

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—This organization shall be called the New Brunswick Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II.—The object of this Convention shall be to promote Home Missions in this province, to assist the N. B. Seminary and the Baptist Annuity Association, and generally to foster all interests that immediately pertain to the welfare of the Baptist denomination in New Brunswick.

*ARTICLE III.—The members of this Convention shall consist of delegates of Baptist Churches contributing to the support of the objects for which it cares. Each Baptist Church may send three delegates, including its pastor, and an additional delegate for every hundred members above one hundred.

ARTICLE IV.—This Convention shall meet annually, the second Saturday in September, at 10 o'clock, A. M., and at such other times as it shall direct. Special meetings may be called by the President upon written request of a majority of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V.—The officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Statistical Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor. There shall be a Board of Directors, composed of twenty-one persons, seven of whom shall be elected annually. The duties of the Board shall be the supervision and conduct of the work of the Convention between the times of meeting. The officers of the convention shall be ex officio members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI.—The Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present at an annual meeting, notice of change having been given one year previous.

BY-LAWS.

I. The Board of Directors shall meet monthly at such place and time as they may decide upon, notice of which shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

II. Notice shall be given by the President in the Messenger and Visitor, for at least two weeks, of any special meeting of the Convention or Corporation called by the requisition of the Board of Directors.

III. The Board of Directors shall have full power to transact all business between the Annual Sessions of the Convention, such transactions to be regarded as done by the Convention or Corporation itself. BA

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MINUTES

OF THE

NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST CONVENTION.

GIBSON, N. B., Sept. 11th, 1897.

THE FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING of the New Brunswick Baptist Convention convened with the Gibson church, opening on Saturday, September 11th, at 10 A. M.

Convention opened, with the President in the chair, by singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." After prayer, offered by Rev. Thos. Trotter, D.D., a brief devotional service followed, at the conclusion of which the delegates present were enrolled.

The following brethren were appointed a Committee of Arrangements: Revs. F. D. Davidson, George Howard, N. A. McNeil, J. H. Hughes.

The Convention then proceeded to election of officers, as follows:

President - W. E. McIntyre.

Vice-Presidents—J. H. Hughes, G. M. W. Carey, D.D., Havelock Coy.

Secretary-S. D. Ervine.

Assistant Secretary-W. E. Nobles.

Statistical Secretary-J. A. Cahill.

Treasurer - Jacob S. Titus.

Auditor - N. B. Cottle.

Brief addresses were given by the President and ex-President touching the Convention and its mission.

Pursuant to notice given last year, Article V. of Constitution was so changed as to provide for the election of an Assistant Secretary.

After partial report from the Committee of Arrangements, the session closed with prayer by Bro. F. B. Seelye, Lic.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

Opened at 2.30 P. M. with prayer by Rev. P. O. Rees.

The following brethren were then chosen to serve on the Board of Directors for term ending 1900: S. H. Cornwall, T. H. Hall, R. M. Bynon, George Howard, F. D. Davidson, J. T. Clark, T. L. Hay.

On motion all visiting brethren were invited to seats; also the following F. C. Baptist brethren: Revs. J. T. Parsons, W. Kierstead and Jos. McLeod, D.D.

Nominating Committee appointed: Revs C. W. Townsend, I. W. Carpenter, A. Freeman and J. C. Bleakney, and Bro. C. N. Barton, Lic.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. R. M. Bynon, seconded by Rev. S. H. Cornwall, and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Our retiring Secretary has, with faithful and untiring zeal, served the denomination in all the duties of his office, giving entire satisfaction; therefore

Resolved, That the most hearty thanks of the Convention be hereby tendered him.

The President then presented the Report on Obituaries—Revs. I. R. Skinner, B. N. Hughes and D. Bleakney had passed away during the Convention year.

The report on Northwest Missions was read by Pastor M. Addison, of Salisbury, and adopted.

Report on Northwest Missions.

The Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ is adapted to the needs of the world. In view of this, and of the fact that Christ has so commanded, it should be given to the whole world.

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Your Committee is pleased to note that faithful and successful efforts are being made by many to give the Gospel to India and other foreign lands. The demands in this direction are still heavy, and call for the heartfelt sympathy and support of all who love the Lord in sincerity. But while we are still anxious to see all the heathen brought to Christ, let us not lose sight of the needs of our own beloved country, and more especially at this time of the needs of our great Northwest. Many thousands are entering here every year; they are coming from almost every country of Europe. Present indications point that the race and creed problem will here require a new solution, and your Committee is of opinion that that solution is to be found alone in the Gospel of the Son of God. Let us teach the inhabitants of the Northwest that God is our Father and that we are brethren; that we are to fear God and honor the King; that men should be free to worship God according to the dictates of conscience, and then the thousands of Europeans and Americans here may dwell in peace side by side, honoring and cherishing the institutions of our country.

Again, the Gospel should be given to the Northwest because of Christ's command and because of the thousands of precious souls that need it. Nothing else can ever take its place, and the principles that we regard as vital to the Baptists of these Maritime provinces are also equally essential to our brethren and fellow-countrymen of the great West. Baptists have without doubt a great work to do here, and they should begin at once about it. Already our brethren are doing a noble work in

Manitoba, but there is a greater work still.

At present we have fifty-three organized Churches in Manitoba and the Northwest, with a reported membership of 3,130. Many hundreds of others are also scattered in these parts, working commonly among the pedobaptist bodies. In British Columbia we have eleven churches, with a little over 1,000 members. In the Northwest, during the year that has just passed, 236 have been added by baptism. The total amount raised for local and benevolent purposes is \$32,936.48.

God is blessing the work amongst the native Indians. There is one Indian Church, with a membership of 150. Of these 112 were baptized by Rev. Henry Prince, the Indian preacher, during the last year. There are at present four laborers among the Indians, but if means could be furnished several others could be placed in new fields. The Indians are anxious to know the way

of life, and their utter need appeals for our assistance.

In regard to the Scandinavian work, it may be said that the one Church of two years ago, with but fifteen members, has

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grown to two churches, with seventy members, with the prospect that a third Church will soon be organized. There are several places in which Scandinavians are very numerous. Here is an especial opportunity for work, as several Baptists are to be found among them anxious that the Gospel should be preached to the thousands of their countrymen who are constantly coming over. Pastor L. M. Stolberg, and those associated with him, have been doing good work at Winnipeg, Scandinavia and Rat Portage among these immigrants, but they greatly need increased help.

Among the Germans the work also is steadily moving forward. They have at present three Churches in a fairly prosperous condition. At one colony—n w so large that it covers a tract sixty miles long by forty wide—Bro. F. A. Mueller is the only missionary we have among them. Those who are on the ground, and know the people and their needs, tell us that there is a grand opportunity for Christian service here in bringing the German settlers to a knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus Christ.

We are sorry to state that Bro. H. G. Mellick, the indefatigable Superintendent of Northwest Missions, has resigned this position to take a pastoral charge. Bro. Mellick has done excellent work, and will long be remembered as one of the pioneers who have labored in building up the Kingdom of Christ in Northwestern Canada.

Providentially, however, a brother has been found to take up the same service, Rev. A. J. Vining, whom we would commend to the prayers and sympathy of this Convention. May he be enabled to do great things for God in that land.

It is with deep regret we record the sudden death of Pastor Alexander Grant of Winnipeg, who was most active with his brethren in the work of the Lord in the West. His early and untimely death has caused serious loss to the cause of Christ. At a time when most men are but entering life's greater mission he was taken away. He was but forty-two years of age.

In conclusion, your Committee would recommend that our brethren inform themselves of the West and its needs, that by prayer and the means at their disposal they seek to supply those needs, as God would have us, for the furtherance of his glory.

Rev. M. Addison, Vice-President, being called to the chair, the report on Home Missions was read by Bro. McIntyre. On motion it was received for discussion and laid on the table.

The report of Committee of Arrangements for Sabbath Services was presented and, with slight changes, adopted.

Session adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. W. Manning.

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SATURDAY EVENING.

Session opened with prayer by Bro. N. A. McNeil.

