

Before us was a picketed inclosure, over one side of which canvas is tacked, that the currous pasers-by may not have a view of the ostriches without paying the admission

Leaving the carriage we walked along to the far side of the inclosure. As we stood before the fence the keeper gave a peculiar call and the ostriches hurried toward us. We had expected such great birds to move awkwardly. Instead, they move with an easy, gliding gait not unlike the camels. Perhaps both acquired it in the same way—from walking over the deep sands in their native land.

There must have been twelve or fifteen cestriches in the corral. They are stranged looking creatures, with long, bare least broad, flat bodies, and long, serpentilize necks, well suited to their small heads and bright eyes. The body of the ostrich is from four to five feet high, and the head rises high above the back, eight or ten feet from the ground.

Their demand has made what is called "ostrich farming" very profitable in Africa. In a wild state from five to firty ostriches may be found together. When ten to twolve sagss are lain the cook begins to broad. During the night be is surrounded by his wives. This is presumably to guard the nest from jackals and other wild animals, rather than to assist in hatching theegas, for they are often left for days to the heat of the sun only. About thirty eggs are laid in the nest and as many more are scattered around it.

Hunters often cover themselves with masks of ostrich feathers, and in this way approach the shy bleds. Only the young birds are captured.

"There is all the difference in the world," he said, "between the methods used by the secret service agents of different countries. Peopie who read French novels have an idea that the disquises spoken of in them as being worn by the Leoogs of the different stories as something auterly untrue. Birange as it may seem, however, it is true. "A French detective who can not so disquise himself that his superior can not recognize him could not find employment in any detective bureau. The disquises are wonderful, too, and even the strong light of day shows no imperfection in them. "There are two sorts of detectives in Frances—State detectives and the municipal or city force. Among the former no one knows who his fellow detectives are, and as they never work in pairs, the necessity for knowing each other is not so great. The workings of the French bureau is very thorough and more like the American method than the English.

"The latter never think of disguising themselves, and go to work openly. If a bank is robbed in France a new assistant teller or clerk appears in the bank a day or so afterward. He is a detective, of course, and where in England the detective would be called in in front of all the employes and ask them all manner of questions, the French would say nothing, and nothing more would probably be heard of the robbery until the their was caught.

"The English have a great system of stool-pigeons. Among the viclous of all classes, male and female, are always those to be found who, for the sake of being protected in a certain way, carry all the news of the erooked work done among the swell mobamen, as high class thieves are called, to Routland Yard, where is situated the Criminal Investigation Bureau. If 'Harry, the Swell,' is flashing a great deal of money about the fact is at once reported to the police, and if any large forgery or robbery has recently cecured, 'Harry, the Swell,' is liable to prove an allot.
