PEACE CONFERENCE TO BE START OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Viscount Grey Declares Complete Organization Can Be Effected Later.

London, Dec. 23 .- Viscount Grey, formerly secretary of state for foreign affairs, has written, at the request of the fairs, has written, at the request of the research committee of the League of Nations Union, an introductory note to a pamphlet entitled "The Peace Conference and After." After urging the great opportunity efforded by the peace conference for taking a practical step in the direction of forming a league of nations, Viscount Grey says: "It is not necessary for the peace conference to create a league of nations. The conference will in itself be a vital beginning of such a league. All that is absolutely necessary is that it should not commit suicide, but keep itself alive by adjourning and leaving a prominent fifth. 1. On the 6th day of December, 1918.

a bylaw was passed by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of London authorizing the issue of \$100,000 debentures for the purpose of




