

NOTICE.

In the Calendar pages the Sun's rising and setting are in apparent time at Halifax; the Sun's Declination is given for apparent noon at Greenwich time. The Moon's rising, setting and southing, and time of High Water are in Halifax mean time. The equation of time is given for apparent noon at Greenwich, for every day. Also the Phases of the Moon, at the head of each month, are in Halifax mean time.

Agricultural, Domestic Economy, &c.

**THE POTATO DISEASE.**—Although so much has been said on this subject, still, from the fact that every successive year the disease removes its destructive ravages—there appears as yet to have been no absolute discovered that can be universally relied on; and until a thorough remedy or preventative can be effected, the farmers must resort such means as their own judgment, or the result of experiments may suggest. In the course of our reading we have met with the following directions, “derived from practical experience,” which are well deserving of attention:—1. Let all early potatoes that are ripe be immediately taken up. 2. Examine the stalks of all others every day. 3. Whenever you find any stalk diseased put your feet one on each side of it and pull it up, leaving the potatoes in the ground—do not cut the stalk off, but pull it up by its roots. 4. Then tread down and harden the ground over the potatoes, and trench it up. 5. Burn the diseased stalks; do not on any account leave them on the ground. 6. All the potatoes should remain in the ground and be dug up only as wanted, for when the disease has once made its appearance exposure to the sun is found to increase it.

We subjoin another method, suggested by the correspondent of a Philadelphia paper. He writes—The cause of the malady, is now pretty well ascertained to originate in atmospheric influences. Wherever the tops of the potatoe have been cut off, the crop has been saved. A plan is, when the vine attains a height of six or eight inches, to cut off about half an inch, so as to make it sprout or branch out, and repeat the operation upon the new branches. The vine is thus made to maintain a vigorous growth, which effectually resists the disease.

**HOW TO ENLARGE VEGETABLES.**—A vast increase of food may be gained by managing judiciously, and systematically carrying out for the principle of increase. Take for instance, a pea. Plant it in very rich ground, allow it to bear the first year, say half a dozen only, remove all others and save the largest single pea of these. Sow the next year, and retain of the produce three pods only, sow the largest one the following year, and retain one pod, again select the best, and the next year the sort will by this have trebled its size and

So we purchased a fine piece of steak, and after cutting it into pieces of the weight of two or three pounds, instead of applying each piece was completely enveloped in corn meal, and packed a box with a sufficient quantity of meal between the pieces to prevent them coming immediately in contact with each other. In this condition it was permitted to remain till it was prepared for the table. On the sixth day after it was slaughtered, the last of it was served up, and pronounced by those who partook of it to be in every respect more delicious than it was the day we procured it. It is rather singular, too, that the old chemists called antimony their lead; maintaining that, in some of its properties, it bore a near affinity to lead.—*Builder.*

## Chronological Summary.

(Continued from December, 1844.)

1845—Jan. 1.—Hugh Hartshorne, Esq. appointed by his Excellency Marshall of the Court of Vice Admiralty, in the place of Stephen W. Deblois, Esq., deceased. The Wesleyans of the city gave a feast, in the Old Methodist Chapel, to the children of their Sabbath Schools. 24th.—Died at Halifax, Mr George Charker—better known as Dad Charker—who for many years held the situation of Town Crier. He was one of the most remarkable characters of the day, possessing an originality of wit with great kindness of heart. He was also a man of very retentive memory. The Press at the period of his death passed the highest encomiums upon his memory. 30.—The Provincial Legislature opened by the Lieut. Governor, Lord Falkland, who delivered an address to both branches of the Assembly.

