#### UPROAR IN BUCHAREST

Vienna, March 27. - Serious street rioting occurred at Bucharest, Roumania, last night, and culminated in a conflict between the rioters and the troops during which two men were killed and over three hundred were wounded. The trouble arose over a demonstration of Roumanian nationalists against the use of the French language in a performance at the National Theater. 'The Ladies' Charity Society, which is under the patronage of the Princess Maria, wife of Prince Ferdinand, the heir-presumtive to the throne of Roumania, advertised the production of a play in French, and thousands of Nationalists gathered about the theater: and became so threatening that troops were summoned and fired twice before the demonstrators were dispersed. Over a hundred persons were arrested.

## **EXPORTATION OF** NIAGARA POWER

Dominion Government Will Exercise Strict Control.

Canadian Industries Must have the First Consideration, Says Hon. Mr. Hyman.

Ottawa, March 26.-A federal policy for waterpowers, which will prevent the export of energy developed at Niagara to an extent to starve Canadian industries, was announced in the House today by the Minister of Public Works. The matter arose in discussion on the motion by Mr. Monk for a return describing all waterpowers under Dominion control. Mr. Hyman said there was no doubt of federal control over the export of electric power. The Government had therefore laid down a policy to govern their course, several applications being now before them. ## NATAL REBELLION QUICKLY CRUSHED

#### Colonial Troops Round Up Belligerent Natives and Severely Punish.

London, March 26.-Natal papers received by the last mail contain detailed accounts of the operations against the John Crosby, 22 years of age, and natives who were in resistance to the refuses to tell anything of himself, poll tax recently imposed or failed to

> The leaders at the beginning appear to have been Ethiopian Christians, as they are called, but later the movement seems to have been taken up by

The colonial authorities acted with inspector and trooper who were killed in the first affray, but were rounding up the natives all over the disaffected districts and compelling them to surrender their assegais and shields and

bring in their cattle. The colonial force at the disposal of the authorities were 3,300, with sixteen field guns, seventeen maxims, and a pompom section.

Martial law was proclaimed and correspondents were not allowed to accompany detachments in the field; in addition a censorship was established over the press and all persons, white or black, repeating rumors likely to cause uneasiness, were being arrested and punished.

Two whites were court-martialed and natives were sentenced to long terms of imprisonment and flogging, and several were shot.

It provides for the exclusion of paupers, or any persons liable to bepome a charge on the public, with the a more profitable market in the United exception of those "seeking admission to the country to avoid persecution or punishment on religious or political grounds." It has been a proud boast of the British people that British soil has been the asylum for centuries of the oppressed of all nations. The expeption in the act is a tribute to the power of this chivalrous sentiment, but the intention appears to have been defeated by the difficulty of enforcing the regulations. A large discretion must be left to the immigration officials, who are puzzled to determine whether destitute aliens are what they represent themselves to be, Several Jewish refugees from Russia have been turned back, and Lord Rothschild claims to have proof that they were shot without a trial when they returned to the Russian frontier. British humanitarians are making an outcry, and urging the new Government to repeal legislation which is foreign to the traditions of the Liberal party. The anti-aliens' act, however, was adopted under pressure of the labor organizations. These are now in wirtual alliance with the ministry, and would oppose any attempt to trepeal the measure. 

The charge was laid by the Trades and Labor Council, and they were represented by Mr. W. T. J. Lee. It was alleged that Mr. Merrick visited the United States at the time that the lithographers' strike was on last August, and brought a man from New York to work in Toronto in the factory of Rolph & Clark.

The man, Henry M. Perry, appeared in court this morning, and told the

Magistrate Denison, taking into account that Perry had been born in Toronto, that his father had been a British subject, and that he had emphasized the fact that he was a Canadian to Mr. Merrick, when being engaged. held that Mr. Merrick had been deceived into thinking him a Canadian, and had forgotten to ask whether Perry had taken out naturalization papers in the United States, which he had. He dismissed the case.

True sportsmen are courteous and friendly in their sports. A sportsman must have courage; a coward is not worthy of the name.

The umpire shall decide the play.

Honor for the victors, but no derision for the vanquished. The true sportsman is a good loser in his games.

The sportsman may have pride in his success, but not concest.

John Montgomery Ward, for many years a professional baseball player, rises to remark that men of that profession are not dissipated, as a class. Why should they be? Why should the public think they are?

Let us consider the first proposition. Prefessional baseball players who smount to anything, reasonably expect to make the most of their talents. They are supposed to hope that they can continue to draw big salaries for many years. They know, if they know anything, that dissipation will hasten the day when salaries will no longer be forthcoming. Leaving it alone is the merest observation of the law of self-preservation. Why should

Why should the public get an idea that they dissipate? Because they hear about specific cases. Prominent exponents of the great game are almost constantly before the people. The public likes to know about them, Even their transgressions become public property and the public does not analyze. It misjudges the class by the actions of a few.

Summed up, it is a fact that dissipation among professional ball players is declining each year, due to recognition of its harmful effects and to the raising of the moral standard of the profession by the better material being annually attracted to it. 


