INTERESTING ADDRESS BY
JUDGE BODKIN AT THE
MEMORIAL SERVICE.

Once again we stand face to face with the world, old truth which in all ages, in all climes, amongst all tribes and tongues of men, has very often claimed their attention and excited their profoundest philosophy—that in the mysterious workings of God's providence—in the Dominion of His immutable laws there is no such thing as partiality. The bolt that shatters the lofty pine and the giant oak, smites the daisy and the fragrant violet. The sickle that reaps the golden grain, gathers into its sheaves the tender buds and the full blown flowers as well.

It is the Creator's inexorable decree that 'all flesh is grass,' and that all forms of life on this planet must perish and give place to succeeding forms. In the operations of that decree, the purple robe of the monarch and the tattered coat of the beggar are equally unimportant. Nearly twenty centuries ago the poetical genius of Horace caught up this great truth of Nature, and set it forever in the golden amber of his immortal verse:

"With equal pace impartial Fate
Knocks at the palace and the cottage gate."

And thus it is that in the operations of a mysterious Providence, regardless alike of exalted station, marvellous power and influence for good, regardless of the affections and patriotic pride of all the teeming millions of the world's greatest and best Empire, and the admiration and esteem of all other nations, tongues and tribes, you, my friends, are today bowed with grief and are assembled here to pay a sorrowing tribute to the memory of your late beloved Sovereign.

The bolt has rived the heart of the great British oak and stricken it to the earth!

Nor is all the grief and the grief of Britons torn earth thirsts for the gentle dews and spring-time showers of tranquil and perpetual peace, whenever human hearts long and pray for the dawn of that glorious era.

"When the war drums throb no longer,
"And the battle flags are furled
In the Parliament of man,
The federation of the world."

There, today, is genuine funeral sadness, for not Britain alone, but the World's Great Peace Maker is at this hour being consigned to the tomb.

This is neither the place nor the occasion for dwelling upon the particulars of his benign career as a diplomat and statesman, for the career extended far back into the years when as a Prince without power or authority of his own, but as his glorious mother's quiet and zealous assistant and councillor, he began building and exerting that wonderful personal influence upon and over exalted rulers and powerful cabinet ministers that won for him at last the proud and imperishable name of 'Edward the Peace Maker.'

Neither may we on this occasion indulge in speculations concerning the effects of his death upon immediate conditions either at home or abroad. It is the nation's business to make of his death, the cause which promoted and ensured the final overthrow of Napoleon, Lord Byron startled the ruling-throws of Europe by propounding the question: "What is the result of this day?" Millions began inquiring: "What is true Sovereignty?" "What is a monarch's true sphere of duty?"

Do you not ask me today? We need but point them to the reigns of grand old "Victoria the Good," and of her great son, "Edward the Peace Maker." They were Sovereigns over the hearts, the consciences and the minds of their subjects, great sovereigns not by decrees and edicts—not by the command of armed hosts and the thunders of vast armaments, but by earning and winning the way over the minds and affections of men and women at home and abroad, and by earning and winning that sway through the practical application to affairs, public and personal, of those eternal virtues that attract and bind hearts to hearts everywhere.

To my American mind there were two thoughts expressed by King Edward, one at the beginning of his reign, the other at its close, that measure all dimensions of his greatness. As he picked up the baton of Sovereignty that dropped from the cold and senseless hand of the world beloved "Victoria the Good" he faced an expectant realm and declared everyone with the firm declaration, "I shall follow in the footsteps of my illustrious mother." As his eyes at last grew dim and he felt the icy breath of the Great Reaper, he triumphantly exclaimed what all the world knew to be true: "I have tried to do my duty."

Were I delegated to decide the inscription for this tomb, I would write in simple English words: "Edward VII, the Peace Maker, the Worthy Son of Victoria the Good."

And then I would write below the two utterances mentioned: "I shall follow in the footsteps of my illustrious mother."

"I have tried to do my duty."

He needs no other eulogy.

"So calm, so constant was his recitade,
That by his loss alone we learn his worth,
And feel how true a King has walked with us on earth."

Le roi est mort: viva le roi.

