# OBITUARIES.

#### JOHN CHAPPLE.

The Rev. John Chapple was born in 1811, in the village of Black Dog, Devonshire, England, His advantages for the attainment of an education were few and poor. But the Divine Spirit created in his soul a hunger for knowledge, and for its attainment no opportunity was allowed to pass unimproved. And the quickening influences of Methodism, in its spiritual and intellectual aspects, were felt also in a wonderful degree in the community where Mr. Chapple was born and brought up. Few men have possessed a better physical constitution than Mr. Chapple. In early life, while learning his trade, he was thoroughly converted to God. Every power of his being felt the mighty change wrought by the creative energy of the Holy Spirit, and from henceforth he belonged to God.

Soon after his conversion he began to exhort, and in 1834, from the Ringsash Circuit, one of the choicest spirits was received as a probationer for the ministry. The Conference at which he was received as a probationer was held at Langtree; and in 1837, under the presidency of the Rev. Wm. Reed, the Conference being again held at Langtree, he was

received into full connection.

Seventeen years of his ministerial life were spent in England, where he travelled upon the following circuits: Weare, Somerton, St. Austell, Meragissey, Truro, Devonport and London. In 1851, he left England for Cleveland, Ohio, where he spent six years of arduous, but divinely-owned and successful toil. In 1857 Mr. Chapple came to Canada; but before leaving Cleveland, in 1856, he married as his second wife Miss Sarah Bailey, who, as Rev. G. Webber has well said, "proved one of the best wives God ever gave to any man."

In Canada, Mr. Chapple travelled on the Bowmanville, Cobourg, Peterboro', Charlottetown, P.E.I., West Cape, P.E.I., and Ingersoll cir-

cuits.

Twice he occupied the presidential chair of the Canadian Conference, and received, as he deserved, every token of respect and mark of esteem

which it was in the power of his brethren to confer upon him.

One who was his friend for nearly fifty years thus speaks of him in the Bible Christian Magazine: "I first heard Mr. Chapple preach nearly fifty years ago. A chance acquaintance was then formed, which in due course ripened into a sincere and fast friendship, which I have for long years prized as one of the choicest blessings of my life. Mr. Chapple was another Nathaniel. He came nearer than most of his fellow-disciples to his Master, who was holy, guileless, undefiled, separate from sinners—that is, in those particulars in which it is at once most essential and most difficult to be like Him. Mr. Chapple was a good rather than a great man, unless unfeigned humility and the sweetest content be the essence of all true greatness. He was moulded after the likeness of 'the disciple whom Jesus loved.' He, therefore, 'by childlike love,' reached more easily than some to loftier conceptions of truth and duty, and sounded

more quickly than they the profounder depths of Christian experience and enjoyment. He greatly rejoiced with Augustine that the first thing in religion is humility, the second also, and the third. He gladly heeded the exhortation, 'Let this mind be in you which was also in 'Christ Jesus.' This was the secret of his usefulness and the spring of his contentment."

Rev. George Webber, writing of him in the Christian Guardian, says:

"Mr. Chapple's life was exceptionally blameless, his spirit fervent and deveut, his time diligently and faithfully employed. He served the Lord with all his ransomed powers. A more God-fearing, conscientious,

upright man has never adorned the annals of the Connexion."

"His death was sudden and painless," says his son, Mr. W. R. Chapple, "just as he would have had it," if the choice had been left to him.

On the first Sunday in September, 1896, he preached in the Irving Street Church, Cleveland (which stands on the same site as that of the first Bible Christian Church erected by him more than forty years ago), for the last time, and administered the Sacrament. It was a season of real joy to all present, and the beautiful close to a gracious and soulquickening ministry, which extended to more than sixty years. He was in his place at the church three times on the following Sunday, and the minister then engaged him to preach the next Sunday. On the Monday he was about as usual, the next day he felt slightly indisposed, and on Wednesday morning, September 16, not caring to take his breakfast, Mrs. Chapple handed him something in a cup; and she had only just gone into another room before she heard the cup fall, and, rushing in, found him lying backward with his hands thrown over his head. Two doctors came almost immediately, but his spirit had already fled to God who gave it. Thus did God give this true bishop of our Church sleep.

One who attended the funeral says that he never attended a funeral at which there appeared to be so much real grief felt by everyone, old and

young alike vividly realizing that they had lost a true friend.

"Life's labor done, as sinks the clay, Light from its load the spirit flies; While heaven and earth combine to say, How blest the righteous when he dies!"

#### JOHN MACK COLLINS.

The subject of this memoir was born in the township of Wainfleet, in Niagara District, on the first day of February, 1814. He was the youngest of seven children. On the 26th of June, 1830, he was soundly converted to God, and as he thus remembered his Creator in the days of his youth, being then only sixteen years of age, he found religion to be an unspeakable blessing to him all through his long life. Two years after his conversion he was licensed as an exhorter in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in that capacity travelled many a weary mile through storm and calm, and often on foot, to carry the "Glad Tidings" of salvation to the new settlement around.

Hannah Hodges, eldest daughter of Mr. Edmund Hodges, and found her a helpmeet indeed during many years of their earthly pilgrimage. For some years he was engaged in the mercantile business in the village of Canboro', but in the latter part of 1849 and 1850, and part of 1851 he assisted Revs. R. B. Cook and N. F. Lowe on the Canboro' Circuit, and in 1852 entered the regular work of the ministry in the old Niagara Conference of the M. E. Church. He travelled the following circuits: Canboro', Kincardine, Orangeville, Eramosa, Teeswater, Stanley, Oakland, Bosanquet, Southwold, Nissouri, Rondeau and Florence.

In 1887, feeling the infirmities of age creeping on, he felt it necessary to retire from the active work which he loved so well. After his retirement he resided in Florence for several years, and in Thedford some four years, in both of which places he preached occasionally, and in various

ways rendered good service to the Master.

