## Disastrous Explosion.

London, May 7 .- An explosion occurred in the cordite works at Waltham Abbey to-day, killing four men and injuring a dozen. The buildings were wrecked.

Sir Charles Russell's Successor. London, May 7 .- An election was held to-day in the south division of Hackney to fill the parliamentary seat left vacant by Sir Charles Russell. Fletcher Moulton (Liberal) was elected by a majority of 192. Joseph Chamberlain's Son Badly Injured.

London, May 7 .- Joseph Austin Chamberlain, eldest son of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, was seriously injured to-day by being gored by a bull on his father's farm at Birmingham.

Emperor William-Fireman. BERLIN, May 7 .- The little village of Galow, near Shandan, was entirely destroyed by fire this morning. The Emperor at the head of the Shandan engineers, was early on the ground and worked hard to

save the burning buildings. France and Newfoundland. LONDON, May 7 .- In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Sydney Buxton, Under Colonial Secretary, announced that negotia-

tions with France in regard to a treaty regulating the fisheries along the shores of Newfoundland still remained suspended. The inhabitants of Newfoundland, he said, were generally on friendly terms with the French. Crispi Was Hissed.

MILAN, May 7 .- The exhibition of arts, wines and spirits was opened here yesterday by King Humbert, accompanied by Queen Margherita, Prime Minister Crispi and other members of the Cabinet, the Duke of Abruzzia and the Duke of Aosta. Signor Crispi was hissed by a crowd of Socialists who had gathered at a point where the procession passed. This insult caused great indignation among the other people present who drowned the hisses in cheers. Subsequently the Socialists were obliged to retire in consequence of the threatening aspect of the supporters of the

Hilarity in the House of Commons. London, 7 .- Sir William Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, moved the second reading of the budget bill in the House of Commons to-day.

John Grant Lawson moved that the bill be rejected. The debate will be continued until Thursday. James G. Weir asked if it was the intention to remove the grating in front of

LONDON, May 7.-The Queen has consented to lend to the committee of the forthcoming exhibition of fair women, which is to open at the Gaafton galleries at an early date, five pictures of the Windsor beauties, by Sir Peter Lely, from Hampton Court palace, and also "La Femme a l'Eventail," by Rembrandt. The Prince of Wales will contribute also toward the collection. From Chatsworth there will be lent the celebrated portraits of Georgiana and Elizabeth, Duchesses of Devonshire, and from Devonshire House a Titian, a Greuze, and other paintings by other masters. Among the chief owners of pictures who have kindly consented to assist in forming the loan collection are Lord Hert. ford, Lord Lothian, Lord Northbrook, Lord Iveagh, Lord de L'Isle, Sir Charles Tennant, Lord Burton, the Duke of Montrose, Lord Carnarvon, Lord Suffolk, Lord Wantage, the Duke of Portland, Alfred Morrison, and Dr. Probert. The patroness of the exhibition is the Princess of Wales and the invitations to lend pictures and other art treasures connected with the proposed collection are signed by the Duchess of Portland, Lady Granby, and Lady Iveagh, to whose efforts and interest the success which it is sure to attain will in a great measure be due.

All Seven Alive.

under the caption "Is the Crash Coming?" expresses the opinion of the writer (T. H. O'Connor, M.P.) that the vote in the House of Commons last Friday on Sir Edward Clarke's amendment to the Registration Bill, 292 to 278, a Government majority of fourteen, was a prelude to a still narrower majority, possibly the vote on the second reading of the budget next Thursday. Such a majority, the Sun asserts, would make it impossible for the Government to carry out the rest of its programme.

GOLDEN RULE MEASUREMENT

Shows Where the P.P. A. Falls Short-Rev. Mr. Weeks' Criticism Creates a Sensation,

ST. JOHN, N. B., May 7 .- Rev. W. W. Weeks, formerly of Brockville, Ont., now pastor of the First Baptist Church here, created a sensation in his sermon yesterday morning by strongly denouncing the Protestant Protective Association. He hoped, if ever it spread to this Province, no Protestant would identify himself with it; that an organization that would not support a man for office simply because he was a Catholic should not be recognized by Protestants who believed in extending to others the same privilege enjoyed by themselves. Such an organization as the P. P. A., he said, grew out of ignorance, and misapprehension of the Bible.

