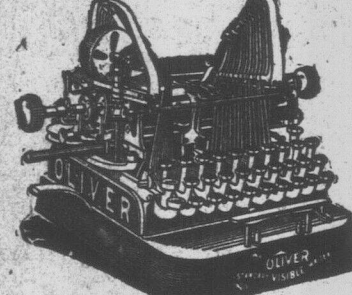

After having been welcomed by Dr. Milligan, Dr. Raymond, dean of the General Assembly, and of the stately Scotch character of the church, in that the individuals of it held such decided opinions and yet such broad opinions; witness the applause with which the Anglican delegation was received.

question of Church Unity. He said that while many members of the Assembly had been born across the seas yet he wished to voice the sentiment that there is growing loyalty to "Our Own Canadian Home."

THE PRYBETTERIAN church has done great work in consolidation of its forces, as has the Methodist church; and the speaker hoped that some day the liturgical churches would consider the question of union.

Rev. Mr. Richardson said that he was sorry that it had been impossible for the Presbyterian ministers to occupy Anglican pulpits but he said that, at present, Presbyterian ministers had taken the shure-going population of St. John from their usual haunts yesterday.

He spoke of the great missionary work being done in the Northwest; and said that until the Anglican church should assume the first place in the Protestant churches of Canada, he was glad to let the Presbyterian church occupy that position. (Laughter and applause.)

He urged catholicity of views in Christian faith; and if such should be accomplished, he prophesied for Canada a bright, virile future in national life. (Applause.)

Rev. J. de Soyres also spoke of a hope for church unity. First, however, he paid a high tribute to the late Rev. Principal Grant, who, he said, united himself "to the statement, the minister and theologian." (Applause.) Dr. Gordon said, in a worthy successor; but not knowing him so intimately as he had known Dr. Grant, he had Dr. Grant's personality ingrained so his memory inseparably with the success of Queen's University.

He said that he did not hope for un denominationalism, but peri-denominationalism. He pointed with gratification to the growing uniformity of Protestants on theological and Biblical subjects; and prayed for the continuation of it.

Mr. de Soyres' address was of a very striking character, and increased his audience's attention throughout.

Dr. Milligan made a short reply to the various speakers, agreeing with them in saying that organic union was not necessary; but intellectual uniformity in general theological issues is earnestly hoped for.

Meat on the Farm.

The regular monthly session of the Town Council was held Monday evening, Mayor Murdoch presiding.

The minutes were read and confirmed.

Much valuable information regarding the butchering, curing and keeping of meat is given in Farmers' Bulletin No. 183 of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, entitled "Meat on the Farm."

The author of the bulletin points out that in the selection of animals for meat health should be given first consideration.

SELECTION OF ANIMALS.

The author of the bulletin points out that in the selection of animals for meat health should be given first consideration.

It is not in perfect health the best quality of meat cannot be obtained. If suffering from fever, or like conditions all have the same effect on the meat as ill health, and unless the animal can be killed and dressed immediately after such accidents it is not best to use the meat for food.

First class meat cannot be obtained from animals that are poor in flesh. A reasonable amount of flesh must be present to give juiciness and flavor to the flesh, and the fatter an animal is, within reasonable limits, the better will be the meat. The presence of large amounts of fat is not essential, however, to wholesome meat and it is far more important that an animal be in good health than that it be extremely fat.

It is not wise to kill an animal that is in poor health, as the muscle fibres are shrinking in volume. As a consequence the meat is tougher and drier. When an animal is gaining in flesh the opposite condition obtains and a better quality of meat is the result. Also a better product will be obtained from an animal in only medium flesh but gaining rapidly than from a very fat animal that is at a standstill, or losing in flesh.

The War.

LONDON, June 4.—The Rome correspondent of the Central News telegraphs a Tokio despatch to Giornale which says that the Japanese have occupied the first line of the outer fortifications of Port Arthur after a feeble resistance.

LONDON, June 4.—No further light has been thrown on the mysterious rumors concerning Kurapatkin's intentions. Despatches to the Morning Post from Shanghai and to the Chronicle from New Chwang repeat the reports of the movement of 15,000 Russians to Kiopien.

The correspondents assert that five days' fighting took place at Wafnegiang and that the Russians are employing 4,000 carts to remove munitions from Liao Yang to Kai Yuen, seventy miles north of Mukden.

The Morning Post's Shanghai correspondent says General Misteplenko has sent 4,000 cavalry of the Imperial guard from Kuang Chang Tai to cut off the Japanese at Eiyewo. No great reliance, however, should be placed in these despatches.

LIAO YANG, June 3.—There are persistent rumors that another great battle is in progress near Port Arthur; continuous cannonading has been heard from the south.

An additional force of 15,000 Japanese is reported to have landed at Takushan.

CHIEF, June 3.—Steamers which have arrived here from New Chwang, report that firing in the vicinity of Port Arthur was heard last night. They saw only two cruisers. Two junks which have reached this port from the Cha river, west of Taku-Shan, report that the Japanese have captured two Russian officers and forty soldiers disguised as Japanese.

TOKIO, June 3.—A body of Japanese encountered and defeated a mixed force of Russian cavalry, infantry and artillery near Lichon, nine miles north of Polandien, on Monday last, May 30. The engagement began at 12.30 p. m., and lasted for two hours, the Russian troops finally being driven northward. The Japanese had one officer and eight men killed, and four officers and thirty-three men wounded. The Russian losses are unknown. The movement of the Russian forces southward indicates a possible effort to relieve Port Arthur.

SEOUL, June 3, 7.30 a. m.—The Japanese consul at Gensan reports a Russian advance on Koyuen, twenty-two miles north of Gensan. Their commissariat has arrived at Puk Sheng. For some months there has been a diplomatic correspondence between China and Korea over the boundary in Kantow Island, at a month's end of the Tumen river. It has finally been decided to request the Chinese Government to agree to arbitration.

Activities appear to have ceased for the last few days, although there are the usual unconfirmed reports of vessels being sunk and minor engagements between Russian and Japanese troops. The next important news expected is that of the intended direct attack on Port Arthur.

When asked by Mr. Flood where the rest of the apparatus was the defendant showed him into a closet where were a few tin cans, a few tin cans, these were the marks of fire on their bottoms and were taken along with samples of the beer and wash. Fire at Deaktown. About one o'clock on Wednesday morning, 1st inst., the progressive little village of Deaktown was visited by a fire which destroyed the station and freight house, causing a loss in the neighborhood of \$10,000. The buildings wiped out were the large wood working factory of Henry and Frank B. Smith and the Canada Eastern Railway station and freight house. It seems that the fire broke out in the engine room of the factory, which is located directly opposite the station, about one o'clock a.m. and soon the building was in flames. The fire spread rapidly and turned out on a mass, but as the place was without fighting apparatus they were powerless to save the building or its contents. All of the machinery and large stock of saw lumber were totally destroyed.
