

TOKIO, Feb. 7.—In any consideration of the question of national finance in Japan it is necessary to have some knowledge of the underlying economic conditions. With this knowledge one may appreciate the difficulties which confronted Marquis Katsura in the framing of this year's budget.



## SUED EMPLOYERS FOR INJURY FROM FLEA BITE

The Way the Compensation Act Works Out ---Judge Gravely Considered

The legal adage de minimis non cur-at lex was apparently reversed in the Glamorgan county court held at Cardiff, Wales, yesterday when a work-man sued his employers for compensa-tion for injuries sustained while put-ting in a shop front, the injuries being the result of a flea bite. The claimant's the result of a fiea bite. The claimant's solicitor asked for an adjournment, as he said his client was ill. The judge granted the adjournment, but was informed immediately that the claimant had been seen in the neighborhood of the court. Thereupon the judge called the case again and gave judgment for the defendants on the ground that the man might have been carrying the fiea for half an hour before he went to work.

"If examinations were made of everyone, people would be surprised at the number of persons walking about suffering from heart disease."

This startling statement was made by a doctor at a recent inquest. "I should not like to say that heart disease is as common as this would imply," said the expert, "but I am sure that the number of persons going about with weak hearts must be very large."