The meeting was of a missionary character. Appropriate and enthusiastic addresses were given on Home Missions by Revs. J. W. S. Young and C. W. Townsend, and on Foreign Missions by Rev. J. W. Manning. The addresses were interspersed with music by the choir. After the announcements for Sunday were made the meeting adjourned by singing the Doxology.

SUNDAY MORNING.

Devotional services were held at 6.30 and 9. A. M.

At 11 o'clock the Convention assembled for worship. The preliminary exercises were participated in by Bros. McIntyre, Springer and Addison. The Convention sermon was preached by Rev. Thomas Trotter, D.D.; text, Hebrews vi, 19-20. It was an earnest and able presentation of Gospel truth.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON.

At 2.30 p. m. a meeting of the W. M. A. Societies was presided over by Mrs. M. S. Cox, Provincial Secretary. Miss A. C. Gray, returned Telugu missionary, gave an account of the Telugus and of the need of an increase in the present staff of missionary workers. She closed by singing a Telugu hymn.

The Secretary next called upon Mrs. G. H. Belyea, of Qu'Appelle, N. W. Territory, who described at some length her experiences of the last ten years in the pioneer fields of the Northwest. Her account of the native Indian religious foasts and ceremonies was listened to with deep attention. It was evident from her narrative that true idolatry in savage form existed on Canadian soil. Here, also, are to be found religious braves rivalling the fakirs and fire-worshippers of India. The address and visit of our sister to the Convention will long be remembered.

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Pastor N. P. Gross, of Grand Falls, spoke of his work at St. Leonard's, Grand Falls and New Denmark. Upwards of five hundred Danish people were to be found in the Hellerup colony, and his visits among them had been most promising. He and Mrs. Gross concluded the address by singing a Danish hymn.

Pastor H. H. Hall, of Portage la Prairie, Manitoba, by the aid of his maps, presented a highly illustrative description of the country and people of Western Canada. He also emphasized at some length our duty to take this land, with its cosmopolitan people, for the Lord Jesus Christ. Here is room for 70,000,000 of settlers. Among them Baptists now have churches of five different nationalities. He highly commended the work of Henry Prince, the native Indian preacher, who has charge of the Baptist Mission to these people. The meeting closed at 5.20 P. M.

SUNDAY EVENING.

At 7 P. M. a thoughtful and practical sermon was delivered by Pastor Fred. T. Snell, of Havelock, from II. Chron., xiv, 11.

At the close of the sermon an inspiring social and evangelistic service was conducted by the President, in which a goodly number participated. The attendance was large, pressing the utmost capacity of both audience room and vestry; and, although the adjoining pulpits of Gibson, Marysville and Fredericton were supplied by pastors at the Convention, thus somewhat dividing the attendance, yet over one hundred and fifty persons were unable to hear Pastor Snell.

The interest in the services of the day was general, while a deep, spiritual tone pervaded throughout the exercises, graced, we trust, with the presence of the Master of Assemblies. The pulpits of Maugerville, Macnaquac, Nashwaak and Keswick also shared in supplies from the Convention, and the impress of our denominational life and activity was both strong and far-reaching

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MONDAY MORNING.

Session opened with prayer by Rev. P. O. Rees. The President read communications from Inspector G. W. Mersereau, Rev. G. O. Gates, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, and His Honor Lieutenant Governor McClelan, expressing kindly wishes to the Convention.

Reference having been made to the propriety of this Convention expressing its sympathy with the brethren of Manitoba in the loss sustained by the death of Pastor Grant, the following resolution was, on motion of Pastor C. W. Townsend, of Cambridge, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The sad intelligence has reached us of the death of Pastor Alexander Grant of Winnipeg, in the very prime of his manhood and usefulness, whereby not only his family but the cause of God in the Northwest has been sorely bereaved; therefore

Resolved, That this Convention place on record its deep sorrow at this inscrutable calamity, and convey to Mrs. Grant and to our brethren in the Northwest assurance of our fervent sympathy with them in their great loss, praying that the God of all consolation and wisdom may comfort their hearts and lead them out of their present perplexities into a large peace.

The report of the Publication Committee was presented by Rev. J. H. Hughes, showing that 1,600 copies of the *Annual* for 1896 had been printed at a total cost of \$110, \$30 of which had been met by advertisements. The *Annuals* had been well distributed and much appreciated.

Report adopted.

The President having made reference to the kindness of the Editor of the Messenger and Visitor, and of the Maritime Baptist Publishing Co., in providing printed copies of the Home Mission Report for use in the Convention at the small cost of \$1.00, suitable thanks were returned and the bill ordered paid.

The report of the Committee on Colportage was presented by Bro. Hughes, and, after discussion by Brethren Coombs, Bynon and others, was adopted.

Report on Colportage Work.

The Committee to report on Colportage beg leave to say:

That the dissemination of sound scriptural literature is essential to the propagation and maintenance of Baptist principles, and for that reason our families and Sunday schools should see to it that nothing inimical to our views in the line of religious reading be introduced into our homes or Sunday schools any more than that which is immoral or vitiating. Literature, as well as society, has a powerful influence in moulding the mind and shaping the character in early life.

If erroneous views of Bible teaching, or low, sordid principles are inculcated in children, it will be very difficult in after years to eradicate them. A Romish prelate once said, "Give me the first ten years of the child's teaching and training and I don't care who has him after that." Strong prejudices always follow wrong views of religious teaching, thus raising insuperable barriers to the reception of clear Bible truth.

We therefore deem it of the highest importance that our people should have some ready way of obtaining sound Baptist literature for family reading and Sunday school use; and to accomplish this object the work of a Baptist colporteur is an important factor.

To this end we recommend that this Convention unite with the Baptist Sunday School Convention of the province in securing and supporting a Sunday school missionary and colporteur as soon as possible to engage in this work; and that he be at liberty to divide his time and efforts between this and general evangelistic work as occasion may require. While engaged in revival services among the churches, or in Sunday school organization, he might have on hand a supply of Baptist literature for distribution, which, as opportunity would present itself, he might dispose of at leisure intervals in the work.

For the accomplishment of this object we would advise that a committee be jointly appointed by this Convention and the New Brunswick Baptist Sunday School Convention to supply suitable literature in the line of books, tracts, papers, etc., to be circulated by sales, or gifts in some cases, as circumstances and funds will admit.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On motion the Home Mission report was taken from the table and discussed section by section. The first ten sections were adopted when the hour for adjournment arrived.

Closed with prayer by Rev. W. D. Manzer.

From 2 to 4 Baptist Annui tion resumed b

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MONDAY AFTERNOON.

From 2 to 4 P. M. was occupied with the annual session of the Baptist Annuity Association, at the close of which the Convention resumed business.

After prayer, offered by Rev. C. Henderson, the report on Home Missions was again taken up and discussed by Bros. Carey, Hughes, Davidson, Henderson, Howard, Addison, Barton, Hay, Hall, Parent and Wilson, and adopted as a whole.

The following resolution was here introduced by Dr. Carey and seconded by Pastor C. W. Townsend:

Resolved, That this Convention place on record its deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God for His great goodness in granting to our beloved Queen and Empress the longest and most glorious reign in English history; and our earnest prayer is that the coming years may bring to her, in every part of our increasing dominion, blessings both abundant and abiding.—
Unanimously adopted.

Adjourned with prayer by Pastor N. P. Gross.

MONDAY EVENING.

A large audience, crowding the building to its utmost capacity, assembled to hear the educational addresses of the evening.

According to previous announcement, Pastor C. W. Townsend, of Cambridge, after the preliminary exercises had been disposed of, opened with an address on "The Value of Intellectual Training to the Christian Ministry."

After laying due emphasis upon the supreme and absolute need of spiritual qualification, and its efficiency in ministerial usefulness, the speaker, in an orderly and argumentative manner, set forth the reasons why, next to that, intellectual light and attainments should be super-added to give the message its most effective power. Baptists who have the whole truth need not fear all the light that can be brought to bear in propagating those principles which the Saviour brought to our world. Many choice quotations and passages of wit were interspersed in the

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theme, which, in its presentation by Mr. Townsend, was heartily enjoyed by an appreciative audience. The address showed careful thought and a warm sympathy with the subject presented.

