FOREIGN EXHIBITS Europe's Display at the Great World's Fair.

THE BRITISH EXCEL IN GENERAL

Many Evidences of Power, Wealth and Development-Fine Display of British Pottery and Antiques—Hatfield Hall Ban-quet Room—Showing in the Art Palace and Transportation Building. World's FAIR, July 6. — [Special.] — Having now had a glance at many features of the exposition I propose to take up in a short series of letters the exhibits made

here by the chief European countries and excel and are most interesting. In consideration of the displays of our cousins naturally come first. The Britons are our blood relations, they speak our tongue and they are, besides, the greatest people of the earth viewed from the standpoint of national importance, wealth, commerce and influence upon human affairs. In almost everything save the fine arts the British excel. Their manufactures lead British excel. Their maintactures lead the world in volume and in many lines in artistic excellence. In shipping they are without rivals, more than one-half of all the tonnage of the high seas sailing under the British flag. Had Britain made at this exposition an exhibit fully representative and worthy of her greatness and

wealth it would easily have been the first of the nations in this comparative object Unfortunately the British exhibit is not fully representative or altogether worthy. Sir James Dredge, one of the English commissioners, admits that it is not. And yet the display is so vast, contains so much missioners, admits that it is not. And yet the display is so vast, contains so much variety, so many evidences of power and wealth and development, that one almost stands against to think of what the British might have done had they done their best and greatest. Owing to the recent tariful egislation in this country British firms and individuals were not willing to incur heavy expenses for displays here, and the cuttery and other makers refused to do anything at all. The appropriation made by the British government was not commensurate with the importance of the occasion or the grandeur of British manufactures. It was only \$125,000 at first, or but one-third the appropriation made by the state of New York, and but one seventh that of the state of Illinois. Afterward this sum was increased to \$300,000, but this was less than half the appropriation made by the French government. Still, as I said a moment 200, the British display is enormous and interesting, no third the importance of the importance of the commissioners spent their money to good advantage. Without being pretentious anywhere they are everywhere in good form, and the British departments are among the richest and most interesting to be found in the exposition.

Here is a Shakespearenn vase, about three feet high, adorned with figures from the bard's plays, and the price is \$2,500. An Evangeline vase, so small that you could put it in your overcoat pocket, is held at \$350.

A game set of twelve pieces is marked \$350, and a dozen plates, illustrating Longfellow's Evangeline, and illustrating it most beautifully, are held at the snug sum of \$2,000, or \$150.60 per plate. Even this is not so costly as a royal Worcester dinner service of 134 pieces, spread out in all its dazzling array upon a table, with crepelamps and other decorations to emphasize its color and beauty, and marked \$5,000. As yet no rich American has come along to buy this noteworthy service, but a little As yet no rich American has come along to buy this noteworthy service, but a little rose-vase, about six inches high, has been sold eleven times at \$43. The British potters, like all foreign exhibitors here, brought over many duplicates of their wares, and are prepared to fill orders. Where they have no duplicates they will take orders for the very articles on exhibition and deliver them at the close of the apposition.

There is nothing finer in the exposition than this display of British pottery, though the Hatfield hall banqueting room, though the Hatfield hall banqueting room. attracts fully as much attention. Here is where the Briton takes us back to the days of the Richards and the Jameses and shows us the baronial magnificence which we have learnt most of through the delightful pages of Walter Scott. This banqueting hall from Hatfield hall was in use from 1605 to 1611, years in which Shake spears was in his prime and the England of royalty and blood was in its glory, no matter what the England of the masses was. The famous hall has been hand

was. The famous hall has been hand-somely and accurately reproduced. It gives us a glimpse of one of those interiors which we have read about. It has the elaborate carving in oak, the old armor, the great open fire-place with its dogs and leopards, the tankards, cups, chalices, flagons, ewers and other heavy silver arti-cles used on my lord's table, the pictures which he had on his walls, the minstrel gallery at one end of the hall and the mar-velous oak carving or screen at the other. gallery at one end of the hall and the mar-velous cak carving or screen at the other. All the antiques here are gengine, and all the carvings and modelings in plaster have been faithfully reproduced. The ceiling of this famous hall is flat, the first in-stance, it is said, of the use of a flat ceiling in Britain, all others having been gabled. One of these exhibitors shows a model of a nountain of billiard balls, and the figures or these exhibitors asows a model of a mountain of billiard balls, and the figures are interesting as showing the extent to which the gene of billiards seems to be played in Great Britain. In this one heap are 20,000 balls, worth \$80,000. It is the largest stock of idiliard balls in the world. Five balls are all that can be taken from each task, and this little mountain of ivery spheres represents the product of 2,000 elephants. The tasks of 1,140 elephants are used every year to supply billiard balls to this one manufacturer.

Two more pavilions in the Manufactures hall are worthy the attention of the visitor. Give is that of a soap firm, which shows a model of Windsor castle. It is 45 feet long and nearly 2 feet high, and the lawn surrounding it is defily represented by an arrangement of green balze. A chemical house has erected a pretty English shop, with dormer windows and lattice work outside and caken rafters showing within. It is like a bit of old England set down in our midst, and is very popular among wither.

Of course it is impossible for me in the space of a single letter to review this exhibits as a whole. The British have published their own catalogue of their exhibits, and it is a book of some 500 pages, which was printed in London. But there are a few features of the English show which may well attract our attention, and which will stand typical of the remainder, if the English excel in anything here it is in pottery. When we visit the large Manufactures building, and go to the clock tower which marks the center of that wonderful structure, we find the British and their colonies occupying practically all of the southwest quarter. 

RAPID POSTAL DELIVERY.

a Novel Automatic Device. Rapid postal delivery of letters and parcels is a subject attracting much attention just now in this country and abroad, and many inventors are devising plans to accom-

plish the purpose.

Postoffice authorities in London are ex-Postoffice authorities in London are experimenting with an automatic contrivance which was recently placed in front of the Royal Exchange. It consists of a box with an electric signal attachment.

By dropping a penny in a slot the purchaser obtains an envelope enclosing a smaller envelope and card, upon which the communication may be written. A small shelf falls in front of the box, at the same time, to serve as a desk, and an electric bell sounds in the nearest postoffice, calling a messenger to the box.

If it be desired to forward a parcel by express delivery the arrival of the messenger

press delivery the arrival of the messenger must be awaited, but a letter may be debe required to pay simply the difference.

If the sender requires a cab to be used the fare must be enclosed in the outer envelope, which has to be marked, "By cab."