At the August Quarterly Meeting in Thedford he assisted the pastor in the love-feast and in the administration of the Sacrament, and greatly enjoyed the service. A few weeks after this he took cold, which, thought trivial at first, soon developed into a serious form, and after declaring to his pastor his abiding faith in Christ, and that he would soon be home with the glorified throng in heaven, he peacefully passed away on Thursday, September 10th, 1896, at the age of 82 years, 7 months and 8 days.

Rev. Dr. Webster, of Newbury, who was his Presiding Elder during a part of Bro. Collins' ministry, says: "Both as a local preacher and as a probationer I considered him a diligent student, and in subsequent years a man of varied reading. He was a careful administrator of Discipline, a close reasoner, and a preacher of more than average ability, and gener-

ally acceptable on the circuits to which he was sent."

As his funeral was on the Sabbath day it was impossible for many of the ministers from adjoining circuits to be present. The funeral services were largely attended. Addresses were delivered by Revs. G. Jackson, President of London Conference, Edwin Holmes his pastor, and Mr. Tyler, and the material remains were laid in the grave-yard near Thedford to await the resurrection of the just.

#### REV. JOSEPH HILL.

Son of James and Margaret Hill, was born in Ireland in 1815. He came to Canada with his parents in 1831, and settled in the township of Montague. He was convicted of sin under a sermon preached by Rev. Thos. Bevett, in 1837, and was converted a short time afterwards in a prayer-meeting held in his father's house. The same year he obtained the blessing of entire sanctification. He united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church shortly after his conversion, and during the six years that followed had never been absent from the regular means of grace.

His stirling qualities of character and eminently spiritual life were early recognized by the Church, and on May 6th, 1843, he was licensed as an exhorter. The following May he was licensed to preach; and in June of the same year he entered as a probationer in the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. During his probation he was stationed at Cornwall, Bath, Barrie, Grimsby, and Adelaide. He was received into

full connection and ordained on June 9th, 1850. After his ordination he travelled the following circuits: Wallaceburg, Proton, Bruce Mines, Durham, Artemesia, Lanark, Grenville, Lochabar, Thurso, Chambly, Chatsworth, Port Elgin, Norwood, Millbank, Oil Springs, and Port Lambton, where, after three years, he closed his long and successful active ministry, superannuating in 1879.

He resided in Port Lambton until 1893, when he removed to Brighton,

where he spent the closing years of his life.

During his early ministry he was regarded as a revivalist of considerable power. He had many gracious outpourings of the Spirit on his circuits, and numbers were converted. He regarded it an unspeakable honor to preach the Gospel of the Son of God. He felt keenly the responsibilities of the work, and looked for the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. As a preacher he was original, clear, logical and convincing, and often preached under the special unction of the Holy Ghost, and quite frequently in the early days of his ministry there were weeping souls

prostrate on the floor crying for mercy during the sermon.

He excelled as a pastor. Frequently visiting from house to house, he sought to win sinners to Christ and to incite all to greater earnestness. His faithfulness in the work and his keen interest in all that concerned his flock won for him the confidence and love of his people. His ministrations to the sick and bereaved were especially tender and comforting. He took a special interest in the young people, to whom he was always most approachable and loving. He was especially kind and helpful to his colleagues, and followed their subsequent career with loving interest. Their attachment for him in his old age was a beautiful expression of the warm friendship his noble qualities had awakened. At least seven young men converted under his ministry afterwards entered the active ministerial ranks of the Methodist Church.

His first marriage was with Miss Mary A. Paups, who died about two years afterward. They had one child, who is now the wife of Rev. E. L. Walker, Meaford, Ont. His second marriage was with Miss Eliza Munn, of Kerwood, who was a beautiful-spirited woman and most helpful companion. They had three daughters and four sons. The eldest son, Joseph S. Hill, is now an honored minister in the Detroit Conference of the

M. E. Church.

During the last few years of his life Brother Hill was afflicted with deafness. This made it difficult to carry on a sustained conversation. This led him to retire within himself, and he lived much in the cherished memories of the past.

He was anxious to preach as long as his physical ability would permit, and even preached when he had to sit down to finish the discourse.

After a few days' illness, which was not supposed to be serious, he passed away very unexpectedly on the morning of January 14th, 1897.

A well-attended and very impressive funeral service was held in the Methodist church, Brigden, conducted by the pastor, Rev. T. R. McNair. Rev. Joshua Stansfield, a special friend of the family, preached from 2nd Timothy iv. 7, 8. Rev. Joseph Stinson, an old friend of the deceased, also delivered on address, after which the remains of the departed brother were conveyed to Lakeview Cemetery, Sarnia, and laid away to await the resurrection of the just.

# SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending July 31st, 1896.

A reduction of 6 per cent. on all claims has been found necessary in view of the prospective deficiency growing out of the largely increased number of ministerial claimants.

Notwithstanding this, the balance against the Annual Fund at the beginning of the year has been increased from \$7,221.62 to \$11,930.

The receipts from Circuits are \$9,326.16 less, and from ministers \$10,979.35 more than last year.

Unforeseen expenditure over the estimates on claims, refunds, interest on last year's balance, and over-drafts of \$2,146, and shortage in estimated receipts of \$2,208, together amount to \$4,354.

The contributions to capital account this year amount to \$5,180.

W. S. GRIFFIN, Treasurer .-

The Board regrets that notwithstanding an increase of \$2,535 in the annual income, and a discount of 6 per cent. in the payment of annuities, there is for the current year a deficit of \$4,709. This is partially accounted for by the large number of ministers and probationers (mostly probationers) who, on the 31st of July, had failed to pay their annual subscriptions. The Board looks to the chairmen of Districts and to the Conference Treasurers to correct this growing neglect of Discipline.

The most serious feature in the Report is the abnormal increase in the number of ministerial claimants. In two years past the annuity claims have increased by \$10,000, and for the current year over \$4,000, rendering necessary a painful reduction of 10 per cent. in the payment of annuities.

