Paris, May 18 .- The Journal's Mukden correspondent says: Important events are imminent. The outposts of the two armies are already in contact in the zone northwest of Fen Wang Cheng. Southeast of Liao Yang the Japanese army advancing on Liao Yang is estimated at 100,000. A persistent rumor, which is not confirmed officially affirms that another Japanese corps is executing a flanking movement directed on some point between

Liao Yang and Mukden According to the best information there are now no less than 160,000 Japanese in Manchuria,

BOMBARDED KIN CHAU. London, May 18. - The Daily Telegraph's New Chwang correspondent cabling under date of May 17 says: "The Japanese with a large fleet of transports and warships, appeared at Kai Chau yesterday morning and opened a terrific bombardment against the shore defenses, which were silenced at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, the Rus-

sians retreating to Tashichao. "The Japanese troops landed and are today advancing rapidly, out-flanking Tashichao and New Chwang."

As figured out from the latest dispatches, from the seat of war in Manchuria, the Japanese are attempting to throw a net about Kuropatkin, using three armies in the operation. One of these is headed directly to Liao Yang, another is marching on New is south of Liao Yang, and a third is reported as turning up unexpectedly northeast of Muk-

den, doubtless with the object of cutting off the Russian retreat should they be compelled to retire from their present position. The correspondent of the Paris Journal says the rival armies are already in touch northeast of Feng Wang Cheng. This is probably the corps that is marching on Liao Yang, and is said to be 100,000 strong.

Despite the close investment of the fortress messages are getting out of Port Arthur, Chinese runners being substituted for the telegraph, and getting through the Japanese lines. Admiral Wittsoeft, who is in command, says all is well, and that Togo has not attacked for several days. 

The number of births registered in Ontario in 1902 was 47,796, an increase of 1,735 over the previous year. Yet there was a decrease of 66 in 1901. as compared with 1900. How can this be accounted for except by grossly defective registration? The variation of the birth rate by counties is another evidence of this. The rate for all Ontario last year was 21.7 births for each 1,000 of the population, but the following districts showed these percentages, which ought to please the most ardent anti-Malthusian:

Nipissing	
Prescott and Russell	
Algoma	30.3
Haliburton	29.4
Parry Sound	29.3

It may be said that these are new districts where the population is not exposed to the influences, moral, social or conventional, which operate to depress the birth rate in older communities. But the new district of Rainy River, where conditions are the same, shows a rate of only 17.5. The only explanation is that the vital statistics are not recorded as accurately in Rainy River as in the other portions of New Ontario. The city of Toronto in 1902 showed a birth rate of 24.0. London shows only 18.5, St. Catharines 18.9, Stratford 18.4 and Chatham 17.9. In all of these four places, Dr. Bryce says, "there is reason to believe defective registration plays a part in the abnormally low birth rate." DAMAGES CLAIMED BY BOTH WIVES

Wanstead Victim Twice Mar ried and Each Wife Wants Compensation.

Among those killed in the Grand Trunk accident at Wanstead on Dec. 26, 1902, was Wilson Morton, of Toronto and Chicago. Annie F. Morton, of To-ronto, and Maud Morton, of Hamilton, each of whom declared she was his widow, claimed damages for his death The Grand Trunk then asked the naster-in-chambers at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, to consolidate the cases, or else to decide which woman had the prior right as Morton's widow. In his judgment yesterday the master declined to consolidate, holding there was no rule for such a course, and told the

Grand Trunk that it must decide for

itself, which litigant should apply for

indemnity.

The claimants must sue separately. the master says, and then he adds: "So far as I can see, the Grand Trunk must determine upon the lawful widow. Then, if any settlement is made, it can be pleaded in the other action, and that plaintiff must es tablish her claim as best she can. "I might say that Annie F. Morton admittedly Morton's first wife. The claim of the second wife is based on a divorce granted in Cook county, Illinois, but the first wife disputes the validity of the separation on the ground that no rotice had been given her. From this it would seem that Maud Morton would have to establish

the validity of the divorce before she could prove claim." 
Council Awards a 'Phone Franchise to the Canadian Machine Company.
