London, April 13-The British line is holding and the Ger man drive west of Armentieres has been checked. Today's news of the fighting in the north is highly encouraging but the situation remains extremely grave. Along the whole battlefront, running from Hollebeke to Lo Bassee, the terrific battle rages with both sides adding fresh reinforcements hourly. A straight line drawn from Merville to Wytschaete gives the approximate positions on the northern patr of the front. From Merville it takes a circular shape to Festubert. The enemy is pressing his attacks on the flanks. Haig reports severe fighting in the neighborhood of Wulverssen and southwest of Messines. Here the fighting has continued without pause for the last sixty hours. The British still hold Bailleul, an important railroad and highway center. Another terrific struggle has been raging around Locon and directly north of Bethune, which is an important center for the British. The Merville portion of the front has been the scene of heavy fighting but the attacks there have been far less powerful than those on the flanks.

Men from United States Withstands Series of Persistent Onslaughts.

The Americans Defeat Enemy Decisively in Every Style of Fighting.

The entire allied line in Belgium and France is holding firm. Nowhere have the Germans been able, notwithstanding the great numbers of men hurled against it, especially that portion in Flanders where the British are holding forth, to gain an inch of ground. Field Marshal Haig's order that no more ground be ceded is rigidly being compiled with as is attested by the thermal of the man deed now lying before the British positions southwest of Ypres, where it is the ambition of the high German command to break through and envelop, Field Marshal Haig's forces and gain an open highway toward the English Channel.

Northwest of St. Miniel the American troops have been compelled to withstand a series of persistent assaults, second in intensity only to those delivered by the Germans against the British in Flanders. And the honors at the end rested with the Americans, who met the foe at every style of fighting he offered and decisively defeated him.

Along the front held by the French Sunday saw nothing of greater importance than reciprocal bombardments on various sectors, the troops of both sides remaining in their trenches. Likewise in Italy the big guns were doing most of the work, although at several points enemy patrois attempted to carry out diversions but met with no success.

Huns Beaten Back.

A determined assault on the British defences in the region of Festubert have been beaten back. British and French reserves are reported to have arrived in the battle area in considerable numbers. That they have been badly needed is shown by the fact that the Fifty First Scotch division, which saved the day on the Somme, had a similar task to face on the Armentieres front. It is too early to judge even the present situation without attempting to forecast future developments. The enemy is unpleasantly close to Bailleui and has made a serious indentation south of Messines Ridge. The British hold exceedingly strong natural defences, they are commanded by a General who knows every inch of Messines Ridge, but the enemy's attack carries considerable momentum and he is short of neither men nor guns. He is less than thirty miles fron Duntirk and that is the goal on the attainment of which he has set his mind.

THE BRITISH REMAIN IN THE POSSESSION OF NEUVE EGLISE

London, April 14—The Germans continue their powerful at-tacks against the British line in Flanders. The town of Neuve Eglise, an important strategical point, which has changed hands several times, remains in possession of the British, Field Marshal Haig's report tonight says.

The statement follows: "At the close of many hours of obstinate fighting during the night and again this morning, about Neuve Eglise our troops remained in possession of the village. The enemy's attacks in this sector have been pressed with great determination and his losses throughout have been heavy. Today the enemy renewed his attempts to gain possession of the village and the fighting continues.

REVIEW OF PROGRESS OF WAR DURING LAST WEEK

situation Still Serious Nevertheless-British Army Has Been Attacked by Double its Number of Enemy Divisions Supported by Enormous Mass of Artillery of all Natures-Less Activity in Air Last Week on Western Front Owing to Broken Weather.

London, April 13.—During the week ending April 11, the fighting for Amiens and the railway to Saint Just resulted in very little change, the chief alteration of this front being further east where the French retired from an awkward salient southward of La Fere made by the old and new lines. North of Arras the enemy advanced appreciably. On the eighth a violent bombardment of the line between La Bassee and Armentiers seemed to indicate an attack but it did not develop. OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY CHARGES AGAINST On the ninth, however, an attack was launched on a fifteer thousand yard front aiming at the Portuguese division in the centre with a British division on either side. The wings at Givenchy and Fleurbaix held, but the enemy, assisted by a thick mist, forced their way through the center and penetrat-

ed beyond the rivers Lys and Lawe. Givenchy was taken on the tenth and later retaken by the fifty-fifth division with seven hundred and fifty German prisoners.

A further attack was made north of Armentieres between a point east of that town and Garde Dieu, north of Messines. On the Messines front the enemy was checked but further south he penetrated the British lines, capturing Ploegsteert Wood. Salients were therefore driven op both flanks of Armentieres, which made the retention of that ruined town inadvisable.

The Enemy's Aim.

Vimy is the stronghold which more than any other blocks his way west and since Arras holds firm he has tried to win his way to the rear of Vimy Ridge through Givenchy, thence to Bethune.

Although there is no sign of a cessation of the enemy's offensive against Amiens, which he renewed in due course, it is clear his main effort was checked and his second effort north of the Somme being also completely repulsed, he is now diverting attention from the main front, to which he will ultimately return with all the forces available.