The Board is helpless to control the number of ministers placed on the Fund, and appeals to the Annual Conferences to check the ruinous policy of receiving more probationers than are needed to fill vacancies by death and superannuation and the actual growth of our work, which policy inevitably throws many older men prematurely on the Fund.

# BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The annual meeting of the Board of Examiners for the London Conference was held in the City Hall, Petrolia, April 20th, 21st and 22nd. The Board instructed the Secretary to communicate to the Stationing Committee and the Secretaries of Conference what titles are to be admitted into the official records.

The election of members to compose the Examining Board shall take place by a ballot taken in the Conference, the thirteen highest names being a nomination from whom ten shall be chosen by a second ballot.

In view of the great International Epworth League Convention to be held in Toronto next July 15th to 18th inclusive, we would urge all honorary-presidents to advise all Leagues to send as many representatives as possible, and would exhort every one to do what he can to make that

event a splendid success.

We would commend to our young people the eminent desirability of generally using the Epworth League Topics for prayer-meeting services, and would respectfully suggest to the proper authorities the advisability of a larger proportion of the space allotted in the Guardian and Onward being devoted to brief comments and contributions from various authors upon the weekly topic, as well as the more extended article from one writer, so as to be more generally adapted to the varied requirements of our many different Leagues.

Your Committee is of the opinion that it is important-

(1) To have a regular programme for each meeting.

(2) To occasionally instruct our young people in the official and dis-

ciplinary methods of our Church.

(3) To encourage them to give a living, personal testimony and Christian experience in the consecration meetings, instead of simply reading or quoting a passage of Scripture or a verse of a hymn, which tends to convert it into the nature of a Quotation Society.

We recognize the great advantage the different committees of our Leagues may be to the pastor, and would remind our ministers of the benefits of employing every committee and especially the Lookout and

Evangelistic committees for the promotion of Christian work.

We would reaffirm the clauses of last year's report recommending more general support of the Epworth League General Fund and the Educational Fund by our young people's societies.

Your Committee recommend that the Conference schedule of the young

people's societies be printed in the Annual Conference Minutes.

#### STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee present a report which in many respects is encouraging, but in other features presents facts which call for increased effort and watchfulness on the part of our ministers and people.

From many of the fields come tidings of successful evangelistic services, in some cases held by the pastors alone and in others assisted by worthy consecrated evangelists.

Although there has been a total removal of 5,120 of our membership,

yet we are able to report a net increase of 1,358.

We regret to note a decrease in the average attendance of the officers and teachers and also in the attendance of the scholars attending our Sunday Schools. We are pleased, however, to find an increase of 146 in the number of scholars studying the catechism and 1,126 in the number who have taken the total abstinence pledge.

Our connexional funds have been well sustained, considering the prevailing financial depression, there being an increase of over \$2,000 beyond

the previous year.

We rejoice in the growing prosperity of our young people's work. Forty-three new societies, seven of which are junior leagues, have been formed during the year, the increase in membership being 1,624. We wish specially to call attention to the development of missionary interest among our young people, there having been an increase of \$303.89 in their offerings to the Missionary Society for the year.

Instead of formulating specific admonitions, your Committee would recommend each pastor to the exercise of a wise generalship and a consecrated zeal for the promotion of the Master's work and for the glory of

Him whose we are and whom we serve.

Your Committee beg leave to report:

That we have considered the memorials received from several districts in respect to a Dominion plebiscite on the question of Prohibition, expressing the opinion that this question should not be complicated with any other issue. We are fully in accord with this judgment, and declare it to be our opinion that, no matter what issue may grow out of this question, the only honorable way for the Government to present the issue to the electorate is to give the people an opportunity to give an affirmative or negative reply to the query, "Are you in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic in the Dominion of Canada?" inasmuch as it is in accord with the sentiments expressed by the Hon. Mr. Laurier, when a deputation from this Conference waited upon him at Stratford, June, 1896, at which time he said, in regard to the question of a plebiscite vote, "Up to this moment this question has never been approached by the electors free from other considerations; whenever it has been submitted to the electors it has always been submitted along with other questions that

affect the public mind. We deem it wise to separate it from all other considerations and test public feeling on the matter, and that we shall dowhen we come into office, as I believe we shall," and that a memorial to this effect be presented to the Government.

2. We are pleased to know that the House of Commons has seen fit to abolish the bar within the precincts of the House, as we do not consider the presence of liquor any advantage to our legislators, and we may be permitted to express the hope that the Senate will follow the commendable example furnished by the members of the House of Commons.

3. We believe that the Prohibition question can never reach its ultimate legal solution till we have in power, both in Dominion and Provincial houses, Governments willing not only to make pledges, but to honorably fulfil them; and we also believe that the policy of political expediency, so long adopted in dealing with this momentous issue, is responsible for incalculable evil, both to the citizen and the State, and is the outcome and direct result of the politician's belief in the Christian voter's insincerity; and while we are glad to note, in the legislation of the past session of the Ontario House, some small advance upon previous enactments, such as raising the age limit from 18 to 21, the slight reduction in the total number of licenses in the Province, and additional restrictions upon the liquor trade of druggists, we must express ourselves as gravely and seriously dissatisfied with such a response to the people's mandate, given in the Ontario plebiscite, and to the Government's pledges, voiced by two Premiers. Of the twenty-three reasonable requests made by the temperance people, the four following-sweeping reduction of licenses, seven o'clock closing, provision for the cancelling of old licenses and the prevention of new ones-call for our special endorsement, and would have been, if granted, a direct and serious blow to the liquor traffic and an advance step worthy of our hearty commendation.

4. We would remind our ministers and people that it will be necessary to make every preparation for the approaching struggle, by an intelligent study of the whole question of the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic; and in order to the development of a proper sentiment amongst our young people, and that this may be more readily accomplished we urge our Epworth League and other young people's societies to take charge of the total abstinence work in our Sunday Schools, and we specially appeal to officers and teachers in our schools to set an example to their scholars

by first signing the pledge themselves.

