

Several days must clapse before General Kuroki and General Oku can get into posation and jointly attack Ta Tohe Kim and Ki Chau, which it is believed will be the most likely point for an important battle.

Che Foo, Jume 25, 11 p. m.—Steamers arriving at Chemiupo from Moji, Japan, report that large numbers of Japanese troops and horses are awaiting transporation at Japanese ports. The toss of Ide resulting from the attacks of the Russian Vladivostock squadron on the Japanese transports Hitachi and Izumi, is now placed at 1,500. Many horses also were drowned.

THURSDAY'S NAVAL BATTLE THURSDAY'S NAVAL BATTLE London, Monday, June 27.—The Central News has received the following despatch from its Tokio correspondent date June 26, even mg—"A detailed account of the mayal battle at Port Arthur has just been published here. The Russian battleship Perceviet, Poltava and Sevastopol and the cruisers Bayan, Askold and Novik attempted to emerge from the harbor at dawn on June 23, led by steamers used for clearing the mines. At 11 a. m. the battleships Czarevitch, Retvizan and Pobeeda joined the others. All the shaps then advanced, endeavoring to

ese toppedo boats exchanged shots with seven Russian destroyers, which were covering the clearing operations. One of the Russian destroyers was set on fire and retired inside the harbor. Subsequently the Japanese decoyed the Russians out to see and awaited an opportunity to begin a general action, but between eight and nine in the evening the Russian ships made for the harbor.

The Japanese torpedo boat destroyers and toppedo boats chased the Russians, and at 9.30 delivered the first attack, in consequence of which the enemy was thrown into disorder. During the night eight separate attacks were delivered, lasting until dawn of Friday. In one of these assaults the Chirataka twice torpedoed a battleship of the Fereaviet type and ank her. A battleship of the Bevastopol type and a cruiser of the Diana type were disabled and towed away. The Russian vessels re-entered the harbor during Friday night. The newspapers publish eulogistic articles upon Vice-Admiral Togo's prompt action."

FIRING AT PORT ARTHUR. Ohe Foo, June 25, 11 p. m.—There was firing at Port Arthur last night, June 24, and to-night. The booming of hig guns was distinctly heard here to-night. Eighteen Japanese transports have been seen going west along the Corean coast.

GOING TO PIECES

interests in the interest of party cliques which has been so pronounced during recent years in Liberal circles appears to be reacting now. The revelations of rascality in conmeetion with the attempt to unseat Donald Sutherland have undoubtedly had their effect. The honest Liberals have had their eyes opened and will refuse to vote at the beck of the disreputable element which has controlled the Gveronment party in so many constituencies and brought disgrace upon the once respectable Reform party. The Ross-Stratton regime has proved too rank for the conscientious Liberals of Norwich, who declared, in a petition to the secretary of the South Oxford Reform Association that they would decline to attend the annual meeting of the association (at Mount Elgin last week While the Woodstock Sentinel-Review published a report which was made to show that the convention was united and harmonious, the fact of disaffection existing was not mentioned. The Express, however, found out the facts and told the story. Donald Sotherland redeemed South Oxford from the corruption which has grown too rank to be longer endured, and the honest Liberals who have rebelled against the machine are not likely to return to an allegiance that had grown unbearable.-St. Thomas Times.



CLEANING CARPETS.

Old and solled carpets or rugs may be cleansed and brightened without the trouble or expense of sending them out. Take a bar of laundry soap and shave it into a quantity of water sufficient to melt it, say, a pint or perhaps a little more. Put this on the stove and let it remain until it boils or until the soap is melted. Then remove and when cool add half a bottle of house hold ammonia.

This should make a soap about the consistency of jelly. To apply to the carpet use a stiff, clean scrubbing brush dampened just a trifle and scrub the carpet vigorously. Then wipe the soap off with a damp cloth and see that the carnet is not walked over until dry more water than is absolutely neces

The effect of this treatment is really surprising, the carpets looking as wel and sometimes better than when done at the cleaner's. Bagdad curtains and oriental rugs may be cleaned in th same manner, care being taken not to leave the soap on long enough to make the colors run.

KITCHEN HELPS.

To Freshen Kid Slippers. White or colored kid slippers often become shabby in appearance because the kid has been peeled off the heels. If the slippers are otherwise in good condition the heels can be made to look condition the heels can be made to look like new by cutting from the top of an old glove of the same color a piece of kid large enough to stretch and paste about the heel. The upper edge can be securely pushed under the sole of the shoe and neatly trimmed at the bottom. If not worn until perfectly dry the result is most satisfactory.

Petate Griddle Cakes.

Left over mashed potatoes can be made into dainty and wholesome gridmade into dainty and wholesome grid-dle cakes. The potatoes are first of all to be "riced," then mixed with the beaten yolks of two eggs (for three pints of potato), the whites to be whipped thoroughly, as for meringue, and added next. Enough thrice sifted four to make the batter firm and one pinch of sugar to insure prompt brown-ing is all that is necessary. Served with jam or maple sirup they will be found very delicious.

Peeling Tomatees.

Nearly every cook or recipe book says, "Pour boiling water over ripe tomatoes, then skin them," but this is a very vague direction. The correct way to peel tomatoes is to cover them with boiling water for half a minute, then lay them in cold water until perfectly cold, and the skin can be peeled off without difficulty, leaving the tomatoes unbroken and as firm as they were before being scalded.