President Trotter, of Acadia, followed with an apt and clear showing of the practical benefits to be derived from the courses of our institutions at Wolfville. He also referred to the needs of those schools, and asked the prayerful sympathy and practical co-operation of his brethren in his most arduous undertaking. That very day one brother had pledged \$5,000 for Acadia, and he hoped it would prove the earnest of the \$75,000 wanted.

After singing by the choir, the President introduced Senator G. G. King, who devoted his remarks chiefly to the St. Martins Seminary indebtedness, urging that as a matter of honesty every effort should be made to pay the liabilities incurred during the running of that institution. It was not right that the late president of the New Brunswick Education Society should carry so heavy a load, and all should come and share the burden with him. The speaker suggested that this Convention undertake the work in good faith, and exhaust every possible means to remove the stigma of unpaid obligations now resting upon our name.

Dr. Carey followed, indorsing the remarks of the previous speakers, and, in his own inimitable way, entertained the audience with a series of pungent and witty sallies that much relieved the serious and business-like arguments previously presented. Although the hour was getting late he succeeded, without apparent effort, in holding the attention of all present until the arrival of Hon. H. R. Emmerson, who had been expected by the late evening train from St. John.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson, having just arrived, next spoke, dwelling upon the educational idea before the meeting, and also warmly endorsing the proposal to pay the St. Martins Seminary indebtedness.

He referred to the students of ancient Persia, who had been taught to reverence the Magi, and to venerate truth above all else, and drew from their system a happy illustration applicable to our educational work at Wolfville. Our students were

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who had been uth above all on applicable students were taught to reverence God, to venerate His truth and to inculcate the highest and noblest aims in life. We had advanced upon the ancient standards both in type and spirit, and the speaker doubted not of the glorious results that would follow.

By this time the evening was far spent, and after passing a resolution moved by Rev. J. H. Hughes, and seconded by Senator G. G. King, to the effect that this Convention pledge its members to make a strenuous effort to meet the seminary indebtedness at an early date, the meeting adjourned at 11 P. M.

TUESDAY MORNING.

Session opened at 10 o'clock, with prayer by Pastor C. Currie, of Richmond.

The following report on the Grande Ligne Mission, presented by Pastor C. Henderson, was, on motion, adopted:

Report on Grande Ligne.

It is evident that this mission holds an important place in our denominational work, as it is the only mission we have which makes a specialty of giving the gospel of the Son of God to the French Roman Catholic people of this dominion.

The success that has followed this mission should cause us to render sincere thanks to Almighty God and take courage for the future. Never in the history of French evangelization have there been so many open doors as at the present time. Thousands now have the privilege of hearing the gospel of freedom, who are numbered among the 1,500,000 Romanists whom the Grande Ligne Mission is endeavoring to save.

During the past year over one hundred of French and Roman Catholic origin have professed saving faith in Christ,

and now rejoice in true soul liberty.

There have been six thousand known conversions during the sixty years of the history of Grande Ligne, and about sixty young men and women have been sent out to preach the gospel in the French tongue, and others are now at Feller Institute preparing for a similar service. Of the Catholic pupils who have attended the school, about sixty per cent have professed conversion to Christ.

It has been computed that in order to carry on this mission successfully \$50,000 should be raised this year. To continue

the work at present in hand will alone require \$22,000. Of this amount it is expected that the Maritime Provinces will raise at least \$2,000. If we could get our people to give as the French churches are giving, that is, at the rate of five to eight dollars per member, this could easily be done, and very much

more. Let us hope for an improvement here.

Your Committee cherish the hope that the work done this year by Bro. C. H. Schutt in Madawaska County may be followed up by putting another good man in his place, on his return to McMaster. We also hope to see him return to the French work in New Brunswick for another summer before his departure for the foreign field. His present experience and knowledge of the work in northern New Brunswick could be made very helpful to the Board in its operations during the coming year.

Rev. F. D. Davidson presented the report on Foreign Missions, which was largely a resume of Secretary Manning's report at the Maritime Convention in St. John. Report adopted.

Bro. C. N. Barton presented report of Committee on Systematic Beneficence. Spoken to by Revs. C. Currie, C. Henderson, F. D. Davidson, W. D. Manzer, S. D. Ervine, J. H. Hughes, and Bros. C. N. Barton, J. S. Titus, E. Hughes, G. Wilson and M. S. Hall, and adopted.

Report on Systematic Beneficence.

1. Your Committee would, with much sincerity and emphasis, recommend I. Corinthians, xvi. 2, as the basis of directions in Christian giving: "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."

2. To those who prefer adopting a regular standard, we believe it right and noble in them to apportion a fixed amount each year to the various departments of our denominational work, increasing these amounts with the annual increase of income. In this way all our objects would be brought under regular notice, and would receive a healthy stimulus, enabling our Boards to lay out successful plans for each year's work. The importance of this can hardly be overestimated, and all our brethren owe it to the Master, who has redeemed them, to return to Him in this way their most effective service.

3. Your Committee would discourage the modern plan, unknown to the Apostolic Church, of raising money by pie socials, auction sales, lotteries, etc., for carrying on the interests of the

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modern plan, by pie socials, aterests of the Kingdom of Christ. He set us an example by giving Himself. It is said of Him, "Though He was rich, yet for our sakes he became poor." As his sacrifice was a direct one affecting Himself, yea, even costing Him His life, so should the children of God give in a way that will be a real sacrifice to them, denying themselves for the glory of God.

4. We regret that there are churches in this Province that have not given systematically to our missionary enterprises. We do hope that the showing in our next *Annual* will prove not only enlarged liberality in the mass, but a more systematic response to the individual objects calling for our help. The present blanks

in many of our columns need filling up.

5. We rejoice to know that many of the churches have given more liberally this year than formerly, swelling the amount for benevolence to a total of \$9,764.95, besides supporting their pastors and contributing often to benevolent objects in their own vicinity. We earnestly pray that this spirit may possess all our churches, and so aid more rapidly in extending the Master's Kingdom at home and abroad.

Report on Education.

Your Committee would beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We as a Convention wish to put on record our apprecation of the work done in our common schools, especially that having reference to the higher moral training of our youth in all that pertains to their social life and to their usefulness as citizens. We would most heartily commend the series of instructions relative to the effect of the use of tobacco and alcohol on the human system, and their pernicious effects on society in general.

2. We rejoice in the increased interest manifest in the churches of our Convention in the study of Baptist principles as resting on the word of God. Especially is this seen in our B. Y. P. Unions, and throughout their literature. We commend the members of these societies in this, and would say to them, press on, that your faith and knowledge may be greatly enlarged. For faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. And if we would be strong we must be thorough students of the Word, thereby coming in touch with the Holy Spirit.

3. We would recommend our pastors in their labors to strive to manifest more of the spirit of teachers in the way of giving expository sermons on the doctrines as taught in the Word of God, and accepted by us as Baptists. Sound training and instruction are much needed in many of our churches.

4. Your Committee has much reason to rejoice over the fact that a larger number of young men than ever before seek to enter the Christian ministry and spend their lives in this most important service. To all such we would urge the advisability of making thorough preparation for their life-work before settling down in the pastorate.

5. It is with much pleasure that we point all such young men to our institutions at Wolfville, N. S. We would have them understand that in Horton Academy and Acadia University we have teachers of first-class quality and all the essential

equipments for advanced training. As churches and individuals we are bound to stand by these institutions and to send our sons and daughters to them.

6. Further, we wish to call the attention of our pastors and churches to the fact that that we are not doing all we should to help these institutions financially. God help us to realize our obligations and extend the helping hand to relieve them in their present hour of need.

7. While we regret the necessity of the retirement of our honored president, Dr. Sawyer, who, after many years of most efficient service, has been compelled, by reason of years and declining vigor of body, to lay aside part of his former duties and responsibilities, we would congratulate the governors of Acadia on their having secured so able and scholarly a successor as Dr. Trotter for president. His course of action and plans now proposed to reduce the present indebtedness we commend to the favorable consideration of all our brethren.