5. We must never forget that the mere passing of the prohibition vote will be insufficient, that behind it there must be the determined will of an intelligent people; and while we recognize the liberty of each individual member of our Church to do as he sees fit in this matter, we can scarcely conceive how an enlightened Christian voter can do other than support all measures of restriction or prohibition of the liquor traffic.

6. We have also received communications from F. S. Spence, Secretary of Dominion Alliance, in regard to a convention of Ontario prohibitionists in Toronto, July 13th, asking for delegates to be sent from our churches and young people's societies. We commend his request to our membership, and hope our people will heartily co-operate with this and every organization, local or general, having in view the attainment of this desirable end, the total prohibition of the liquor traffic in our Dominion.

In regard to a request from the same source asking that four representatives be sent from this Conference to the annual meeting of the council of the Dominion Alliance, held in the city of Toronto, July 14th, we recommend that two ministers and two laymen be appointed to represent this Conference at that meeting.

7. In respect to the suggestion of the Ontario W.C.T.U., that the last Sunday of November be set apart as Temperance Sunday, we recommend that such arrangement be made, and would call the attention of our ministers to par. 470, sec. ix., p. 228 of our Discipline in respect to this

matter.

We also hope that the General Conference Temperance Committee will take active measures as directed by the General Conference, p. 227, sec. ix., par. 469 of Discipline.

# (A.) CONSTITUTION OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

#### A STREET STATES T. NAME. Colorotte Securition of the

The name of the Fund shall be the Sustentation Fund of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

# II.—Овјест.

The object of the Fund shall be to supplement the amount paid by any circuit for ministerial support where this amount is considered to be insufficient to meet the requirements of the minister for the current year, in accordance with par. 468, sec. 8 of the Discipline.

# III.—INCOME.

The Fund shall be maintained by collections and contributions taken annually in the month of March at the morning, afternoon and evening public services in all our congregations on every circuit and mission throughout the Conference, and by bequests and donations; and each minister shall bring the matter fairly before his people and earnestly endeavor to secure for it their liberal support.

## IV.—CLAIMANTS.

Any minister on a circuit whose income from all sources whatsoever is deemed insufficient to meet his requirements for the current year shall be entitled to make a claim upon this Fund; but only in special cases shall any claim be considered where such income exceeds for married ministers the sum of \$600 per annum, for single ordained ministers \$250, and for probationers \$200.

# V.-MANAGEMENT.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed
of one minister and one layman from each district, elected by ballot by
the annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected
by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee.

This committee shall meet and consider the claim upon the Fund at such a time as will enable the secretary-treasurer to distribute to the several claimants the funds in hand during the sessions of the Conference.

3. No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the May District Meeting immediately preceding such distribution.

4. The Financial District Meeting shall each year inquire into the financial condition of each circuit reported as having paid less than \$600 the previous year, and, if deemed necessary, a special deputation shall be appointed to visit their Quarterly Board, so as, if possible, to develop a more liberal support of their minister.

5. No minister or probationer shall be entitled to any claim upon the Fund upon whose circuit the appointed contributions to the support of

the Fund have not been taken.

6. The Committee shall present a report to the Conference annually, including an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any

suggestion deemed necessary in the interests of the Fund.
7. And your Committee would respectfully suggest, that for the present year the Conference proceed to elect a secretary-treasurer, without nomination, from the Sustentation Fund Committee, and that the Rev. J. R. Gundy be so appointed.

#### (B.) REGULATIONS FOR THE CONTINGENT FUND.

All claims upon this Fund for special affliction must be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting, and also by the itemized and receipted bills for the same.

2. All claims upon this Fund for extraordinary services incurred in the services of the Church must likewise be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting.

Your Committee on Memorials would respectfully report as follows:

1. The following recommendations are strongly urged by your Committee:

1. That we deplore the fact that some of our schools are still using American Sunday School publications, and that as these papers are anti-Canadian and anti-British in sentiment, and tend to the disintegration of our national and Church loyalty, we therefore recommend that strong efforts be made in all our Sunday Schools to supplant these papers by our own publications, which we believe to be, in the interest of Church and State, the very best and cheapest published.

2. That greater attention be given in all our schools to the study of the Methodist catechism, that our Sabbath School scholars may become more familiar with the cardinal truths of the Holy Scriptures, as understood and taught by the Methodist Church, and that as pastors and teachers we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to secure the end desired.

3. That the pledge against the use of cigarettes, tobacco and alcoholic stimulants be introduced in all our schools where it is not already introduced, and that the most strenuous efforts be made to stamp out these blighting and demoralizing evils.

# SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee report as follows: We recognize the fact that the Lord's Day is of divine appointment for the benefit of man, and is inseparably connected with our civil, social and religious prosperity. It is with gratitude that we dwell upon the fact that among all the colonies of the British Empire none have been more law-abiding in this particular than our beloved Dominion. It is, however, a cause of regret that the trend of the times is toward laxity.

We very deeply deplore the result of the vote on Sunday street cars in Toronto, and would encourage the Christian people of that city to keep up their organization and be unrelaxing in their efforts to preserve the sacredness of the Lord's Day; and as many rising towns and cities may be contemplating the introduction of electric cars, we recommend that they follow the example of the city of London, whose wisdom and foresight we commend in making it a fundamental part of the agreement with the company supplying the electric plant, that cars are not to be run on the

We trust that every effort will be made by our great railway corporations to reduce the Sunday labor connected with these to a minimum, and will expect our people to do all in their power to bring about this end. It might be suggested that our people make their purchases early on Saturday, so that our merchants may be able to close their establishments at a reasonable hour, and their employees be not compelled to violate

God's day, or be unfit for its devotions.

We are pleased to learn that since last Conference many of the cheese factories have ceased to manufacture on the Sabbath, and would ask our

people to do all within their power to entirely check this evil.

