The Minister's statement and the Railway Department were sharply rificised by Mr. Haggart and Dr. Reid. The former referred to Mr. Graham's lack of information, especially in regard to the prospecive cost of the Transcentinental, bowed that the Intercolonial was on at an actual loss of more than \$1,000,000 a · year, denounced the deception in the branch line pro gramme, and estimated that the Grand Trunk Pacific extension would put the I. C. R. largely out f business. He proved that the ost of operating the Intercolonial was large out of all proportion to he revenues or the work socomplished.
