TORONTO LETTER.

TORONTO, Aug. 18. Trade during the past week has been generally inactive as is usual at this season of the year. The recent reports of the crops from all parts of the Province are crops from all parts of the Province are very encouraging, and these were hailed as the harbinger of a more active trading when the grain has been harvested and begins to come to the market. 

ARREST OF RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION Railway building in the Northwestern States is feeling the influence of fast extravagance in the construction of competing lines, and to some extent also the hostility of State Legislatures to railway rates and management. 