We commend the action of the Hon, John Charlton in his endeavors to secure reforms in Sabbath observance, and regret that his efforts have not received the support they should in the House of Commons. But as Sunday newspapers are being brought over from Detroit, Buffalo and other points in the United States, we are pleased to know that there is a strong consensus of opinion in the Senate and House of Commons insuring the passage of a bill in the near future prohibiting the entrance and sale of Sunday newspapers from across the lines.

We would still continue to exhort our people to avoid and discountenance the turning of the Lord's Day into a day of pleasure-taking, whether through the use of the bicycle, visiting, or in any other way. And we would urge that steps be taken to stop the landing of Sunday excursions from the other side on Walpole Island, as it surrounds our Indian population with immoral influences, and is a source of temptation to violate

God's command concerning this day.

In full sympathy with those who through the years have endeavored to maintain the sanctity of our Sabbath, your Committee would recommend that our ministers preach at least one sermon during the year, combating the teaching of those who do not accept the Lord's Day, and seeking to impress upon the minds of our people the importance of guarding with greatest care the sacred day.

# REPORTS OF COLLEGES.

# REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

To the President and members of the London Conference.

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—I have much pleasure, on behalf of the Regents and Senate of your University, in submitting to you the following report of our work during the year just closing:

Our net enrolment of students has reached the number of 282, an increase of 29 on last year. This enrolment has been distributed as follows: Arts, 226; Theology, 158; less counted in both faculties, 102; net enrolment, 282. Of this number 34 are completing the B.A. course, and 24 have completed one of the three prescribed curricula in theology. Of these 13, or more than one-half, have already graduated, or are proceeding to graduation in Arts as well as in Theology. We are thus, we believe, securing to our rising ministry an intellectual training not inferior to that required by any other branch of the Christian Church in our country.

We are able also to report that the work of our theological school is extending itself quite beyond the training of candidates for our ministry. Probably nearly one-third of the students enrolled this year are not specifically preparing for that work. Quite a number are deaconesses seeking a thorough training in religious knowledge to prepare them for the work to which they have consecrated their lives. Others are young men, and even more largely young women, supplementing their Arts course by Biblical and other Christian studies which will fit them for the most intelligent Christian work in the days to come. These studies embrace the wide range of the English Bible, Biblical History, the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, Church History, Christian Ethics, Apologetics and Theistic Philosophy. The selection of these studies is optional, so that no candidate for an Arts degree is forced to take them. But as a matter of fact, the greater part of our graduates in Arts pursue these studies for either one or both the years in which they are prescribed. In this way our curriculum under Federation is quite as distinctly marked by the impress of Christian teaching as it was when we formed it independently.

The important subject of a refined Christian home for our young women students has been taken up by an organization of Christian women, who will ask your sympathy and assistance in this important

work, and this we are sure they will abundantly receive.

We will venture once more to ask your co-operation in directing all our young people who are seeking a university education to our own college. There are still strong influences used to divert them in other We have watched the course of those who have been so led, and have found that they are often diverted from the Church in which they first found spiritual life, or else decline in that life and step aside from their original Christian consecration. We feel certain we can offer them every advantage to be had in any other college in our country and combined with moral and religious influences which will make them strong in spiritual as well as intellectual life.

# WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of last

year's work and of the present position of the institution.

Number of students in Arts, full course, 10 (others as partial students take more or less work in McGill University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 15; for the degree of B.D., 21; for the Conference

Course, 18. Total enrolled, 64.

Rev. Principal Shaw, D.D, LL.D., lectures in Systematic Theology, Greek Testament and Church Polity; Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., in Apologetics and Homiletics; and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., B.D., Bursar, in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., having completed a Post-Graduate Course in Oriental Literature, in Leyden and Heidelberg, will resume his work in that department, as well as in Latin Patristics, next session.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference requirements in the new course for probationers or for pursuing the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in divinity leading to the degree of B.D. Copies of calendar containing full informa-

tion as to curricula, etc., may be obtained from the registrar.

The Endowment Fund is now \$75,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$4,000. The boarding department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000. The need is urgent for enlargement of buildings, for increased accommodation in dormitories, lecture rooms and convocation hall.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund, is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

Students from Alma are in mission work in Africa, China, Japan, India and America, and more are preparing to go. This interest in missions is but one manifestation of religious life. It is never forgotten that the greatest mission is the making of cultured Christian homes in our own land and the practising of Christian virtue everywhere. Alma College is Methodist, yet enjoys the high honor of having usually one-half its patronage from other churches. No denominational meddlesomeness interferes with the church preferences of its students; the aim is to foster a love of truth in whatever form held.

The College is a gift of the people to woman's education. In thousands of subscriptions, the largest not exceeding \$500, the people have given over \$63,000 to this enterprise. The Methodist Church has undertaken to administer this generous liberality. Alma College is indeed the voice of the people, asking that the best facilities for woman's education be available equally to the daughter of the mansion and the daughter of the cottage. High scholarship, Christian kindness and social energy command the patronage of the wealthy, and low rates encourage the struggling to try to attain better things. It is therefore possible to bring in touch and sympathy in college life the best minds and purest hearts from all spheres of life. This was the high ideal of the founders of this College.

In founding this institution they had at first to depend on the small contributions of the many less wealthy, but the plea of Alma has touched the kind heart of one man of wealth, and is the beneficiary to the extent of \$10,000 in the princely benevolence of the late Hart A. Massey. And Alma expects that in answer to the faith and sacrifice of the people other men of wealth will be moved to place at the disposal of the Church the means to enable Alma yet to realize the original intent, that the College buildings and equipment should be a free gift to the cause of woman's education. There is a sphere of education which the State cannot fill, and

There is a sphere of education which the State cannot fill, and that is a residential school-life incorporating the idea of church, home, and school, blended in one organization. This sphere the Church must fill in order to permanency, and to the development of the generous liberality essential to so great a cause. The Protestant churches have a very plain duty in this most important matter. Alma College is fully on the line of the traditional policy of the Church declared in the Discipline to be: That in the best interests of the Church and of education we imperatively demand that our colleges and universities should be under the fostering care of the Church.

