A writ has been issued on behalf of the Canadian Bank of Commerce against the Casselman Lumber Conspany, of Casselman, Ont., and Charles G. Davis, Benton Harbor, Mich., for \$5000 on promissory

The insurance rates on the buildings and their stock, between King street, and German st, St. John, N. B., have been increased. The increase is from \(\frac{1}{2}\) to 1 per cent on buildings and \(\frac{1}{2}\) to 3 per cent on stocks. There are quite a number of firms between the points mentioned and they will not, it is understood, accept the change.

The Supreme Court of Maine has been considering the question of the right of a military and conductor to tear off the tickets in a mileage book other than that desired by passenger. The full Bench concurs in an opinion that the conductor has this right. It seems that the plaintiff in the case wanted the ticket torn from the back, instead of the front, of the book, and went to law when his wish was disregarded.

Several wholesale houses are interested in the embarrassment of John Clark, general store-keeper, of Mount Brydges, who has effected a compromise at 40 cents on the dollar, at three, six and nine months, secured.

The Hamilton Radial railway has consented to withdraw from its bill the clause authorizing the use of steam power on the Toronto branch. Mayor Tuckett objects to the company being allowed until January 1st, 1902, to complete the line.



Mr. D. Bain, who has carried on business in Toronto under the firm name of James Bain & Son, has assigned his book debts to J. T. Hornibrook, of Brown Bros. The business was closed under a chattel mortgage for \$4,500 last week, but has now been purchased by A. E. Huestis, and is being run under the firm name of the Bain Book and Stationery Company,

The annual report of the famous Cariboo mine shows that the total work of the last season was 45 days, 9 hours, and the gold product of the season reached \$60,806. The estimated gross product of the mine for 1896 is \$300,000, the net profits \$213,000. The report says that when the appliances are completed the annual net profit will be \$540,000.

FIRE-RESISTING PAINT.

A PAINT THAT HAS STOOD SEVERE TESTS AND WILL PROVE EFFECTIVE IN PROTECTING MINE BUILDINGS FROM FIRE.

Some remarkable results are reported from the the use of the Jamieson fire resisting paints and kalsomine. Recent severe tests have shown that a wooden building protected by only (we coats of this product will effectually resist ignition. In a large fire at Carteret, N.J., last year the value of this paint as a check



on the spread of flames was illustrated. The cut presented here-

with gives a view taken three days after the fire.

The three buildings standing in the background were protected by Jamieson fire-resisting paints; the ruins represent several acres of building painted with ordinary paint. Every building painted with ordinary paint, we are informed, was totally destroyed, while none of the buildings painted with the Jamieson fire-resisting paint were sufficiently injured to

require repairing.

The burned blocks of buildings were only sixty feet away from those painted with the Jamicson fire-resisting paint, and extended lengthwise beyond them on either end. The direction of the wind during the fire was directly from the burning buildings toward the unburned block, and although the covering boards were badly scorched in several places, they did not ignite. Owing to the almost entire absence of fire appliances, it was considered certain that had these buildings once caught fire in any one spot they also would have been totally destroyed, and that they did not catch fire was undoubtedly due to their protective coating of Jamicson fire-resisting raint.

A practical test like this on a large scale is in some respects of more value than prepared tests on a small scale, no matter how carefully the details may be arranged. In one of such tests lately held some very satisfactory facts, however, were brought out. This test was made in the presence of the representatives of the New York fire department, building department, dock department, board of fire underwriters and of several large railroad and manufacturing companies. The following description of this test is given:

"The ordinary course of these events is that the conflaggations start in some light, quickly-burning and very inflammable substance; for example, paper, shavings, oil waste, etc. From these any adjacent heavier combustibles, are ignited. The wooden portions of a building, as a rule, furnish the readiest fuel, and are the best means of spreading the fire. To imitate the regular course of events, therefore, a large cask of hardwood was placed in the building, filled with shavings and the whole soaked with kerosene oil. The match was then applied, and immediately the oil-coaked shavings burst into flames, completely filling the building. At the same time the outside of the building was surrounded with similar fuel (shavings and hard wood barrel staves), and the attack started from the outside as well as the inside.