Savagely difficult indeed would have been the burdens of one who in the midst of some history-making campaign should have been called upon with stien emphasis to take up the torch of command in the place of a Wellington, a Napoleon, a Grant or a Von Moltke and to carry profound military propositions of others to a successful conclusion! What shall we say of the task, and how shall we measure its awful weight—the task that now devolves upon your new King, George V., as he faces the responsibilities of a royal career as the successor of Victoria the Good, and of her son, Edward, the World's Peace Maker? Surely, my friends, there is in that thought, in that question, a suggestion of profound consideration for one and all of you, and for every true man and woman in the great British Empire. You and all others have confidence in the new King's ability, in his integrity of purpose, in his exalted ambition to be known as a worthy successor to his father and grand mother. You have his candid and hearty promise and it in you hear the ring of the pure gold of true manliness. But a duty has devolved also upon every subject of the new King—the sacred and holy duty, of sustaining, encouraging and cheering him with your fervent prayers and your heartiest cooperation and good-will. If you would still further exalt and exult the noble and good influences of the British crown—if you would assure to your new King a triumphant career as he loyally endeavors to follow the royal examples of his father and grandmother in calming and dissipating storm-clouds of domestic and international passion, in promoting all the arts of peace and good-will among men, then cultivate a fellow-feeling for him in his times of difficulty, and mantle him with your unstinted confidence and patriotic affection, and by so doing you will inspire his loftiest courage, strengthen his influence for good, and bring reciprocal blessings upon yourselves, your country and the world.

Avoid his feet first planted upon the eternal rocks of truth, justice and equity in his own dominions and amongst all nations, and applying the Golden Rule of conduct between governments everywhere, long may George V. live, and glorious and renowned for good be his reign.

Profound regret for the dead, unbounded respect for the living monarch.

PREFER NEW BRUNSWICK AFTER LIVING IN THE WEST.

Three Farmers Among Recent Arrivals Buy Farms and Will Settle in Province.

A new immigration movement has been inaugurated—a migration of farmers from the northwest to the little old Province of New Brunswick. These farmers have recently forsaken the west for the east, evidently having come to the conclusion that opportunities in New Brunswick are better than in other parts of Canada. Clement C. Carter, an English farmer, who has spent some time in the west, came to New Brunswick the other day, and after taking stock of conditions, purchased the well-known potato farm of McQuar Brothers, at Burton, Sunbury County.

R. E. Young, a farmer who spent six or seven years in the west, has purchased a farm near Fredericton Junction, Wm. Ashman, another farmer, who has had considerable experience in the west, went down to Grand Manan a few weeks ago, and has decided to locate there.

"That experienced farmers should see greater opportunities in New Brunswick than in the northwest, and decide to locate here does not surprise me," said W. W. Hutbasd, secretary of Agriculture, yesterday. "At the recent convention of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association at Fredericton, Prof. Cummings and Dr. Standish, of the Truro Agriculture College, told the farmers that the soil of many parts of the Maritime Provinces was just as good as that of the west, and more suitable for raising a variety of crops, while other conditions, such as proximity to markets and the cost of labor were more favorable to successful farming. They added, however, that we were only learning the ABC of agriculture. There is no doubt that there is a great future for farming in this province, and the fact that farmers are coming from the west should encourage our own people to make greater efforts to realize their opportunities."





(Continued from page two)

She was a Christian and I don't think there was a brighter face in the audience. Leprosy is very common here, also smallpox and the persons afflicted are not isolated but go about the streets wherever they have a mind to go.

During the last day of their session in the city they requested that they might be allowed to make a P. T. - pronounced here 'Pong' and translated 'see of the Hospital and home of the missionaries. Their request was granted and they came in by twenties. I wish with you might have seen the look of astonishment on the faces as they went up the hospital stairway, many of the women never having been inside of a wooden or brick building as they had come to the city or the first time. Their exclamations were very amusing, one woman exclaiming: 'This is Heaven.' The missionaries' houses, they think are little palaces, which, in fact, are made in comparison with houses in the home land, but to the Korean, anything made of wood, or other than mud is a great curiosity. They can not conceive of anything like a ten-story building, or an automobile and until they could see such with their own eyes would never believe such things to be true. But the encouraging thing is that they are always ready to hear the Gospel message, and when they become Christians prove themselves honest, deserving people. The work of Bible Study and prayer was certainly uplifting and many avowed their desire to become Christians.