8. In relation to educational matters in our own province, we are glad to say that a determined effort is now being made to remove the stigma that rests upon us as New Brunswick Baptists. We hope to so arouse our people that we shall obtain an honorable release from the unpaid obligations due on account of the St. Martins Seminary. Let us also look forward to the time when we shall again have an academy in this province training our own sons and daughters who now seek instruction at other doors. The horizon may look dark just at present, not even the day-star appearing, but the watchmen on the height of faith, as you ask, "What of the night?" answer, "The morning cometh."

Last night we had six anxious souls in our meeting; some are thinking of baptism. Don't neglect putting a man on these field immediately when I leave, one that can hold regular Sunda services as I have done, and a man that is enthusiastic and no afraid of work, and the field is ours."

Since the removal of Bro. Schutt the Board has engaged Mr Paul Madliger, a native of Switzerland, recently graduated from Newton Seminary. Bro. Madliger speaks both French and English, and will continue the work in Madawaska. We hope for good results.

Your Board would cherish the hope that the revival of French evangelistic work, now so auspiciously begun in this Province, may find a hearty response in the sympathetic help of the churches, and that before many years we may be able to report an encouraging increase, not only in the work and workers but also in the direct fruits gathered in the various settlement of the French throughout the northern and eastern sections of the Province. Let the 18,000 church-members of New Brunswick do that which is worthy of them in so great and good an under taking.

REV. I. R. SKINNER.

It again becomes our mournful duty to record the fall of a faithful watchman and a brother beloved by all who knew him.

Bro. Skinner had spent but a few years in the Province, yet in that brief period he had won many friends, and proved himself a workman truly called of God.

He was born at Weston, Kings Co., N. S., in 1846, his parents being devoted and intelligent members of the Berwick Church. At the age of fifteen he was converted and baptized by Rev. E. M. Saunders, D. D. At twenty one he entered on a course of study at Horton Academy, which was afterwards continued in Acadia College. After his graduation, in 1873, he became for a time assistant to Dr. Steele, of Amherst; later he undertook regular pastoral work, and during his ministry was stationed at Andover, N. B., River Hebert, N. S., Wittenberg, N. S., and finally at Oak Bay, Charlotte Co., where, after three years' hard toil, which told keenly upon his strength, he finished his labors.

Our brother was an earnest biblical student; he prepared his sermons with much care, and confined his preaching to the great, central, cardinal doctrines of the Gospel. While in search of much-needed rest he visited his former home at Weston, N. S., hoping amid these associations to regain his vigor so as to continue his work, but God had willed it otherwise; he was soon to reach the eternal home and enter the heavenly rest. The end came peacefully October 16th, 1896.

Mr. Skinner was twice married. First, to Miss Belle Black, of Amherst, who left three sons at her death, and again, some three years since, to Miss Emily McCabe, of Wittenberg, who survives with one child. We commend them to the God of all grace, a father to the fatherless, and a friend and helper to all who put their trust in Him.

REV. BENJAMIN N. HUGHES.

In that part of Queens County now known as Cambridge Bro. Hughes first saw the light of day January 17th, 1832. His parents were Welsh, and of Baptist ancestry, who for generations back had stood for the faith against church establishment and priestly power.

Of such a stock our brother was an eminent and worthy son. From early life he manifested those distinguishing traits of courage, steadfastness of purpose and unflinching loyalty to the right, which were so conspicuous throughout his ministerial

career

He was from his youth the subject of deep religious impressions, and in the spring of 1850, after much struggling, he found peace. He was baptized in the autumn of the same year by Rev. James Trimble at the Narrows, Queens County In the winter of 1855, in company with Elder G. W. Springer, he went to assist his brother, Rev. J. H. Hughes, then pastor of the First Hillsboro Church. Here a gracious revival took place, and nearly one hundred persons confessed Christ.

He remained several months in Albert County, laboring with much acceptance among the churches, and returned home in the spring. Shortly after the church at the Narrows (2nd Cambridge) gave him license to preach. Subsequently he spent some time at the Fredericton Seminary under Dr. Spurden, after which he accepted a call to the Maugerville Church, where

he was ordained in October, 1858.

He afterwards held pastorates in Jacksontown, St. George, Centreville, Florenceville, Upper Gagetown, Macnaquack, Prince William, Kingsclear, Nashwaak, Havelock and Hopewell. On his various fields of labor he was the means of leading a large number of souls to Christ. It was the joy of his heart to win souls for Jesus and to lead them into the baptismal waters.

The death of Bro. Hughes removes from this Province one of our best ministers. He was for years a familiar figure at all our gatherings. His association always counted on him as one of the true men to whom the brethren could look in the hour of need. He was not easily moved from positions which thought and study had led him to take. He believed and held fast to the faith, and while he had a kindly heart to all, he would give no quarter to those he believed to be teaching false doctrine. In his family circle he ever manifested a genial manner, a pure conversation and a consistent Christian character. Here he shone in brightest qualities, and welcomed all.

bed of suffering news came of the death of his son, then in Virginia. It was not the father's privilege to look into the face of one he so tenderly loved, nor to stand by the grave and weep out his sorrow. This was a heavy blow to our brother.

A few months before his death he bade good-bye to his daughter Lisbeth, then setting out for Maulmain, Burma. Concerning her arrival there a little later it may be of interest to many to hear the words of Pastor F. D. Crawley, formerly so well known in this Province. In his report to the American Baptist Missionary Union he writes from Maulmain: "We have all been made glad by the coming of Miss Hughes. On the first Sunday evening of the new year the pastor had the privilege of receiving into fellowship of the church here this sister whom eleven years before he had baptized and received into a dear church home far away."

And so a few weeks before she had been received into the Maulmain Church the father had received his welcome into the church triumphant. On November, 22nd, 1896, he passed to

the great reward.

Bro. Hughes was twice married. His first wife was Miss Good, of Jacksonville; his second, Miss Perry, of Havelock. Two sons in the prime of manhood had preceded him to the spirit world. Three daughters and a son, with Mrs. Hughes, remain to cherish his memory. May they follow in the footsteps of him who has gone before.

ELDER DAVID BLEAKNEY.

After nearly forty years in the ministry, Bro. Bleakney has finished his course. He was well known to the brethren of the Eastern Association some thirty years since,—a kindly genial man, and an humble servant of the Master.

He was called to ordination November 27th, 1858, while pastor of the Caledonia church, Albert County. For some time he made his home at Salisbury, living afterwards at Cornhill, Westmorland County, also at Kinnear, and finally removing to Petitcodiac, where he quietly spent the evening of his days,

preaching occasionally, until incapacitated by age.

From September 1860, to October 1861, he labored in Restigouche County, in connection with the N. B. Home Mission Society. While here he preached chiefly at New Bandon and Armstrong's Brook, opening some promising interests, which, it is to be regretted, have since been lost sight of. The fathers

From 1865 to 1872, Elder Bleakney was pastor of the Third Elgin Church, in which relation he was highly esteemed. We cherish his memory as one who, amid many discouragements, strove to do his Master's will.

ELDER ELIAS KEIRSTEAD.

Since the close of Convention, and just as these minutes go to press, we have to record the fall of a veteran in our ministry. Elder Elias Keirstead of Studholm, known and beloved these many years, more especially by the older brethren, has gone to his eternal reward.

Born at Gondola Point, Kings County, May 23rd, 1807, he had at his death compassed the greater part of this century, and been an interested witness of its most important events. His youth was spent chiefly in the ordinary occupations of farm life at the head of Belleisle Bay, where, surrounded by Christian influences, he received religious impressions that produced a last-

The scenes and events of his early life, even without the training of the schools, were singularly favorable to the production of this result. Few places, perhaps, could furnish better natural surroundings for the development of the highest type of manhood. The bold and rugged hillsides facing the waters of the Belleisle, with a rich and varied scenery, conspire to give an ennobling influence to the spirit and motives of the people, while added to these were stirring revival efforts of the time that early shaped their religious sentiments and moulded their life.