"After several minute:, the shavings and oil having burned out and the harrel staves having caught, the shavings became less in volume, but of greater intensity, and the spectators retired to a distance, and, shielding their faces from the intense heat, expected the destruction of the building. Matters were stimulated by throwing on a few gattons of oil at intervals. Then the sue was allowed to hum itself out, and as soon as the slames from the barrels died down and the building was cool enough to approch, it was seen that the boards had not caught fire at all, and the only damage was a charring of the surface.

and the only damage was a charring of the surface.

The process of firing was then repeated and continued for a period of one hour and twenty minutes, the only intermissions being a few seconds at a time to see whether the buildings had taken fire. The intense heat gradually charred the wood away until holes were burned completely through the side and roof, but still the building did not take fire, the nearest approach to it being at the edges of the boards, where little flickering flames appeared, which, however, made no headway, but died out when the fuel cessed to burn. Finally the building was upset over a mass of burning barrel staves, but still refused to break into flames.

"The total time of test was one hour and twenty minutes and

"The total time of test was one hour and twenty minutes, and the actual time of exposure to intense fire (deducting the time of stoppages for examination) was one hour and ten minutes.

"The results of the test satisfied those present that a building of ordinary pine lumber can be protected from fire by a simple and necessary operation without any increased cost of construction viz, by painting with the Jamieson fire esisting paint or kalsomine. It was further shown that light and inflammable pine, it conted with the Jamieson fire resisting paint or kalsomine will not actively burn, but must be slowly charred away by the heat from some external fuel." 



is a spirit of unrest all over this con. tinent at the present moment. In the United States it is a presidential year, and the disturbing influences of the turmoil of political excitement are increased by the evident eagerness of Congress to subordinate the business of the country to politics, and par ticularly its indifference to the fact that the revenues of the Government are insufficient to meet the appropriations which Congress itself is making. Uncertainty as to whether the two great political parties will separately take positive and unequivocal positions relative to the maintenance of the gold standard in the pending Presidential campaign is another deterrent influence. In this country, also, we are looking forward to an election, the result of which may possibly-though not probablychange the fiscal policy of the Dominion to a certain extent. Naturally our business men are disposed to be extremely cautious in all transactions, and no one is inclined to discount the future at a moment when the political horizon is darkened with stormclouds. Yet the outlook is not altogether

sombre. Although business is dull and hesitating there are many bright spots which may form the nuclei for for a clearer commercial atmosphere before long. The revival of trade in England is most marked. There is a plethora of money in all the great financial centres, and it is felt that, could once the disturbing political factors be removed, it would not be long before business would settle down to its old channels with renewed confidence. The trouble is that no one knows how long our political leaders will keep the monetary situation in a condition of unrest, or what the ultimate result of the conflict may be when they finally decide to appeal to the country. It is this which renders merchants so conservative. They have no guarantee as to what the tariff conditions may be at the close of the present year, and they are not disposed to take any This is the season of the year when speculative risks. But with a Presidential election on in the United States, the European situation strained and anxious, and an unusually exciting election due in our own country, it is idle to expect commerce to be calm and unresponsive. That the dedepression is passing away there is no doubt. And in its passage it has removed a quantity of deadwood and left the tree of commerce all the more sound and wholesome for the liberal pruning it has received. But until the political horizon is clear it is hopeless to look for any marked improvement, and we can only count upon the steady, if almost imperceptible, advance, which is inseparable from a strong and virile nation pressing steadily forward to fulfil its destiny.

FARM ANIMALS IN THE UNITED STATES.