## POLITICAL.

Hon, J. M. Gibson Nominated by His Hamilton Constituents-Notes.

HAMILTON, May 7 .- The Reformers of West Hamilton met in convention to-night candidate for the Legislature. There the tank. was a good attendance of delegates, and the nomination was unanimously tendered Hon. J. M. Gibson, the present representative of Hamilton, who has been the whole city's representative for the past fifteen years. Mr. Gibson gave an account of his stewardship, and thanked the convention for the honor they had done him. J. T. Middleton, Reform candidate for East Hamilton, and others addressed the meeting during the evening.

IMPORTANT LABOR MEETING.

Representatives of Over 85,000 Textile Workers in Conference-Mine Machinery Wrecked by

a Mob. AN IMPORTANT GATHERING. PHILADELPHIA, May 7 .- Fifty delegates, representing over 85,000 textile workers in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, Connecticut and Pennsylvania, met in Labor Lyceum Hall to-day in the fourth annual convention of the National Union of Textile Workers of America. The 6,000 members of the union in New York State are not directly represented. The convention is an unusually important one, because it will decide questions bearing upon the formation of an international textile workers' union; amalgamation with the Northern Silk Workers' Union of America (at the request of the latter), which has 5,000 members; the limiting of hours of labor; the adoption of a uniform rate of wages, "upon as high a basis as possible consistent with the true interests of trade"; the delegation of a portion of the power of the National Union to district councils, and the adoption of a rule whereby no two big strikes will take place in the union at the same time. The convention will also take action upon the National Factory Law. President Thornton's annual report showed that the union has grown over 100 per cent during the

MINE MACHINERY WRECKED WITH DYNA-

BIRMINGHAM, Aia., May 7.-A mob, numbering from 200 to 500, went to Prince's mines, at Horse Creek, last night and blew up the boilers and other mine machinery with dynamite, and fired two shots into the company's storehouses. No one was hurt. The mob then went to the Victoria mines and blew up several freight cars loaded with coal and turned others loose down the mountain, wrecking them. It appears that the miners at Horse Creek refused to join the strike. The strikers have threatened them several times.





A Percentage Offered for the Street Railway Franchise.

An Alleged Irregularity To Be Investigated.

"We propose to pay a tax to the city of \$25 per car per year for each motor car operated, and in place thereof:

"We will pay the city a percentage of the total receipts arising from the operation of the road, this percentage to be agreed upon between us.

"We would at this time name a definite percentage if we were able to estimate closely the amount of business which an electric road would do. However, in the absence of sufficient data to name a definite percentage, we will merely state that we will discuss this point with the committee or with your body as a whole and endeavor to reach a satisfactory conclusion. We could meet your committee on the 12th or 14th of this month for the purpose of going into details of this propo-

Lawless State of Affairs in the Wyoming Coal Field.

PORT RICHMOND, Pa., May 7 .- For a long period lawlessness has prevailed in the Wyoming coal field, and hardly a week has passed since January that a crime of a heinous character has not been committed. Within the last three months crime has been on the increase, and Capt. Whalen, chief of the detective department, states that 35 mysterious and brutal assassinations have been committed, besides other atrocious deeds. In every instance the

imes have been traced to Hungarians and lavonians, who have managed to escape. Eatire communities have been terrorized by members of an oath-bound organization whose influence appears to reach from the anthracite coal regions of Northern Pennsylvania to the bituminous area of Central Pennsylvania and west of the Allegheny Mountains to the coke country.

The criminal record of the sections of the State enumerated shows that during the last year over 200 murders have been perpetrated and but seven of the perpetrators apprehended.

The same body of organized outlaws committing these crimes has also been guilty of wholesale destruction of property, and the value alone of coal breakers and other mine works destroyed in the anthracite country amounts to nearly \$2,000,000. So great has been the outlawry within a recent period that the authorities have determined to adopt more resolute measures to apprehend the law-breakers.

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

## Ontario's Trusted

Biographical Sketch of a Popular

Eventiul Career of Hon, J. M. Gibson, Provincial Secretary.

