Peter Seneca Is Being Sought by Police for Attacking and Badly Cutting Samuel Delaray on Welnesday Night.

Samuel Delaray, an Indian on the Muncey Reserve, is lying at death's door at his home, from wounds received in a brawl there on Tuesday night. He charges Peter Seneca with having committed the deed.

to death. Noah is at present serving a twelve-year term in Kingston. According to one story in circulation at the reserve, Delaray and Seneca were among a number of Indians, who had been imbibing freely.

A fight started, and, it is claimed, Delaray struck Seneca, knocking him down, The latter jumped up, and, pulling a knife, attacked Delaray, cutting

The injured man was taken into the house, and for a day or so, it did not appear that he was very badly hurt. Yesterday he began to grow worse, and today, it was stated that the Indian is dying. He is in an uncon-

Seneca disappeared, and posses are hunting for him. Delaray is frightfully cut-up, according to the latest advices. He is cut on the left side of the face from the ear around under the chin. There is slash at right angles to the first cut. After the fight the injured man rushed to the home of his aunt, Mrs.

A traveller named Snider from London was in the house at the time and he kept presure in the wounds preventing Delaray from bleeding to death. To this fact Delaray owes the fact that he is alive today. Dr. Dewar, of Melbourne, was immediately summoned, and dressed the

These columns of water, each 150 feet high, make a graphic picture of the explosion of submarine mines off Fort Wadsworth, S. I. (N. Y.) Huge Stone Cannon Ball Found in the Tweed River.

"BRAID SCOTS" SERMONS

Make Striking Appeal to Hearts o Highland Worshippers.

Glasgow, Oct. 26.—A huge stone cannon ball, about 18 inches in diameter and weighing about five hundredweight, was found recently in the Tweed close by Norham Castle, and it was probably fired from the famous Mons Meg in the reign of James IV. of Scotland four centuries ago. The King having suddenly declared war against England, a large Scottish army crossed the Tweed on Aug. 22, 1153, A.D., and appeared before Norham Castle with guns and siege artillery, including Mons Meg and the seven Borthwick guns. The old fortress was not able to withstand the weapons of coming ages, and surrendered. The ball found was probably at this siege fired from Mons Meg, and flying over the ramparts, alighted in the bed of the Tweed on the foot of the castle rock.

KING IN LONDON FROM VACATION

George Will Be Very Busy Until Departure For India.

BATTLESHIPS GROWING

Bigger Fighters for British Navy the Fleet Increases.

London, Oct. 26.-The King is again London, Oct. 26.—The King is again in London after the only vacation he has taken since his accession. The royal party came directly to London from Balmoral, where the last weeks of the vacation have been spent.

After a strenuous season, which included the coronation and the long list of succeeding festivities, the King and Queen left town at the end of July. Cowes week commenced the vacation, and between races the King and the Prince of Wales enjoyed bathing from a steam pinnace in Osborn Bay until the Prince had to leave to join his ship, the Hindustan, on board which he started active service affoat as a midshipman.

With the breaking up of the royal party on board the Victoria and Albert, the King and Queen returned to town for a day, and after bidding good-by to Queen Alexandra, the King went as the guest of Lord and Lady Ripon to Studley Royal for the opening of the shooting season.

After his shooting visits, the King took up his residence at Balmoral Castle, where the Queen and royal children had preceded him, and the succeeding weeks were spent in entertaining distinguished guests and with shooting parties on the Balmoral estates.

The King's resumption of residence at Buckingham Palace was marked by a reception to the envoy of the Portuguese republic, recently recognized by England. Until his departure for India for the Durbar the King will be kept so busy that it is hardly likely that he will get another extended vacation before next year.

After Keir Hardie.

The Liberals are out for Keir Hardie's scalp. The uncompromising Socialist has been going up and down the country condemning the Government, particularly for their action in calling out the troops at the time of the railway strike. Mr. Lloyd George took the lead when he gave Mrs Hardie a dressing down in the House of Commons, which, however, made the Socialist leader bitterer than ever, and his attacks have been so savera After Keir Hardie. and his attacks have been so severe that even the Labor leaders have had to repudiate them. The Liberal revenge is to take the form of opposing the re-election of Mr. Hardie for Merthyr-Tydvil. Hardie is a Scotsman, and has not been able to manage the language of Wales. To most of his constituents Welsh is their native tongue. The Liberal campaign against Mr. Hardie is therefore to be carried on in Welsh, which the Chancellor of the Exchequer and most of the Liberal leaders of Wales can talk as well as they can English, and it generally carries a Welsh audience. Whether it will wean the Welsh miners from their Socialist member remains to be seen.