The report of the census of farm animals, taken by the U.S. Department of Agriculture during the past year, shows the way in which the trolley car, the bicycle and the scarcity of fodder due to a succession of seasons of drouth, have depleted the number of horses in the United States. During the seven years ending with 1895, this class of live stock decreased in value nearly \$500,000,000, and this fali in value appears to have been universal, the only fairly acceptable figures anywhere commanded being for good roadsters and fancy stock. The financial and industrial depression, the introduction of more efficient motive power, and the cost of feed consequent on protracted and repeated drouths are the chief reasons adduced. Sales at \$2 and below are reported from Kansas, Nebraska. Utah and Oregon, while colts are unsable in many counties. Old and inferior stock have been largely killed off in the central region and in California for fertilizer or as food for hugs, and there seems to be no hope of any alteration for the better, so far as the average grades of horses are

> Milch cows increased slowly until the commencement of 1895, when the continued drought in many sections of the United States caused a decrease of 367,043, or 2.2 per cent. The average value of cows increased 58 cents last year, and the aggregate value of cows has, with some variations, increased during the whole of this period. The aggregate is a million and a third greater than it was a year ago. A satisfactory increase was that of \$1.80 a head for oxen and other cattle, whose numbers decreased more than two millions last year The number and the aggregate value of oxen and other cattle has been decreasing since 1892. The demand for cattle has strengthened since the harvest of 1895, and the value of the animals has pretty generally increased in the Central West and the Northwest.

> Whether it be due to drought, or to free wool, the number of sheep have decreased steadily during the past two years in the United States. They have also decreased in value to the extent of sixty million dollars, or nearly one-half the value of the flocks three years ago. Last year there was a decrease in number of nearly four million, against a decline of five millions in the two preceding years. But there was last year an increase of 12 cents in the average value of sheep, due to a greater demand for mutton, The aggregate value of sheep declined last year only 2.3 per cent, thus comparing favorably with the declines in other animals. Swine, for example, which have not been subject to adverse legislative influences, declined last year 3 per cent in number, 12.5 per cent in average value, and 15 per cent in aggregate value. Last year's decline in the value of swine was close to thirty-three million dollars. The number of swine has been declining constantly from 1892, and the value has been declining from 1893. so that evidently the poor corn crops which preceded last year's bounteous harvest were not without their effect upon the hog crop.

Taking the statistics for the past little change in numbers, the decline in the values of domestic animals was of public interest. Mr. Auditor-Gen-

reached in 1893. They then began to decline slowly but continually, and at the present time the total value is \$739,912,840 less than it was in 1884 and \$755,580,597 less than it was in 1893. These decreases are not due, save in the case of sheep, to unfavorable legislation. They are simply the outcome of the march of human invention and the general condition of business in the country. As practically the same conditions prevail upon this side of the political line as on the other, they may possibly be faithfully reflected in this country also. At all events they bear testimony to the general shrinkage in values and show that the farmer has not escaped entirely the effects of the wave of depression which overwhelmed so many of his mercantile brethren.

THE AUDITOR-GENERAL'S REPORT.

We suppose if the chrysalis from which a butterfly is about to be developed were able to think and to express its ideas, it would tell us that the one thing of supreme importance in this world is the preparation for that event. The Auditor-General seems to have almost as narrow a conception of the movements of the world outside his office, for he has caused a report to be printed which outdoes all his previous efforts at prodigiousness of bulk. The book is so paged in sections as to give no clue to the number of pages; but it contains about 1,300, which is enough reading material for the life of any ordinary person, and far too much for most of us who are unable to devote all our time to the wearisome details of accounts. The Auditor-General makes a new departure in his last report. These official documents are supposed to contain such matter only as refers to the affairs of the departconcerned. Many of the letters are mere formal acknowledgements, and others relate to matters which no outside reader can get a gleam of information from. This is an unbusinesslike and inconvenient system. The expenditures of each department should be set out fully in the report of that department, so that each would be complete. 

The real estate mortgage loans recorded during the month of February, in the registration division of Moutreal West amount to \$121,907.43; of this amount \$51,762.43 was placed at 5 per cent, \$23,000 st 51 per cent, \$17,000 at 51 per cent, \$17.815 at 6 per cent, \$1,830 at 7 per cent, \$2,500 at 8 per cent, and \$8,000 at a nominal rate. In Montreal East, the loans recorded amount to \$265,403; of this amount \$40,000 was placed at 42 per cent, \$23,000 at 5 per cent, \$64,000 at 51 per cent, \$59,550 at 5½ per cent, \$62,950 at 6 per cent, \$4,350 at 7 per cent, \$1,400 at 8 per cent, \$900 at 10 per cent, and \$9,253 at a nominal rate.