Lieut.-Col. Hon. John Morrison Gibson.

M.P.P., whose nomination for West Hamilton was so warmly indorsed at a mass meeting held in that city last night, is the Provincial Secretary, and has occupied that position in the Local Government since the office became vacant on Jan. 18, 1889, by the transfer of Hon. A. S. Hardy to the commissionership of the Crown Lands Department. Mr. Gibson is probably the most accomplished and finished scholar in the present Cabinet so far as literary and academical at. ments are in question. He is the son o. the late William Gibson, who came to this country in 1827 from Glamis, Forfarshire, Scotland, and shortly after his arrival married Mary Sinclair, whose family resided in Nelson township, in the county of Halton. William Gibson was a farmer and died when his son John was only three years old. The late David Gibson, who formerly represented North York in the old Parliament of Canada, was cousin to J. M. Gibson, who is the subject of the present sketch. He received his early school education at the Hamilton Grammar School, under the mastership of Dr. Sangster. He made rapid progress, and his studious habits and fine natural endowments soon placed him at the head of the school in regard to proficiency in the branches of learning taught in that institution, giving promise of the ripe scholarship which he attained in after years. He matriculated in University College, Toronto, in 1859. He continued the same close and laborious attention to study which had marked his course at the grammar school during his university course of four years, taking high honors and winning scholarships during the course, graduating in 1863, when he took the Prince of Wales' prize, at that time awarded to only the most distinguished graduate of the year. During his college course he gave special attention to the study of languages, not only including the usual course of Latin and Greek, but also Hebrew, Chaldee and Syriac, as well as the modern European lauguages. He not only took prizes in the department of classics and modern languages, but in Oriental languages as well. After completing his college course and graduating with the highest honor, he commenced the study of law in the office of the law firm of which the present Justice Burton was the head, in the city of Hamilton, and during the term of his articles he entered the law course of the university, receiving as the reward of his close and successful study of the law the degree of LL.B. and the gold medal of the faculty in 1869. He was called to the bar in Michaelmas term, 1867, and after practising his profession alone for one year he entered into partnership with Francis Mackelcan, Q.C., with whom he has continued to be associated, under different firm names, carrying on a very extensive

Mr. Gibson's solid and varied literary attainments, as evidenced by his brilliant university career, and his thorough and comprehensive study of jurisprudence, together with his subsequent experience arising from the extensive professional practice he has had in later years, have combined to place him in the first rank of found in Canada. Col. Gibson has a high reputato Wimbledon in the years 1874, 1875 and 1879, on each of which occasions he won honors as an admirable marksman. In the latter year his record was a splendid one. he succeeding in winning the Prince of the same occasion he was the winner of the Olympic or Snyder championship match. He commanded the Canadian team to Wimbledon in 1881, when the British team were defeated in the match for the Rajah of Kolapore's cup. Col. Gibson has held, and still holds, many prominent positions in connection with military affairs of the country and has been also almost as intimately connected with educational affairs. In the city of Hamilton, and at Toronto at the first election of members for the the University Act of 1873, he was selected by his fellow-graduates as one of the first senators, and was repeatedly reelected. He has been also prominently connected with the Freemasons for many years, and has held the office of grand master of the Grand Lodge of Canada for several recurring years.

It need hardly be said that Col. Gibson has actively associated with the Liberal party from his earliest manhood. For many years he was the indefatigable secretaey of the Reform Association of Hamilton, and on the ratirement of J. M. Williams, M.P.P., from public life in 1859, Col. Gibson was selected as the Reform in the Hamilton representation, and after a very exciting and active campaign he defeated Mr. Hugh Murray, the most popular candidate the Conservatives could put in nomination, and he has been re-elected at every succeeding general election since up to the present time. At the last general election, however, he suffered an apparent defeat by the Conservative candidate, Mr. Stinson, who was returned by a considerable majority, but the return of that gentlemen was protested on the grounds of bribery, undue influences, etc., and a new election was ordered by the election court. In this second contest with Mr. Stinson, Col. Gibson was returned by an unusually large majority. It is a singular fact that though the city of Hamilton has returned Conservative members to the Dominion Parliament for many years past, it has never since Confederation returned any but Reform members to the Local Legislature. Indeed, it has sent only two different to the Ontario Legislature since the confederation of the Provinces in 1867. In January, 1889, Col. Gibson was called to intimated, by no means so unimportant an office as many people suppose, because there is little patronage connected with it. office has attached the Department of Prisons, Charities and Public Institutions. In point of labor, therefore, the office of secretary is the heaviest burdened of all the Government departments. When we consider the vast amount of worked entailed upon the secretary by the duties of his office, the numerous societies, military organizations, etc., of which he is the head, and by the law firm in which he still takes a very active part, and, in addition to all this, the legislative labors he has to perform when the House of Assembly is in session, one must arrive at the conclusion that he is one of the hardest worked and busiest men in the country; and so he is, but his vigorous and well-trained mental powers, as well as his strong physical constitution, seem to