In reviewing the work of the College for the past year, we most gratefully record the goodness of God in His providential care of our students and teachers. No serious illness or contagious disease has visited us. While the number of our students and the receipts of the past year cannot be ranked among our best, it has its record of successful work and some encouraging features to record.

The total enrolment, 10 in excess of last year, is 134 students, of whom 91 have been resident, and 43 day pupils. This enrolment represents the Christian denominations as follows: Methodist 70, Presbyterian 27, Episcopalian 16, Baptist 12, Roman Catholic 7, Congregational 2.

Twenty students have been enrolled from the neighboring Republic.

The class preparing for graduation this year numbers thirteen, representing all departments.

The school is in a condition for effective work in all its departments, and is unsurpassed in its arrangements for the comfort, convenience, progress and health of its students. We are persuaded that no school in the Dominion can offer better advantages and at lower rates in the way of a liberal education for young women.

A rearrangement of the loan upon the college property has been effected at a lower rate of interest, resulting in an annual saving of nearly \$400. The Board is using most careful economy in order to the reduction of the debt, but must carefully guard at the same time the comfort of the students and the efficiency of the school.

We would most respectfully urge the members of the Conference, lay and clerical, to aid the work of the school by personal interest and cooperation. By sending us timely information concerning prospective students, by bringing the claims of our Methodist institutions frequently before the people, and in a variety of other ways, ministers and laymen can greatly aid the College.

In conclusion, we beg to thank the Conference for excellent appointments made in preceding years to our Board of Management, and to ask that a Conference representative be selected for the current year.

# REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE AND CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC.

To the London Methodist Conference:

We, the directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, take pleasure,

in presenting to this Conference our twenty-third annual report.

Notwithstanding the continued commercial depression, the attendance has been very gratifying, there having been 110 boarders and fifteen day pupils. This success is the legitimate outcome of faithful and well-directed effort. For many years it has been our aim as Directors to provide the highest educational facilities, and the most comfortable and culturing surroundings.

The financial aid recently furnished by the friends of the College has enabled us to realize our ideal in buildings and equipment, and has given a wonderful stimulus to all departments of our college work. The Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, when visiting our College at commencement, was delighted with what he saw, and said that the most effective way of advertising, so far as our College was concerned, was to have the people of this country come and see it for themselves, and go forth intelligent as well as enthusiastic advocates of its real merit. Stronger language than we would like to use in this report is being used almost every day by visitors, to express their appreciation of the beautiful and extensive buildings, the chaste and elegant appointments, and the magnificent equipment for first-class educational work. It should be, and undoubtedly is, a

source of pride and pleasure to the Methodist Church to have under its control such a grand college property with its ever-increasing possibilities for good.

We are deeply grateful to the friends of higher education who have aided us in our scheme of extension and improvement; and we sincerely hope that others in the near future may be disposed to give us still more extended aid.

Respecting the literary status of our College, and class of work being done by our students, we take pleasure in quoting from letters recently received from Chancellor Burwash, of Victoria University, and President Loudon, of Toronto University.

Dr. Burwash says :

"I have pleasure in stating that no less than nine students have entered Victoria and Toronto universities from the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. The majority of these have taken the first two years of their university work at Whitby, coming up for their examinations to Toronto, and passing with credit. Three of these have already graduated with honors, and are a credit to the Ontario Ladies' College. Four others are at present doing excellent work as undergraduates in the University, and two others have been transferred to another Canadian university in the city where their parents reside. Any college carrying students up to university studies, and placing them in a position to obtain advanced standing at the University examinations, deserves great praise, and should receive every possible encouragement in its important work."

President Loudon says:

"When visiting your College in June last year for the first time, I was agreeably surprised at the extent and excellence of your building and equipment, which should, I think, afford every accommodation for physical comfort and health of students. I have observed also with pleasure the creditable stand taken at the University examinations during the last few years by several students who had prepared the work of the first and second years of the Arts course in the Ontario Ladies' College. Without entering into detail, I may say that these candidates have mostly taken honor standing in modern languages, and that their success affords testimony to the efficiency of the instruction imparted by your staff."

It is due our College to draw the attention of this Conference to the fact that no other ladies' college in Canada has been able to make a

similar University record.

Our Conservatory of Music affords the best facilities for the study of piano, pipe organ, violin, guitar, voice-culture and harmony. No expense has been spared in providing concert-grand pianos, comfortable practice rooms, etc.; but the most important provision is a large two-manual pipe organ, recently erected in the new concert hall. This organ has been specially designed to meet the wants of students desirous of fitting themselves to become church organists. Considering the great demand at the present day for competent lady organists, and the difficulty usually experienced in obtaining practice on a suitable instrument in a well-warmed hall, we take pleasure in referring to our superior facilities for organ practice, and trust that they may prove advantageous to many an aspiring student.

Resolved,—That whereas, there has lately been a most brutal and demoralizing prize fight at Carsoh City, in the State of Nevada; and whereas, such exhibitions are prohibited by the criminal law of the country; and whereas, such exhibitions have a tendency to degrade and corrupt the morals of the people, of all ages and both sexes; and whereas, the practice of taking pictures by means of electricity scientifically applied of these degrading and brutalizing sports has become somewhat common in some portions of the neighboring Republic, thus perpetuating the memory of the disgusting and demoralizing details; and whereas, a determined and persistent effort is being made to introduce these revolting amusements and productions into this country; be it therefore

Resolved, —That this Conference is of the opinion that the most strenuous efforts should be made by the Church and the Legislature to protect society from this foul blot upon our Christian civilization, and that we assure the Parliament of this country of our hearty sympathy and co-operation with them in every effort to suppress this, and every other form of vice, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Premier of this Dominion and the Hon. Sir Oliver Mowat, Minister of Justice.