GRAIN IN FARMERS' HANDS.

The quantity of wheat remaining in farmers' hands March 1 is 19,000,000 bushels less than a year ago, according to the special report of the "American Agriculturist." Consolidated estimates of county correspondence indicate that 29.3 per cent. or 134,513,000 bushels of the wheat crop of 1895, is still on farms. Corn on the farm. 46.6 per cent, or 1,061,000,000 bushels, and oats 45.9 per cent, or 414,943,000 bushels. A special investigation indicates that in corn crop, or 160,000,000 bushels, which has passed out of first hands is now stored in the cribs in the territory in which it was raised. The present estimate of 135,-000,000 bushels wheat as probable farm stock is intended to incorporate all wheat now on the farm, including not only commercial surplus but stocks reserved for spring seeding and such domestic consumption as is supplied by local custom milling. The present winter, however, has been exceptionally mild, and in many which can be judged by appearances. 

MEN'S STYLES.

The new fashions in men's wear do not not show many radical alterations from last fall and winter. Still there will be a few new styles and some changes, giving the effect of lightness as against heaviness in designs. In effect the production of sugar has been too great on that side of the Atlattic, whilst the cane grown on this side has barely sufficed. This now bids fair to be altered, and its effect on the markets of the world remains to be seen. It may be taken, however, as a fact, that the change will be beneficial to growers of sugar, both beet and cane, and it may for a year or so at least obviate a return to such rumous prices as obtained during the past season of 1894-95. The excess in visible supplies is slowly melting away, for whereas on the 1st of October last year it was 809,000 tons, it has now been reduced to 272,000 tons, and will soon show a deficiency. This is the position to-day. Visible of 1896, 2,654,000 tons; 1895, 2,382,000 tons; 1894, 1,853,000 tons. The present beet-root crop is turning out better than was expected, and after allowing for the reduction in sowings, M. Licht now estimates the deficiency at only about 500,000 tons. His figures are as follows: European beet crops, 1895-96, 4,270,000 tons; 1894-95, 4,752,000 tons; 1893-94, 3,889,000 tons. He also estimates Cuba's production at about 200,000 tons instead of 1,000,000 tons, or thereabouts, thus demonstrating a possible deficiency from beet and Cuba of 1,300,000 tons. This is a rather startling amount of sugar to go short of, even allowing for some slight increase in certain cane countries, and the \$00,000 tons excess in the world's supplies at the commencement of this season.

CHEAP LABOR AND ITS DRAW-BACKS.

It is a curious but instructive fact that the advantages accruing from the operation of the mills day and night, and the employment of labor at about the lowest wages in the world, are in great measure offeet in Japan by the necessity of employa great many more laborers to do a given amount of work than in any other country. The disparity in the number of persons employed is so great as to stagger belief, but if the difference were not quite so great it would raise no question whatever, for in proportion to a given amount of product American industrial establishments employ fewer operatives than English, and English employ fewer than Germany and France, and these employ fewer than Italian and Russian; and the number of persons employed rises so fast as the rate of wages goes down that Mr. Thomas Brassey concluded that the cost of building railroads was nearly the same in all parts of the world, and his son lord Brassey extended this rough approximation to other labor than that of building railways. Where machinery is employed it has seemed difficult to believe that there could be very great differences in the efficiency of labor, but more machinery is tended by one operative in England than by one on the Continent, and more by one operative in the United States than by one in England.

The distribution of merchandise continues moderate and careful buying is the rule in all departments of trade. Orders are being booked ahead to some extent for spring delivery when cheaper freight rates will be in force. Profits on all expurtable farm produce are small and in the case of live stock, losses have been encountered. Fair returns are hoped for this spring from the lumbering industry.

DRY Goods.—The tone of outside markets is encouraging to sellers and there is confidence that prices will be maintained. What is wanted locally is fine, spring weather and we have had such for two days this week Liverpool cotton, easier; American 4s 13-32d. New York, cotton, spots, steady; Uplands, 7ic; Gulf. 81. Futures, steady; March, 7.58c; April, 7.59c; May, 7.68c; June, 7.66; July, 7.67c; Aug. \$7.67.