stand the strain without apparent fatigue. In the House Col. Gibson does a large share of committee work, has been for a long time chairman of the committee on private bills, which is a position of no little difficulty and delicacy, and requiring a high degree of legal acumen, but no man is better qualified for the position than Col. Gibson. He is not a frequent speaker in the House, but when he addresses that body his speeches are clear, logical and always to the point, and clothed in the language of grace and precision, just such as might be expected from so accomplished a scholar. There is not a better informed man than Mr. Gibson in the whole House on all matters that com e up for discussion either in the Assembly or the executive sessions of the Cabinet, nor is there one of sounder judgment. Courteous in manner, kindly and generous in disposition, self-possessed, without assumption, profoundly versed in law, literature, and the principles of sound legislation unwearying in the discharge of his official duties, without a blemish up on either his public or his private reputation, he fully merits and as fully receives the entire confidence and respect of his constituents, of the members of the House, and of his colleagues in the Ministry. Col. Gibson has been married three times and has met with severe calamities in his domestic relations. He married Miss Emily Annie Birrell, of London, Ont., on Oct. 26, 1869, but she died on June 30, 1874. On Sept. 26, 1876, he married Carolina, second daughter of Hon. Adam Hope, Senator of the Dominion, and she died on Oct. 9, 1877. His third marriage was to Elizabeth, daughter of the late Judge Mulloch, of Brockville by whom be has several children.



Mr. Flint, of Yarmouth, N.S., Makes a Clear, Forcible Statement of the Case.

The Government Scored for Its Assisted Emigration Policy,

Mr. Wallace told Mr. Taylor that the Government intended to appoint the Montreal inspector of weights and measures referee in any disputes between buyers and sellers as to the weight of cheese. Mr. Martin, in moving for papers in re-

gard to immigration work, stated that the Government sent to Great Britain missionaries and experienced men chiefly to give political favorites a holiday at the public expense. He went on to speak of the policy of bringing in settlers from the United States, men who have failed to House adjourned. succeed there. It was necessary not only to bring these people in, but also in most instances to provide them with a loan to enable them to live. Settlers were now asking to he relieved of mortgages given for these loans. A great portion of these settlers located at Salt Coats and Yorkton, brought in at great expense, have left, and the remainder have not yet left because they have not money enough to get out. The whole transaction, said Mr. Martin, is a gigantic failure. He alluded to the Jews brought by Government agents from Chicago to Calgary as a waste of public money.

In his reply Mr. Daly denied that the Government had anything to do with the advances made to these settlers. They were made by the Canada Settlers' Loan Company. In regard to the Jews. Mr. Daly said that only 25 per cent were Jews. The others were Hungarians and Poles. Mr. Daly refused to believe that the settlers referred to were badly off, and read from the reports of immigration inspectors to show that Mr. Martin was altogether astray.

This brought Mr. Martin to his feet, Salt Coats settlers, asking for legislation to prevent the land companies from taking mortgages on the homesteads, "inasmuch as not one settler could pay either interest or principal." The petition also asked that the Government should pay off the liens, and so retain the 50 per cent of the settlers who are left, otherwise there would be no alternative for the remaining half but to go.

