Daily Hints For the Cook

BAKED PORK TENDERLOIN Split the tenderloin through lengthwise; make a stuffing of bread seasoned with salt, pepper and some kind of sweet herb, stuff the tenderloin and tie a string around it to keep the filling in, add a cupful of water and bake from forty to fifty minutes; baste frequently.

PINEAPPLE PIE.

Peel and take out the core and little ends of one pineapple. Grate it or chip it into very fine pieces. Mix together and beat one cupful butter until creamed. Add the beaten yolks of five eggs, then the pineapple and one cupful of sweets cream and astly add the beaten whites of the eggs, whipped in the pie mixture very lightly. Bake with undercrust only.

ROYAL BOUILLON.

To make three pints of rich bouillon, take two and a half pounds of lean beef that has been finely chopped and cover with two and a half quarts of cold water, allowing it to stand for one hour; then cover and place on a moderate fire, only just simmering for three hours and remove any scum that may arise; now add one small onion, one carrot, a sprig of parsley, one bay leaf, two cloves, four peppercorns and two stalks of celery, all cut into dice, and simmer until the vegetables are tender. Strain into an earthenware bowl and let it cool without covering



WRANGLE IN COURTS OVER HANGMAN'S ROPE

Vienna, May 21—A curious dispute about a hangman's rope, which will have to be settled by the law courts, has arisen besteled by the law courts, has a law courts, has a law courts are the law courts. settled by the law courts, has arisen between the Hungarian hangman, Bali, and the public prosecutor at Temesvar, in Hungary. A murderer had just been hanged, and the hangman untied the rope and began to cut it into small pieces in order to sell these at an impromptu auction to the crowd waiting outside the prison.

The public prosecutor, however, who has to be present to witness an execution, ordered Bali to hand over the rope to him, because scandalous scenes amounting to a riot had occurred after a recent execution at Miskoloz, when the crowd fought among themselves for the grisly mementoes. The hangman refused to give up the rope on the ground that it was not only his perquisite but actually his own property, as he has to supply ropes at his own expense. The public prosecutor thereupon ordered a policeman to take it from him by force, which was done. Bali gave notice that he would bring an action for its recovery.

FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS ASKED FOR

Montreal's First Case Involving Rights Below Ground Surface

Montreal, May 21—For the first time in local court history, subterranean rights are involved in a suit over the exaction of a St. Catherine street sky-scraper. In constructing the building, Contractor Labelle sank several piers twelve feet below the surface of the land, these piers varying from four feet square to ten feet by fourteen feet.

They were sunk in such a way that the centres, whereon rested the steel work supports, were flush with the dividing line between the defendant's and plaintiff's porperties.

Thus one-half of each pier rested on the neighboring property. The defendant contends that, in order to secure the necessary foundation for the steel work supports, he had to sink the piers so that the supports would rest in the centre. But the neighboring owner does not think so and sets the damages at \$40,000 in the case which opened this morning.





FLEMMING NOW DOES THE THING HE CRITICIZED

arge Sum Paid to Lawyers Hired By His Government---Read This Statement of Facts

Fredericton, May 20-Some of the govment supporters and newspapers ar

Fredericton, May 20—Some of the government supporters and newspapers are fond of referring to the fact that years ago legal gentlemen belonging to the Liberal party did some work for the local government of that day and received payment for the same. At that time they were in opposition and were equally anxious then to declaim against the usefulness of the solicitor general.

They could not see why the criminal business of the province should not all be handled by the attorney general himself, whom the wanted, in addition, to look after the collecting of the succession duties without receiving any additional remuneration. In fact, they thought that all legal work with the government should be done by the attorney general in consideration of the ampunt he received in connection with that portfolio.

Their memories have as usual proved to be very short. A reference to the Public Accounts of 1910 and 1911 will show that the Hazen-Flemming government were very generous indeed, to the lawyers who supported them. In the amounts paid for the administration of justice in 1910 there are two separate sums, one of \$601.65 and the other of \$120.75 paid out in criminal prosecution outside altogether of the work done by the attorney general, and, it should be added, by the solicitor general; for no sooner was the Hazen government in power than the premier forgot all about his famous platform and filled the office of solicitor general just the same as his predecessors had done.

Under the heading of "Criminal Prosecutions," in 1910 it will be noted that Fowler & Jonah, of Kings; W. F. Kertson and T. J. Carter, of Victoria county; J. B. M. Baxter, of St. John; H. H. James, of Kent; T. W. Butler, of Northumberland; J. S. Harquail, of Restigouche; R. B. Hanson, of York; J. C. Hartley, of Carleton; A. J. Legere, of Westmorland; W. A. Mott, of Restigouche; all 'had a share in the plums that were handed out.

Mr. Baxter, of St. John, under another heading is paid the comfortable sum of \$1,000 for "Services re Judicature Act;" and E. C. Weyman, of Kings county, for preparing the index, gets \$192.

Then there is a grist of legal expenses in connection with the fish, forest and game protection in which many smaller favorites figure. The solicitor general himself, in addition to the attorney general, received \$1,200 and \$525 additional for expenses, while the Hon. Mr. Hazen, the attorney general, had \$575 in addition to his \$2,100 as attorney general and \$600 in round numbers as a member.

His lordship said that taking into account that some of the judge's best land in the centre of his farm had been taken he would give judgment for \$532 and allow costs of \$130. Sheriff O'Brien, \$130. The judge declared that in the O'Brien case he could not take the value that the defendant put upon his land, as it was but a medium grade of farm land taken and be felt that the case should not have been brought before the court. He gave judgment for \$133 and would allow no costs.