RAW FURS.—The fur busines is quiet, and prices are nominal. We quote: Spring beaver \$3.50 to \$4.50 per pound; fall beaver, \$1.50 to \$5.50; black bear skins, \$7.50 to \$18.00; brown hear, \$5.30 to \$12; red fox, \$1 to \$1.40; otter, \$7 to \$12.50; raccoon, 46c to 10c; skink, 50c to \$1.00; muskrats, winter, 9c to 15c; fall, 8c to 10c; mink. \$1 to \$1.20. A sale of Hudson's Bay furs has been proceeding in London since Monday. Silver fox, cross fox and red fox skins have declined thirty per cent, blue fox, forty per cent and white fox fifty per cent from the prices of 1895. Marten furs have advanced ten per cent. Otter, seven and a half per cent, over the prices of 1895.



GROCERIES.—Business is about equal to what it was a week ago. In a large way little has been done but jobbers reporter moderate output. First cot at the refineries for granulated is 4½ to 4½c, as to size of lot; vellows 3½c. European advices on beet sugar are firm and in New York a fractional advance has occurred in the raw market. It is now the grinding season in Cuba and in some provinces nothing is being done. A sugar expert in Havana gives the situation up to the March 1st as follows:—

The probable shortage the year will be 873,000 tons, or over 87 per cent of a normal crop. These figures contain only one element of doubt, that is as to whether the decree of General Woyler that planters shall grind, or of Gomez that they shall not grind, will be enforced. Gomez at present occupies eight-tenths of the sugar producing districts. He has more men and seems better able to enforce his decree than eyer before. Therefore, the estimate of 63,000 tons for the balance of the season is on the long side. The elimination of over 800,000 tons will undoubtedly affect the price of sugar all over the world. 
Business on the Stock Exchange continues to be extremely limited in its character, in sympathy with New York, where the uncertainty as to the antics of Congress and the multiplicity of war scares have almost paralyzed speculation. But prices continue firm because the amount of stocks available for speculative purposes on the market is so small that any attempt to hammer prices down would simply result in a squeeze, unless holders can be frightened into letting go their stocks, which does not look likely at present, as most of the "bear" arguments have been reiterated so often that the public have become accustomed to them

Money is unchanged in this market at 5 to 51 per cent for call loans and at 6 to 7 per cent for discount according to name and date. In New York money was casier, notwithstanding the call of the Treasury for 20 per cent of the money deposited in the banks. It is the policy of the Treasury to keep money rates comparatively high, and this call will, therefore, probably be succeeded by another one in short order. On call, money is 31/6/11 per cent. Time money, 4 per cent for sixty and ninety days, and 41 per cent for four, five, and six months on mixed Stock Exchange collateral. Commercial paper, 51@6 per cent for first-class endorsed bills receivable and four months' commission paper, and 6 per cent and upward

for choice single names. In London money is 1 per cent on call, and the rate for discount in the open market is 11-16 per cent for both short and three months bills.

In this market sterling exchange closed easier. Between banks sterling sixties were 9 5-16 to 9 7-16, demand 9# to 9 11-16 and cables 9#. Over the counter sixties were $9\frac{1}{2}$ to $9\frac{1}{2}$, demand drafts 95 to 10, and cables $10\frac{1}{8}$. New York funds were 140 to 1-16 discount between banks, and 1-16 to 1/8 premium over the counter. In New York sterling exchange was dull and steady. Continental exchange was dull Posted asking rates for sterling, \$1.87½ for long bills and \$1.88½ for demand. A group of representatives of the leading commercial organizations of the principal cities of the United States will make a trip this year to the Argentine Republic, Uruguay and Brazil. Invitations from the governments of those republics have been received by the United States state department for delivery to the chambers of commerce and other organizations interested.

Hon. A. C. Cox, of the United States district court, on application of the Natural gas fuel company, reviewed decision of appraisers, holding that the gas was duitable, over-ruled it, and held that natural gas is a crude bitumin, and a crude mineral, and, therefore, exempt from duty under paragraph 651 of the act of 1890. The gas is piped from Canada under the Niagara river.
