The difficulty is to get them to go home. You will thus see that my work is very exhausting; but oh! it is most pleasant. I am convinced that this excitement will spread, that it will reach England, and that you will share with us in the blessing. Urge upon your friends in Christ the cultivation of the spirit of humble, earnest, united and exhortant prayer.
