**Green Grape Jelly**

Pick, wash, drain and remove stems from the grapes, then separate skins from the pulp. Put the pulp in a granite saucepan and beat to the boilingpoint. Keep over a slow heat until the seeds separate themselves from the pulp, then rub through a sieve. Add an equal measure of sugar and cook slowly thirty minutes. Stir occasionally to prevent burning. If gas is used the cooking dish should be set on an asbestos mat. Dispose of in jelly glasses or jars. Cover with paraffin wax.—Eldora Lockwood, Dow in Weman's World for August.

The Canadian government is to make another attempt to preserve Sable Island by forestation. The island is of no value in itself, but the government maintains a light house and a life saving station there, and consequently wishes to prevent the sandy wastes from being wholly eaten away by winds and waves. The island is now about twenty-five miles long and mile and a quarter wide. When navigators first knew it, the island was a hundred miles long and twice as wide as it is now. The sea has demolished two lighthouses built within a generation. The point where they stood is now five miles out from the shore.

The Minister of the Militia has decided that in future, in every case of promotion beyond the rank of captain, a special report shall previously be submitted to him as to the officer's personal record as a rifleman, his natural or acquired qualifications, his special interest in keeping the company together previous to or during annual training, and the number of his officers and noncommissioned officers who have qualified at provisional schools.

### Hearing Continued in Sydney Murder Case.

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 8.—The preliminary hearing in the case of Frank Haynes, of San Francisco, charged with the murder of B. S. Atkinson, was resumed this afternoon, the crown having another array of witnesses summoned, and further evidence was brought out bearing closely upon the case.

Two thousand people filled the corridors, halls and chambers. Press, counsel and even the magistrate, found it next to impossible to reach their places. Proceedings were delayed half an hour, and it was not until one man was arrested and the sheriff threatened to clear the court room that order prevailed. Women grew hysterical, men excited and children cried.

The prisoner seemed worried, the strain of the past few days apparently telling on him. Throughout, he took notes of the proceedings. He refuses emphatically to have his picture taken.

### Brakeman Met Instant Death

Amherst, N. S., Sept. 8.—While shunting at Spring Hill Junction tonight about eight o'clock brakeman Percy LeBlanc, of Moncton, on No. 33 train, better known as the Spring Hill "cannon ball" accidentally caught his foot in the frog of the rails and five cars passed over his body, killing him instantly.

LeBlanc has been a brakeman about two years on the I. R. C. This was his first and fatal run on this train since the change of time table that took effect Monday. ### Train Wreck at Kentville

Tuesday night about ten trains that ever passed over the D. A. Ry., came into Kentville. It contained 22 coaches filled with men of the 78th, regiment, Pictou, on the way to Aldershot for a fortnight's drill. This train was drawn by three engines.

The train came to a sad mishap before reaching its destination. At the points where the main line branches off toward the C.V. Branch north of the machine shops part of the train left the track. Three large I. C. R. coaches filled with soldiers slid down a steep embankment and another car was derailed. For some most fortunate and almost unaccountable reason not one of the inmates of the cars was hurt. The whole Regiment arrived at Aldershot not much the worse of the shaking up.

The cars remained coupled together and did not roll over. They were not very much damaged. The large Crane Car Stellarton and a crew from Truro, arrived on Wednesday. One car was lifted on Wednesday evening and the other two yesterday.

A large number visited the scene and witnessed the wreck and the process of lifting the cars to the track. The D. A. R. has always been most fortunate in all the wrecks which have occurred.

### Sad Drowning and Brave Attempt at Rescue

On Saturday, Aug. 30th., a sad drowning accident occurred near South Blomidon, when Everett Corkum, aged 14 years, the only son of Mr. George Corkum, came to an untimely end. While bathing about 11 o'clock in the morning at Mill Creek, he got astride of a log and using his hands as paddles got out into deep water, the log however commenced to turn over, it being wet and slippery, he was unable to retain his hold and letting go attempted to regain the shore, only to sink. At this time Mr. Lloyd Legge, a son of Mr. Benjamin Legge, of Scotts Bay Road, who had been watching from a distance saw the boy sinking, and ran to help him and bravely plunged into the water, which was some 15 feet deep and though himself also unable to swim, attempted to rescue the boy, only to find himself in danger of drowning and but for the timely help of some boys who pushed out a plank to him would probably have lost his life. The body was recovered some hours later at low tide.

Much sympathy must go out to Mr. George Corkum in his loss, as he himself is sick and confined to his bed with rheumatism and his little son was his only helper. Some two years ago another young son also lost his life through being burnt to death in a barn. The brave action of Mr. Lloyd Legge deserves more than passing notice and though he was not successful he has the satisfaction of knowing that he did all that was in his power to save the boy.

In Ontario... the general average has been reduced... from 50 per cent of a full crop, the... July estimate, to less than 47 per cent... with quality fairly good.