In 1809 the First Springfield Church was organized, just two years after Bro. Keirstead was born, and with this church he soon became identified. God gave him a most suitable companion in Miss Margaret Ganong, who, in both spiritual and temporal affairs, proved a helpmeet indeed. On experiencing a hope in Christ, they were baptized at Hatfield's Point by Rev. Samuel Bancroft, and united with the church at that place.

Having settled on a new farm in the vicinity of Collina Corner, our brother and his family were called upon to endure many hardships and trials peculiar to all early settlements in those days. At this time what is now the main road from Belleisle to Collina was not opened through, and communication with other parts was not easy. Then, too, there was no Baptist interest in the place, and but few religious privileges of any kind. Some

time after his removal thither, he opened a prayer-meeting in a private house which, under the Divine blessing, proved the means of doing much good. Several were awakened to see their need of Christ, and in due time believers came out to profess their faith.

The result was the formation of the Studholm Church. Here our brother was ordained in 1849. His labors soon became more wider ead, extending to Upper Millstream, Cumberland Bay and The Range, where he was pastor of the First and Second Grand Lake Churches for thirteen years; also at Titusville, Upham, Mill Cove and Chipman.

On several of these fields he saw extensive revivals, one of the la gest of which took place in the First Grand Lake Church in the early part of 1859. Here many stout-hearted sinners were convicted of sin and cried for mercy, while the entire membership experienced a wonderful quickening. The result of this revival was felt for years, leaving an abiding im-

pression on the whole community.

As a preacher Elder Keirstead was held in high esteem among the churches with which he labored. His sermons were practical and earnest presentations of the great truths of the Gospel, richly graced with an evangelical spirit. He held with a strong grip the doctrine of sovereign grace as the effectual means of saving men, and in his more vigorous days proclaimed it with singular fervor and power. Saints were edified under his ministry, and even the unbelieving were compelled to admit the truth and force of the Gospel of the grace of God.

The peculiar style of his preaching and ministry was greatly strengthened by the well-known character of the man. He was the very embodiment of honesty and truthfulness, scorning the common arts of policy or the use of any subservient means of doubtful character to gain a desired end. Endowed naturally with a strong mind, and inspired with the loftiest motives, he fearlessly proclaimed the truth, leaving the issue with God and the hearer. As a result everywhere his preaching produced soundness in the faith and stability of Christian character, and it is an imperishable monument to his ministry that in all those churches with which his labors were associated no modern heresy has ever succeeded in disturbing the converts led into the churches by his hands.

The same loyalty as was manifested in our brother's preaching of the Word was also evident in all his denominational relations. He was a subscriber to the old "Baptist Magazine" from its origin; then of the "Christian Messenger": next of

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preachnational gazine" next of the "Christian Visitor," and so continued to the close of life. In every denominational enterprise commending itself to his Christian judgment he took his full share of interest and gave liberally. Fidelity to truth was the watchword of his life, and he was truly a helper to his brethren in every good word and work.

In public matters also affecting the welfare of society he was an active participant. The temperance reform, the educational system, Sabbath schools and their efficient development, all alike shared in his labors and interest. In politics he was a pronounced Liberal, after the character of the English Baptists, holding the right of franchise free and unbought as the inalienable right of every citizen. In all these relations few men have preserved a character as pure and unsullied. We can truly say he leaves a stainless memory.

His family enjoyed peculiar blessings One of his sons, Rev. E. M. Keirstead, D. D., of Wolfville, N. S., has long been held in deserved esteem in our ministry; a grandson, Rev. E. W. Kelly, now a missionary in Burma, has been for some years a successful preacher of the Word among the heathen, while a large number of children and grandchildren have obtained like

precious faith in the Gospel he so often preached.

Many sorrows also had darkened his earthly home. His partner in life, after suffering much from cancer in the breast, was removed to the heavenly home November 11th, 1879. She was a godly woman, beloved by all who knew her, a true mother in Israel. Her Christian memory and kindly words are still a precious legacy to those coming after. A favorite daughter, Lydia, sickened and died in 1859. A beloved grandson, Frank M. Kelly, with every promise of usefulness in life, fell a few years since a prey to consumption. A granddaughter, wife of Rev. M. Addison, of Salisbury, of most beautiful spirit and life, was called away a little over a year since. Many other near and dear ones had gone before him. Four sons - Francis, Isaac, Jacob and Elias M., with two daughters, Mrs. Kelly and Mrs. Jas. Gibbon, besides his brothers James and William, and two sisters-Mrs. West and Mrs. F. D. Ganong-remain to revere his memory.

His last days were quietly spent with his son Jacob. For a year or more, owing to a partial paralysis of the tongue, he could scarcely make any one understand what he wished to say. This was a great disappointment to him, especially when meeting with Christian friends. Yet he patiently awaited the end, and mourned not. Surrounded by loving children and grand-children, he tarried until the Master's call came. At length, on

Saturday, at 2 p. m., October 16th, 1897, he gently departed this life, and his triumphant spirit entered into the rest that remains for the children of God.

The funeral services were held on the following Monday, and the occasion was improved upon by Rev. W. E. MacIntyre, who spoke from Psalm xxxvii, 37th verse, "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace." Rev. S. D. Ervine and Mr. Bailey (Methodist), were also present and participated in the services. Rev. E. K. Ganong and E. M. Keirstead, D. D., sat among the mourners. A large concourse of friends gathered to pay the last tribute of respect to one whose name will long linger in hundreds of homes, and whose character and work will live on and bear fruit in generations yet to come. Truly a good name is rather to be chosen than great riches, and loving favor rather than silver and gold.

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Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour; and, on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church, in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, back-biting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant, and the principles of God's word.

PRAYER.

Now the God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the Great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work, to do his will; working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen.

These possess property and endowments valued at \$3,554,185. We also possess thirty-six Universities and Colleges, having 845 instructors and 11,287 pupils, with an aggregate valuation of property amounting to \$12,737,964.

There are, besides these, twenty-nine Ladies' Seminaries, with 386 instructors, 3,444 students, and property valued at \$4,224,700.

Then there are sixty-four other institutions for both sexes, with 518 instructors, 11,676 students, and property valued at \$4,416,370.

Lastly, we have thirty-three institutions devoted exclusively to the Education of Negroes and Indians, with 280 instructors, 5,216 students, and property valued at \$1,307,000. Thus we have a grand total of 169 institutions, 2,099 instructors, 32,692 students, and property amounting to \$36,240,869.

These do not include McMaster University, and Toronto Baptist College in Ontario, Feller Institute in Quebec, or our own institutions at Wolfville, of which fuller notice is given elsewhere.

Baptists in the United States have also thirty-four charitable institutions, with property valued at \$1,525,721.

Feller Institute is pre-eminently a Christian school of learning. As such it has, besides developing the spiritual life of its students a four-fold aim: to give a thorough education to the young people of the province far removed from Protestant centres; to open the doors for Roman Catholic youths, who have not sufficient means to attend schools of their own faith; to furnish training to those who intend doing French missionary work, and to offer a superior French education to a limited number of English students.

The history of this mission is most interesting. In October, 1834, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver, with three other Gospel missionaries from Lausanne, Switzerland, arrived in Montreal. One year later, in October, 1835, Mrs. Feller and Mr. Roussy, also of Lausanne, landed in the same city.

In the great educational progress which has been made during the sixty-two years which have intervened between that time and the present, the influence of the institution, which bears the honored name of "Feller," has been a most important factor.

The Feller Institute stands to-day an established school of learning, as well as a centre of missionary endeavor. It is not only a living, but a growing institution.

Though it has now accommodation for about 120 pupils, it has in some recent years been obliged to refuse more than fifty applicants for admission, because for want of room.

About twenty per cent of the young men and women who fill its corridors and class-rooms are usually Roman Catholics.

The courses of study provided cover the whole ground between the most elementary subjects and the University matriculation.

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A former female pupil of Feller Institute, which is open to both sexes, recently graduated from McGill University, at the head of her classes. She has the additional distinction of being the first French Canadian lady graduate of that university.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

BAPTIST ANNUITY ASSOCIATION, LOCATED IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

This Corporation shall be known as "THE ARTICLE I. BAPTIST ANNUITY ASSOCIATION, LOCATED IN NEW BRUNSWICK," the object of which shall be to make provision for the support of disabled and aged Baptist ministers of the Province of New Brunswick, Dominion of Canada, but the benefits of this Association may be hereafter extended to the Baptist ministers of other provinces, should equitable arrangements be made to that end.

