Soviet Government Practically Refuses League's Request,

It is altogether probable that the proposed mission to Soviet Russia-from the International Labor Office and the League of Nations will not visit that country for some time. The secretary of the League of Nalions has on various operations been a wireless communication with the Soviet Government at Moscow and the last reply to the league's note was practically a refusal to allow the on to visit Russia.

At a recent meeting of the Council of the League of Nations a reply was sent to the Russian Soviet Government as follows:

"The League of Nations regrets, that after a long delay the Russian Soviet Government has made the condition of an investigation by the league practically equivalent to refusal. The Soviet's endeavor to discriminate between delegates from the league's member nations.

"The league is an international organization siming at justice and peace. Its delegates represent the league not single states.

"The league still hopes the Soviet Government will modify its reply. If, before June 15, the Soviets do not accept the league request as formulated March 17, the council will throw upon the Soviets full responsibility for frustrating an effort inspired only by a desire for better international relations."

The Russian reply to the league note of March 17 said that while the Soviet Government would welcome a league investigating commission to enter its borders on which were representatives of nations at war with Russia, such as Poland. Aftogether, 4,585 children under sixteen years of age and employed in Montreal factories and elsewhere registered during the past two months by virtue of the Act passed by the Legislature at the last season, and which compels the registering of children workers.

The effect of this law, as carried out by the inspectors at Montreal is that if anyone under 15 years of age wishes to work, he or she must be able to read and write passably, or commence the task of learning at a night school. The law has not yet been enforced in other parts of the province to any degree, but it will now be pressed more vigerously.

One thousand Montreal sugar workers have struck for increases amounting to approximately 70 per cent, over the existing rates of pay. This strike, coming on top of a shortage of raw sugar, has led to the closing down of the plants of the St. Lawrence Sugar Refinerles and the Canada Sugar Refinerly. The employers have refused to consent to a board of conciliation, for which the men appealed to Ottawa, and the walk-out followed. They have offered the employes a minimum wage of 46 cents on a 56-hour week basis, with a promise of another increase inside of two months if the cost of living gets higher. Proportional Representation

(By David Blyth)

There are a great many things about proportional representation I do not understand, but there are two things about proportional representation I do not understand, but there are two things about the system that I do most thoroughly appreciate. One of these is that the vote of the individual citizen counts as it never did before.
