, and R. A. Lawlor, for the crown, thereupon let the case stand.

The total amount of lumber to come from the Upper St. John this year to the booms here amounts to about \$2,000,000, of which about \$1,000,000 feet is now said to be in the booms; there is also between 20,000,000 and 30,000,000 feet for the St. John Lumber Company and other mills in Maine above the Grand Falls. Mr. Chouinard is the largest operator having about 13,000,000 feet of new lumber and 10,000,000 of old logs, a total of 23,000,000 feet, of which 15,000,000 are coming to the booms here. The total amount of old and new logs coming to the St. John River Log Driving Company's booms for the mills here and at St. John, is made up as follows: F. Chouinard, 15,000,000 sup. feet; J. Kilburn, 15,000,000 sup. feet; J. A. Morrison, 13,000,000 sup. feet; W. J. Noble, 8,000,000 sup. feet.

Britain's Notable Delegation To Canada and Their Itinerary

LARGEST EVER ORGANIZED

Will Sail From England on May 31, and Will Make Early Call at St. John—Some Words From the Financial Post

(Financial News, London) We are gratified to be able to announce that we have completed arrangements for the visit to Canada, at the end of the present month, of eighty to 100 of the leading manufacturers and of representatives of financial interests in Great Britain, with the view of ascertaining the opportunities that exist in the Dominion for the establishment of branch factories, and the opening for capital in industrial undertakings, and the possibilities of extending the market for British-made goods.

The urgent necessity of some such step to consolidate Anglo-Canadian sentiment and self-interest, has been only too forcibly evidenced by the recent exposure of the designs of American politicians on the commerce and industry of the Dominion, and the continuous growth of industries in Canada, controlled by American brains and capital has been a constant source of anxiety to those who are solicitous of the permanent unity of the British Empire.

On May 31 the C. P. R. liner "Empress of Ireland" will leave Liverpool with this large and distinguished party of British men of affairs. These envoys or envoies, rather say ambassadors, of British industry, bent on a mission fraught with the most important of consequences, include leading men in almost every branch of British manufactures. Among plating and machine-making, electrical engineering, the motor car industry, printing, food, milling, biscuit making and general confectionery, all kinds of food preparations, with many another typical British industry, are represented by this delegation.



LITTLE GIRL IS BADLY BURNED

Clothing Catches Fire in Long Wharf House — Was Playing With Matches

Leaving her four little children playing together in a bedroom of their home on Long Wharf this morning, Mrs. Walsh, wife of Bernard Walsh, was startled just a few moments later on reaching the street to hear screams coming from the direction of the house. Running back she was horrified to see her six-year-old daughter, Gretel, almost throwing herself down the stairs in her haste to reach assistance, her body and clothing in flames. The child had been playing with matches unknown to the mother and one or more of the dangerous toys had fallen and set fire to some bed clothing and the flames quickly enveloped the little girl, seriously burning her body, face, and arms and scorching her hair. Her little brother ran out before her, giving the alarm, and a call was sent in from box 145 and the department responded. When it was seen how badly the child was injured the ambulance was summoned and she was taken to the hospital. Previous to the arrival of the ambulance the mother and others had endeavored to ease her sufferings and Mrs. Walsh herself was badly burned about the hands in trying to extinguish the flames and tear the clothing from the little one's body. Stephen Daley, who was nearby, took his coat and wrapped it about the child, thus aiding materially in putting out the fire. Mrs. Walsh feels very keenly about the accident. She is at a loss to know how it could have occurred so quickly, as she had been from the house but a few minutes.

SHIPWRECKED MEN ARE IN CITY TODAY

Captain Lewis and Crew of the Clayola Saved Nothing

Captain Lewis and the crew of the schooner Clayola, which wrecked ashore on Cross Island, near Machiasport, Me., on Friday night last, reached the city last night. The Clayola is owned by J. Willard Smith, and was on her way from this port to Boston with a cargo of lumber. On Friday night the schooner sprang a leak and became unmanageable. For several hours she drifted about and finally ran ashore on the island. The captain and the crew had considerable difficulty in getting ashore, and so quickly did the little schooner break up that they had to leave her and get away without any of their belongings. Later they were taken to Machiasport by the life saving crew of Cross Island. Captain Lewis and the men, considering themselves very lucky in getting ashore with their lives. The schooner is a total wreck. Captain Lewis will remain in the city for a few days before proceeding to his home in Nova Scotia.

SWIMMING THE KENNEBECASIS

One of Trio Remains in Cold Water For More Than Hour, in Attempt at Rotheasy

A Rotheasy correspondent sends the following interesting story: On Saturday evening an attempt was made to swim the Kennebecasis at Rotheasy. The yacht Helena, of Providence, R. I. (Doctor Part), anchored off Rotheasy Park, being the starting point, and Long Island the objective. Doctor Part, of Providence, R. I., and Doctor Ellison, his assistant, accompanied the swimmers, Abner Brotherton, the skipper, acted as time keeper. Three men took the water at six o'clock. J. P. Burns of Dalhousie, H. Freeman of Yarmouth and F. P. Denison of St. John. Twenty-two minutes from starting Burns was lifted out of the water, Burns and Denison still stuck to the water and possessed. Burns is a strong swimmer with a powerful overhand stroke. In forty-three minutes Burns reached the island and commenced the return trip. Denison was only four minutes behind him, using the breast and "trudgeon" strokes. After being in the water fifty-four minutes Burns was lifted out and after a conversation it was decided to abandon the return trip. Denison was lifted out after sixty-three minutes. Both men, when seen an hour or two later, seemed little worse for their immersion in the cold water. Burns is a Nova Scotian of Irish descent. Denison is a native of Ireland and is a daily bather in the waters of the Kennebecasis. Both men are training for a big swim in July.