# ANNUAL ADDRESS

# OF THE MINISTERS OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—Early in the history of Methodism it became a custom for the ministers assembled in their annual gatherings to send to their people an epistle containing, as the case may be, commendations, recommendations, or admonitions. This time-honored tradition of our fathers has become now an established usage which we delight to observe, not simply because of the associations of the past, but because we want to keep open every avenue of communication by which we may be

mutually helpful to one another.

We find the following minute in John Wesley's journal under the date of June 25, 1744: "Monday and the five following days we spent in Conference with many of our brethren (come from several parts), who desire nothing but to save their own souls and them that hear them. And, surely, as long as they continue thus minded, their labor shall not be in vain in the Lord. The next week we endeavored to purge the society of all that did not walk according to the Gospel. By this means we reduced the number of members to less than nineteen hundred. But number is an inconsiderable circumstance. May God increase them in faith and love." From this first record by our founder of the nature and result of his conference with his assistants or preachers, one thing deeply impresses us, which lesson will be profitable for both you and us. And as we tried to apply the lesson in our District and Conference gatherings, we feel that we are preaching what we practise, when we urge you to the application of the same lesson. As we read that old record of June, 1744, we discover that the Conference gathering was eminently spiritual in its object and tone and results. He had confidence in his preachers as spiritually minded men. He had confidence in the future as long as they continued to be thus minded. They went back to their work with a desire to impart to the people the same spiritual ambitions which had seized their own minds. The object of their desire was to secure a society of men who not only had the form but were seeking the power of godliness. And, although the carrying out of this desire resulted in a serious reduction in the number of their members, this led Wesley to record the judgment, so adverse to the principles of wordly boasting, that "number is an inconsiderable circumstance," being only an accidental not an essential, element of success, which may even prove a source of weakness.

In our Conference gatherings of to-day there is very much business belonging to the temporal affairs of the Church which requires attention in

adjusting to preserve the machinery in complete working order. This takes time, and leads to the free expression of opinion of men who differ in their judgments. Yet we aim still to be men who, as Wesley said, "desire to save their own souls and them that hear them." While coinciding with the judgment that "number is an inconsiderable circumstance," we rejoice that ever from a numerical standpoint our joint labors have not been in vain in the Lord, but that many have been added unto the Church such as are being saved, and our prayer is, "May God increase

them in faith and love.'

We would centre all our exhortation at this time to endeavor to secure in you what we esteem most in one another, spiritual-mindedness. To be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. It is not necessary to venture on a definition of that characteristic of a Christian, which it was the aim of the "prophets" of both Old and New Testament to secure, the lack of which they deplored, declaring that the "new moons and Sabbaths, the calling of assemblies" were "vain oblations" and "an abomination" as long as the heart was not in the service. This was the quality of character which secured for David the eulogy from God, "A man after mine own heart," and which proved so satisfactory to David that he gave out of his own experience his advice to others: "Delight thyself also in the Lord, and He will give thee the desires of thy heart." This was the attitude of Job toward God, and the standpoint from which he viewed all the relations of life in which it is possible for a man to stand—an attitude which was so provocative of Satan's rage, yet proved so satisfactorily, beyond all question, the ultimate security of a good man. And one cannot turn over, in a meditative, prayerful mood, the pages of the New Testament without having it borne in upon one's mind that whatever may be the ultimate purpose of God with regard to the world of redeemed men who have been crowding one another off the stage of action in civilized and heathen lands for wellnigh six thousand years, this one thing is plain, viz., that each one who wills to be numbered among the "royal priesthood," and desires to obtain the fulfilment of the promises given "to him that overcometh," God requires to "have the mind of Christ." This knowledge of and acquiescence in the will of God led him to declare, in a crisis which involved the sacrifice of His human nature, "Not my will, but thine be done." One comes away from a careful study of the revealed will of God with the pervading thought that "if a man have not the spirit he is none of His," and that every one who does not wish to be cast aside as reprobate silver must have the true ring of loyalty to Christ.

We emphasize this particularly for the reason long ago assigned for the providential existence of Methodism, viz., that it was raised up to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land. Other churches may appeal to national sentiment, or to the natural tendency in some for artistic surroundings either in church architecture or in gorgeous church service, and thus draw to their communion families who seek either the social standing the Church seems to offer, or the satisfaction of the religious instincts by a formal service. The revivalistic origin of Methodism, the universality of her mission, and the general simplicity of her church architecture and church service debar her from any numerous accessions from motives which might be deemed æsthetic, social or national. When she

ceases to be a centre for the generation and radiation of spiritual forces she violates the very charter under which she has any authorization as a separate denomination, and Ichabod is written on her walls.

Suffer, then, the word of exhortation, to be loyal to Christ. "He that hath my commandments and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me." Here, knowledge of, fidelity to, and affection for Christ are implied as the essentials of an acceptable service. If there is vigorous life in a plant and proper conditions of growth, we need not be anxious concerning the character of its leaves or flowers or fruit, for it will doubtless be loyal to the laws of its own life, and the blade and full ear will appear in due season. So, in exhorting you to nourish your spiritual life we are confident we are taking the best means to secure substantial and permanent

progress in everything that tends to a church's true success.