ARTICLE II. This Association shall consist of ordinary members, beneficiary members, and life members, all of whom must be members in good standing in a Baptist Church, and also resident in New Brunswick at the time of admission,

Foreign Missionaries alone excepted.

ARTICLE III. The officers of this Association shall be a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Financial Secretary-Treasurer and fifteen other Directors. To this Board shall be entrusted the faithful management of the Association, and at all regular meetings five members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IV. President .- It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the meetings of the Board of Management and of the Association; to correspond with ministers, churches and individuals; to visit personally associations and churches, and to use his best endeavors to extend the usefulness of the Annuity Association.

Recording Secretary.—The Recording Secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Management, and of the Association.

Financial Secretary-Treasurer.—It shall be the duty of the Financial Secretary-Treasurer to carry on the financial correspondence of the Board of Management, under the direction of the President, to receive and deposit all monies in bank, or to invest the same as directed by the Board; to disburse all monies upon the order of the Board, signed by the President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, and countersigned by the Recording Secretary; to keep accurate accounts of the receipts and expenditures of the Association, and to report upon its monetary affairs at the regular meetings of the Board, and at the meetings of the Association admin expens

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ARTICLE V. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be determined upon by the Association in session, for the reception of the reports of the Board of Management and its officers; for the election of officers; and for the despatch of all necessary business. Special meetings of the Association may be held at any time upon the order of the Beard of Management.

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The Board of Management shall hold regular quarterly meetings for the transaction of business; and special meetings may be held upon the call of the President and Secretary. Due notice of the meetings of the Board shall be given to all its members. All sessions of the Board of Management, and of the Association, shall be held in New Brunswick.

ARTICLE VI. At the annual meeting of the Association the Board of Management shall submit a report of its proceedings during the previous year for the approval of the Association. Such report shall contain a full account of the receipts and disbursements, the condition of the Capital Fund, and all other particulars necessary to a complete showing of the financial affairs of the Association; together with other information pertaining to the welfare of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. The Capital Fund of this Association shall consist of donations, legacies, quarterly or annual payments of members, and other contributions.

ARTICLE VIII. All donations and bequests of ten dollars and upwards, unless otherwise directed by the donor, shall be added to the Capital Fund, and surplus money from all sources shall be added in like manner.

ARTICLE IX. Ordinary members shall pay an annual subscription of one dollar to the funds of this Association.

Beneficiary members shall pay the annual fees required by the scale. (See Article X.)

ARTICLE X. Beneficiary members of this Association shall pay into its treasury according to the following scale:

Beneficiary members shall continue to pay the same annual fee as that at the time of admission to membership until they have reached sixty-five years of age, when they cease to pay.

ARTICLE XI. If any minister having a right to this fund shall leave the denomination, he shall forfeit all claims on the fund. If a minister ceases to labor as a minister and engages in a secular calling, except from some physical disqualification for continuing his ministerial work, he shall forfeit his claims on the fund, but shall receive back one-half of the amount paid in yearly dues.

ARTICLE XII. The Recording Secretary shall furnish to each beneficiary member a certificate signed by himself and the President, stating that such member has complied with the prescribed regulations; and this certificate shall be presented as a voucher to draw the money to which such member may be entitled.

ARTICLE XIII. None but Ordained Ministers in good standing with the Baptist denomination shall become beneficiary members of this Association.

ARTICLE XIV. Any Baptist Missionary in foreign service, supported by the Baptists of Canada, shall be entitled to membership, with equal claims for his widow and orphans as other beneficiary members.

ARTICLE XV. The current expenses of this Association, and all annuities, shall be paid out of the funds accruing from interest, fees of beneficiary members, annual subscriptions of ordinary members and donations of less than ten dollars.

ARTICLE XVI. When any beneficiary member of this Association shall become disqualified by illness, or by the infirmities of age, to discharge the duties of his ministry, and shall have paid, according to Article X, he shall be regarded as having a legal claim upon the funds of this Association.

ARTICLE XVII. Any disabled beneficiary member shall be entitled to an annuity of eighty dollars, and if he has children he shall receive twelve dollars additional for each child under fifteen years of age. The Board of Management shall have discretionary power to increase an annuity in special cases. No annual fee shall be required of any beneficiary member while incapacitated for service.

ARTICLE XVIII. The claims of the beneficiary members shall be paid semi-annually, in equal parts, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year; the certificate of each claimant having first been submitted to the Board of Management.

ARTICLE XIX. No beneficiary member of this Association shall have a claim upon the funds for aid until he shall have made five annual payments, in accordance with the provisions

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ARTICLE XX. When a beneficiary member is removed by death his widow shall receive sixty dollars annually so long as she remains his widow. If the widow be left with children to provide for she shall receive twelve dollars additional per annum for every such child under fifteen years of age. If the deceased minister shall leave orphans, but no widow, they shall each receive twenty dollars annually until fifteen years of age, and the money shall be paid to their legal parents or guardians.

ARTICLE XXI. If a widow receiving an annuity shall marry she shall cease, from the date of her marriage, to participate in the fund; but the children of her former husband shall continue to receive their annuities the same as if their mother had remained a widow.

ARTICLE XXII. When any beneficiary member of this Association shall die before becoming a claimant upon its fund, and shall not leave a widow or orphan, his heirs shall have a legal claim for one-half the amount paid by him, unless it shall have been freely donated to the Association prior to his death.

ARTICLE XXIII. In case any beneficiary member of this Association shall remove to any other province or country, his removal shall not invalidate his claim; provided always that he continues to comply with the conditions of his membership.

ARTICLE XXIV. Should any beneficiary member of this Association fail to pay during any year the annual amount of fees required by Article X., he shall cease to have a claim upon the benefits of this Association. Should however such defaulting beneficiary members within two years thereafter pay into the funds of this Association the full amount of fees due from such default to the time of such payment, he shall be entitled to a full participation in all the benefits of this Association as though such default in payment of his annual fees had not occurred.

ARTICLE XXV. Should any beneficiary member of this Association from any cause sever his connection with it, he may hold the Association legally bound to refund to him one-half the amount he has paid into the funds, provided such claim is filed with the Board of Management within one year of such withdrawal.

ARTICLE XXVI. Any society, church or person, by paying the annual fees required of beneficiary members, shall be entitled to nominate as a recipient of the benefits of this Association, any Baptist minister in New Brunswick or Baptist missionary

abroad supported by the denomination in Canada, and such benefit shall accrue to him, his widow and his orphans as though he had personally contributed to the funds of this Association in accordance with Article X.

ARTICLE XXVII. Should the Board of Management upon proceeding to vote the semi-annual grants to beneficiary members, their widows and orphans, at any time, decide that the available funds are not sufficient to warrant the full amounts specified in Articles XVII and XX, they shall vote only such proportionate parts of the sums so specified in said Articles XVII and XX, as the funds will in their judgment warrant.

ARTICLE XXVIII. This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present; provided that no such alteration or amendment conflict in any way with the terms of the Trust Deed conveying to this Association the original gift of Jacob Bradshaw of ten thousand dollars, and that due notice of the proposed change be given in writing at a previous annual meeting.

STATE OF THE DENOMINATION.

Again, at the close of another convention year, we have to record heavy losses in the ranks of the ministry. Since the last session at Hatfield's Point, Elders Wm. T. Corey, I. R. Skinner B. N. Hughes and D. Bleakney, captains all in the Lord's hosts, have passed away. And now, since the recent Gibson convention, Elder Elias Keirstead, too, is gone.

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Due notice of Bro. Corey's death was inserted in last year's Annual, as it came to hand before the minutes had gone through the press. Sadly, as we close up the ranks where the death shafts have fallen, we look into each others' faces and ask, "Who next?" Four obituary sketches in last year's Annual; four again this year! Thus, while we are pressing forward to carry out the Master's commission, the watchmen fall on every hand. Yet we trust the work moves gloriously on. God buries His workmen, but carries on His work.

