THE STUMPAGE DEBATE.

THE PROCEEDINGS IN THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY LAST EVENING.

REASONS WHY THE LEGISLATURE SHOULD HAVE RECONSIDERED THE STUMPAGE.

RELATIVE TO THE GAZETTE.

FREDERICKTON, March 18.—The great debate of the session is now on. The galleries of the house are crowded and the available space on the floor of the house is filled with spectators. To judge from the large number of men and women who have attended the session this afternoon and evening, the ladies of Fredericton take a deep interest in the proceedings of the House of Assembly.

How long this debate will last it is hard to say just now. Mr. Blair spoke an hour and a half. Mr. Hamington as long, if not longer; then Mr. Burchill, Dr. Atkinson, Mr. Labillois and Phinney, all of Fredericton, took turns up to the adjournment of the debate.

There is no doubt that the resolution will pass, but it is not clear whether it will pass with a majority or a minority on both sides of the House, nor is there known whether the breeze the question will be decided in either direction over in a day or week.

The stumps debate having resumed,

Mr. Blair's speech was a powerful and interesting effort and produced a great impression.

Mr. Hamington spoke long and loud in answer to Mr. Blair and Mr. Stockton presented a petition from F. O. Talbot, Nathan Cleveland, Thomas E. Colpitts, H. N. Keirness and others, residents of Alma, praying for a grant to aid the improvement of the road from Alma to Fredericton.

Mr. McLean gave notice of inquiry as to the government's intention to construct a new bridge over the Scudoc River on the post road in Sheldie or to substantially rebuild the same and make it suitable for passage.
