CAUSED BY A GAS EXPLOSION IN A CHURCH.

It occurred during a crowded Music Lantern Show. A dreadful Fate in the Dome Darkness Followed the Explosion. London, Nov. 20.—During a music lantern show at the Metropolitan church in Ilchester, Derbyshire, which was crowded with men and women and children, while all were intent on gazing at the pictures, and the room was darkened, suddenly there was a blinding flash and terrific explosion. People were thrown in every direction with great violence, and there was a dreadful panic in the church. The pictures, which had been hanging from the ceiling, had been destroyed, and every light extinguished. In the stampede for the doors many people were trampled under foot, some of whom had been injured by the explosion, some had their limbs broken, while others had their clothes slashed into shreds. As soon as light could be procured, a scene of desolation was revealed. The interior of the chapel was a complete wreck, the woodwork destroyed, and a mass of ruin, the pews overturned and the windows blown out. A search for the lantern was immediately set on foot. Two persons were found dead and their bodies brought out into the air. Two women were discovered with their eyesight destroyed and their cheeks laid bare to the bone. Eight others were found lying on the floor badly injured that they had been unable to crawl out of the chapel. The wounded were quietly removed to the nearest hospital. The disaster was caused by the explosion of gas, which had accumulated in the cellar, while the lights were turned down during the exhibition. At the coroner's inquest on the bodies of the dead there was a rigid investigation into the circumstances and the responsibility for the disaster will be laid to a sharp account.

BARON DOUGHERTY APPEARS. The Russian Foreign Minister Reaches the French Capital. Paris, Nov. 18.—M. de Sereff, the Russian foreign minister, arrived here today. He was met at the railway station by Baron Malmgren, the Russian ambassador, and the attaches of the Russian embassy, as well as by Comte de Sereff, the Russian foreign office, who represented Minister Ribot. No demonstration was attempted in honor of the visitor. The visit of M. de Sereff to Paris is soon after the interview with the King of Italy and the Marquis de Rudini is looked upon as having decided present significance and as being another proof of the good understanding existing between Russia and France. It is believed, however, that whatever the understanding between Russia and France may be, it certainly does not take the form of an offensive and defensive alliance.

An enormous crowd to witness the event. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. SPENSERFIELD, Mass., Nov. 21.—The city is owned today by warriors of blue and crimson. WARLIKE TRIPS TO THE POLAR FRONTIER—Anti-Arctic Strengthening.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Standard's St. Petersburg correspondent says—"Owing to the cooling of the French submarine project, the Russian minister of war has abandoned the project of purchasing new rifles and has ordered the utmost despatch in filling old Berlin cartridges with smokeless powder. The Russian regiments in Finland will be transferred to the Austrian frontier and recruited by the Russian army. These measures are presumed to be due to the Austro-Serbian military speech.