ORDINATIONS.

Four brethren have been ordained since our last report—Bro. M. B. Whitman, at Alma; Bro. J. G. A. Belyea, B.A., at Sackville, C. J. Steeves, at Upper Newcastle, Queens Co., and N. P. Gross, at Andover.

Since the Gibson convention, Rev. W. J. Halse, a minister of the F. C. Baptist body, having resigned his relations with that conference, has united with us, and assumes the pastorate of one of our churches. This makes five accessions to the ministry, one more than we have lost by death.

NEW ORGANIZATIONS.

There have been three churches organized during the convention year, all in 1897: Tobique Valley, Northampton and Cloverdale, and all in the bounds of the Western Association. The Tobique Valley Church, the largest part of whose membership is at Sisson Ridge, Victoria County, takes the place of the Arthurette Church, the name of the latter being now dropped from our minutes.

Since the close of convention another new organization, also in the Western Association, known as the Glencoe Church, has been recognized with forty-six members. This body owes its existence largely under God to the labors of Bro. F. D. Davidson, our general missionary, and Bro. H. B. Sloat, student supply on the Nashwaak field during the last summer. The Church was formally recognized by council October 7th, 1897.

Houses of Worship.

Several of these have had extensive repairs put upon them. The Second Springfield Church, on Pastor Ervine's field, after being re-fitted and re-painted, had a re-opening service September 27, 1896.

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In December, 1896, the new house of worship built by the Main street Church, St. John, was publicly dedicated to the worship of God, and appropriate exercises took place during the holiday season. It is a handsome edifice.

Since the Gibson Convention a new house of worship, which has been under construction during the last two years, was opened at Hardwood Ridge, in Northfield, Sunbury Co The dedication service took place October 3, 1897, all bills being paid at the time of opening but about \$20. It is a part of the Upper Newcastle Church, Queens Co.

Our interests in Northfield have enjoyed much prosperity during the last four years, previous to which we had scarcely a foothold in that part and no house of worship of any kind. Since the revival in the fall of 1893 several families, hitherto pedobaptist in sentiment, have adopted Baptist views, and we now have two meeting houses there, attended by large congregations.

Another new meeting house was also dedicated at Lower Coverdale, Albert Co., November 7, 1897.

FRENCH MISSIONS AND GRANDE LIGNE.

We are glad to report progress in our Mission in Quebec. At Feller Institute twenty-two of the students professed conversion during the year. Three of the students are now in training as missionaries for work among the French. For the last two years an unusual awakening among the people has greatly favored the efforts of our missionaries, and inquiries are becoming more numerous.

During the past summer we have had a former student of Grande Ligne, Bro. C. H. Schutt, B. A., laboring among the French in Madawaska County. Thus we hope, by pressing our work up to the boundaries of Quebec, to assist presently in the general evangelization of all the French people inhabiting Eastern Canada. In this a great work lies before us.

Since the return of Bro. Schutt to Toronto, to complete his theological course, the Home Mission Board has secured the services of Bro. Paul F. Madliger, a native of Switzerland, who has recently graduated from Newton Theological Seminary. Bro. Madliger speaks both French and English, French being his

native tongue. He will occupy St. Leonards, Edmundston and St. Francis, as Bro. Schutt has done, and we hope, through him, to sustain the interest so well begun.

NORTHWEST MISSIONS.

The recent visit of Bro. H. H. Hall, of Portage la Prairie, Manitoba, as also the address of Mrs. G. H. Bulyea, of Qu'Appelle, N. W. T., at the New Brunswick Convention, must undoubtedly direct especial attention to the needs of the great west. Here overflowing multitudes of emigrants from Europe are fast coming in, and a magnificent opportunity is held out to the Baptists of Eastern Canada to evangelize these people within our own borders. Whilst we have hitherto sent no missionaries to their native lands, where for the most part they have been held under bondage to priestcraft and medieval superstitions, God has now given us an open door to bring them to the truth, as they enter this land of freedom. We shall miss the greatest opportunity in our history as Canadian Baptists if we fail them at this time.

Baptists in the Northwest, and the cause of God at large, have sustained a heavy loss in the removal of Alexander Grant, of Winnipeg. While canoeing he was drowned in the Nepigon River, north shore of Lake Superior, August 4th, 1897. Elder Grant was but forty-two years of age. Perhaps, though, it is God's call to turn our sympathies more directly to the pleas of the Northwest. His sudden translation leaves a wide gap in our ranks there.

The Convention of Manitoba and the Northwest comprises within its borders fifty-three organized churches, reporting this year an aggregate membership of 3,192 professed believers. There are also several Mission Stations and hundreds of scattered members not accessible to the present church organizations.

We are glad to note the resuscitation of the Northwest Baptist, which has been suspended for a time. Our brethren there need an organ to sustain their interests and hold their people to the work. We hope to see many copies of it in New Brunswick also. It can be ordered of the business manager, Mrs. C. W. Clark, Winnipeg.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Here, too, the western problem confronts us. Multitudes are flocking in. The recent discovery of gold on the Klondike, in our far Northwestern territory, has brought thousands of emigrants from every land, and British Columbia promises to be

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the centre through which these rolling tides of humanity shall pass. Already, we are informed, tens of thousands of able-bodied men, the flower of the adventurous spirits of the present generation, are making their way to this remote corner of our Dominion, and we shall need to move quickly, ere skepticism and immorality seize the control.

In July, 1897, the eleven churches of British Columbia, representing about 1,100 members, met at Vancouver and formed themselves into the British Columbia Baptist Convention, striking out boldly for aggressive work. Bro. Cogswell is Secretary of this body, and Mr. W. Marchant, of Victoria, the Treasurer. We hail with joy the advent of this organization, the fifth among the great sisterhood of Conventions now carrying on our denominational interests in Canada.

During the financial year just closed Mr. Marchant acknowledges receipts amounting to \$4,500, about \$2,500 of which comes from the Maritime Provinces, the result largely of Bro. R. W. Trotter's appeal. They propose this year to help Nanaimo, Chemainus, Emmanuel Church (Victoria), Mount Pleasant and Jackson Avenue (Vancouver), Chilliwack, Rossland, Trail, Nelson and Kaslo—the two last being as yet unorganized mission stations.

And who will give the gospel to the teeming multitudes entering the Klondike? Will the rum fiend and social debauchery—now being fast crowded out, thank God, by Christian influences in the East—find here a retreat, where they may make havoc of the souls and bodies of men, and wreck the whole social fabric of this new community? Brethren of the East, let us wheel into line with the new Convention of the West, and grapple in dead earnest with this great issue. God has hidden a vein of gold in Western Canada, as the last bait to draw the nations to our shores. Shall we evangelize them and civilize them as they enter, or shall they heathenize us? We have no desire to see another Quebec in our far West, stretching from the Pacific to the Arctic shores, a blockade to the western march of Christianity throughout the twentieth century. Well may we tremble as we ponder the results!

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Nor less, because of our zeal for the home land, do we appreciate the glorious prospects abroad. We trust that we are but in the beginnings of that great uprising of the Church militant which is yet to take the world for Christ.

Last October Rev. R. E. Gullison and wife, with Miss Maud E. Harrison and Miss Ida M. Newcomb, sailed for India to recruit our missionary staff. They arrived at their appointed field in the latter part of December. This fall Bro. W. V.

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Higgins, of late home on a furlough, through the illness of his wife, returns, accompanied by Bro. John Hardy and Miss Mabel Archibald, after being tendered a farewell meeting at the Moncton Church, Nov. 12, 1897. We trust that all the friends who pledged subscriptions for Mr. Gullison's support at the Springfield Convention will remember the request of the Secretary—that these be continued from year to year. This request should be honorably complied with.

Gratefully do we note the fact that the missionary spirit in our churches is on the increase. May it widen until our sympathies shall be as wide as the world itself, for which Jesus died. We hope before this generation shall have passed away to see Canadian Baptists in one grand foreign missionary organization, reaching out not only to the land of the Telugus, but to China, Japan and Africa, not content until for every dollar laid out for home support, we have given at least five for foreign work, where the need is a hundred fold greater than ours can possibly be. May we awaken speedily to the glorious realization of such an undertaking.