Mr. Daly declared he preferred to believe his agents to the statements of "these people," who were trying to get the Government to pay off their mortgages, after the Government had brought them 'out of their misery in Dakota,'

The motion was passed. Mr. Stairs, of Halifax, brought to the attention of the House the subject of adulterated teas in a resolution providing for inspection of teas and the destruction of adulterated teas. He described how black teas were adulterated. The exhausted leaves were spread out and sprinkled with tannic acid and otherwise prepared for the market. Green tea leaves were restored by the application of a paste

composed of gypsum rice and prussian blue.
Mr. Wallace said that the tea imported under the new tariff from Great Britain would have to be of a quality fit for consumption according to the experts of the British customs. The same thing would apply to the teas from the United States, where they had a still more rigid inspection of teas. In addition appraisers were instructed to keep out of Canada adulterated teas.

Mr. Stairs declared that the Controller was mistaken, and that under the present customs machinery there was no means of keeping out adulterated teas.

The matter was shunted by Mr. Wallace moving the adjournment of the debate, which was carried after a protest from Mr. Mills, of Bothwell, who thought the matter deserved greater consideration from the Government.

Mr. Flint, of Yarmouth, N. S., moved: That it is expedient that as speedily as possible this Parliament should enact a law to prohibit the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in Canada, except for medicinal, manufacturing and sacramental purposes. In support of this resolution, which is the official motion of the Dominion Alliance, Mr. Flint made a long and well-considered speech. He admitted that the resolution was worded a little vaguely, but explained it by reminding the House that it was made so purposely to please the supporters of Sir John Thompson in view of the Premier's declaration that nothing could be done in this direction this session. He wanted it understood, however, that the phrase "as speedily as possible" had reference only to practical difficulties and not to any doubt as to jurisdiction or as to the ripeness of public opinion for such a measure. Public opinion has traveled far and fast on this question of prohibition, Mr. Flint recited the history of the progress of this movement in Canada, and then took up the statistical and financial questiens. He showed that not less than \$40,000,000 worth of liquor and beer was consumed in Canada annually. He gave the capital invested in the l'quor business in Canada as \$8,309,000 in the 162 breweries, and \$7,054,000 in the eight distilleries in Canada. The number of employes was 2,243, representing about 15,000 persons, and the amount paid in wages about \$1,070,000. The value of the total output

of distilleries and breweries was put down

at \$7,916,000. Whose interests, Mr. Flint

He then dealt with the revenue question and the anti-pated deficit, quoting Sir Leonard's statement in Parliament when Finance Minister, that he would undertake as Finance Minister to make up any deficiency in the revenue arising from prohibition. He also quoted Mr. Gladstone as saying: "The question of revenue must never stand in the way of needed reforms. Besides with a sober population I shall find a way to raise a revenue." Mr. Flint referred to the effect of Father Mathews' marvelous temperance crusade on the revenue of Ireland. The revenue did not decrease, but crime did. He replied to other objections to prohibition, such as injury to invested capital and the loss arising from throwing persons out of employment. Mr. Flint made many quotations from official and authoritative sources to show that there was nothing in these apprehensions or arguments. While it was true that they could not make men sober by act of Parliament, it was equally true that they could greatly assist by removing temptation from the way. Parliament had always acted on the principle of interfering with anything which operated against the interests of the general mass of the community. Mr. Flint cited the plebiscites in the different provinces as showing the wishes of the people, and concluded with an urgent appeal to both political parties to combine in support



A WORLD'S COMBINE

In Oil-Markets, of the Earth to be Divided Between Two Interests.

NEW YORK, May 7 .- The Herald says:

During the past three or four weeks private cable dispatches announce important negotiations have been held in Paris between the representatives of the Standard Oil interests and the Russian oil companies, resulting in a division of the entire world's markets between these two great distributing and producing agents. A territorial division was made which is said to consist of a line drawn north and south through Europe in a somewhat circular manner. The Standard is to have the monopoly, it is said, of the British Islands, France and most of the western portion of Europe, including a part of the German Empire. The Russian companies will be probably unmolested by competition east of this dividing line and make their own market for the

vast territory of Asia. The Russian companies have gained rapidly for several years in China, India and Japan, and are now doing considerably more than one half of the business of those countries. It is understood the Standard agrees to give most of this section of the world to the Russian companies in consideration of getting control of the countries of Western Europe.