We need scarcely remind you of the deep and inexhaustible springs of the spiritual life-thoughtful reading of the Word of God; communion with God in prayer, not only in times of trouble and perplexity or at regular seasons of private devotion, but also the cultivation of a prayerful spirit, so that ejaculatory petitions and notes of praise will punctuate, if not our words, at least our thoughts. "In everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. and the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." This prayerful, thankful spirit will seek means of expression, and will find them in prayer at the family altar, the attendance upon, from a love for, and also a taking a part in, the prayer-meeting and class-meeting, essential parts of the spiritual machinery of Methodism. This loyalty to Christ and first principles will also secure the regular attendance upon the church services for instruction and worship of yourselves and families, which will be a standing advertisement to the world of the repose and dignity of a religious life. This will also make every home, as well as every Sunday School, a training place in Christian knowledge, Christian experience and Christian work. This will secure, also, the end aimed at by our Epworth Leagues, that under the hallowed influence of a spiritual church membership, the young people will be brought together, their reading and recreation-in which so many perils lie-diligently watched over, and their ardor and energy directed in suitable forms of benevolent work. As, again, the gardener looks for the first signs of life from the seed or plant where he has good reason to expect it exists, so this conscious spiritual movement in ourselves will lead us to look for signs of the religious life with the dawn of intelligence and the first development of will. While we insist, as we have always done, that the mature religious life should be definite and conscious, we would that parents should feel that they can scarcely look too early for the faint beginnings of the spiritual life in the hearts of their children, nor too carefully foster such recognized beginnings. Let the application of no false tests, in which the nature of the child is quite forgotten, prevent us from finding them. While the religious life ought to become as clear and self-attesting as the summer noon, it may arise as gradually and gently, and be withal as beautiful, as the day-spring from on high. Then, also, Junior Leagues and catechumen classes will be, even more than the ranks of the ungodly, the source of the Church's accessions. Spiritual life will also prove to be a powerful solvent which

will set free a much larger amount of the accumulated worldly substance of the Church, which can be used to carry out the great work of the Church, proclaiming the "Gospel of the Kingdom in all the world for a witness to all nations." Deficits in our missionary treasuries will not then be dreaded nor retrenchment even hinted at. Loyalty to Christ will require you to become acquainted with the needs of the world and the Church, and so you will be necessarily on the lookout to secure information which your local and secular papers and magazines do not supply, so that religious reading, such as provided by our Book Room, will be welcomed and appreciated. This will also lead to a correct attitude towards the difficult question of amusements. He who loves God supremely, and who feels that he needs his time and strength and money for carrying out the purposes of God-which an intelligent mind and an alert conscience will not be slow to perceive-will not need a list of forbidden amusements. For him the general rale of the society will be sufficient and efficient, and he will abstain from "taking such diversions as cannot be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus." We exhort our young people especially to a position of dignified firmness upon this question. We urge you not to be moved from your position by the laxity which may prevail in some other communions upon this point. The Methodist Church simply proposes to maintain all the year the high standard of religious life and zeal, which even they recognize to be inconsistent with indulgence in the amusements frowned upon by us, as they prohibit and suppress, as far as they can, such amusements as theatre-going, card-playing, and dancing during, at least, forty days in the year. Let us "stand fast, therefore, in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage." Loyalty to the "royal law of love" will always give safe results, not only in the difficult question of amusements, but also with regard to Sabbath observance and prohibition of the traffic in strong drink, as well as in every question where worldly interests and abnormal appetites seek to cross and even obliterate the line of demarcation between the Church and the world. Some may question how far the Church is authorized in endeavoring to secure the enactment of the ten commandments by civil statute. this is clear, that until the volume of public opinion is strong enough to secure the embodiment of the principles of righteousness and charity in the law of the land, it can at least be utilized in protecting the sentiments of those who let it be known, by the scrupulous avoidance of those things that offend, that they consider every legalized infringement of the quiet of the Lord's Day, or legalized protection of the liquor traffic, as coming under the common law regarding nuisances and their suppression.

You can readily see then, dear brethren, that when in this annual message we exhort you to loyalty to Christ and the cultivation of a sensitive and vigorous spiritual life, we are really directing your attention to the prime requisite of religion, without which—either as individuals, or in our corporate capacity—we are weaker than a rope of sand. Desire one thing of the Lord, and diligently seek after it, viz., that you may cherish and utilize the Old-World habits of meditation, self-examination and self-discipline. Those who least care to be alone with themselves and God most need that solemn, searching, strengthening, divine communion. In the secret of His pavilion, far from the strife of tongues, we may learn to

know Him and also ourselves. The cleansing, the strengthening and the enlightening of the conscience must take place there, and pure and strong the Christian will go on his way rejoicing.

It has been said, "No one has a true idea of right until he does it, no one has a genuine reverence for right until he has done it often and with cost to himself; no one has peace ineffable in the right until he does it always and with alacrity."

Read frequently the thirteenth chapter of first Corinthians, Paul's eulogy of love; try to practise its teaching, and learn to consider it to be as heretical to be unsound in charity and patience as to be unsound in the faith

Finally, brethren, dearly beloved and longed for, our joy and crown stand fast in the Lord, stand fast in one spirit, with one mind, striving together for the faith of the Gospel. Gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope perfectly for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. There are certain facts in the past which must be believed, and there is a kind of life in the present which must be lived, and there are things in store for us in the future which must be looked for. Thus the three great virtues of faith, love and hope are inculcated.

Your life of constant struggle to overcome the difficulties and disappointments which beset your daily course will require unfailing sources of strength. Gather this strength from such passages as the following, with which we would close our message: "For the grace of God hath appeared, bringing salvation unto all men, and instructing us, to the intent that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly and righteously and godly in this present world, looking for the blessed hope and appearing of the glory of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ, who gave himself for us, that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a people for His own possession, zealous of good works."

Two great appearances of Jesus Christ are here stated as forming the limits of the Christian dispensation: an epiphany of grace, when Christ, appearing in humility, brought salvation and instruction, and an epiphany in power and great glory when Christ will appear to gather His saints together unto Him, even those who have made a covenant with Him by sacrifice, and also to complete His kingdom. From these two sources, as from the upper and nether springs, may your faith and hope

be nourished to maturity.

This coming year of the swiftly-moving modern world may be a critical one to us and the Church and the world. To some of you it may be given in the behalf of Christ not only to believe on Him, but also to suffer for His sake. In such a case, if there be any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, may it all be made manifest in preserving you blameless and harmless, the sons of God, without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom shine ye as lights in the world, holding forth the Word of life.

Praying for a prosperous year, we commend you to God and the Word of His grace.