Feb. 6th.—A great public Meeting was held at Mason Hall, at which resolutions were passed, condemning the manner in which the grand and special juries for town and country were drawn, and adopting effective measures to have the grievance redressed. 12.—A highly exciting debate was commenced in the House of Assembly, which was continued for thirteen days, upon the official correspondence between the Lieut. Governor and the Right Hon. the Secretary for the Colonies, respecting the differences which existed between political parties in the country at that period. Resolutions moved by the Liberals in the House, who were in the minority, condemning the statements made in the Despatches sent to England, were lost by a majority of four. 18th.—A Bill was presented to the Assembly for the incorporation of a Company for building a bridge across the harbour of Halifax. 25th.—The 46th Regt. of Foot, from Barbadoes, under the command of Major McLean, landed at the Queen's wharf. A simultaneous temperance meeting was held at Mason Hall, and passed off with great *eclat*.

March 17th.—Died, the Rev. James Knowlan, an exemplary clergyman of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. 27th.—Great temperance bazaar held in the city, by which £160 was realized.

April 8th—Resolution moved and negatived in the Assembly, censuring Sir Rupert D George, then Provincial Secretary, touching his communication with the Colonial Secretary, respecting the Register Bill passed the previous session—the result of which communication was the withholding of the royal assent. 14th.—The Provincial Parliament prorogued after a session of unusual length and extraordinary interest. A silver speaking trumpet presented to Wm. Caldwell, Esq. by the Union Engine Company as a token of respect and esteem.

May 10th.—The removal of C. W. Wallace, Esq., Provincial Treasurer, from office, occurred this month, and commissioners were ap-

May 26th.—Public meeting held at the Exchange Coffee House, to devise means to aid the sufferers by a great conflagration which occurred in Canada. 29th.—A complimentary address was presented to the Rev. John Loughnan, upon his resigning the pastoral charge of St. Mary's Chapel, Halifax. June 6.—The first information given in the morning papers of an awful fire at Quebec on the 28th May, by which 2000 houses were destroyed and 12,000 persons rendered houseless. A fire occurred in St. John street—two or three houses were burnt. July 7.—The 46th Regt. embarked on board of the troop-ship Apollo, for Quebec. 10th.—Great bazaar held at McNab's Island for the benefit of the Dartmouth Mechanics' Institute. 22.—Public meeting held at the Exchange for the purpose of organizing the Halifax Water Company, by electing officers, preparing bye laws, &c. The sum of £833 19 10½ was collected through the several wards of the city, during this month, in aid of the sufferers by fire in Quebec. Aug. 5th.—A great thunder storm discharging hail-stones of an extraordinary size, burst over the city. The like was not witnessed for many years before. 21st.—A sacrilege was committed at St. Mary's Church by some villains—the vestry being entered and pillaged of its valuables.

Sept. 1st.—Great robbery of over 200 chests of tea in Messrs. Charlton & Co.'s warehouses. 11th.—A public dinner given to the Rev. B. O'Brien, of St. Mary's Cathedral, at the Halifax Hotel. Several Indians, with an Indian tomahawk, were dug up by the labourers employed in excavating the foundations of a house in Lockman street. Oct. 2.—A public meeting held at Mason Hall in favor of the contemplated railroad from Halifax to Quebec; which was attended by all leading capitalists of the city. 7.—A regatta took place in the harbour, and passed off with great spirit. The opening of a mine in Dartmouth, said to be iron, was commenced this month; but after considerable labour and expense in working the mine, the project was abandoned.

Nov. 8.—A meeting was held at Mason Hall relative to the projected Railroad from Halifax to Quebec, which was largely attended. Resolutions favourable to the object were passed and a provisional committee appointed to carry out the important undertaking. 15th.—Samuel Fairbanks, Esq., appointed by Lord Falkland, the Lieut. Governor, the office of Treasurer of the Province of Nova Scotia. A night school was commenced in the city, and continued for a few weeks.

Dec. 11th.—A public meeting held at Mason Hall to take into consideration the subject of a Railway from Halifax to Windsor. Resolutions were passed in favor of the undertaking, and a committee appointed to carry out the views of the meeting. A great seizure of contraband goods to the amount of £200 was made by the Custom Officers, near the foot of Cornwallis street.