EDUCATION.

Recent events at Wolfville lend an encouraging prospect to the educational work of our denomination. A large and promising class of Freshmen, numbering fifty in regular course, with several special students, and with all the other classes of usual numbers, gives good ground of hope for the future. The high Christian character of the institutions, worth more than gold endowments, is well sustained, and we believe the Board of Governors have found in Dr. Trotter a worthy successor to Drs. Crawley, Cramp and Sawyer. Long may Acadia live to carry on the grand work committed to her charge. "She openly avows," says Dr. Trotter, "the supremacy of Christ over all life."

SEMINARY DEBT.

At the educational meeting held with this Convention at Gibson, a strong and unanimous feeling was expressed in favor of a determined effort to wipe out the St. Martins Seminary indebtedness. Senator King voiced the sentiments of New Brunswick Baptists when he claimed that the non-payment of this debt would be a lasting stigma upon the denomination. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Dr. Carey and others coincided with this view. In accordance with the sentiments there expressed a resolution was unanimously passed to make a strenuous effort this year for the raising of at least \$1,500. We hope the whole amount will speedily be forthcoming. Brethren, let us lift all together on this issue.

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We note encouraging progress in this department, an account of which is more fully given elsewhere. The following tabular statement of receipts from the churches for Home Mission purposes, and of additions by baptism throughout the province since 1890, may be of interest to many:

With the Bradshaw Trust Funds we were enabled to lay out last year \$2,494.82, and with the year closing September 1st, 1897, the total outlay was \$3,213.63, over \$500 more than in any previous year.

Added to this should be mentioned the fact that during the last three years the work done by the Secretary has been performed without salary, thus effecting a saving of over \$300 per year as our share of the salary formerly paid the Secretary of the Maritime Board.

Since the formation of this Convention, not only have the General Home Mission contributions increased, but accessions to the churches throughout the Province have also been proportionately large. These facts may, in some measure, compensate us for the loss of the Seminary, which we were obliged to close in 1895. Let us yet hope, however, that at no distant day our people, with recruited strength, may again resume their academic work without the least diminution to our present general progress.

A NEGLECTED PART.

It seems somewhat remarkable that, with all our missionary activity, the Baptists of Canada have as yet done nothing for Newfoundland and Labrador. Some years since our English Baptist brethren did send missionaries to the island of Newfoundland, but no continuous efforts were made.

With a population of 162,000, Newfoundland presents no ordinary field for Christian work. There is not to-day a single Baptist church on the island, although there are several Baptists residing there. Lying, as it does, so near to us, we should make some exertion to see that its people receive the whole truth as God has given it to us.

Then, too, Labrador, another neighboring territory on our eastern seaboard, has been almost totally neglected by all bodies of Christians. Some years since the Moravian missionaries, sent over by the parent church in Saxony, established a footing both here and in Greenland. At one time they reported as many as five hundred converts on the Labrador coast, but of late they have not done much. Surely, as those within nearest call, we are under some responsibility to share our blessings with this hitherto neglected part of our continent.

REMOVALS.

We desire to call the attention of pastors to the duty of looking after absent members. Many of our young people are annually going from us, some to reside in New England or the Western States, many more to the great Northwest of our own Dominion. Our ministering brethren in the West complain that before they can get on the track of these members, or find out that they are Baptists, the latter, too often discouraged by their isolation, have drifted off into other connections, and lost their denominational attachment altogether.

There is evidently a lack somewhere. If the pastors, on learning of the removal of a member, would inquire and get the absent member's address, or that of some Baptist minister in the vicinity, many of these might be saved to us. Any one, for twenty-five cents, can get the American Baptist Year Book, which contains the name and address of every Baptist minister in each State of the American Union. Every maritime pastor should have this year book. We publish elsewhere in the Annual a list of the Baptist ministers in each Province of Canada, the first of the kind ever issued. It will prove helpful in this direction to many.

Along this line we call especial attention to the subjoined appeal sent to us by our young brethren in the Boston churches. As will be seen, they have taken this matter in hand in good business form. The appeal speaks for itself.

Boston, Mass., September 1, 1897.

To the Baptist Churches and Pastors of New Brunswick:

Dear Brethren,—We desire to call your attention to the Young Men's Baptist Social Union, which is now upon the sixth year of its existence.

We have a membership of about three hundred and fifty young Baptist laymen, over twenty-one years of age, representing thirty of the Baptist churches in this city and vicinity. soci

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The purpose of our Union is to advance the religious and social interest of our Baptist young men.

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As a part of our work, we are endeavoring to reach, in a systematic way, the many young men who are constantly coming to our city. Many of them are often lost to Christ and His Church because, when they arrive, there is no one to take any special interest in their welfare.

To try and overcome this, we ask your assistance by filling out one of the enclosed blanks and forwarding the same to us whenever any young man leaves your church and congregation, and comes to our city or its suburbs.

We will then give his name and address to a member of our Union, and also to the pastor of the Baptist Church nearest where he is located, when they will make it their business to call, invite him to attend their church, and interest others in him.

We think we can do a good work in this way, but we shall need your most hearty co-operation.

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Constitution of the N. B. Baptist Sabbath School Convention.

ARTICLE I. This organization shall be known as the New Brunswick Baptist Sabbath School Convention.

ARTICLE II. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Executive of five brethren, together with one from each County in the Province. Any five of these shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

ARTICLE III. The membership of the Convention shall consist of the Superintendent and two delegates from each school in the Province. All pastors shall be ex-officio members.

ARTICLE IV. The annual meeting of the Convention shall take place in connection with the sessions of the New Brunswick Baptist Convention, opening on the day previous to that gathering.

ARTICLE V. The object of the Convention shall be to advance the interests of Sabbath School work in the Province—

(a) By the appointment and support of a Sunday School missionary;

(b) By striving to effect the co-operation of all the Baptist Sunday-schools in the Province in the more successful prosecution of our great denominational enterprises;

(c) By maintaining colportage work to circulate denominational literature in our Sabbath-schools and home;

(d) By the organization of County and Parish Associations, auxiliary to the general body.

ARTICLE VI. Special meetings of this Convention may be called at any time by the Executive, due notice of which must be given by the Secretary in the Messenger and Visitor.

ARTICLE VII. This Constitution may be added to or amended at any regular meeting of the Convention by a two-thirds vote.

MINUTES OF S. S. CONVENTION.

Gibson, September 10th, 1897.

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The Convention opened at 2.30 P. M. President Ervine led an interesting social service for half an hour, after which the delegates were enrolled.

The election of officers was deferred until Article II of Constitution was amended to admit one from each county on the executive.

Pastor Ervine reported for the St. John and Kings County S. S. Convention. The session was an interesting one. The next meeting is to take place with the Quarterly Meeting at Kars in October.

Pastor Cornwall reported the Parish Convention, organized lately at St. Martins, and the Hammond Convention, organized at Hillsdale, Kings Co. He also stated that the Albert County S. S. Convention stood ready to aid the Provincial Convention in the support of a Sunday-school missionary.

Kent County and Queens County Conventions were also

reported as ready to do the same.

Reports from fields and single schools were given by Pastor Henderson, Pastor Davidson, Bro. Smith of Marysville, Pastor Barton of Queensbury, and Bro. Blackbourn.

Elder W. Keirstead, F. C. Baptist, having been invited to a seat, offered some encouraging remarks in relation to Sunday-

school work.

Pastor C. Henderson spoke of the obligation of the pastor to keep in touch with the Sunday-school.

EVENING SESSION.

Opened at 7.30; President Ervine in the chair. Singing from Gospel Hymns No. 91; Scripture reading and prayer by Elder J. A. Cahill; singing, No. 65.

Pastor R. M. Bynon followed with a Model Lesson on Romans xii, 9-21, and Pastor M. Addison with an address on "The

Qualifications of the Sunday-school Teacher."

Elder J. H. Hughes dwelt on the nature of love and its efficiency in all Christian work. It was, he said, a principle