**Everything Now Favors Crops**  
Winnipeg, Sept. 4.—Recent rains in the Canadian prairies have had little effect on the 1913 crop, according to advices from the principal points in the provinces. Harvesting is practically completed, and the rain, falling on the stooked wheat, dried off as the grain dried out, so that threshing will be taken up just as soon as it would have been under ordinary circumstances. Some rain fell in Manitoba and a little in Saskatchewan yesterday, but the fall was only spasmodic, and the garnering of grain will not suffer. The temperatures taken at midnight showed a good level maintained, with no signs of frost, and few clouded skies.

**On the Matter of Prices.**  
The report has some very pertinent and sensible remarks to make on the matter of prices, especially with regard to speculative prices. There is a general application to these remarks which are valuable reading to growers on either side of the border line. As follows:  
"We have reports of buyers offering 75c per barrel on the trees. This, of course, is an absurdly low price. There is absolutely no reason why every apple in Canada should not be sold this year at a price that would bring back to the grower at least \$1.25 per barrel on the tree. On the other hand, we find reports of some independent co-operative associations asking \$3.50 per barrel for No. 1 Spies. It is quite as absurd for the grower to accept so small a price for his apples as to leave him no profit as to ask so large a price that the merchant who handles his fruit will have no profit. As a matter of fact all prices at the present time are purely speculative and it would be much better for all parties concerned to wait until the crop is assured, if not harvested. There are many conditions that cannot be predicted at the present time that will enter into the problem and the nearer estimates can be made to the time the fruit is ready to be placed upon the market the nearer the true value of the fruit can be gauged.  
There is undoubtedly a slight shortage of apples in all the apple growing districts of the world for this year. But the shortage is not by any means a failure, and under the stimulus of high prices it will be extraordinary how large the quantity of apples may be upon the market at a later date. The present market conditions are extremely critical. On two or three occasions we have had within the last decade somewhat similar conditions, and in each case very grave mistakes have been made in placing the fruit upon the market. In 1910 many dealers, noting the short crop, went into the field early in the season, paid fairly high prices to those who knew

In each of the places visited "the skeleton timbers of factories and additions were rising rapidly. Factories, long established and prosperous, were installing new machinery. The signs "Help Wanted" were numerous. Processions of loaded freight cars were moving out of switches. Many manufacturers stated that they could not keep up to their orders. There seemed to be no idle men anywhere. No strikes were encountered. Manufacturing suburbs full of workmen's homes were appearing in places where the hay fields rustled a few years ago. Good homes they were, too, and, walking among them, one was forced to wonder if there were any poor."

In Hamilton, the third manufacturing centre in the Dominion, thirteen factories are being extended and 22 new factories erected. In Galt, "the little Birmingham of Canada," the capacity of several of the largest existing plants is being enlarged at considerable expense to keep up with the demands from a growing market. A new cotton mill and a new steel plant are under construction at Welland, and a furnace company is to spend \$750,000 on a plant at Port Colborne which will employ two hundred men. Thorold and Port Robinson are securing new industries this year, while important industrial expansion is reported from Niagara Falls and St. Catharines.

At Brantford a great deal of money is going into new plants and enlargements of old ones, and similar developments are forward at London, St. Thomas, Stratford, Guelph, Berlin, Preston and Sarnia. Windsor, Walkerville and Sandwich are getting new industries from the United States and a considerable portion of the City of Detroit is said to be "moving across into Canada" in the wake of motor car and other transplanted industries. Altogether this review of industrial conditions throughout Western Ontario is very cheering to those who are inclined to be pessimistic over the stringency in the money market. So long as our crops increase, so long as the population continues to grow as rapidly as at present, and so long as the National Policy is maintained we are scarcely likely to see many idle factories or much poverty in this country.

#### Antigonish M. P. Had Toes Amputated by I. C. R. Train

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 7—William Chisholm, M.P. of Antigonish, while returning from Halifax to his home at Healderton on Saturday, met with a very painful accident, having his foot crushed under the wheels of the train at South River Antigonish county. A special train with physicians was sent out, and Mr. Chisholm was taken to the Antigonish Hospital and the toes amputated. He had left the train for a few minutes, and while getting on board he made a misstep and his foot went under the wheels. A dispatch from Antigonish tonight says that he is resting easily.

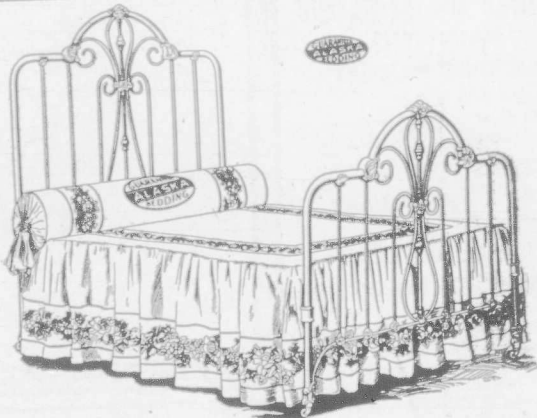
